IPDA

IPDA will be offered Saturday, January 31st with true finals offered Sunday, February 1st. IPDA

<u>regulations</u> will govern the event. No additional prep time is allocated beyond the 30 minutes of

prep following reading of the topic, which by the way is negotiated by the debaters as each can

strike two of the five resolutions provided per round. Debaters are permitted to use reference

materials during their preparation time before debating including online materials. They may

also consult with teammates and/or coaches for ideas and advice. IPDA will not break brackets.

In true UCSD fashion, please prepare for one or more "fun" resolutions as options on the strike

sheets. Using one's phone to time during the round is not permitted. An announcement will be

sent out for Topic Strike Location.

IPDA Times shown below:

a) First Affirmative: 5 minutes

b) Cross Examination: 2 minutes

c) First Negative: 6 minutes

d) Affirmative Rebuttal: 3 minutes

e) Negative Rebuttal: 5 minutes

f) Affirmative Summary: 3 minutes

ELIGIBILITY:

Any college student enrolled in a degree granting program may compete. Any community

member may compete in the Pro division.

Division Eligibility:

Novices are allowed to be in 8 or fewer tournaments including this one and also including their

high school experience.

Juniors may have competed in up to 16 tournaments including this one and high school

competition.

Senior division are for those with a desire to go senior, or who must move up due to 16 prior

tournaments.

Pro: (Depending on entries) Open to all community members. In the event that there are not

enough entries, it will not collapse down into the senior division.

JUDGES/FEES:

Entry fee IPDA \$25.00

Judge fee: \$75 per uncovered entry

All schools must provide 1 judge for every 3 IPDA entries.

IPDA can be judged by any critic at least 18 years old regardless of experience or credential.

Some IPDA critics may have little to no experience, so debaters should adjust accordingly.

LD

LD will be offered Saturday, January 31st with a bronze/gold round. NFA regulations will govern the event. Speed delivery is permitted if both the judge and opponent agree. Four minutes of prep time for each debater can be used at any time during the debate. Electronic devices may be used in the round (e.g. cell phones as timers, laptops with evidence or for notes), but competitors must agree to NOT communicate with anyone else, either inside or outside the room, during the course of the debate via their electronic devices.

NFA-LD Times shown below:

a) Affirmative Constructive: 6 minutes

b) Cross-Examination: 3 minutes

c) Negative Constructive: 7 minutes

d) Cross-Examination: 3 minutes

e) Affirmative Rebuttal: 6 minutes

f) Negative Rebuttal: 6 minutes

g) Affirmative Rebuttal: 3 minutes

Prep time per debater: 4 minutes

Eligibility (more info in the NFA regulations):

Contestants must be enrolled at the school they represent. Contestants need not be full time students but must be enrolled at their institution for more than a course in forensics. Contestants may not have received a baccalaureate degree or its equivalent. Automatic exceptions are granted

for students who graduate mid-year. Students who graduate during the academic year may

compete at the National Championship Tournament in those events in which they qualified

between September and the date of their graduation. Division eligibility is according to the

NFA-LD National standards.

JUDGE/FEES:

Entry fee LD \$25.00

Judge fee: \$100 per uncovered entry

All schools must provide 1 judge for every 2 LD entries.

All LD judges must have a FRED Certification.

Judges for Open must have a bachelor's degree or no longer be eligible for collegiate debate.

Judges for Novice and Junior may be Open competitors.

NPDA

NPDA will be offered Sunday, February 1st with true finals offered the same day. NPDA regulations will govern the event. Each team must have two person versus two person debates (except for three person teams where only two people debate at one time). Team preparation, coaching, and accessing electronic devices are all permitted during the designated 20 minutes of prep time, not during flex time. Additionally, NPDA requires that all participants be certified as having completed the anti-harassment training, so coaches and directors please be able to verify that this has been done. In true UCSD fashion, please prepare for one "fun" resolution as the fourth prelim round. Pre-written materials may be used in preparation but not consulted in the actual debates for NPDA. We will break brackets according to the NPDA national norms and criteria. Using one's phone to time during the round is not permitted.

- b) Opposition Flex Time: 2 minutes
- c) First Opposition Constructive Speaker: 8 minutes
- d) Proposition Flex Time: 2 minutes

- f) Opposition Flex Time: 1 minute
- g) Second Opposition Constructive Speaker: 8 minutes
- h) Opposition Rebuttal by First Speaker: 4 minutes
- i) Proposition Flex Time: 1 minute

j) Proposition Rebuttal by First Speaker: 5 minutes

ELIGIBILITY:

- 1. A student must represent a recognized degree granting institution and participate with the full knowledge and approval of that institution, its officials, and any existing NPDA affiliated organizations operating within that institution.
- 2. A student needs to be seeking a baccalaureate degree at the institution they are representing unless competing for a two-year honor, in which case, pursuit of associate's degree or equivalent two-year certification at said institution is sufficient.
- 3. Possession of one of the aforementioned degrees precludes further competition for those respective honors at the national tournament.

