

# ROUND 1

## A Resolution to Ban Hydraulic Fracturing in the United States

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **WHEREAS**, hydraulic fracturing (“Fracking”), also called enhanced oil and gas
2. drilling, has potentially led to increased earthquake activity, and
3. **WHEREAS**, enhanced oil and gas drilling pollutes adjoining ground water,
4. **BE IT RESOLVED** by this Student Congress here assembled that:
5. All enhanced oil and gas extraction in the United States be suspended for additional
6. research on safety and efficacy.
7. **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** all laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
8. declared null and void.

# ROUND 2

## A Bill to Counter the Opioid Crisis

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** \$100 million shall be allocated to fighting opioid addictions across the
2. country.
3. **SECTION 2.** \$30 million from this fund will be added to the Public Health
4. Emergency Fund, with the requirement that this money only be used to combat the
5. drug epidemic.
6. **SECTION 3.** The remaining \$70 million will be given to the US Department of
7. Health and Human services.
8. **A)** This money must be used for Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services
9. Administration (SAMHSA) grants.
10. **B)** The SAMHSA grants provided through the funding in this legislation 12 cannot be
11. given any private entities.
12. **SECTION 4.** Funding shall be allocated immediately upon the passage of this
13. legislation.
14. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
15. void.

# ROUND 3

## A Bill to Limit the Growth of Self Proclaimed “Sanctuary Cities”

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** The United States Congress will end the awarding of federal grants to the
2. current and future: localities, cities, counties, and states that identify themselves as a
3. sanctuary for illegal and undocumented immigrants.
4. **SECTION 2.** Sanctuary cities are those localities, cities, counties, and states with
5. policies that make themselves a safe-haven for an undocumented immigrant.
6. **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Commerce will work in conjunction with the U.S.
7. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to enforce the termination of grants to the self
8. proclaimed “sanctuary cities.”
9. **A)** The U.S. Department of Commerce will oversee the end of grants to the localities.
10. **B)** The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) will oversee the identification of
11. sanctuary cities.
12. **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect at the end of the fiscal year on 1 October 2018.
13. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# FINAL

## A Resolution to Permit Japan to Defend Itself

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **WHEREAS**, since World War II, Japan's military capabilities 1 have been limited to
2. defensive forces; and
3. **WHEREAS**, the Japanese Self-Defense Forces are currently supplemented and
4. supported by United States Military personnel; and
5. **WHEREAS**, there has been growing tension between United States and Japanese
6. military forces, particularly with regard to Okinawa; and
7. **WHEREAS**, the threat to Japan posed by North Korea has been increasing; and
8. **WHEREAS**, the recent North Korean missile test violated Japan's air space; and
9. **WHEREAS**, Chinese claims in the South China Sea infringe on the territorial rights of
10. Japan and the Philippines; and
11. **WHEREAS**, the United States is committed to defend Japan against threats; and
12. **WHEREAS**, United States military action in defense of Japan will contribute to
13. destabilization of the region; now, therefore, be it
14. **RESOLVED**, By the Congress here assembled that the United States shall support
15. Japan's efforts to build an offensive military force to protect itself against 16 all threats
16. and be it
17. **FURTHER RESOLVED**, that this Congress shall support a change to Japan's
18. constitution to allow the establishment of a permanent Japanese military.
