When deciding where to vacation, the state of Arizona can offer unlimited experiences that will keep you coming back for more.

Enjoy a hot, sunny morning in Phoenix, then take a drive north, climbing 7,000 feet, passing through mountainous terrain and breathtaking landscapes, and end up at the <u>Grand Canyon</u> in the afternoon.

On a recent visit to Arizona, I was lucky enough to experience this first-hand with stops in Phoenix, Flagstaff, Prescott and the Grand Canyon.

While visiting the Grand Canyon is awe-inspiring, taking a helicopter ride above it is an experience of a lifetime.

<u>Maverick Helicopters</u> — a pretty cool name for Top Gun fans — is set up just outside the Grand Canyon. No, our pilot Chris doesn't look like Tom Cruise, but he still is a high-flyer and a master of his craft.

Having never flown in a helicopter before, Chris put our nerves at ease by going though safety procedures and explaining where we were about to fly. My wife and I got front-row seats right up there with the pilot. After lift-off, we picked up speed and flew over the Kaibab National Forest en route to the Grand Canyon.

We are told the flight path is set by the Federal Aviation Administration, so that chopper tours stay far away from the busy tourists sections of the Canyon. Given its size — more than 445-km long and up to 29-km wide — that wasn't a problem.

As we approached the edge of the Grand Canyon, the sheer size of it was hard to believe. Hovering above and looking down 6,000 feet, the mighty Colorado River looked very small.

Chris told us about the Canyon, the rock formations and the different names of the monuments. Some of the areas we flew over are so remote, they have never been touched by humans.

Flying with Maverick Helicopters is truly a unique way to experience the Grand Canyon.

But you can also visit via tour bus, car, by hiking the many trails, riding muleback, or floating down the Colorado River.

The park is massive and driving around the rim allows you to stop and experience different views from all sides.

For the adventurous types, hiking down into the Canyon is a must. Most of the trails are steep and climbing back out takes twice as long and much more effort.

Just outside the Grand Canyon sits the picturesque town of Tusayan. There you will find a visitors centre, restaurants, and hotels.

Just five minutes from the South Rim is the <u>Squire Resort at the Grand Canyon</u>.

Recently purchased by Delaware North, the 322-room hotel and resort is undergoing a massive renovation to attract even more tourist and business.



Sales manger Greg Espinoza says they are hoping to work right through the winter in order to get the renovation done quickly. The building we stayed in had already been renovated and had been done with great attention to detail and care.

The property has many food and beverage options, including Coronado, a fine-dining restaurant, and Squire Pub, both of which we enjoyed.

There's also a banquet facility, indoor and outdoor pools, a fitness centre that is being upgraded, and a bowling and arcade area.

Just imagine hosting a work conference only a few minutes from the Grand Canyon. Work in the morning, have lunch, take a swim, and then head up to the Canyon for an afternoon of adventure. The Squire Resort is perfectly situated for visitors to the Grand Canyon.

FLAGSTAFF IS OUT OF THIS WORLD


<u>Flagstaff</u> is one of the more unique cities in Arizona and it will keep you entertained for days.

For starters, it is the world's first International Dark Sky City. The commitment needed to achieve such a designation demonstrates how much the residents care about the environment.

Every outdoor light must be yellow and pointing down. It's an honour system, but compliance is mandatory. People who move into the area are educated quickly by neighbours.

Having a dark sky is important for operating the historic <u>Lowell</u> <u>Observatory</u>.

Established in 1894 by Percival Lowell, today's version of the observatory offers advanced telescopes that can be used to explore the cosmos.

We took a fascinating guided tour through the facility and learned about Percival Lowell, a man who laid the groundwork for the discovery of Pluto.

We also went inside the Clark Dome, which has a working massive telescope. Visitors can look through it if weather permits.

Another hidden gem within Flagstaff is the <u>U.S. Geological Survey</u> <u>Astrogeology Science Center</u>.

Bet you didn't know that every astronaut who has ever walked on the moon has trained in Flagstaff.

The topography, including the Meteor Crater and Sunset Crater Volcano National Monument, resembles the surface of the moon. Astronauts are sent to Flagstaff for science training, instrument development and lunar mapping.

The staff of the Astrogeology Science Center are proud of what they have achieved and have a mission to share it with the public.

Flagstaff promotes its astronaut history with a Lunar Landmarks trail map and passport that guides you to places such as the Apollo astronaut training sites

There are many more must-see attractions in Flagstaff, including the Walnut Canyon National Monument.

Stopping in at the visitors centre beforehand is a must. The guide tells you about the rich history of the place and helps you choose which hikes would be suitable.

Taking the steps down inside the Canyon on the Island Trail is like walking back in time. There is evidence of homes of ancient inhabitants that were abandoned some 800 years ago.

It's hard to image people living in homes carved out of vertical rock faces, but the evidence is there for all to see.

The Rim Trail is much less strenuous and still offers stunning views of the canyon and cliff-dwellings below.

Other things to do in Flagstaff include the <u>Museum of Northern</u>
<u>Arizona</u>, the Visitor Centre, which is located in a train station,
exploring the <u>Wupatki National Monument</u>, and taking the historic
downtown walking tour.

