18	MADAM SECRETARY: You want to do the

22	Exhibition Center is celebration of Orange County's
23	communities, interests, agriculture, and heritage with
24	results justifying resources expended.

6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: It feels great.
7	CHAIR RUIZ: Maybe we can turn it up a little bit.
8	(Public laughs)
9	Also, really quick, I had a ticket to be at the
10	NFL Draft today, but I would much rather be here with you.
11	(Public laughs)
12	So with that, I'm going to turn it over to the
13	CEO for her operational comments.
14	MS. KRAMER: Thank you, Chair Ruiz.
15	Well, good morning.
16	(Everyone answers in the affirmative)
17	You know Fair is in the air when you start seeing
18	this signage appear on the grounds and the OC Fair cow and
19	chickens show up.
20	In case you're wondering, we're 78 days until the
21	2019 OC Fair opens. It's been a busy month out and about
22	in the community. I've had several opportunities this
23	month to represent the OC Fair & Event Center with
24	speaking engagements and panel participation.
25	A special thank you to Director Rubalcava for

1	inviting me to be a part of two of these engagements;
2	Society of Marketing Services Professionals Luncheon and
3	Panel Discussion on April 9th. They're the only marketing
4	organization dedicated to creating business opportunities
5	for firms and individuals in the architect, engineering,
6	and construction industry.
7	And Director Rubalcava's very own organization
8	the Orange County Business Council I was asked to be
9	part of the Chairman's Leadership Breakfast on April 18th
LO	at the Center Club.
11	I want to thank Vice Chair Cervantes,
12	Director Rubalcava, and Director Meyer for attending the
13	OCBC Chairman's Leadership Breakfast. Next slide.
L4	I attended the OC the OneOC Spirit of
15	Volunteers Award Luncheon yesterday where we received the
16	Spirit of Volunteers Award for being a champion against
L7	hunger in Orange County.
18	We were nominated by the Community Action
19	Partnership of Orange County which is the Orange County
20	Food Bank, for a We Care Wednesday: Food Drive during the
21	OC Fair, as well as hosting Share the Harvest. An event
22	that engages 750 volunteers in assembling 12,000 holiday
23	food boxes right here at the OC Fair & Event Center.
24	OneOC Spirit of Volunteers and Award Luncheon is
25	Orange County's largest and longest running volunteer

1 recognition program. 1,100 community members filled the Disneyland Hotel's Grand Ballroom to celebrate 2 3 volunteerism. 4 At the suggestion of Director Mouet during the 5 2019 Budgeting Process, it was recommended in anticipation of low unemployment rates in Orange County, to budget for 6 7 additional staff customer service training. For many of our fair time seasonal staff, the 8 9 OC Fair is their first job, and we anticipate this to be 10 the case for many of our positions this year. To help prepare this new staff to welcome our fair -- to help 11 12 prepare this new staff, we have hired Mike Ganino, a 13 speaker and expert on positive community culture to 14 provide training at our staff orientation prior to fair. 15 Next slide. 16 Our last class of the Hatch Culinary Lab, AIME 17 students, concluded their training this week and we 18 presented certificates of participation. 19 This is the second year of this program providing culinary skills training to Anaheim School District High 20 School students. This is also the second year of our 21 22 summer internship program which I'm pleased to say we have 23 10 students who are already signed up and they will be 24 provided an advanced culinary class. 25 Centennial Farm continues to be busy with school Page 8

1	tours; 69 docents donated over 718 volunteer hours at
2	Centennial Farm, 6,787 students participated in 264
3	scheduled Junior Farm Tours and Discovery Days. Busy,
4	busy. Lots of kids in school buses.
5	The Ranch After School Program held it's banquet
6	on April 4th at Centennial Farm. Over 300 kids, parents,
7	and school staff attended the event celebrating the
8	accomplishments of the 80 kids who participated in the
9	program throughout the school.
LO	I want to thank Vice Chair Cervantes for
11	attending and supporting this event.
12	And then, if you're into goat yoga, and back by
L3	popular demand our second goat yoga event is scheduled
L 4	at Centennial Farm on May 18th. Next slide, Summer.
15	Okay. This time I'd like to report our first
16	quarter financials. Can you do the other. Thank you.
L7	For the for the for the three months in the
18	March 31st, 2019, we were favorable to budget by \$635,000.
19	Total revenues of 3.5 million exceeded budget of 3.1 by
20	375,000. This is due to a Ticketmaster signing bonus and
21	increased interest earnings. Total operating expenses of
22	5.1 million were favorable to budget of 5.3 by 178,000.
23	This is in part due to timing. Next slide, Summer, Cash
24	Equivalent.
25	Okay. Thank you. As you can see from the slide,
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1	this represents our cash on-hand and investments. In the
2	March 2019, Cash and Cash Equivalence is 52 million as
3	compared to a year ago, a 44 million. Almost an \$8
4	million increase year over year.
5	The OC Fair Supervisor Team is more engaged than
6	ever in managing the 2019 budget. Budget variance reviews
7	are now a standing topic at the Operations Management Team
8	meetings to ensure oversight by all departments. This
9	additional oversight will help the department increase
LO	their involvement in actively managing the overall
11	organizational budget.
12	We've also created some new tools and systems to
13	help staff have the resources and time realtime
14	information they need to manage their budget and making
15	purchasing decisions. These are happening on a quarterly
16	basis and we'll have another one of those just prior to
L7	Fair to make sure we're keeping everything on budget.
18	Any questions on that financials?
19	(No response)
20	Okay. At this time, I'd like to turn it over to
21	Ken Karns, VP of Operations, to provide an Operational
22	Update.
23	MR. KARNS: Thank you, Kathy. Good morning, Board.
24	Two updates this month.
25	First, on the 405 Project. The OCFEC team met
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1 with the 405 Project team on March 29th. The items on the Agenda were the 405 Project impact on the 2019 and 2020 2 Fair, traffic flow strategies, communications plans, and 3 4 possibilities for improved signage. 5 On Item 1, the project timeline for the Fairview bridge and 405 is 20 months completed in two phases. 6 7 minimum, there will be activity in 2019 and 2020. And there is discussion of possible work carrying over onto 8 9 2021. 10 The 405 Team is committed to maintaining three 11 northbound and three southbound lanes on Fairview and 12 extremely confident there will be little impact on traffic 13 flow during the annual fair. 14 On Item 2, the team from the 405 and the City of Costa indicated they have weekly meetings. 15 Traffic flow strategies are consistently discussed and 16 17 implemented. 18 The OCTA and 405 Team will be out during our 19 annual fair to monitor everything and the Fair was a part of the contractors contract and all plans collectively 20 encompass everything. The contractor works with OCTA to 21 22 strategically place temporary digital signage indicating 23 preferred roots of travel. On Item 3, the Team is committed to continue the 24 25 communication efforts already in place. They met again

