

A Bill to Expand Funding for Farm-to-School Programs

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** Funding for Farm-to-School programs shall be increased by
3. \$500 million annually for six years.
4. **Section 2** "Farm-to-School programs" refers to initiatives that
5. connect local food producers with public schools to provide
6. fresh, whole foods for student meals, while developing
7. campus-based gardens and educational programs.
8. **Section 3** The Department of Agriculture shall be responsible for
9. enforcing the provisions of this bill, including grant
10. application and program oversight. The Department of
11. Agriculture shall gather data and produce an outcomes study on
12. the effectiveness of the program and its impacts on local food
13. producers, schools, their students, and the overall communities
14. in which the programs operate.
15. **Section 4** The provisions of this bill shall take effect
16. immediately with grants funded by August 1st 2026.
17. **Section 5** All other laws in conflict with this legislation shall
18. hereby be declared null and void.

A Resolution to Remove Cuban Sanctions

1. **WHEREAS**, The United States has maintained a comprehensive embargo
2. and sanctions regime against Cuba since 1962, restricting trade,
3. travel, and financial transactions between the two nations; and

4. **WHEREAS**, Decades of evidence suggest the embargo has failed to
5. achieve its stated goals of promoting democracy and improving
6. human rights in Cuba, while causing significant humanitarian
7. hardship for ordinary Cuban citizens; and

8. **WHEREAS**, The normalization of diplomatic and economic relations
9. between the United States and Cuba would benefit both nations
10. through expanded trade, investment, and cultural exchange; and

11. **WHEREAS**, The United Nations General Assembly has voted
12. overwhelmingly in favor of ending the embargo for over two
13. consecutive decades, reflecting broad international consensus;
14. now, therefore, be it

15. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled urge the President and
16. Congress of the United States to lift all economic sanctions
17. against Cuba and end the naval and trade blockade, directing the
18. Department of State and the Department of Commerce to begin the
19. full regulatory process for normalization of trade and
20. diplomatic relations within 180 days of this resolution's
21. adoption.

A Resolution to Remove Meat Subsidies

1. **WHEREAS**, The United States government currently provides billions
2. of dollars in annual subsidies to the beef, pork, and poultry
3. industries, significantly lowering the market price of meat for
4. consumers; and
5. **WHEREAS**, Large-scale meat production is a leading contributor to
6. greenhouse gas emissions, water consumption, and land
7. degradation, with significant long-term environmental
8. consequences; and
9. **WHEREAS**, Removing subsidies on meat would more accurately reflect
10. its true environmental and economic cost, encouraging consumers
11. and producers to consider more sustainable alternatives; and
12. **WHEREAS**, Federal subsidies on dairy and egg products serve
13. distinct nutritional and economic purposes and shall remain
14. unaffected by this resolution; now, therefore, be it
15. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled urge the federal
16. government to phase out all direct and indirect subsidies
17. currently provided to the beef, pork, and poultry industries
18. over a period of five years, beginning no later than January 1,
19. 2028, with the Department of Agriculture reporting annually to
20. Congress on progress toward full subsidy elimination, while
21. maintaining existing subsidy programs for dairy and egg producers.

A Resolution to Reduce Regional Immigration

1. **WHEREAS**, Millions of people from Central and South America leave
2. their home countries each year due to poverty, violence, and
3. limited opportunity; and

4. **WHEREAS**, Many of these individuals and families emigrate to the
5. United States seeking safety and a better quality of life; and

6. **WHEREAS**, Addressing root causes of emigration, namely economic
7. instability, violence, food insecurity, and lack of access to
8. education, could reduce the need for people to leave their home
9. countries; and

10. **WHEREAS**, Increased U.S. foreign aid targeted at development and
11. opportunity in high-emigration countries has been shown to
12. reduce emigration rates over time; now, therefore, be it

13. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled urge the United States
14. government to increase foreign aid directed at Central and South
15. American countries with the highest rates of emigration to the
16. United States, with a focus on economic development, public
17. safety, and access to education.

A Bill to Incentivize Technology Companies to Create Recyclable Products

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2. **Section 1** Technology companies that design and manufacture consumer
3. electronics with a minimum of 75 percent recyclable or reusable
4. components shall be eligible for a federal tax credit equal to 15
5. percent of their annual research and development costs related to
6. sustainable product design.

7. **Section 2** "Consumer electronics" includes smartphones, tablets,
8. laptops, desktop computers, and wearable devices sold to the
9. general public. "Recyclable components" means materials
10. recoverable through existing U.S. municipal recycling programs.

11. Companies must submit annual product composition reports
12. certified by an independent auditor to qualify for the credit.

13. **Section 3** The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will
14. administer the program and maintain a public registry of
15. certified companies, funded at \$1.5 billion annually through the
16. federal Clean Technology Tax Incentive Fund. The Internal
17. Revenue Service (IRS) will verify and process all tax credit
18. claims. The EPA will conduct annual audits of 25 percent of
19. participating companies to ensure compliance. Companies found to
20. have submitted false certification reports will be fined \$1
21. million per violation, required to repay all credits received,
22. and permanently barred from the program.

23. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2028.
24. Companies may begin submitting eligibility reports on July 1,
25. 2027.

26. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
27. declared null and void.
