LEGISLATIVE LOWDOWN



Subsequent to the President's signing the Budget Bill on July 4, Congress has made significant strides in the last few days to advance its most critical defense policy bill: The annual **National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA).** This legislation will authorize military pay, benefits, and support programs for fiscal year 2026. Its impact reaches across the breadth and width of the uniformed services community - servicemembers, families, retirees, and survivors alike.

The latest from both chambers

- * **Senate:** The Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) reported its bill out of committee on July 11 with near-unanimous support (26-1 vote) following a swift, bipartisan markup.
- * House: The House Armed Services Committee (HASC) reported its version out of committee late July 15, also with a near-unanimous (55-2) vote after a longer process, debating over 700 amendments.

The next big hurdle for both versions will be full floor consideration. And MOAA is closely tracking what's in – and what's miss-

ing – as the NDAA continues to move forward. Here's a look at what both bills contain after their committee markups, and how you can help MOAA's work on the must-pass legislation.

- * Military Pay: Both the House and Senate versions support a base pay increase of 3.8% in 2026, which would keep pace with the Employment Cost Index.
- * **Separation Pay**: The House version would boost the Family Separation Allowance to \$400 per month. Previous authorizations allowed DoD to increase the allowance from \$250 to \$400 per month; this provision creates a new floor.
- * Allowances: The House version requires studies to improve the accuracy of both the Basic Allowance for Housing and the Basic Allowance for Subsistence.

TAKE ACTION and ask our Lawmakers to help ensure that our servicemembers can afford Housing: Restore Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) to 100%. The cost of housing is skyrocketing across the country, and military families are feeling the strain. Unlike civilians, servicemembers don't get to choose where they live. They move frequently, making homeownership difficult, and their spouses often face job instability due to these relocations.

For those living on-base, the government covers 100% of projected housing costs. But for the majority of servicemembers - about two-thirds of the forces - who must live off-base, their Basic Allowance for Housing only covers 95% of rent and utilities. That leaves military families paying out of pocket just to afford a roof over their heads.

This cost-cutting measure is unfair and puts unnecessary financial stress on those who sacrifice so much for our nation. Our troops don't cut corners in their service - why should we cut corners on their housing?

Restoring full BAH isn't just about housing - it's about keeping our promise to those who serve. Congress must act now. Urge your legislators to support, and ensure our servicemembers can afford a safe and stable home. Specifically, ask our legislators both in the House and Senate to restore BAH to 100% of projected housing costs.

NOTE: H.R. 1956 - A bill to amend Title 37, United States Code, to increase the basic allowance for housing inside the United States for members of the uniformed services, was introduced in the U.S. House on March 6, 2025. A similar bill is expected to be introduced in the Senate by Senator Raphael Warnock (D-Ga.). The act was introduced last session and was part of MOAA's 2024 Advocacy in Action efforts; partial funding for BAH restoration was included in the House version of the FY 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) but was not part of the final legislation.

Families and Survivors - The latest from both chambers

- * Child Care: The House version includes a three-year extension of the In-Home Child Care pilot program, which provides fee assistance for military families seeking in-home care. The House bill also requires a Government Accountability Office (GAO) review of privatized military family housing inventory.
- * Impact Aid: The Senate version authorizes \$50 million "to educational agencies affected by the enrollment of military and DoD civilian dependents," according to the executive summary, along with \$10 million in impact aid payments for children with disabilities and \$20 million "for local educational agencies"

determined by the Secretary of Defense to have high concentrations of military children with severe disabilities." The House version authorizes \$35 million to local educational agencies impacted by the presence of tax-exempt federal property and an additional \$10 million for locations serving military-connected children with severe disabilities.

* Food Security: The House bill excludes BAH from the eligibility calculation for the Basic Needs Allowance, a long-standing MOAA priority.

Retirees and Veterans

Transition Help: The House bill enhances the Transition Assistance Program (TAP) by standardizing the presentation of VA offerings while introducing transitioning servicemembers to VA-approved veterans service organizations who are able to assist with the transition into civilian life and navigating benefits available to servicemembers and their families.

DoD Health Care

* Dental Readiness: The House bill provides no-cost dental coverage under TRICARE for

members of the reserve component.

* **Improved Access to Care:** The House bill would create a pilot program designed to stream-line access to OB-GYN care by providing it without a referral to TRICARE Prime beneficiaries. It would also institute a five-year pilot treating pregnancy as a qualifying life event for the purposes of eligibility to enroll in TRICARE Select.

When MOAA speaks, Congress listens. What can you do to help?

