

The Perspective of Faith

In the great faith chapter, Hebrews 11, we find what seems at first sight to be a strange request. We read that Joseph, when he was about to die, spoke about the coming departure of the children of Israel from Egypt and gave commands that they take his bones with them when they left. We may be even more puzzled when we read that what Joseph did was a great act of faith.

One might ask, “What has this to do with faith? With all the great deeds of faith before his eyes, why does the writer of the book of Hebrews stop to record how Joseph gave instructions about where his bones should finally come to rest?” However, a closer look reveals that what Joseph did was indeed a remarkable act of faith.

The Israelites had risen in Egypt from poverty to power. They were now prosperous in the home that Joseph had provided for them. But at his death, Joseph looked forward to a time when his people would no longer be prosperous, when they would be persecuted and would leave Egypt to go back to their own land.

Joseph took his eyes from the present with its prosperity, and he fastened them on the future of his people, a future which was filled with the promises given by Jehovah to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. To them God had promised a land, and it was in that land, in Canaan, that Joseph said that he should be finally buried.

Like Moses after him, and like all those who are truly faithful to God, Joseph chose to suffer affliction with the people of God. He could look past the present, with all its enticements, and see the destiny that God had for him with his chosen people.

For this reason the writer of Hebrews records this as a great act of faith: “By faith, Joseph, when he died, made mention of the departing of the children of Israel; and gave commandment concerning his bones” (Hebrews 11:22).