1	this month and OCFEC is also providing a list of larger
2	events scheduled in 2019 and 2020.
3	Both communications Team will customize any
4	social media plans tied to our large events. OCFEC
5	communications will have additional efforts to push the
6	OCT Express utilized during the Fair.
7	And on Item 4, OCTA is going to carry out a sign
8	inventory of current OCFEC signage. The applicable teams
9	will meet to review any possible needs or improvements;
10	however, OCTA indicated that Caltrans does not provide
11	digital signage for individual companies or entities.
12	My next update is on parking and
13	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Ken, if I might.
14	MR. KARNS: Yes.
15	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: My daughter lives over at Adams
16	and Fairview, so we drive that maybe a couple times a day.
17	On a good day, it's bad.
18	MR: KARNS: Yeah.
19	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: But before the bridge was taken
20	down. So I think I'm very appreciative of all the work
21	you're doing and anything we can do to encourage
22	alternative routes and methods of getting there because
23	it's it's it's pretty bad. So
24	MR. KARNS: We agree.
25	Second update is on our parking storage
	Page 12

1 initiatives. The challenge facing the OCFEC related to fair 2. 3 time parking and storage have been an issue for a long The issue of storage at fair time is mostly due to 4 time. our carnival operations in need for approximately four acres of land to store what we call a "boneyard." That's 6 the dead stock. These are all the empty trucks and tractor-trailers that need to be stored once off-loaded. 8 9 The issue of parking is multi-faceted by the 10 large component. The 1,100 spots required for all staff 11 related to our outside contractor, operations, 12 concessioners, vendors, and attractions. 13 Over recent history, we've have had an agreement 14 with Ganahl Lumber and their property was used for the 15 boneyard, and that property is no longer available. 16 We had an arrangement with Orange County College where we had property available for both the boneyard and 17 18 the 1,100 spots and that property is no longer available. 19 Last year, we had an agreement with the 2.0 Newport Mesa Unified School for a piece of property in 21 West Costa Mesa which was able to partially house the 22 boneyard. We are looking into that opportunity once 23 again; however, that lot is not large enough to keep 24 everything. The OCFEC formed an internal subcommittee. 25

team brainstormed a robust list in the search for 2019 and 1 beyond solutions started. The list of parking lots and 2 3 storage lots was large and to-date, we've had had little 4 success. Parking lot is still in discussion; however, our areas at Orange Coast College working around their 6 7 construction, Newport Mesa Unified School District in discussions about Costa Mesa High School, Estancia High 8 9 School. There's a property on Bear Street that we're 10 pursuing. And, also, in discussions with the 11 Fairview Development Center and the City of Costa Mesa. 12 The same holds true for our storage. A long list 13 with no success. But we are still in discussion, again, 14 with Orange Coast College, Newport Mesa for the lot. City of Tustin. We're in discussions with them 15 16 around land around the old hangars and the 17 Fairview Development Center. We have been quoted a budget 18 number of about \$10,000 an acre to rent open land if we 19 were to find something that works. So if we were able to find four acres and the need was for two months, that 20 equals an \$80,000 impact. 21 22 So we also -- through due diligence -- we want to 23 know what that impact may have on our operations if we 24 were to house all that storage and all that parking on our

25

property.

1	The review will provide us the impact on parking
2	and parking revenue; however, we do believe this will also
3	have an impact on the tenants. We will not be able to
4	quantify this impact; however, over time, we believe it
5	will be detrimental to our overall operations and
6	attendance.
7	We've had had discussions with OCTA on the
8	expansion of the mass transit program. The current
9	bussing program only runs on Saturdays and Sundays.
10	To expand the program, the cost would be at a
11	minimum of \$26,000 a day. But beyond these costs is the
12	availability of buses and drivers.
13	But we continue to hunt. Thanks.
14	MS. KRAMER: Thank you, Ken, for that update.
15	Last but not least, I'm going to turn it over to
16	Michele Richards, VP of Business Development. She's going
17	to give us some Imaginology results and then share our
18	Upcoming Events.
19	MS. RICHARDS: So it is a wrap on Imaginology 2019.
20	And thank you to the Board members that were able
21	to come out that weekend. It was a fantastic three-day
22	weekend filled with science, technology, engineering,
23	arts, and math.
24	The weather was near perfect. It was a very good
25	time for all. Kids and teachers, parents people of all
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1 ages came to learn, discover, and explore to play in the great outdoors, to get up-close and personal with some 2 3 pretty adorable animals, and learn about animals as well. 4 To try their hardest at various compensation and 5 to even win a blue ribbon. To eat some pretty delicious food, and to be entertained by the most talented kids on 6 7 stage. And certainly to enjoy an added day of 8 9 Dia del Niño. Last year at Imaginology, Dia del Niño was 10 only able to be with us for one day, but they expanded it 11 to a second day. 12 Dia del Niño is the Day of the Child. It's a 13 beautiful cultural and arts festival programming in 14 conjunction with Arts OC. We also added the E-sports playground this year 15 so that kids of all ages could come discover the 16 17 possibilities of careers in video game coding and 18 E-sports. We even held our first ever E-sport tournament 19 at Imaginology. And to certainly test their fitness by crawling, 20 throwing, and jumping at the Fort Blisters Boot Camp. 21 22 Now, when it was all said and done, 43,898 people attended 23 Imaginology 2019. That was our second highest attendance in Imaginology history. We greeted a 160 busloads of kids 24 25 on Friday and we had record attendance on Friday of 16,554

1 students, teachers, and participants. 2 Social media was amazingly active and included 3 727,000 social media impressions. We added 500 new followers across all of our social media platforms. 4 5 Instagram impressions were up 98 percent during Imaginology, Facebook up 59 percent. 6 We had 199 volunteers that contributed 900 volunteer hours to help us put on Imaginology. It was a 8 9 true community event. 2,750 competitive entries by kids 10 were judged and awarded ribbons and designations, and over 4,000 kids survived the Fort Blisters Boot Camp. 11 12 We had 10 teams that competed in the first 13 Imaginology E-sports tournament. Those kids were from all 14 over Orange County. And the winning team on Saturday was from Westminster High School, and on Sunday from Laguna 15 Hills School, and University High School in Irvine. 16 17 And then there were also teams from 18 Saddleback High School, Woodbridge High School, El Toro, 19 Aliso Niguel, Magnolia High School, and then a few match up teams that included several different high schools, so 20 it was a great success. 21 22 But what we're really proud of is seeing the 23 sense of discovery and exploration and wonder on faces like this and on kids like this. Now doesn't this look 24 25 like a future neuroscientist, maybe; right? And on faces

1 like this and even teenagers like this. But our favorite is on sweet faces like this. 2 3 (Public laughs) So thank you to the staff and all of our 4 5 volunteers and to our Board for your support and helping us present an amazing Imaginology 2019. 6 And until next year. Okay. 8 (Applause) 9 All right. Let's roll right into our upcoming 10 events. 11 Last month, I previewed Pet Expo which opens 12 tomorrow here at OC Fair & Event Center. So if you 13 haven't ever been out to Pet Expo, I highly encourage you 14 to do that. It's one of our largest events of the year. 15 We will entertain lots of crazy pet guests this weekend. 16 Coming up the following weekend -- Friday through 17 Sunday, May 3rd through the 5th -- is the OC Marathon. 18 This is the 15th annual OC running festival which includes 19 the Full Marathon, the Half Marathon, the OC 5K, and then the -- the festival as well. 20 Also, including the Kids Run the OC Program. 21 22 that starts on Friday from 4:00 to 8:00 with the Fitness 23 The Kids Run the OC and the 5K is on Saturday and then the Big Daddy Marathon and Half Marathon is on 24 25 Sunday. And you can still register. Go through our Page 18