Call MOAA's headquarters offices in DC at 800-344-6622 for assistance. Ask to be connected to an agent who can give you the names and contact numbers of your elected officials so that you can call and speak with them and urge them to ensure that current bills will move forward through the legislative process without delay. While MOAA continues direct engagement with lawmakers and their staffs, that alone won't be enough to move current bills in the U.S. Congress affecting active-duty military and veterans across the finish line. Your voice - raised as a constituent - can help in making all the difference(s).

MOAA TAMPA CHAPTER MEMBER HIGHLIGHT: LTC DAVID ZALLO, USA (Ret)

Retired as of 1 Jun 2025, Dave initially enlisted in the Army upon graduation from Pelham Memorial High School, NY in 1998. After completing training as a 77F (now 92F), Petroleum Supply Specialist, at Fort Lee, VA he was assigned to HHC, 4th Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division at Fort Hood where he fulfilled his initial contract. After ETS'ing (leaving) from active duty, he remained in the Army Reserves, drilling out of Fort Totten (Queens, NY), and participated in the Simultaneous Membership Program as a member of the (formerly) Ram Battalion (BN) while attending City University of New York (CUNY) Lehman in the Bronx, NY.

In 2004, he was commissioned as a Field Artillery (FA)

Officer and was assigned to 1st Brigade Combat Team (BCT), 10th Mountain Division in Fort Drum, NY. While serving at Fort Drum, Dave worked as a Fire Direction Officer (FDO) (3-6 FA), Company Fire Support Officer (FSO) (2-22 IN), Military Training Team Member (2-22 IN), and BN FDO (3-6 FA) and deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom twice (Baghdad 05-06 and Kirkuk 07-08) for a total of 26 months. In Baghdad he led combat patrols and established relationships throughout the area of operations to identify disruptive individuals and humanitarian needs. While in Kirkuk, he lived on an Iraqi air base advising their staff and establishing a reconnaissance platoon which would go on to conduct their own patrols in Northern Iraq.

Upon completion of the FA Captain's Career Course at Fort Sill, OK, he was assigned to 1st BCT, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Carson, CO. While serving at Fort Carson, Dave deployed to the Arghandab River Valley, Afghanistan as the BN FSO for 1-66 AR before working as the BN FDO and taking command of A BTRY, 4-42 FA. In Afghanistan, he planned and executed both lethal and nonlethal operations in coordination with Afghan military, Afghan police, USAID, DoS, and several other NGOs. As a Commander, he was directly responsible for eight, 155mm Paladins, and the day-to-day operations for over 100 Soldiers.

Following command, Dave transferred from Field Artillery to Functional Area 30 (FA30), Information Operations (IO). Upon completion of the IO Qualification Course at Fort Leavenworth, Dave was assigned as the BCT IO officer for 1st Armored BCT stationed at Camp Hovey, Korea. In Korea he coordinated both military to military and civilian-military relations between the US Army and Republic of Korea officials. Additionally, he managed the Cour-

tesy Patrol Program ensuring the safety and wellbeing of servicemembers and locals in the local community. After a year in Korea, he joined Operations Group at the Joint Readiness Training Center where he served as the Brigade Mission Command (BMC) IO Observer Controller Trainer (OC-T) for 25 incredible rotations over nearly three years. As an OC-T, he not only worked with role players and contractors to develop and implement scenario design, but he also mentored fellow officers and their associated staff for the duration of their time at JRTC. Dave was also responsible for conducting after action reviews for the Brigade Combat Team command teams and staff.

From JRTC, Dave reported back to Fort Carson to work as the Deputy (4th Infantry) Division IO officer where he spent approximately six months as the Strategic Effects Officer in Charge for the Division Mission Command Element in Poznan, Poland. In addition to coordinating General Officer travel and VIP visits, he regularly communicated with Embassy's throughout Eastern Europe. Shortly after his return from Poland, he moved to Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion where he served as the BN Executive Officer (XO), Operations Officer (S3), and Commander (CDR) over the course of two years. Though primarily a member of the Command team helping to man, train, and equip a unit of over 800 personnel, Dave also served as the Commander in his absence.

His final assignment was as a member of the Army Cyber Cyberspace Operations – Integrated Planning Element to CENTCOM at MacDill AFB, Tampa, FL, where he served in the Offensive Cyberspace Operations and Plans Branch Chief positions.

Throughout his career, Dave earned two Bronze Star Medals, three Meritorious Service Medals, a Combat Action Badge, and the Parachutist Badge. He also earned a master's degree in leadership and management (Webster University) and a master's degree in finance – Financial Planning (Liberty University).

