

**A Bill to Federally Decriminalize Controlled Substances**

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** The possession and personal use of all controlled  
3. substances currently classified under the Controlled Substances  
4. Act shall no longer be treated as a criminal offense under  
5. federal law. Currently incarcerated non-violent drug offenders  
6. shall be released from prisons and jails.

7. **Section 2** "Non-violent drug offender" means any individual  
8. currently serving a prison sentence solely for the possession,  
9. use, or low-level distribution of controlled substances, with no  
10. history of violent crime. The Department of Justice shall  
11. conduct a full review of all eligible cases within 18 months of  
12. this law taking effect and issue release orders for qualifying  
13. individuals.

14. **Section 3** The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) shall  
15. administer a National Drug Treatment and Diversion Fund,  
16. allocated \$2.5 billion annually, to provide treatment referrals  
17. and support services to individuals diverted from the criminal  
18. justice system. The Department of Justice shall establish a  
19. dedicated Case Review Office, funded at \$750 million, to process  
20. prisoner releases. States that fail to redirect drug possession  
21. cases to treatment programs will lose federal criminal justice  
22. grant funding. Federal facilities that delay compliance with  
23. release orders will be subject to a \$100,000 per month penalty  
24. until compliance is achieved.

25. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2028.

26. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby  
27. declared null and void.

## A Resolution to Remove Meat Subsidies

1. **WHEREAS**, The United States government currently provides billions
2. of dollars in annual subsidies to the beef, pork, and poultry
3. industries, significantly lowering the market price of meat for
4. consumers; and
5. **WHEREAS**, Large-scale meat production is a leading contributor to
6. greenhouse gas emissions, water consumption, and land
7. degradation, with significant long-term environmental
8. consequences; and
9. **WHEREAS**, Removing subsidies on meat would more accurately reflect
10. its true environmental and economic cost, encouraging consumers
11. and producers to consider more sustainable alternatives; and
12. **WHEREAS**, Federal subsidies on dairy and egg products serve
13. distinct nutritional and economic purposes and shall remain
14. unaffected by this resolution; now, therefore, be it
15. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled urge the federal
16. government to phase out all direct and indirect subsidies
17. currently provided to the beef, pork, and poultry industries
18. over a period of five years, beginning no later than January 1,
19. 2028, with the Department of Agriculture reporting annually to
20. Congress on progress toward full subsidy elimination, while
21. maintaining existing subsidy programs for dairy and egg producers.
