

A Bill to Require Police Bodycams

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. Section 1 All law enforcement officers (federal, state, local, and
3. otherwise) shall be required to wear an actively-recording body
4. cam.
5. Section 2 Police officers would be required to have an
6. actively-recoding body cam during all potential times when
7. interacting with the general public.
8. Section 3 The Department of Justice shall oversee the enforcement
9. of the bill.
10. Section 4 This bill shall go into effect on January 1st, 2024
11. Section 5 All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy
12. shall hereby be declared null and void.

A Bill to Require DNA Evidence for Death

Penalty Sentencing

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. Section 1 No convicted criminal shall be sentenced to death unless
3. DNA evidence linking the criminal to the crime comprises a
4. central element of that conviction, as determined by the judge
5. overseeing the case.
6. Section 2 Any inmate currently sentenced to death and awaiting the
7. completion of that sentence whose conviction was not
8. significantly predicated on DNA evidence shall have their
9. sentence commuted to life in prison. District attorneys with
10. jurisdiction in the court where the crime was originally tried
11. shall be responsible for making these determinations and shall
12. have one year from the passage of this legislation to do so.
13. Section 3 If a judge is found to have violated this legislation,
14. this shall serve as compelling grounds for that judge's
15. impeachment
16. Section 4 This legislation shall be overseen by the Department of
17. Justice.
18. Section 5 This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2024.
19. Section 5 All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
20. declared null and void.

A Bill to Close the Fragrance Loophole

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. Section 1 Any cosmetic brand owner shall make public the following

3. information: (1) any fragrance or flavor ingredient present in

4. cosmetics at a concentration that equals or exceeds .01 percent;

5. (2) any chemical used in a fragrance or flavor ingredient present

6. in such cosmetics, regardless of percentage, that are identified

7. as likely to be carcinogenic to humans or any persistent,

8. bioaccumulative, and toxic Priority Chemicals identified by the

9. Environmental Protection Agency's National Waste Minimization

10. Program as of February 22, 2016.

11. Section 2 The term 'flavor ingredient' means any intentionally

12. added substance or complex mixture of aroma chemicals or

13. natural essential oils for which the purpose is to impart a

14. flavor or taste, or to counteract a flavor or taste. The term

15. 'fragrance ingredient' means any intentionally added substance

16. or complex mixture of aroma chemicals, natural essential oils,

17. and other functional ingredient or ingredients for which the

18. purpose is to impart an odor or scent, or to counteract an odor.

19. Section 3 The Food and Drug Administration shall oversee the

20. enforcement of this law.

21. Section 4 This law shall go into effect January 1, 2024.

22. Section 5 All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy

23. shall hereby be declared null and void.

Congressional Debate Legislation #4

A Bill to Restructure the Mèrida Initiative

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. Section 1 The United States will allocate one billion dollars every
3. year for the next decade to counter-
- narcotics and development
4. within Mexico.
5. Section 2 Counter-narcotics will be spearheaded by drug
6. interdiction through greater collaboration
- between the U.S. Coast
7. Guard and Mexican Navy with increased targeting for smuggling
8. networks. Economic development will be defined as aid packages to
9. develop agricultural industries and business development for
10. cartel-ridden areas.
11. Section 3 The Department of State, in collaboration with the
12. Department of Defense and USAID, will enforce this legislation.
13. Section 4 This legislation will go into effect in fiscal year 2023.
14. Section 4 All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
15. declared null and void.

A Bill to Encourage the Development of Nuclear Power

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. Section 1 The United States Congress shall allocate three billion
3. dollars to be distributed towards states to encourage the
4. development of nuclear power plants.
5. Section 2 A nuclear power plant is defined as a thermal power
6. station whose heat is sourced by a nuclear reactor and provides
7. power to buildings within its proximity.
8. Section 3 The United States Department of Energy shall oversee the
9. enforcement of this bill. In order to receive aid for nuclear
10. energy, states must apply to the Energy Department, which will
11. ultimately determine the amount of funding to be granted.
12. Section 4 This bill will go into effect in the 2025 fiscal year.
13. Section 5 All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
14. declared null and void.
