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OC Fair Junior Livestock Auction and Why Your Support Matters

The annual OC Fair Junior Livestock Auction supports 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) educational programs throughout Orange County. Each purchase directly finances and supports individual youth participants who are working to become future agriculture and community leaders.

As a buyer, your participation supports exhibitors' future animal projects as well as their overall agricultural, general education and life experiences. Additionally, you receive high-quality, locally sourced food for you and your family to enjoy.

Each youth participant spends 3-9 months and countless hours raising and caring for their livestock projects. They gain experience, and learn responsibility and dedication as well as animal care and entrepreneurialism.

Only market beef, goats, lambs, hogs and rabbits that earn a blue ribbon, "market-ready" award, are permitted to sell in the Junior Livestock Auction. All Champions, Reserve Champions, Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions in each species are required to sell in the auction. This simply means the best of the best are available for you to purchase!

About 4-H

4-H is the nation's largest youth development organization reaching more than six million youth from ages 5 to 19 years old around the nation. 4-H is focused on empowering youth to reach their full potential by focusing on four personal development areas or the four H's: head, heart, hands and health. 4-Hers spend their extracurricular time on projects focused on citizenship, healthy living and science so they can make a positive impact on their communities and the world. The Buyer Experience

Bidding at the OC Fair will be in-person. Add-on contributions online only.

Purchasing Animal Experience (In-person)

1. Admission tickets must be purchased online in advance and will not be available for purchase at the gate. You will not be charged transaction fees for your OC Fair admission ticket purchase! *Saturdays are busy and normally sell out, purchase your tickets now!*
 - a. Tickets on sale now: ocfair.com/oc-fair/buy-tickets/
 - b. **Last year's buyers (2025)** will be sent two admission tickets.
 - c. **Last year's add-on contributors (2025, over \$100)** will be sent one admission ticket.
2. Register and check-in as a buyer at the OC Fair Livestock Office patio on auction day, Saturday, July 25. Gate 10 and Orange Gate entrances will be open at 8 a.m. All buyers must have a mobile number available in order to register.
 - a. **NEW: New buyers** (i.e., those who did not make a purchase during last year's auction) can begin registering on Monday, July 20. Registration closes on Saturday, July 25, at 8 a.m. On auction day, park inside Gate 10 off Newport Boulevard and enter the Fair through Orange Gate. Parking is \$15. Check in at the new buyer table located in front of the Livestock Office. See page 15 for a map and driving directions.
 - i. Meal wristbands can be purchased for \$25 per wristband.
 - b. **Last year's buyers (2025)** are automatically registered for this year's auction and will be sent information for this year's auction directly. Last year's buyers are listed by first name and can pick up their packet at the OC Fair Livestock Office patio. The packet includes, the sales book, bid paddle and two wristbands valid for two complimentary meals each. Additional guests must purchase meal wristbands at the Livestock Showring.
 - c. **Add-on** contributions are online only; see instructions below on how to contribute to sellers.
 - d. **Spectators** (individuals not bidding) **do not need to register**. Check out the auction on the sidelines of the Livestock Show Ring or watch add-on contributions online by clicking the auction link and watching the auction live!
 - e. If you are unable to attend, you may send a representative or a "proxy buyer" to make a purchase for you. The required Buyer Authorization Form is included at the end of this handbook.
3. Breakfast and lunch:
 - a. 2025 buyers will be given two meal wristbands valid for up to two meals each. Additional meal wristbands can be purchased for \$25 per wristband for guests and new buyers.
 - b. Meal wristbands are good for one breakfast and one lunch plate (while supplies last).
 - c. Enjoy breakfast beginning at 9 a.m. with a valid wristband.
4. Opening ceremonies begin at 10 a.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance, auction rules and introductions. Don't forget to peruse the sales book to mark animals you might be interested in purchasing.
5. Auction bidding begins at approximately 10:30 a.m.
 - a. When you see an animal you would like to buy, simply raise your paddle high enough for the auctioneer to see. If other buyers also raise their paddles, keep raising your paddle each time you want to raise the bid until the auctioneer announces an animal is sold, finalizing the bidding for that animal.
 - b. All species of livestock will be sold by the head, not the pound.
 - c. Species are not rotated, or mixed, throughout the sale order. As an example – in no particular order – all lambs will be sold, then all goats, then all beef, etc.
6. Winning a bid:
 - a. When you win a bid, hold up your buyer number and destination paddle to indicate where you want to send the animal. See page 9-10 for the auction sale contract details.
7. Payment:
 - a. Before you leave the auction, report to the OC Fair Livestock Office patio to complete your purchase. **Purchases must be paid on auction day.**

