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BOOK CLUB DISCUSSION QUESTIONS



Describe Jude. What was she like at home in Syria compared to when she arrived in Ohio?



Discuss Jude's relationships with her new American friends & cousin. How does each relationship evolve or change?



What did you learn about Syria and the refugee crisis from this book? How is Jude's home experience in Syria different from what is described on the news?

Read the Arabic proverbs on pg. 129 and 238. What do these mean to you? What did they mean in the story's context?



Why was Laila's family restaurant targeted? How did the community respond? How would you (or have you) responded in situations like this?




Why did Jude begin wearing a hijab? How is this transition perceived by her Syrian family vs. her American friends/family? Are there cultural traditions you have assumptions about? How might you challenge those?



What did you think about the verse writing style? How might the story have been different if it had been written in prose? As a graphic novel?




What were major themes in this book?

WHAT DOES HOME MEAN TO YOU?
