

## **A Bill to Ban K-7 Tackle Football**

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. Section 1 Tackle football programs for children in 7th grade
3. or younger will be banned. Any programs that would like to
4. continue will be required to switch to flag football.
5. Section 2 Tackle football has been deemed by the CDC Injury
6. Center as a high risk youth sport. A safer alternative for
7. children on the younger side is flag football. The ban is
8. implemented for K-7 instead of K-8 in order for children to
9. have experience before going into high school.
10. Section 3 The Department of Health and Human Services will
11. work with the CDC Injury Center to oversee the enforcement
12. of this bill.
- A. The DHHS will make sure that any and all
13. K-7 tackle football programs will be shut down or switched
14. to flag football.
- B. This ban will be on a "three strike"
15. punishment system. On the first strike a letter will be
16. sent out to the league president requesting them to shut
17. down their program within one month The second strike will
18. include a fine of up to \$10,000. If a final strike is
19. needed, the league president will be charged \$50,000 and
20. may be sued for child abuse.
21. Section 4 This legislation will take effect on January 1st,
22. 2023.
23. Section 5 All laws in conflict with this legislation are
24. hereby declared null and void.

## **A Bill to Promote Healthy Lunch Options**

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. Section 1 Schools will now be required to provide a mandatory

3. salad bar in their lunch lines and focus their physical

4. education curriculums on physical fitness.

5. Section 2 Mandatory salad bars shall be defined as sections of

6. counter designated for healthy foods like salad, vegetables,

7. and fruits.

8. Section 3 The Department of Education and Food and Drug

9. Administration will oversee the implementation of this

10. bill.

A. The Department of Education will be responsible

11. for distributing funds.

B. The Food and Drug Administration

12. will be responsible for overseeing health regulations and

13. making sure schools have an adequate amount of healthy

14. foods in their salad bars.

C. Up to a \$3,000 fine will be

15. put in place for schools that do not comply. The amount

16. will depend on their income.

17. Section 4 This legislation will take effect at the beginning

18. of the 2023/2024 school year.

19. Section 5 All laws in conflict with this legislation are

20. hereby declared null and void.

**A Bill to Eliminate College Tuition**

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. Section 1 All course tuition for two and four-year colleges

3. and technical schools in the United States is hereby

4. eliminated.

5. Section 2 Four-year colleges shall be defined as an

6. undergraduate degree program that leads to a bachelor's

7. degree in a specific area of study. Technical schools shall

8. be defined as a two-year college that covers fields such as

9. business, finance, hospitality, tourism, construction,

10. engineering, visual arts, information technology and

11. community work. Tuition shall be defined as a sum of money

12. charged for teaching or instruction by a school, college,

13. or university. Tuition does not include meal plans,

14. housing, or student fees.

15. Section 3 The Department of Education will oversee the

16. implementation of this bill.

17. Section 4 This legislation will take effect on August 1st,

18. 2023.

19. Section 5 All laws in conflict with this legislation are

20. hereby declared null and void.