DIVISION ELIGIBILITY:

Eligibility for Novice, Junior, and Open Divisions:

- 1. To be eligible in **Novice:** a) The student should have no more than two semesters of high school debate experience. b) The student should be in the first two semesters of collegiate debate. c) Once the student has won six elimination rounds (including byes), they are no longer eligible for the Novice division. d) Eligibility is determined prior to the start of the tournament.
- 2. To be eligible in **Junior**: a) The student should be in the first four semesters of intercollegiate debate. b) Once the student has won six elimination rounds (including byes) in Junior or Open, they are no longer eligible for the Junior division. c) Eligibility is determined prior to the start of a tournament.

3. To be eligible in **Open**: Any NPDA eligible student may debate in the open division.

Entry fee Parli \$50.00

Judge fee: \$100 per uncovered entry

All schools must provide 1 judge for every 2 NPDA entries.

All NPDA judges must have a FRED Certification.

Judges for Open must have a bachelor's degree or no longer be eligible for collegiate debate.

Judges for Novice and Junior may be Open competitors.

TPDA

TPDA will be offered Sunday, February 1st with true finals offered the same day. We will only be offering the Open division. We will be abiding by the IPDA/TPDA custom with regards to divisions.

Eligibility:

Any college student enrolled in a degree granting program may compete.

JUDGES/FEES:

Entry fee Parli \$50.00

Judge fee: \$100 per uncovered entry

All schools must provide 1 judge for every 2 TPDA entries.

TPDA can be judged by any critic at least 18 years old regardless of experience or credential.

Some TPDA critics may have little to no experience, so debaters should adjust accordingly.

Individual Events (Speech)

Individual Events will be offered on Sunday, February 1st and governed by the NFA regulations.

All speeches should adhere to the NFA Code of Standards, Rules and Procedures. Students may

triple enter, but it is the responsibility of each student to make it to each of their events. We will

not delay rounds. We encourage students to sign into each of their rooms at the start of the

pattern.

Cultural Artifact Speech is a five minute speech designed to offer a discussion of some tangible

aspect of culture. The event will be governed by the PSCFA regulations. A visual or audio aid is

required.

The prompts for Impromptu finals will be photographs.

Division Eligibility:

IE eligibility is in accordance with the NFA regulations.

A novice is a student who has not won 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place twice in an event or like event, in

which a final round occurred. Students competing in an event which is similar; must be eligible

for novice in all of those similar events. The event categories are Platform, Interp., and Limited

Prep that eligibility is determined based off.

Judges:

Entry fee IEs \$10.00

Judge fee: \$20.00 per uncovered entry

All schools must provide 1 judge for every 5 IE entries.

All IE judges must have a FRED Certification.

Judges for Open must have a bachelor's degree or no longer be eligible for collegiate debate.

Judges for Novice and Junior may be Open competitors.

General Information

Judges, competitors, and spectators are expected to respect all students' identities, including their identified pronouns, and to ensure everyone in the round does the same. Intentional or repeated violations of this may result in removal of the judge from the judging pool and/or forfeiture of the round where the violation occurs.

Lunch will be offered Saturday and Sunday for both competitors and judges, in addition to an assortment of breakfast foods for judges.



Sweepstakes:

UCSD students may compete, but UCSD will not be eligible for any sweepstakes awards. Sweepstakes Awards will be presented to schools in both two-year and four-year school divisions. Sweepstakes points will be based on the following formula: IE: 1 st Place = 10 points Finalist = 4 points 2 nd Place = 8 points Semifinalist = 2 points 3 rd Place = 6 points NPDA and IPDA and TPDA: -- Each preliminary win = 5 points for NPDA and TPDA, 4 points for IPDA preliminary win (teams in a division). Teams earning less than 2 preliminary wins in NPDA and TPDA and 3 preliminary wins in IPDA debate receive no sweepstakes points. Only your top 4 teams per division and event will be counted. -- 5 additional points for each team advancing to the initial elimination round for NPDA and TPDA, with 4 points for IPDA (regardless of how many teams advance per division).

INDIVIDUAL SWEEPSTAKES: Awards for the top five open competitors will be presented for the most aggregate number of sweepstakes points earned by individual events competitors. The formula used for calculating individual sweepstakes is identical to the formula used for school sweepstakes for individual events.

UCSD students will be eligible for the "Sibi Sivaram Sweepstakes Award", which will celebrate the student with the highest individual sweepstake points.