1 website or go to ocmarathon.com. The following weekend is going to be a very busy 2 3 weekend here. Sand Sports Super Swap kicks off the 4 weekend. It's a one-day opportunity for off-road enthusiasts to swap their sand toys and equipment. is Saturday, May 11th from 7:00 to 2:00. General 6 admission is \$10. That same weekend is the March of Dimes March for 8 9 Babies. This is a 5K fundraising event benefitting 10 March of Dimes, a non-profit organization that helps raise 11 funds to support research, advocacy, and programs for the 12 health of all moms and babies. And that's Saturday, May 13 11th. And you can register online as well. 14 That same weekend, we have a garden class at Centennial Farm. This is Urban Chickens Demystified. 15 chickens are fascinating creatures. Whether you want to 16 17 get started with chickens or you already have an 18 established flock, this class will showcase why you should 19 equip your garden with these amazing multi-taskers. That's Saturday, the 11th, at 10:00 o'clock. The cost is 20 \$15 which covers the fees -- the fee for all the 21 22 materials. And chickens not included. Okay. Again, May 23 11th. It is going to be a busy weekend around here. Costa Mesa Speedway. They're celebrating their 24 25 50th year here at OC Fair & Event Center in the arena.

1 General admission is \$20. 2 And the Gem Faire is back with us the following 3 weekend, May 17th through 19th where you can find fine 4 jewelry, precious gemstones -- millions of beads and crystals. That's Friday through Sunday, the 17th through the 19th. General admission is \$7. 6 Also, that weekend is OC Night Market. Beginning on Friday through Sunday, May 17th, the OC Night Market 8 9 features over 200 food, merchandise, crafts, arts, games, 10 music, and entertainment attractions in an epic event that 11 appeals to all ages. It's a great event. Admission is 12 \$5. 13 Kathy mentioned Goat Yoga. We're back again for 14 our second Goat Yoga Experience at Centennial Farm. Spectra Yoga Teachers will lead three beginner level yoga 15 sessions and the Fountain Valley Cloverdales 4-H Club will 16 17 bring the baby goats. If you haven't seen this, I highly 18 recommend. If you're not into yoga, just come and watch. 19 It's so entertaining. But if you do want to participate in the yoga 20 21 session, it's \$45 and you can sign up online and spots are 22 going very, very quickly. 23 That same day, we're going to do another garden class at Centennial Farm. This one on making passion 24 25 fruit jam. That starts at 10:00 o'clock. The fee is \$25

1 to cover the costs and materials. 2 And then wrapping up the month -- a very busy month indeed -- will be the Scottish Fest. And this is a 3 great tradition at the OC Fair & Event Center. May 25th 4 and the 26th. Enjoy a fun, family-friendly weekend of Scottish and Celtic entertainment and food. General 6 7 admission is \$23. And please, don't forget about Centennial Farm. 8 9 Open free to the public, Monday through Friday from 1:00 10 to 4:00, Saturday and Sunday, 9:00 to 4:00; Heroes Hall, 11 open free to the public, Wednesday through Sunday, 11:00 12 to 5:00. 13 The Market Place. Open Saturdays and Sundays from 8:00 to 4:00. And then, of course, our certified 14 15 Farmers Market in front of the Pac Amp box office, 16 Thursdays, 9:00 to 1:00. And that concludes my report. 17 18 MS. KRAMER: Thank you, Michele. 19 Speaking of Imaginology, some of you may not 2.0 realize that that's really become an event that's 21 recognized by our industry. 22 In fact, two years ago, we had our colleagues 23 come down from the LA County Fair, work with our team, 24 understood what we were trying to create here. And it's 25 been very engaging helping them really sponsor and get

1	their own.
2	And I believe this is their first year that they
3	launched their own not Imaginology, but a STEAM event.
4	So we're very proud that our Imaginology is a catalyst
5	of and that's just one the many that ask about it and
6	inquire about how they can get a STEAM event going in
7	their market.
8	So thank you for the team. Not only do they have
9	to produce it, but they're willingness to share with the
10	industry and givebacks. So thank you. Yeah. Thank you.
11	That concludes my report.
12	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. Thank you, Kathy.
13	Before we move onto the the next item, I got a
14	couple of speaker cards under the CEO's Operational
15	Announcement.
16	And I'm going to call up the first speaker which
17	is Reggie followed by Adam Carleton.
18	MS. MUNDEKIS: I'm going to withdraw my card for that
19	item.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: All right. Adam?
21	MR. CARLETON: Thank you, Board.
22	And today I'm here, once again. I'm the Vice
23	President of Finance. And what we see again is another
24	headline in the newspaper. This one, says, "The Orange
25	County Fair Board moves to bar unapproved employee

1 separation agreements." This is something like the third 2 news article. 3 There was one in the OC -- Voice of OC. A couple in the Daily Pilot. And within luck, perhaps we're going 4 to see one in the Wall Street Journal. And it's a very, very bad press when you're failing audits. 6 And today, we've only had a one-sided rendition of what actually happened. But what we do now is that the 8 9 CEO placed me on administrative time off and she keeps 10 insisting it was an HR matter. 11 Well, I have a public records request from the 12 CDFA and she phoned the auditor. And as you know, it was 13 on December 10th. My staff was instructed to start 14 booking some of the stuff from the audit that's in question. And I said we need legal approval to do so. 15 16 The very next day -- about 10:00 a.m. -- I was 17 walked out of the building. And one of the very first 18 things the CEO did was call to the State Auditors Office. 19 And I have those emails because he wrote to her and he is discussing his phone calls just a couple of hours later. 20 And he says, "To clarify," excuse me. He says, 21 22 "Hello, Kathy. I received your phone call about Adam not 23 being with the OC anymore. If I receive a call from him in the future, I'll direct him, but I can't talk about 24 OC Fair business." 25

1 Okay. It's not an HR matter. She doesn't want me talking to the auditors. Okay. It's like the smoking 2 qun. She writes them back and she says, "Well, to 3 clarify, he's on administrative time off at this time but 4 restricted from conducting OCFEC business." All right. I don't know what she's going to 6 7 conjure up, but it's been some five months that she's been investigating me now. She put me on ATO so I can't 8 9 conduct business. I'm on the wrong side of the fence 10 here. I only get three minutes to try to talk about a 11 very complicated subject. And all we have so far from this Board is a 12 13 one-sided rendition from the CEO about what she did, but 14 there's a nine-month hold in there. And I have emails. 15 have all kinds of correspondence about what happened 16 during those nine months. 17 So I have 33 seconds left to go, and I'll tell 18 you, if you read pages 164 through 166 of last month's 19 transcript, she hems and haws about what she did. then she says, to Mr. Caplan, "So -- I know, Josh, if you 20 want to comment or is that -- or you're good?" 21 22 This is our attorney and we haven't heard from 23 the attorney. We haven't heard from CDFA. We haven't 24 heard from CalHR. And he had no response. 25 Thank you.