Add-on Contribution Experience (Online Only)

1. Admission tickets must be purchased online in advance and will not be available for purchase at the gate. You will not be charged transaction fees for your OC Fair admission ticket purchase! *Saturdays are busy and normally sell out, purchase your tickets now!*
 - a. Tickets on sale now: ocfair.com/oc-fair/buy-tickets/
 - b. **Last year's buyers (2025)** will be sent two admission tickets.
 - c. **Last year's add-on contributors (2025, over \$100)** will be sent one admission ticket.
2. Register as a buyer at ocfair.com/auction. All add-on contributors must have a mobile number on file in order to register.
3. Access add-on contributions:
 - a. Select "Log In" at the top right corner of the screen.
 - b. Search for your company or name in the drop-down list.
 - i. If your company or name doesn't appear, click "Register New Buyer" and complete the form.
 - c. Select "Request Code" to receive a 4-digit security code via text. This code is your bidding password for contributing add-ons and will be used to continue to log in to your account.
 - d. Enter the code in the box below your name.
4. On Sunday, July 26, the OC Fair Junior Livestock Auction will be available to view and start accepting add-ons. The add-on deadline is Tuesday, July 28, at 11:59 p.m. **Add-on contributions will NOT be accepted in person.**
5. Make an add-on contribution:
 - a. Use the filters found by clicking the top left-hand corner of the screen to find the exhibitor you are looking for.
 - b. Indicate the add-on amount you want to pay (\$20 minimum per lot) for your selected exhibitor.
 - c. Keep track of your total add-ons. Near the top of your screen, you will see "Buyer Totals" with the total cost of add-on amounts.
6. Payment:
 - a. Add-on contributors **MUST** pay online after completing add-ons.

Auction Tips

- Make sure you check your freezer space before making a purchase or make arrangements to store your purchase once it's been processed and packaged. A 1,200-pound beef can produce more than 486 pounds of packaged meat.
- Add-ons are a great way to support a youth participant without purchasing an actual animal or paying a large amount of money. The Auction Sales Book lists all the youth participants you can provide additional support to.
- Buyers can team up to purchase an animal together. Up to two buyers can bid together.
- If you do not want the packaged meat product from the animal(s) you purchased, you can still support the youth participants:
 - **Buy Back:** Select this on your Auction Sale Contract and your purchase will be resold commercially at market price by the auction staff. You pay the difference between the market price and your bid and the youth exhibitor receives the full amount.
 - **Scholarship/Donation:** Select one of the four available nonprofit programs or youth scholarships and your purchase will be resold commercially at market price with proceeds from your bid and the resale going to the selected program or scholarship. See page 11 for your donation options.
- **NEW REMINDER: State fair rule VII., Livestock and Horse Exhibits, Ownership, Item 4 states:** *No junior exhibitor may exhibit an animal in a market class once it has been sold as a market animal through a fair junior livestock auction. These animals may be shown following the 30 consecutive day ownership requirement as breeding animals only. All champion and reserve champion market animals will be permanently identified by the fair if sold through a fair junior livestock auction unless these animals are sold at a terminal sale with no live animal pick-up.*

Add-Ons: What Are They and Why Do We Have Them?

- An "add-on" is a form of support, above and beyond the auction sale price, for a particular student you are supporting.
- Any amount over the \$20 minimum per lot can be given through an "add-on" without actually purchasing the animal.
- If unable to participate in the auction add-ons, you can always write a check directly to the particular student to show your support.
- Add-ons can help students to break even on their livestock projects if they get low bids at the Junior Livestock Auction.
- Add-ons can also be given if you think the student did an excellent job on their livestock project and deserves extra money to put towards their education, future projects or life expenses.
- Participants must have an animal in the auction in order to receive add-ons.

