

A Bill to Fund Public Broadcasting

SECTION 1. Congress shall restore federal funding to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, also known as PBS.

SECTION 2. Congress shall restore federal funding to National Public Radio, also known as NPR.

SECTION 3. Public broadcasting in the United States shall receive a total of \$1.1 billion, as it received before funding was eliminated in 2025.

SECTION 4. This legislation will go into effect in Fiscal Year 2026.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.

A Bill to Stop E-Waste

SECTION 1. Congress shall order the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to study, and regulate, electronic equipment that poses a potential danger to the environment or human health.

SECTION 2. All businesses in the United States shall be required to recycle electronics, including at least phones, computers, and televisions.

SECTION 3. The above section shall apply to all federal, state, and local government agencies and their workforces.

SECTION 4. Businesses that sell electronics must collect a recycling fee from consumers, for each new phone, computer, or television purchased. The money will be put into a federal fund to support recycling of electronics.

A Bill to Regulate Self-Driving Cars

SECTION 1. Congress shall order the United States Department of Transportation (DOT) to study the risks of self-driving cars, defined as cars that use any combination of cameras, sensors, and artificial intelligence to travel without a human operator.

SECTION 2. DOT shall require that self-driving cars cannot be on the road unless there is a fully licensed human driver in the car.

SECTION 3. DOT shall also establish that the owner of a self-driving car is fully responsible for any accident caused by their computer-driven vehicle.

SECTION 4. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.

FINALS: A Bill to Ban Cloning

Also known as the Dolly the Sheep Memorial Act

SECTION 1. Congress shall ban all forms of human and animal cloning in the United States.

SECTION 2. "Cloning" is defined as the intentional production of a genetically identical copy of a living thing.

SECTION 3. Any person found to have violated the ban on cloning shall be charged a fine, face imprisonment up to ten years, or both.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect immediately.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby null and void.