1	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
2	Okay. Now we move onto the next item on the
3	Agenda which is matters of public comment.
4	Public comment is allowed on issues not on the
5	current Agenda; however, no debate by the Board shall be
6	permitted on such public comments and no action will be
7	taken on such public comments items at this time, as law
8	requires formal public notice prior to any action on the
9	docketed item.
LO	Speakers are requested to sign in prior to the
11	start of the meeting and are limited to three minutes.
12	Comments will be accepted on Agenda items during the
13	meeting.
L 4	Speakers wishing to address the Board on items on
15	the Agenda are requested to sign in prior to the start of
16	the meeting and identify the Agenda items on which you
L7	desire to address the Board. Speakers are limited to
18	three minutes.
19	So with that, I got quite a bit of speakers here.
20	I'm going to start with the first one which is
21	Reggie Mundekis followed by Mary.
22	MS. MUNDEKIS: Good morning. I'm Reggie Mundekis and
23	speaking on Item 7, Matters of Public Comment.
24	My first question is: Where is the 2017 2017
25	CDFA Audit? During the March 2019 Board meeting,

1	statements were made that the audit has been completed.
2	Where is it? We need to see the audit and the management
3	report and findings immediately.
4	We also need to get our money back from
5	Vanguard University. For reasons which are unclear to
6	anyone, CEO Kramer illegally transferred money,
7	trademarks, logos, and intellectual property to Vanguard
8	for their use.
9	Vanguard University is part of a church which
10	openly discriminates and quite frankly hates anyone
11	who's LGBT or transsexual or even questions anything
12	besides a straight arrow male/female relationship.
13	So Kramer broke the law when she sent that money
14	and she sent state intellectual property over there. So
15	we need to get our money back, and it's a really simple
16	matter; you tell Kathy Kramer to get up, walk across to
17	Vanguard, and come back with our money and our
18	intellectual property. It's really simple.
19	I've asked several times for this to happen and
20	it hasn't. Kathy Kramer broke the law. You guys need to
21	clean up after Kathy Kramer yet another time. It's going
22	to be much better for you guys as a Board if you get this
23	mopped up right now.
24	Because right now, you're supporting homophobia
25	and you're telling the world by letting Vanguard have

1 your money and use your trademarks -- that you like being 2 homophobes; State agencies are not allowed to do that. 3 I also have to ask the question of why is 4 Kathy Kramer still employed here? The public is owed an 5 explanation why she still has a job here. In any number of companies and governmental agencies, Kramer would have 6 been shown the door a long time ago. Instead, every month, we have just more, more 8 9 sketchy things that she's done. We find out that there's 10 more issues with audits. We find out there's more 11 financial transactions which are questionable. We need an 12 explanation from the Board why Kathy Kramer is still 13 employed. 14 Thank you. CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. 15 16 I will now call on the next speaker, Mary, 17 followed by Kim Stanford. 18 MS. SPADONI: Thank you. 19 You mentioned that the Pet Expo is starting tomorrow. I'm a great pet lover; however, this new policy 20 that you've allowed Pet Expo to charge \$10 for outside 21 22 dogs to be admitted into Pet Expo is absolutely 23 outrageous. 24 We've had a number of rescues that have withdrawn 25 their support of Pet Expo because of this. They have dogs Page 27

that have been exposed in the past to dogs.

Now, at the gate, you're charging \$10. You're asking the owners of the dog to sign a waiver. Well, who signs a waiver that wouldn't involve the Fairgrounds who's getting part of the \$10? Who is aware that the -- they didn't have permission?

It says in here that "No dogs are permitted on the Orange County Fairgrounds that are not part of the exhibition without permission of the 32nd DAA, and they're saying that these dogs must be a legitimate part of the show, exhibit, or activity requiring the use of the animals. If allowed, the renter is ultimately responsible for the liability associated with the animals and the sanitary needs."

However, if you've got the knowledge, you're reaping some of the profits. Obviously, if there's a dog bite -- and we know that the Pet Expo is -- main attraction are children -- that if outsides dogs are involved in dog bites or some type -- that you're going to be involved in liability and you're going to really sell your reputation for this Pet Expo.

And in addition, you're putting all of these rescue dogs in great harm. You're going to have communal water bulls. So all you need is one case of Giardia or some type of transferable parasite and you're going to

1 have an outbreak, not only with the rescues but with the other people that are bringing their dogs. 2 3 So you might want to weigh in legally to see 4 where your liability is regarding this. I don't think you can waive the right of a victim who is bitten -- or a child is bitten -- so that you don't become involved in 6 this. This is just -- I mean, they're going to have one 8 9 location where animals are supposed to deposit their urine 10 or feces. Well, any of dog owners know that when they got 11 to go, they're gonna go and they may not make it to the 12 appropriate area. So if -- even if the feces is picked up 13 immediately, you're still going to have the contamination 14 in that area for other dogs. You've got rescues that are bringing puppies and 15 16 young dogs. This is really a bad decision. I don't know 17 who made it. And I think your liability of what could 18 happen is really incredible because they're not allowing 19 any of the more aggressive dogs -- least aggressive dogs -- Pits, German Shepherds. So there's no weight. 20 So I hope you will review this immediately. 21 22 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. 23 I will now call on Kim Stanford followed by Vincent Pollmeier. 24 25 MS. STANFORD: Good morning. Thank you all for Page 29

1 allowing me to talk to you today. My name is Kim Stanford and I have my business located at the Equestrian Center 2 3 here at the Orange County Fairgrounds. 4 As the Fairground starts to have the 5 property-wide infrastructure analysis done, I'd like to remind the staff and the Board to keep in mind the 6 Equestrian Center here at the Fairgrounds is still a standing element that needs to be included into future 8 9 plans of the property. 10 As an analysis is done, I also would remind 11 you -- as well as the other entities that -- who performs 12 the analysis -- that the Equestrian Center is an 13 agricultural piece of property and has to be evaluated as 14 such. Please don't evaluate as a commercial type of 15 16 property because that will change how things need to be 17 addressed. 18 The Equestrian Center has been used 365 days a 19 year for all type of people and ages to the public. multiple equine programs offered here is a wide variety of 20 activities. Everything from kids riding and equine 21 22 science horsemanship camps to year-round academy 23 programs -- multiple different types of levels of 24 competition teams practice here. 25 And we do have equine therapy which we have a

