## A Bill to Ban K-7 Tackle Football

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2. **Section 1** Tackle football programs for children in 7th grade or younger will
- 3. be banned. Any programs that would like to continue will be required to
- 4. switch to flag football.
- 5. **Section 2** Tackle football has been deemed by the CDC Injury Center as a high
- 6. risk youth sport. A safer alternative for children on the younger side is
- 7. flag football. The ban is implemented for K-7 instead of K-8 in order for
- 8. children to have experience before going into high school.
- 9. Section  $\bf 3$  The Department of Health and Human Services will work with the CDC
- 10. Injury Center to oversee the enforcement of this bill. A. The DHHS will
- 11. make sure that any and all K-7 tackle football programs will be shut down
- 12. or switched to flag football. B. This ban will be on a "three strike"
- 13. punishment system. On the first strike a letter will be sent out to the
- 14. league president requesting them to shut down their program within one
- 15. month The second strike will include a fine of up to \$10,000. If a final
- 16. strike is needed, the league president will be charged \$50,000\$ and may be
- 17. sued for child abuse.
- 18. Section 4 This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2023.
- 19. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared

## A Bill to Promote Healthy Lunch Options

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2. Section  ${\bf 1}$  Schools will now be required to provide a mandatory salad bar in
- 3. their lunch lines and focus their physical education curriculums on
- 4. physical fitness.
- 5. Section 2 Mandatory salad bars shall be defined as sections of counter
- 6. designated for healthy foods like salad, vegetables, and fruits.
- 7. **Section 3** The Department of Education and Food and Drug Administration will
- 8. oversee the implementation of this bill. A. The Department of Education
- 9. will be responsible for distributing funds. B. The Food and Drug
- 10. Administration will be responsible for overseeing health regulations and
- 11. making sure schools have an adequate amount of healthy foods in their
- 12. salad bars. C. Up to a \$3,000 fine will be put in place for schools that
- 13. do not comply. The amount will depend on their income.

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## A Bill to Eliminate College Tuition

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2. **Section 1** All course tuition for two and four-year colleges and technical
- 3. schools in the United States is hereby eliminated.
- 4. **Section 2** Four-year colleges shall be defined as an undergraduate degree
- 5. program that leads to a bachelor's degree in a specific area of study.
- 6. Technical schools shall be defined as a two-year college that covers fields
- 7. such as business, finance, hospitality, tourism, construction, engineering,
- 8. visual arts, information technology and community work. Tuition shall be
- 9. defined as a sum of money charged for teaching or instruction by a school,
- 10. college, or university. Tuition does not include meal plans, housing, or
- 11. student fees.
- 12. **Section 3** The Department of Education will oversee the implementation of
- 13. this bill.
- 14. Section 4 This legislation will take effect on August 1st, 2023.
- 15. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
- 16. null and void.