Dave is married to Dayna Robson Zallo of Houston, Texas. They have one daughter, Bianca Lynn (7 years) and a son, Anthony John (4 years) who both attend faith-based schools in Tampa. While Dave prefers roundtrips, cruises have become the preferred vacation for the family. Most recently, Dave and Dayna visited Alaska.

Voices of our Ancestors: the Navajo Code Talker's Story

YUMA, Ariz. - A few Marines fortunate enough to be in the right place at the right time witnessed an amazing piece of history come alive. On July 2, for the first time in more than 60 years, the Marine Corps' Navajo code from World War II was again passed over radio transmission.

The code was transmitted by Bill Toledo who served as a Navajo code talker with 3rd Battalion, 9th Marines and is a native of Laguna, N.M., and was visiting the men and women of Marine Wing Communications Squadron 48 during Exercise Javelin Thrust to commemorate 70 years since the code talker program was founded in 1942.

In spite of triple digit temperatures, gusting winds and clouds of dust at Marine Corps Air Station Yuma, Bill Toledo and fellow code talker Sidney Bedoni, who served as a Navajo code talker with the 2nd, 4th and 5th Marine Divisions and is a native of White Cone, Ariz., insisted on visiting Marines out in the field to see how modern radio Marines live and work. After reviewing a static display of modern radio communications equipment, Toledo discussed his experiences as a code talker in the Second World War and, during the story, Toledo keyed the handset of a nearby PRC-150, performed a brief radio check, and then reenacted a coded message from the story. Toledo simulated calling for fire on a Japanese-held hill before the awestruck Marines.

"We are in the presence of greatness and true American heroes," stated Master Sgt. John Roberts, the MWCS-48 communications chief and a native of Cleveland who was assigned as an honorary code talker liaison for the duration of the event.

Toledo and Bedoni came to visit the Marines and to tell the story they lived almost 70 years ago. Their visit began with video interviews conducted by the Marine Corps History Division for the sake of posterity, including a recording of the Marine Corps hymn in Navajo. Following

these interviews, the code talkers ate chow with several junior Marines and non-commissioned officers.

Later, active and reserve Marines, Marine Corps League members, and local civilians gathered in the chapel to hear their tale firsthand. The day ended with a banquet in their honor.

The code talkers' storied history began in early 1942, when Philip Johnston, a white Protestant missionary's son, presented the idea of using the Navajo language to create a code the Japanese couldn't break. Johnston recruited 29 young Navajos to become Marines, not informing them about the plan for the code. Once the Navajo Marines had graduated boot camp and combat training, they were instructed to create a code based on their native language.

The code was first tested on Guadalcanal by six Marine code talkers who landed with the 1st Marine Division. Four weeks after the landing, then Maj. Gen. Alexander Vandegrift, the division commander, sent back to the Pentagon, "The enemy doesn't know what they're saying. We don't know what they're saying, but it works."

The code was based on the language of the Navajo people, but not everyone could understand it. Each Navajo Marine still had to go through a school to learn how to speak the code. The code was based on words which were familiar to the Navajo people. For example, the word for potato meant

hand grenade and the word for turtle meant tank.

In order to test the code, the government had Navajo elders try to decipher it. When they couldn't, the government knew they found something special.

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Surviving Spouse Corner: Growing Up TAPS: Understanding How Our Children Grieve

There is a personal nature to how each of us grieves, and that individuality extends to our children and teenagers. They uniquely grieve the death of their person based on (but not limited to) their personality type, individual preferences, how they most feel comfortable being in the world, the nature of the relationship they shared with their person before they died, and where they are in their developmental process. Understanding their grieving style and coping style can be helpful as we, as their parents and guardians, navigate what role we play in their continued healthy growth and development.

Common Grieving Styles

Let's look at a few grieving styles and what might be common reactions to loss at different developmental ages, keeping in mind that these generalizations will vary from person to person.

Private in Grief: Those Who Grieve More Quietly

It is important to first remember that quiet or private grief is not "absent" grief. Children and teenagers who are more private about their grief are still grieving. They likely have a personality type that is more comfortable expressing their grief when they are alone. This does not mean that they never outwardly share their grief with others or visibly emote, and this may vary widely from one person to another. One of the challenges for individuals with this style of grieving is that others may assume they are not grieving. Because of this, people who are more private with their grief may not have the same level of outside support from others in their family and circle of friends. We can support our children with this style of grieving by setting times to check in with them at appropriate intervals to see how they are doing.