1	dream to expand this. And to be able to expand this for
2	the demand that the public needs, we will need the support
3	of the Fairgrounds.
4	So I thank you all, and I have great confidence
5	that the staff and the Board members will remember that
6	this is a public facility and that you all are public
7	servants. And keep in mind the wants and the wishes and
8	the needs of the residents and how the Fairgrounds should
9	be utilized for years to come.
10	Thank you again for following me to address you.
11	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
12	We'll now call on Vincent Pollmeier followed by
13	Nick Berardino.
14	MR. POLLMEIER: Thank you.
15	I have two things I want to talk about just very
16	briefly. As soon as public comment is over, I have to
17	leave because I have a job.
18	Over and over again, we've raised the issue with
19	this Board of moving these meetings into the evening when
20	people who are employed and can't take off a morning to
21	come here can attend. I've heard nothing but positive
22	feedback from Board members and the public about these
23	ideas, and yet this is just lip service.
24	These meetings keep getting scheduled for 9:00
25	a.m. on Thursdays. So I point to you, Chair Ruiz,
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1 schedule the next meeting for 6:00 or 6:30 p.m. in -- in May; simple as that. Let's move them to the evening. 2 3 (Applause) That's all it takes. Now, the second item I want 4 to talk about is, I sent all of the members of the Board 5 on behalf of Friends and Neighbors of the Orange County 6 7 Fairgrounds and email yesterday. CDFA has finally responded to our document -- our 8 9 public records request and produced the Separation 10 Agreement that led to the issues with the 2016 Audit. 11 And I owe CEO Kramer an apology because I've been 12 insisting because there must be something wrong with the 13 Separation Agreement. That it couldn't possibly be a 14 standard agreement, but it is. It's a standard agreement set -- causing --15 entered into in June of 2016 for an employee to end their 16 17 employment in February of 2017. 18 On the face of the agreement, there's nothing 19 wrong with it. The problem is that the email that came out the day after it was signed saying that the employee 20 had -- employment had been terminated that -- had already 21 22 been terminated. 23 Now, this means one of two things: One, CEO 24 Kramer entered into this Separation Agreement knowing that 25 the termination date was false. There's a word for that.

1 It's called fraud. 2 Or CEO Kramer was thought that this was the real 3 termination date and then allowed the employee to end their employment early and fill out time cards -- get paid 4 5 for seven months. There's a word for that; theft. So those are your two choices. Those are the 6 7 only two logical choices. Either it was fraudulent from the get-go or theft occurred. 8 9 I encourage you to ask her which it was. Ι 10 encourage you to ask yourself why you have an employee --11 why you have a CEO who has now got a track record -- a proven track record -- of engaging in illegal contracts 12 13 with organizations which discriminate and not requiring them to live up to their non-discrimination clauses under 14 15 the California law and has retroactively renegotiated 16 contracts without your permission that has cost this 17 fairgrounds and the people of the State of California hundreds of thousands of dollars. 18 19 Thank you. 20 (Applause) CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. I will now call on 21 22 Nick Berardino followed by John Stevens. 23 MR. BERARDINO: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman, honorable members of the Board. A pleasure to be here 24 25 today.

1	I'm here to say thank you and to thank everyone
2	for their hard work in getting the A-4 Skyhawk over here.
3	Since it's an Agenda item, I can't urge you to vote yes on
4	it, so I won't say for you to.
5	But I will share with you as Josh, you know
6	I will say it was a very marvelous experience to be at the
7	Board of Supervisors last Tuesday.
8	This item, I've been appearing before that Board
9	since 1973. It's the first time there was so many
10	people wanting to second the motion to approve the MOU
11	that the County Clerk couldn't get to second it the motion
12	because they were that fast to join into that.
13	But, you know, it was a great lesson learned that
14	it takes a real community to move a jet. Moving a jet
15	isn't as easy as it would seem. You know, I was thinking
16	maybe we could get Ken's pickup, hook it up, take it out
17	of there kind of the way we snatched the plaques.
18	(Public laughs)
19	On the weekend when nobody was looking.
20	(Public laughs)
21	But the fact is, it's a little bit more difficult
22	with the jet. So I thank this Board for it's leadership
23	on this. This is so meaningful to so many veterans. I've
24	talked to two pilots that have flown that jet and the
25	excitement is just tremendous.
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1	I also want to thank from the County, Saul. He
2	took the lead with the County CEO's Office. He took my
3	calls. When I kept saying, "Look, the price for this jet
4	is three-thirds off, you know, let's see if we can work a
5	deal." Which with a great work of Doug La
6	Belle and his tenacity and Sandra and their tenacity, the
7	County did agree three-thirds off, and great work.
8	And I hope that the you, here at the Board,
9	will send a letter of recommendation to the CEO on behalf
LO	of Saul who did a great job.
11	Thank you, Josh, for all your hard work on it.
12	Josh moved the thing quickly and that was important for
13	this Board. And the staff here, thank, you know, all of
14	you. I want to thank the CEO. Rene Ramirez from the
15	Veterans Affairs Office. The list goes on and on.
16	Thank the community group. Thanks to the Friends
L7	of the Fair, the neighbors all the citizens.
18	I mean, I haven't been coming to these meetings
L9	but I hear everybody has been so supportive and so strong
20	and getting it here.
21	(Director Rubalcava-Garcia joined the.
22	meeting at 9:47 a.m.)
23	This has been a marvelous achievement. And so on
24	behalf of all the veterans in the community, we are all
25	looking forward to it, and I hope I haven't missed
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1	anybody.
2	Saul will be here on the Agenda. He knows
3	everything about the jet and so thank you all very much.
4	Thank you.
5	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
6	(Applause)
7	I will now call on John Stevens. John Stevens
8	followed by Anne.
9	FEMALE SPEAKER: John Stevens is not present. Please
10	disregard.
11	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay.
12	The next speaker will be Anne. And I apologize.
13	I cannot read your last name. Followed by Ana V.
14	ANNE: So, this is an unusual experience for me to
15	agree with almost everything that the prior speakers have
16	said.
17	And, also, I attended the Imaginology thing on
18	Friday and it was a really great event. It was so much
19	fun to watch all of that action with the kids and the
20	community.
21	But what I'm worried about is I feel that the
22	that the Fairgrounds is it even sounds like we're in a
23	Board meeting of a company. I don't think that's the
24	original intention of the Fair. The Fair was supposed to
25	be a community event for the county.

1 Yes, you have to break even and yes, there's money to worry about. But it just seems like the money is 2 3 wrecking the Fair. The money is corrupting the Fair. 4 And, of course, I'm going to be speaking about --5 are you investigating the people that are offering you money to exhibit at the Fair? 6 I think you better do your due diligence on this because there's going to be a community backlash and I'll 8 9 talk more about that later. Thank you. 10 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. I will now call on Ana V, 11 followed by Beth Refakes. 12 MS. VRSKA: Hi. Good morning. Ana Vrska. 13 First, I'd like to talk about the Pet Expo. 14 in the actual contract, there is no mention of allowing outside animals for a fee. So it is yet another example 15 of this organization not following their own contracts --16 17 not enforcing them -- and opening the Fairgrounds and the 18 people to unnecessary liability. 19 Never have outside animals been allowed. I think that made sense, even though it was sad for my dog, I 20 understand why that is to protect the animals and to 21 22 protect the sanctity of the event. 23 And this blatant greed at the expense of the people attending and at -- you know, the people in the 24 25 community is outrageous. So I would urge a reexamination

of -- just a simple as follow the contracts that you're signing as to not incur legal issues.

Videoing the meetings is a step in the right direction, but we definitely need to look into changing the time of the Board meetings. I happen to have a very gracious boss because community engagement is important to me, but not everyone has that luxury. And I know more people would like to participate.

You should actively seek input year-round and then incorporate that input because this is a public organization and should be run as such.