How to Participate in the Add-On Program

1. Visit the website (link on cover page) for up-to-date information. On Sunday, July 26, the OC Fair Junior Livestock Auction link will be available to view and start accepting add-ons. Add-ons are only accepted online, July 26-28, by 11:59 p.m. **DO NOT come to the Fairgrounds. Add-on contributions are available online only.**
2. Add-on participants must register as a new buyer.
3. Use the filters found by clicking the top left-hand corner of the screen to find the exhibitor you are looking for.
4. Indicate the add-on amount you want to pay (\$20 minimum per lot) for your selected exhibitor or lot.
5. You will be sent an invoice by mail and/or email by OC Fair staff.
6. See the buyer experience on page 4 for more details.

The Seller Experience

1. *To secure individuals to purchase project animals, it is strongly recommended that exhibitors send out letters to all potential buyers inviting them to the Junior Livestock Auction. Let buyers know add-on contributions are online only.*
2. Exhibitors should read all market competition and auction rules and guidelines prior to arriving at the Fairgrounds.
3. Exhibitors receiving a blue ribbon in their market class – which signifies that the animal exhibited is market ready – can be entered in the Junior Livestock Auction. Those exhibitors planning to sell their animal in auction must sign their animal in on the day of the species market show. The deadline to sign an animal into the Junior Livestock Auction is one hour after completion of judging for that species. Exhibitors who are not planning to sell their animal through auction do not need to sign any paperwork after the conclusion of the market show for that species.
4. Once sign-ups are complete, a proof list will be posted. Exhibitors will be reminded to check the proof list for accuracy of name, school or club and species of livestock being sold.
5. The 2026 OC Fair Junior Livestock Auction is Saturday, July 25, at 10 a.m.
6. Exhibitors **MUST** continue to care for animals until the night of Sunday, July 26. Final cleaning of animal pens will begin after 9 p.m. on Sunday once the all-clear has been given over the loudspeaker. Exhibitors must ensure animals are given water at the conclusion of pen cleaning and just prior to leaving the Fairgrounds.
7. Exhibitors will receive an auction packet (auction check, buyer and add-on information list with addresses) from their leader/advisor. Exhibitors are **STRONGLY ENCOURAGED** to send a thank you letter to all individuals who supported their project, including leaders and/or advisors.

Auction Guidelines

1. Bidding will take place in-person at the OC Fair. Add-on contributions are ONLINE ONLY.
2. The auction is limited to Orange County 4-H and FFA exhibitors.
3. All 4-H/FFA Champions, 4-H/FFA Reserve Champions, Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions must sell at the auction.
4. **OC Fair is a Partial Terminal show meaning ALL champions (beef, hogs, goats and lambs) are required to go through the Junior Livestock Auction, then directly to the processing plant designated by the OC Fair Livestock Department. These champions cannot leave the grounds as live pick-up sales.**
5. **Only CHAMPION market small animals may sell in the auction and are pick-up live only.**
6. Only market beef, goats, lambs and hogs that are judged Blue Ribbon "Market Ready" will be permitted to sell at auction. Market small animal champions must sell at the auction; no other small animals will be sold in the auction.
7. Auction animals are to be consigned through the OC Fair Livestock Office only.
8. Due to privacy laws, the OC Fair Livestock Office will **not** provide copies of buyer lists.
9. Non-auction animals may be consigned in the Livestock Office only on Friday, July 24, from 10 to 11:30 a.m. A nonrefundable **\$50** fee plus processing costs apply. ***NEW*** Hottinger will no longer be available for non-auction consignment due to an influx of orders and limited storage space. Other cut-and-wrap locations are available, or you may make your own arrangements as needed for non-auction animals.

Sellers:

10. Exhibitors may sell one animal in the auction.
11. Each exhibitor with eligible animals must indicate with the Livestock Office which animal is to be entered in the auction. **The auction sign up deadline is one hour after completion of judging:**
 - Wednesday, July 22: beef, hogs, goats and lambs.
 - Small animal champions must sell in the auction; no other small animals will be permitted to sell.
12. Seller will be charged a **5%** fee for animals sold through the auction. (Fees are used for auction expenses.)
13. Exhibitors selling animals in the auction must wear official 4-H/FFA uniforms. Refer to the Junior Department rules.
14. Animals cannot be sold through the auction without an official OC Fair ear tag. A replacement tag will be supplied if necessary.
15. Decorating animals is not permitted.
16. Before the auction, sellers are obligated to solicit and secure buyers to attend. Sellers may not actively solicit buyers in auction areas, including the show ring and Livestock Office, on auction day.
17. Sellers may not approach the auctioneer for special requests or announcements on auction day.
18. **Any scratches requested after 8 p.m. on Thursday, July 23, will be charged a \$40 fee (cash only).** Exhibitors are responsible for scratching their animals.
19. There is a \$40 fee (cash only) for any late auction sign ups after the day the specie showed market. No late sign-ups will be accepted after 8 p.m. on Thursday, July 23.
20. Sellers are encouraged to thank their buyer. However, sellers are **not** allowed to contact their buyer for the purposes of asking the buyer to not send their animal to market, asking buyer to donate/trade animal back to the seller/school/club/etc. or asking buyer to send their animal to a no-kill shelter. This behavior is inappropriate and jeopardizes the Junior Livestock Auction program.

Buyers:

21. All species of livestock will be sold by the head, not the pound.
22. Species will no longer be rotated, or mixed, throughout the sale order. As an example – in no particular order – all lambs will be sold, then all goats, then all beef, etc.
23. There is a two-buyer maximum per lot/sales invoice for animal purchase.
24. New buyer pre-registration will begin on Monday, July 21. You must register before 8 a.m. on auction day, Saturday, July 25.
25. When a lot CLOSSES or is SOLD, the animal is the property of the buyer. However, the seller is responsible for caring for the animal until it is loaded on the truck on the night of Sunday, July 26. Seller's failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums.
26. OC Fair Livestock Department will **ONLY** accept and process add-ons for market competitors that have an animal going through the Junior Livestock Auction. Add-on contributions are ONLINE ONLY.

Auction Sale Contract

After you are announced as the winning bidder, report to the livestock office to receive your Auction Sale Contract and pay for your purchase(s). Completing this contract is quick and helps expedite your sale at the Livestock Office.

1. Purchase options *(select one of the following four options):*

The following examples assume the following:
 Specie: Hog
 Buyer bid: \$850 (based on the break-even price, page 12)
 Market value: \$0.75

Process for meat and deliver to locker/plant.

Buyers who have made their purchase for the meat product need to indicate where they would like the carcass cut and wrapped. Buyers are responsible for paying the purchase amount plus the processing and transportation fees. Buyers are responsible for contacting the locker/plant selected to provide instructions. Buyers are responsible for cut & wrap locker fees/charges.

Buyer's cost for the animal \$850	Estimated buyer's cost (transportation and processing) \$95	Estimated buyer's cost (cut & wrap) 120 pounds x \$1.25 = \$150
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Seller/Exhibitor receives (minus sales fee)
 \$850

Note: Cut, wrap and locker costs are paid to the company you choose when you pick up your meat. All other costs are paid to the OC Fair on auction day.

Buyback (resale at market price)

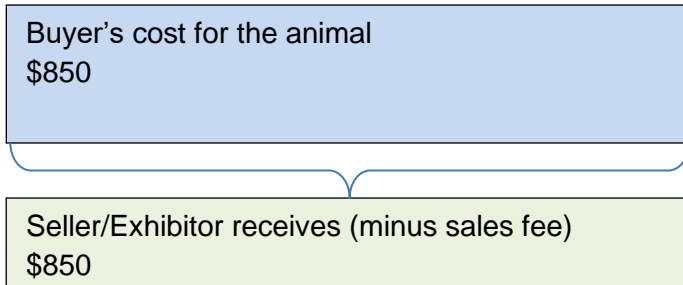
If you do not want to receive the meat from your purchase and instead wish for the animal to be sold commercially at market price to benefit the youth exhibitor, or if you want to support the program but have no use for the animal or the meat, you can choose this option. Buyers pay the difference between their bid and the market price, and the youth exhibitor receives the full bid amount. Auction staff handles the resale for you. No private buybacks are allowed or offered.