Although they may not contribute to a conversation, grievers who are more quiet or private are still observing, taking in what others are sharing, and processing ideas for coping with the intense thoughts, emotions, and experiences grief is bringing to their lives. As their parents and primary caregivers, our acknowledgment and validation are important to their ability to adapt their loss into their lives as they grow into healthy adults.

Seen in Grief: Those Who Grieve More Visibly

The phrase, "the squeaky wheel gets the grease," comes to mind when considering this style of grieving. Some children and teenagers grieve in a way that is more outward-facing and visible to others. This can manifest in many ways — some may be more visibly emotional, while others may be more talkative, using their words to share openly about their grief experiences with others.

Those children and teens who are more emotionally open might draw the attention of caring adults in their lives who worry they are struggling and are unsure how to offer help. Those who more openly share their grief might also lead their parents or caregivers to believe they are managing their grief well. In either case, the reality is that they need attention and support from their trusted adults. Whether we simply sit with them and comfort them or actively listen to and affirm them, we are letting them express their emotions and giving them room to grow with their grief.



NECE HISTORY

-1942-

Navy entomologists were first deployed to the Pacific Theater as part of Navy Epidemiology Units. Between 1942 and 1944, Navy Medicine established 122 epidemiology units worldwide, including the Malariology and Pest Control Unit at Naval Air Station (NAS) Banana River, Florida.

The Malariology and Pest Control Unit relocates to NAS

Jacksonville, Florida.

-1949-

On July 1, the unit was renamed the Malaria and Mosquito Control Unit No. 1. Navy entomologist Lt. Cmdr. John M. Hirst was assigned as its officer-in-charge.

-1952-

The unit is renamed Preventive Medicine Unit No. 1 (PMU-1). -1957-

PMU-1 is redesignated the Disease Vector Control Center

(DVCC) with an expanded mission covering roughly half the world. A sister unit, DVCC-Alameda, is established in Alameda, California, to support the remaining global regions.

The DVCCs are renamed Navy Disease Vector Ecology and Control Centers (DVECCs).

-1995-

DVECC Alameda relocates to Navy Submarine Base Bangor, Washington (now part of Naval Base Kitsap), and is renamed **DVECC Bangor.**

-2005-

DVECC Bangor is disestablished on September 30.

-2006-

DVECC Jacksonville assumes responsibility for providing worldwide disease vector control and prevention support. The unit is renamed the Navy Entomology Center of Excellence (NECE).

Remembering an airborne legend: Sgt. Maj. McLaney's career spanned first three decades of Army airborne history

A little more than a year before the U.S. entered World War II, the Army put out a call in 1940, for volunteers to test a relatively new tactic for inserting troops into enemy territory.

Two hundred men from the 29th Infantry Regiment pushed their mortal fears aside and stepped forward to be part of airborne history. From them, 48 were chosen to train and become the first U.S. Army platoon to jump as a unit from an aircraft. They formed the modestly named, "Airborne Test Platoon".

With the exception of two lieutenants and two sergeants, the test platoon was made up of young privates. Among them was a strapping young man from rural

Alabama who would eventually become a decorated World War II paratrooper and a sergeant major in the premiere airborne division — the 82nd Airborne Division.

December 11th would have been Lester C. McLaney's 100th birthday. According to his widow, Willie McLaney, Lester grew up the son of a sharecropper in Hartford, Alabama; just south of what today is Fort Rucker. She said he joined the Army for adventure and a better life.

"One night he was sitting by lamp-light doing his school work and he looked up through the ceiling and saw the sky," Willie said. "He said to himself right then — there had to be a better place for him. And that is when he decided that he was going to join the Army."

McLaney joined the Army in June 1938, and served two years with the 29th Infantry Regiment at Fort Benning, Georgia. In 1940, the regiment was selected by then Maj. William Lee to provide volunteers for the first-of-its-kind airborne training.

The volunteers underwent three days of flight physicals, which skimmed the test platoon down to 48 of the fittest men.

"I was 23 and single, and it promised to be something different, so I volunteered," McLaney wrote in a 1968 biography. "It was quite strenuous, but we had a lot of fun."

The training lasted seven weeks at Fort Benning, where, in addition to six weeks of parachute training, the volunteers conducted physical exercise for several hours each day; a regimen that included calisthenics, log raises, swimming and running.

After the training at Fort Benning, the test platoon traveled to Heightstown, near Fort Dix, New Jersey, where they practiced descending and landing in harnesses attached to steel cables from 125-foot towers. After a week of tower-training, the test platoon returned to Fort Benning for parachute packing and live jumps.