The ramp in corporatization and semi-privatization that is happening should stop. All the issues with Vanguard, Pac Amp, investigators being hired to intimidate loose and unfavorable contracts to the Fairgrounds and people disruptive costly events at the disregard of community -- you know, need to be re-examined.

Perhaps, that in terms of what has happened previously, a previous Board wanting to sell the Fairgrounds to themselves. Maybe this seem like a drop in the bucket, but we seriously need to have a shift in paradigm about what it means to be a public organization in this day in age and what kind of behavior of the Board and the executive staff that entails.

1	How we do that? We need a change in executive
2	leadership. I, too, would like to wonder why Kathy Kramer
3	is still an employee. At no other place, including a
4	corporation, would she still have a job. You're going to
5	cost the shareholders if you're going to increase
6	liability.
7	Usually, the first maybe second time you're
8	going to be out the door. Not the 20th time. This
9	disregard for rules, procedures, disregard for community
10	wishes needs, questionable tactics, worrisome patterns of
11	behavior, including circumstances of her previous
12	employment which I will talk about another time.
13	And it's wise to remember that though you can
14	delegate authority, you cannot delegate responsibility.
15	Thank you.
16	(Applause)
17	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Beth Refakes followed by
18	Gibran Stout.
19	MS. REFAKES: Good morning. Thank you for letting me
20	speak. I have a couple of items.
21	First of all, I'd like to know the schedule for
22	acclimating the video recording of the meetings. I also
23	love that you finally got the large screen monitors. It
24	makes it so much easier for the residents and the other
25	attendees at the meeting to see what is presented.

1 I also have concerns about the impact on Costa Mesa residents of the 405 construction during fair 2 3 time. I know that as a resident who lives in the 4 5 downtown area which is basically at the end of the 55 freeway -- lots of times, even without the construction --6 the 55 Freeway is like a parking lot sometimes and it makes really difficult. 8 9 The other issue is that residents in this area, 10 as well as other areas, are faced with the issue of 11 cut-through traffic and you have a lot of apps that are 12 available that direct traffic through our neighborhood, so 13 I have concerns about that. 14 The other thing is on the Pet Expo. Admitting outside dogs I think is a bad idea. I am concerned that 15 16 disease can be spread very easily between dogs. Like a 17 previous speaker mentioned, all it takes one dog and it 18 could be spread easily. 19 Also, people go around. They like to touch the other animals and things like that. And so if one is 20 sick, it can get spread easily. So I have a lot of 21 22 concern for that, and I think that is also very bad idea. 23 And I also would suggest that you need to resolve 24 the issues around the audit and get those settled. 25 not going to go away. And you need to -- some of the

1 other issues that have been brought out -- you need to resolve those because they're going to linger on in and 2 3 you need to be able move forward. And the last thing is I hope that you had a 4 5 chance to visit The Wall That Heals. It's a three-quarter scale of the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington DC, and I 6 volunteered there for several shifts. And I have to tell you, it was very moving for people. At night, when the 9 wall was lit up, it was spectacular. And so I hope that 10 everyone had a chance to visit that. 11 Thank you. 12 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. 13 I will now call on Gibran Stout followed by 14 Lisa Sabo. MS. STOUT: Good morning, Board. Thank you for 15 16 hearing me today. 17 I want to start by thanking you for your time, 18 your service, your leadership. I know this is a thankless 19 I know you don't hear a lot of thank you's so I figured I start with that today. 20 I want to thank you for the communication with 21 22 the Equestrian Center. The emails are great. 23 I want to thank you for the fire system. 24 is doing a great job coordinating with everybody. 25 actually, I may feel alone in this field, but it feels Page 41

1 like it's going pretty well considering the scope of the 2 work, so it's doing great. 3 The car show was much quieter this year than last year, so this was a win. It would be great if it weren't 4 5 as close to the horses, but it was a better -- it was an improvement definitely this year. 6 Imaginology was great. Our Club OC Vaulting, the Equestrian Vaulting, non-profit that's at the 8 9 Equestrian Center. So if you guys went and you saw kids 10 doing crazy stuff on horses or that weird barrel, that was 11 We love Imaginology. 12 I love your Goat Yoga. But if you guys look at 13 the City of Costa Mesa Parks and Rec, you'll see horse 14 yoga. And "Oh, it's at the OC Fairgrounds. It's here. It's been here for two years." So how do we get up there 15 16 too? Because it's a great program. 17 A lot of the equestrians here have some great 18 programs. We have horse programs. We have horsemanship 19 And I know for our club, we are already in City of Costa Mesa and Newport Beach, so it seems to me 20 that it should already be on our website with those kinds 21 22 of things, and I don't know how we take we make that 23 happen, but we'd love to do that. 24 One last thing I want to bring up. I've talked 25 to Equestrian Center staff -- FFA and 4-H people -- it's a

1 little bit off topic but parking during the fair is a 2 nightmare. Anybody who does 4-H and has a kid knows what 3 it is. 4 I know many people have stopped exhibiting 5 because it's a nightmare. Parking is a nightmare. have to bring their animals and equipment from the Adams 6 lot. The equestrians -- parking is impacted because a lot of them park there. 8 9 We would love to sit down with somebody because 10 we have some great ideas for some solutions that should 11 make it easier for everybody and increase participation 12 and get more agriculture at your Fair. 13 So we would love to do that. Not have any angry 14 villagers in pitchforks, but really come up with some solutions and have some good discussion about it. 15 Hopefully, in enough time so that we can implement it this 16 17 year and if it works, following years. 18 So, again, thank you for all that you do and I 19 really encourage us to keep up the dialogue and the inclusion with the Equestrian Center. It's a great asset 20 for you guys that I feel it's really not recognized nearly 21 22 enough. 23 So it would be great to get an update with that, CEO Kramer, when you do -- in the beginning of every --24 25 when you're talking about the Goat Yoga and everything

1 else. We're here 24/7. We got a lot of great stuff going So let's hear about it more in the meetings. 2 3 Thank you very much. 4 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Lisa Sabo. MS. SABO: Good morning. And thank you, Gibran. think she stole my notes. It's so funny because if you 6 7 know horse people, we're, like, super busy. And even though we're both at the Equestrian Center all day, we're 8 9 just super busy dealing with our clients. 10 But the first thing I wanted to say just like 11 Gibran is thank you. And thank you for the new fire alarm 12 system, and it's going very well in the installation. And 13 thank you for Michele with the communication. 14 It was funny. A few weeks ago, there was a lack of communication on just some minor issue. 15 She came running out to the stables and we had a great talk. 16 17 And then coming up, I know you were doing the 18 branding. We want to be included because I had said, 19 well, one of the kids at the barn -- one of Kim's students -- came up with the cutest little logo that we 20 would love to use for the Equestrian Center. Because it 21 22 would be great to get some sort of signage out front 23 with -- and she's -- Michele had said that the branding is doing a logo and -- anyway, we just want to be included. 24 25 I think being included in this stuff -- the yoga, we want