Market value 240 pounds x \$0.75 = \$180	Buyer's cost (over-market value) \$850 - \$180 (240 pounds x \$0.75) = \$670

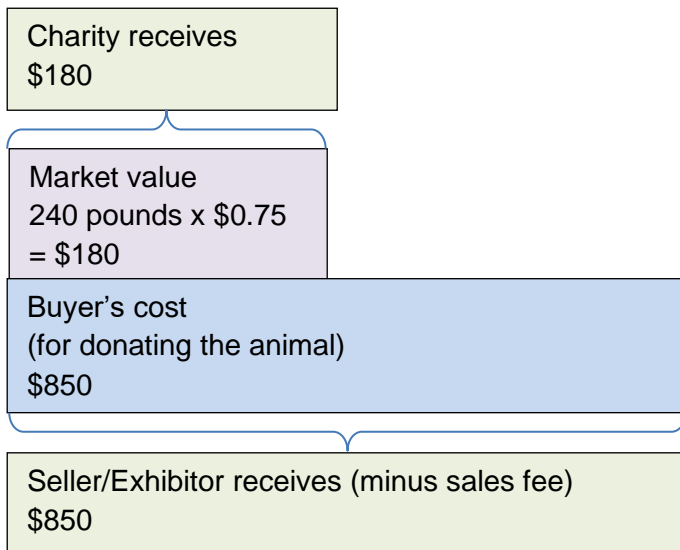
Pick-up live

You or a representative will come to the OC Fair at the appointed time to load and haul away the animal you purchased. Buyers who choose this option usually have a place where the animal can be kept as breeding stock ONLY, wish to have it processed in a special way or have some other purpose in mind. Choose this option if you want to keep the animal alive and can arrange for hauling. You must include the pick-up person's name and phone number, and provide this person with your copy of the sales agreement if you are not picking up the animal yourself. Note: **All Champions** (beef, hogs, goats and lambs) are required to go through processing. Additionally, in accordance with **State fair rule VII., Livestock and Horse Exhibits, Ownership, Item 4** market animals sold in any junior market livestock auction cannot be shown in another market show but can be kept for breeding stock.



Donate resale proceeds to charity.

Animals to be resold commercially at market price to benefit a designated scholarship fund. You pay the entire bid price and the proceeds from the bid will go to the exhibitor and the resale price will go to the designated charity. See page 11 for a list of programs you can donate to.



2. PURCHASER

Review buyer information on the sales contract/invoice to ensure that the buyer's number, name and address are properly entered.

3. BUYER SIGNATURE

Please sign the sales contract. You will be given a copy for your records. Present this at the Livestock Office to expedite the process of settling your account.

Once finished participating in the auction, buyers must report to the OC Fair Livestock Office to review invoices and pay for purchases before leaving the livestock area and the Fairgrounds.

Donations and Scholarships

After purchasing an animal in the Junior Livestock Auction, you may donate that animal to any scholarship fund described below or any other nonprofit group of your choice. The animal will then be sold to the market and the money received from that sale will go to the designated fund. The buyer will pay the full bid price. The charity will receive the market value price. Rabbits, broilers and turkeys are excluded. See donation example on page 8.

Orange County 4-H

“Head, heart, hands and health” are the four H's that make up the 4-H pledge and are the cornerstones of an organization which reaches more than 2,000 youth in Orange County. The program emphasizes leadership development through project participation, community service and record-keeping. The Orange County 4-H program, organized through the USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) and the University of California, is now 100% dependent on private funding for its operation (other than salaries) because of county budget restraints. Note: Add-ons cannot be made to donation or scholarship programs. Individuals interested in contributing to the above programs without purchasing from the auction are encouraged to donate directly to each organization.

Understanding Your Auction Purchase – Cost and Yield

The goal for exhibitors is to cover their expenses and to also make a profit to further fund their future projects, education or life expenses. However, their foremost goals and the ones that are of utmost importance are that exhibitors acquire the experience, dedication and responsibility that they learn while raising their livestock projects. Buyers can help the youth exhibitors obtain all of their goals.

What Your Purchase Gives You

Helpful Definitions

- **Live weight:** The weight of the animal during the auction.
- **Carcass weight:** The weight of the animal after inedible parts are removed, such as, internal organs, head, hide and blood.
- **Dressing percent (%):** The percentage of the live animal weight that becomes the carcass weight at slaughter.
- **Percent packaged Meat:** The percentage of the carcass weight that becomes retail cuts that the buyer will receive after processing.

Cuts Produced

Percentages are based on the average carcass weight of each species. Contact your cut-and-wrap company to learn what cuts will be offered.