After completing six jumps, members of the test platoon were qualified as paratroopers and became the cadre to train the 501st Parachute Battalion, which provided the historic lineage of the storied 501st parachute Regiment. Their training took three months, after which trainees and trainers alike were ready to make their historic combat jumps into the European Theater and the North African Campaign.

Lester was assigned to the 509th Parachute Infantry Regiment. His combat jumps include: Tebassa, North Africa; Oran, North Africa; Avilino, Italy; and Southern France. According to Willie, Lester also jumped into Normandy.

But this was all before he and Willie met. While Lester was participating in campaigns such as Algieria – French Morocco, Tunisia, Naples – Foggia, Anzio, Rome – Armo, Southern France, Rhineland, Ardennes – Alsace; Willie was serving in the Red Cross. She said she remembers serving at Fort Ord, California, watching film of U.S. paratroopers jumping out of aircraft overseas. Little did she know that one of those brave men would soon be her husband.

After the war, Willie returned home to Alabama, where she met Lester, who was then working at his father's dry cleaning shop.

"I was the new girl in town and he was the town's Casanova," Willie said with a smile. "We married two weeks later."

The role of Army wife was one that Willie said she embraced passionately. Her strength and self-reliance helped her get through rough times when her husband left for training and missions; the details of which he was not allowed to share with her.

"It takes a darn good woman to be an Army wife because you have to put up with so much," Willie said. "The minute they walk out the door, everything blows."

At the end of hostilities in Europe, Lester was assigned to the 82nd Abn. Div. when the 509th PIR was disbanded. After returning from war, Lester was discharged as a first sergeant in 1945.

Following a three-year break in service, Lester re-entered the Army in 1948 and returned to the 82nd Abn. Div., where he served for a little more than three years. Remaining at Fort Bragg, he served as a project noncommissioned officer at the Airborne Service Test Division, Army Field Forces Board #1; and supervisor of the Parachute Repair Section, Post Quartermaster.

Additionally, Kelly is a The Firewalking Center certified Fire and Glass Walking Instructor.

Kelly is also an accomplished writer and much sought-after speaker. Her book entitled "My Life After... the death of my son - a story of miracles" has received high accolades. Her second book "My Service Dog's Place" has become a favorite by many. She also has had several stories published in a few Chicken Soup for the Soul books.

Points of Light: Continental Army Chaplains and Civil Relations

Abstract

U.S. Army chaplains have been engaged with civil and religious authorities from the beginning. Chaplains who served in the American Revolution came from local churches or from college faculties. Whether they arrived with militia units or as individual volunteers, they came with the support of their home communities. Although they did not use the exact term at that time, many leaders, clergy and laity alike, understood the center of gravity of the Army to be the spirit and determination of the men and women to endure until victory was achieved. Chaplain presence and encouragement reinforced that strength. This article explores why chaplains were included in the organization of the U.S. Army from its formation during the American Revolution, and why they were seen as indispensable "points of light" for the Continental armies through eight years of warfare.

The establishment and survival of the armed forces have depended directly on the support of civil authorities since the beginning of the American Republic. The appointment of military leaders, the training, supply, and sustainment of units in the field, and the health and welfare of military personnel have been matters of national security. Civilian support and control of the military have been pillars of our American democratic form of government through 120 U.S. Congresses and for over 250 years.

U.S. Army chaplains have been engaged with civil and religious authorities from the beginning. Chaplains who served in the American Revolution came from local churches or from college faculties. Whether they arrived with militia units or as individual volunteers, they

came with the support of their home communities. Although they did not use the exact term at that time, many leaders, clergy and laity alike, understood the center of gravity of the Army to be the spirit and determination of the men and women to endure until victory was achieved. Chaplain presence and encouragement reinforced that strength.

I explore why chaplains were included in the organization of the U.S. Army from its formation during the American Revolution, and why they were seen as indispensable "points of light" for the Continental armies through eight years of warfare.[1] Some two hundred eighteen pastors, including one Roman Catholic priest, volunteered to serve in line units to uphold the morale, the courage, and even the fighting spirit of the Army. One clergyman also served in the Continental Congress and signed the Declaration of Independence. Without the support of the government, the endorsement of diverse faith groups, and the sacrifices of the civilian population, the Army and the Chaplaincy would have ceased to exist.

Animating the Soldiery

The leading advocate and proponent for the inclusion of chaplains in the Continental Army was General George Washington. In fact, over fifty references to chaplains appear in George Washington's letters. Chief among them was the appointment, pay, and value of military chaplains "to animate the Soldiery and Impress them with a Knowledge of the important rights as we are contending for...holding forth the Necessity of courage and bravery and at the same time of Obedience and Subordination to those in Command."[2]