1 to be. We're agriculture. We're helping people. We have our -- I have one student that was 2 3 selected by the USEF -- United States Equestrian 4 Federation. She's in the top under 18s and this week she's in New York doing a big camp. She's one of the top 6 7 equestrians under 18 in the United States and she's right here at our Fairgrounds. 8 9 But then we also have Changing Strides -- our 10 non-profit group -- where we bring in wonderful kids at 11 risk and we're doing weekly lessons and we're really 12 working hard to expand that program. 13 Of course, it's funding. We're -- we need to go 14 on a big campaign to raise funds to increase the program. And Wall Street Journal, just last week -- and actually, I 15 was sitting here thinking, "Shoot. I should have printed 16 17 it." There was a big article on equine therapy. Equine 18 assisted therapy is the fastest growing therapy program in 19 the United States. We have it right here. We help veterans. 20 help battered women. We help at-risk teens and we have it 21 22 here in -- in Orange County with our society. The way we 23 are right now and these kids are on these social media 24 problems. 25 And I'm telling you, when my kids enter the barn, Page 45

1	they have to put their phones in the basket on my basket
2	and they're not allowed to be on their phone or on social
3	media when they're at the barn and it is healthy.
4	It's a whole bunch of teenagers and kids out
5	there working, getting dirty, and loving it, and taking
6	care of animals. And I just wanted you know, keep
7	promoting the Equestrian Center.
8	So thank you, guys.
9	(Applause)
10	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
11	Okay. That's going to wrap up speakers for
12	Matters of Public Comment. We will now move onto the next
13	item on the Agenda.
14	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Chair Ruiz, can I ask a few
15	questions?
16	CHAIR RUIZ: Sure.
17	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Just to, kind of, unpack some of the
18	things.
19	I recall the Pet Expo that we have allowed people
20	to bring pets before. Is this something that's a new
21	MS. KRAMER: Yeah. I'll turn it over to Michele.
22	MS. RICHARDS: Several years ago
23	MR. CAPLAN: Before you answer, Michele, I again,
24	I'm concerned that we're engage in a discussion about a
25	Pet Expo event.

1	If you're asking for clarification regarding the
2	CEO Operational Update, that's one thing. But I want to
3	make sure we're not engaging a discussion regarding
4	Matters of Public Comment.
5	But I'll defer to you, Director Aitken. I'm not
6	sure whether your question deal directly with CEO Kramer's
7	Operational Announcements and that specific event.
8	But, again, if it's about public comments, unless
9	it's agendized, we can't discuss that today.
10	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Okay. Then I have no questions of
11	clarification on the Pet Expo.
12	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
13	Okay. If all the Directors had a chance to
14	review the minutes, at this time, I'd to like entertain a
15	motion to approve the minutes.
16	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: So moved.
17	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion. Is there a second?

12	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
13	Now we will move onto the next item on the Agenda
14	which is the Consent Calendar.
15	All matters listed on the Consent Calendar are
16	operational matters upon which the Board has governing
17	policies implementing on which are delegated through the
18	CEO. They will be enacted in one motion.
19	There will be no discussion of these items prior
20	to the item of the Board of Directors vote on the motion,
21	unless members of the Board, staff, or public request
22	specific items to be discussed separately and/or removed
23	from this section.
24	Any members of the public who wishes to discuss
25	Consent Calendar items should notify the Chair of the

1	Board at the time of the request and be recognized by an
2	invitation of the Chair to address the Board.
3	At this time, is there any items that any of the
4	Directors wish to pull from the Consent Calendar?
5	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Chair Ruiz, I have two items.
6	SA14119SP which is the sponsorship item. And
7	then SA12119PA which is with Pacific Symphony, the
8	Rick Springfield contract.
9	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great. We will hold those.
10	Any other items?
11	(No response)
12	Okay. At this time, I'll entertain a motion to
13	approve the ones that were not pulled.
14	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So moved.
15	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Second.
16	CHAIR RUIZ: Motion and a second.
17	Roll call.
18	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
19	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.

6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
7	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?

9	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Thank you.
10	At this time, we will now go back to the items
11	that were pulled; SA141SP and SA12119PA.
12	Director La Belle?
13	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: The first item is a sponsorship
14	with, I believe, AT&T Mobile.
15	Same as always
16	(Public laughs)
17	287 shares my wife and I own, out of 7.1 billion
18	outstanding. I'll state that for the record.
19	And then on the other item, being we have an item
20	later on the Agenda, 9J, relative to the Pacific Symphony,
21	I'd like to ask that that item be carried over until the
22	Board considers 9J.
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay.
24	With that, we will approve the one item which is
25	the AT&T item.
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1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So moved.
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Second.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Motion and a second.
4	Roll call.
5	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
7	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
8	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
9	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
10	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
11	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
12	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
13	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
14	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
15	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
16	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
17	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
18	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
19	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
20	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
21	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
22	Okay. Before we move onto the the next item, I
23	have a couple of speaker cards on the Consent Calendar.
24	And I will call on Reggie Mundekis followed by
25	Ana V.

1	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis. I'm speaking
2	to the contracts.
3	Today's process was a bit odd. And not keeping
4	with the best interest of the public. A number of people
5	had submitted cards specifying contracts they wanted to
6	speak on.
7	And rather than pulling those contracts that the
8	public wanted to speak on and raise serious issues with,
9	the Chair went ahead and allowed the Board to vote to
10	approve them before hearing the objections from the public
11	about those contracts, and that's that's unusual.
12	So I'm speaking about the contract for the
13	sheriff's retirement party. It's not clear to me how the
14	non-profit Orange County Deputy Sheriff's Association
15	which is not a part of the Orange County Sheriff's
16	Department is somehow funneling money they got from us
17	as far as not charging them rent for a retirement party.
18	Michele Richards gave me some information on how
19	that transaction allegedly works, so that's, you know,
20	we're working on unpacking that, and I'm not sure if that
21	contract is legit.
22	My next issue is with the March of Dimes
23	contract. There's just a whole lot of wrong with this.
24	First of all, both Kathy Kramer and
25	Barbara Bagneris have signed on to be co-Chairs of the
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event and that is self-dealing. They should recuse themselves from the process, admit they even thought of being a co-Chair. So this contract is tainted by the self-dealing of Kathy Kramer and Barbara Bagneris.

There's also the issue of that when

Barbara Bagneris was Chair, she assisted Kathy Kramer in

her various misdeeds and help her hide the 2016 Audit

Report and also went after members of the public who spoke

out against what was being done.

This contract is a gift of public funds. The -- a large -- over half of the rental fees are being written off for no reason. The inflatable run that was held, I think two weeks -- weekends ago -- had twice the rental fees of this contract and that represented a contract which was done at the public rates which are published.

What -- what Kramer has left out on this contract is the 9,500 check that was cut to the March of Dimes in January 2019 for a quote, unquote, "platinum sponsorship." So that Kramer and Bagneris could be big shots with public money.

So when you add the \$9,500 check that we gave to the March of Dimes which is public money, we subtract from that the about \$3,500 bill that they're paying us, which is already heavily discounted, the March of Dimes makes \$6,000 profit of public money from holding this event.