WHERE TO STAY

Located on the famous Route 66, the <u>American Hotel</u> recently went through a renovation and offers funky, cool space-themed decor inside the rooms.

There's also an outdoor heated swimming pool that's open year round, lawn games, and fire pits.

You can just imagine how much fun this place would be to stay at on a busy summer evening. The staff is friendly and committed to making your stay a good one.

WHERE TO EAT

Before arriving in Flagstaff, I had read a lot of good reviews about <u>Shift Kitchen and Bar</u> and as it turns out, they were 100% correct.

It's not often you leave a restaurant thinking, "That might have been one of the best meals I have ever had," but that was the case for us.

As we chatted with our cook during our meal, he told us that pastry chef and owner Dara Wong changes up the menu every couple of weeks.

Striving for culinary perfection, she is constantly coming up with new recipes to keep her customers coming back for new, bold creations.

Their delicious pickled French fries are a staple and remain on the menu. Thank goodness for that.

The scallops were prepared to perfection, as were the elote agnolotti, risotto, and pork chops.

It's hard to image Chef Wong topping the food and desserts we sampled, but I will be back, first in line, to dine there again the next time I'm in Flagstaff.

PRESCOTT IS AWESOME, PARTNER

Strolling through the main street of Prescott, then sitting down for a drink in the same place where Wyatt Earp and Doc Holliday once ruled the roost is a pretty cool experience.

Famous for its cowboy history and Whiskey Row, Prescott is another fantastic town in Arizona that is well worth a visit.

Whiskey Row earned its name because of the 40 saloons it boasted once upon a time.

Back in the day, after a hard day's work, you can bet a lot of fun — and the odd shootout — took place.

Today's version of <u>Whiskey Row</u> is a lot more civilized, with art galleries and shopping and yes, there still are a few saloons.

We stopped in at the historic Palace Restaurant and Saloon. Along with great food, drink and service, the saloon has artefacts on display dating back well over a 100 years to a time when Whiskey Row was filled with cowboys, gold prospectors, and gamblers.

A cornerstone of Whiskey Row is <u>Hotel St. Michae</u>l. Opened in 1901, it has stood the test of time and offers guests beautiful accommodations in rooms and suites, and it has a trendy bistro that serves savoury comfort food and a wide range of drinks.

For outdoor enthusiasts, the 7.7-km Watson Lake Loop trail is perfect for exercise and offers stunning landscapes.

During our hike, we found ourselves regularly admiring the unusual rocky terrain surrounding the lake.

There's also the Constellation Trail, Upper Goldwater Lake Trail, and Thumb Butter trail that offer great vistas and hiking.

Prescott also offers winery tours as well as a casino. At an elevation of 5,200 feet, it has four moderate (as compared to Canada) but distinct seasons.

WHERE TO STAY

<u>SpringHill Suites</u> is located just a short walk away from Whiskey Row and the Courthouse Plaza.

SpringHill Suites offers a really impressive breakfast at no cost to guests. What sets it apart from others is the quality and variety of the food. For example, fruit and nut options were generous and plentiful. Given the price of food these days, it was a tasty surprise.


SCOTTSDALE AND PHOENIX

When asked if anyone ever becomes afraid while riding the horses, without hesitation, our guide Charlie calmly replied, "It's our job to make you feel safe, there are no freak-outs."

And indeed we did feel safe, as we were led through windy paths and even across the fairly deep Verde River — twice!

Fort McDowell Adventures also offers Jeep and Segway tours, as well as cattle drives and wagon rides and is a blast to visit.

WHERE TO EAT

Built in 1934 as a school for girls, El Chorro is an institution in the area and offers views of the Camelback and Mummy mountains while you eat food to die for.

It was raining the night we visited, but we were told most people eat on their stunning outdoor patio.

The menu includes delicious starters such as Crab and Tuna stack, Flash Fried Lobster Tails and five mouth-watering salads.

For entrées, the shrimp linguine and old fashioned broaster fired chicken were cooked to perfection. The menu also includes trout almondine, red wine braised beef short ribs, El Chorro vegetable steak and much more. Our server was knowledgeable and charming.

Having returning customers is always a sign of a good business. At El Chorro, the inviting atmosphere, ideal location, top-notch service and savoury food makes it clear why this restaurant is full night after night.

MERKIN VINEYARDS

Enjoying dinner at <u>Merkin Vineyards</u> on a hoping Friday night in the Old Town Scottsdale was a delicious experience.

The contemporary bar has a welcoming atmosphere, filled with people sharing stories over fine wine and food.

Luis and the rest of the service staff are proud to share their knowledge of their wine and where it comes from.

Produced at the Estate Vineyards in the Verde Valley and Willcox, Ari., it is stored in concrete barrels.

They produce their own fruits and vegetables in gardens and orchards to insure their wine is uniquely theirs.

Their Chupacabra line of wines are very popular, as are the new Caduceus wines.

To go along with the wine, they specialize in artisan pizzas baked in wood fired ovens and also serve up many delicious pastas.

There's a section on the menu called "Gardens" that included foods such as bacon dates and warm citrus olives produced in their farms and local growers.

Merkin Vineyards checks all the boxes as far as food, drink, atmosphere, service and enhances the already great Old Town Scottsdale.
