

A Bill to Require Expiration Dates on Digital Content

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** All digital content sold or licensed in the United States
3. must clearly state if access to the content will expire.
4. **Section 2** Digital content includes video games, movies, music, and
5. software purchased or streamed online.
6. **Section 3** The Federal Trade Commission will enforce this law.
7. Companies that fail to disclose expiration terms will be fined
8. \$10,000 per violation.
9. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027.
10. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
11. declared null and void.

A Resolution to Limit the Use of Loyalty Programs That Track Consumer Behavior

1. **WHEREAS**, Many businesses use loyalty programs to track customer
2. purchases and behavior; and
3. **WHEREAS**, These programs often collect large amounts of personal
4. data without full transparency; and
5. **WHEREAS**, Consumers benefit from discounts and rewards offered
6. through these programs; and
7. **WHEREAS**, There is a need to balance consumer privacy with business
8. incentives; now, therefore, be it
9. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled support limits on the
10. amount of data collected through retail loyalty programs.

**A Bill to Restrict Surge Pricing During
Emergencies**

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** Companies shall be prohibited from increasing prices
3. above standard rates for essential goods and services during
4. declared emergencies.
5. **Section 2** Essential goods and services include transportation,
6. food, water, fuel, and temporary housing.
7. **Section 3** The Department of Justice will enforce this law.
8. Violators will be fined up to \$50,000 per incident.
9. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on July 1, 2026.
10. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
11. declared null and void.

**A Resolution to Regulate the Use of Dark
Patterns in Online Design**

1. **WHEREAS**, Many websites use "dark patterns" to trick users into
2. making choices they might not otherwise make; and
3. **WHEREAS**, These practices can lead to unwanted purchases,
4. subscriptions, or data sharing; and
5. **WHEREAS**, Businesses argue that such design choices are part of
6. competitive marketing strategies; and
7. **WHEREAS**, Consumers should be able to make clear and informed
8. decisions online; now, therefore, be it
9. **RESOLVED**, That the Congress here assembled support regulations
10. limiting the use of deceptive design practices in digital
11. platforms.

**A Bill to Require Disclosure of Sponsored
Content in Podcasts**

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2. **Section 1** Podcasts distributed in the United States must clearly
3. disclose when content is sponsored or paid for by advertisers.
4. **Section 2** Disclosure must be made at the beginning and end of any
5. sponsored segment.
6. **Section 3** The Federal Communications Commission will enforce this
7. law. Violations will result in fines of up to \$5,000 per episode.
8. **Section 4** This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2027.
9. **Section 5** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby
10. declared null and void.