1	This is a gift of public funds. This contract
2	has to be redone charging the March of Dimes for
3	everything that they used and for every building that they
4	used, including the Pacific Amphitheater which rents for
5	around, I think, \$8,000 a day. Okay. If you're going to
6	use it, you have to pay for it, just like the inflatable
7	run paid for everything.
8	And we have a problem with this contract and I
9	don't know how you cure it in that the entire process is
10	tainted because Kathy Kramer and Barbara Bagneris were
11	running the event and engaged in self-dealing.
12	Thank you.
13	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
14	Next speaker is Ana V.
15	MS. VRSKA: Hi. I'm having some technical
16	difficulties.
17	Actually, pulling the investigative or
18	investigator contract, so I can't speak to it in detail
19	right now because oh, maybe it download.
20	But generally, what I'd like to say is I have
21	questions about why investigative services are needed. I
22	feel it is a tactic of intimidation. I know two Board
23	members resigned under I wasn't exactly sure under what
24	kind of circumstances. There are rumors about there being
25	things that were threatened to be exposed and things like

1	that.
2	I know investigative services have been hired
3	before. To me, this is just a waste of a whole heck of a
4	lot of money on items that could be done by cleaning house
5	and following proper procedures and doing things above
6	Board all the time.
7	And so I would just object to it. Not
8	specifically the actual contract, but the fact that we
9	even need to be doing that and hiring and spending
10	hundreds of thousands and dollars.
11	And I would appreciate, you know, respect and
12	attention while I'm talking, so you can actually be
13	hearing what I'm saying.
14	Thank you very much.
15	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Okay. That's going to wrap
16	up that item.
17	We will now move onto the the next item.
18	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. I have one for 9B, but I don't
19	have
20	FEMALE SPEAKER: Well, that's what it says back here.
21	I'm going by what it says back here. Do you understand?
22	CHAIR RUIZ: I'm sorry.
23	FEMALE SPEAKER: Back here, when you pick up the item,
24	it says what it is here.
25	CHAIR RUIZ: Yeah. We

1	FEMALE SPEAKER: So that's what I put on there on the
2	card.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Go ahead. Step up to the mic,
4	please.
5	FEMALE SPEAKER: Okay. So I agree with everything
6	everybody is saying.
7	And once again but here's the deal, if you
8	accept this contract from American Addiction Centers at
9	the Laguna Treatment Hospital, you're making a huge
LO	mistake.
11	This is you are located in the City of
12	Costa Mesa. We have a huge problem with crooked, sober
13	living operations. This particular outfit, "Did you do
L 4	your homework? Did you look into?" I'm not against
15	recovery, I'm against bad recovery.
16	And if you follow the Orange County Register, if
L7	you follow the L.A. Time, if you follow the
18	Wall Street Journal, Washington Post, New York Times if
19	you're following any of this there are good recovery
20	centers and bad recovery centers. Why would you accept
21	this?
22	We already had a problem at the 60th anniversary
23	party across the street. Remember that Solid Landings?
24	Put in a donation and they just took it and they turned
25	out to be one of the worst operators in the country.

1	They're being sued and, you know, everything people
2	died. Why would you do this? Just for money? Are you
3	joking?
4	You are going to get a backlash. You are going
5	to get a community backlash, not just from Costa Mesa,
6	from residents of Orange County that are putting up with
7	this craziness. We are the Rehab Riviera. Don't buy into
8	it. Don't take the money. That's how this happened in
9	the first place. Crooked money got into all the politics
10	in Orange County from the Sober Living Network. Don't buy
11	into it.
12	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. If there are no more speakers
13	under the Consent Calendar, we will now move onto the next
14	item in the Agenda which is the Governance Process.
15	Okay. There are no more speakers under
16	Consent Calendar.
17	FEMALE SPEAKER: Back here it say I put a card in.
18	CHAIR RUIZ: I don't have any cards. Other than 9A,
19	Committee Reports. And that's the only ones I have. I
20	don't have any
21	FEMALE SPEAKER: 9C.
22	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Where's your speaker card?
23	MADAM SECRETARY: It should be in the stack of when
24	you get to that item. We're just not to that item yet.
25	CHAIR RUIZ: Yeah. That's what I thought.

1	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: That's for 9C. A couple down the
2	road.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: We're on 9A. Thank you.
4	To assure compliance with the Bagley-Keene Act,
5	Committee reports are only for the purpose of the
6	Committee Chair. Ad hoc committee members or liaisons to
7	provide a verbal update.
8	Should the Board want to discuss any committee
9	work item not already in the Agenda, those would need to
10	be agendized for future Board meetings.
11	Okay. Now, I will move onto the
12	Heroes Hall Veterans Committee. Do we have a report from
13	Director La Belle or Vice Chair Cervantes?
14	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Absolutely.
15	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes. Sandra and I met last Friday
16	with Ken and the staff and the architects regarding the
17	A-4 Skyhawk Project, and we'll have comments on that
18	later.
19	The Foundation continues to look for a grant
20	person or persons to assist in future fundraising efforts.
21	We have a list that has been provided to us and the
22	Foundation will be conducting interviews in selecting
23	somebody to assist with our fundraising efforts.
24	I have some other comments later on on the Agenda
25	relative to the Skyhawk, but I think that's it at this

1	point in time. Sandra?
2	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Correct.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great. Thank you.
4	Now, I will move onto the the
5	Centennial Farm Foundation. Do we have a report from that
6	committee?
7	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Nothing to report.
8	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
9	Okay. Now, we will move onto the
10	Financial Monitoring Committee. Director Mouet?
11	DIRECTOR MOUET: I will ask Kathy to report on the
12	committee that took place.
13	MS. KRAMER: Yes. We held our monthly absent,
14	Director Mouet, Director Pham was on the call with myself
15	and staff and reviewed the financials.
16	We also updated on some work we're doing to give
17	a restart to our PO system and some of the
18	behind-the-scene things. He was happy with seeing that
19	direction and approved the financials.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
21	Okay. I will now move onto the
22	Legislative Monitoring Committee. Director Aitken, do you
23	have anything to report?
24	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
25	So we got a report from Gonzalez & Sons that
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helps us monitor some of the current legislation.

Right now, we have not submitted anything on the 50-50 raffles that there is an urgency cause, so we can't submit it at any time. But it seems to be that it has gotten so cost-prohibitive and it's been difficult even for professional sports franchises to navigate with the gambling commission that for an organization of our size, I don't know if pursuing this seems to be feasible in the benefit of the organization.

I think that we could end up spending a lot of taxpayer money pursuing something at the end of the day might be a dead end and it might not be financially feasible for our non-profits.

So I'm going to request some dates from Kathy to, kind of, sit down -- digest this. But I think at the next meeting, I might make a report that we halt pursuing this because it doesn't seem financially feasible, so I just want to give you a heads up.

I do think, actually, retaining a lobbyist in Sacramento is a smart thing for the organization. There is other pieces of legislation that are going to be coming down the pipeline that are going to affect the fairground industry as a whole.

I don't know if people had a chance to see some of the articles about what's going on at the Cow Palace,

1 but they also alerted us to that. About whether there's going to be some statewide legislation dealing with gun 2 3 shows on State property. 4 There's also legislation moving certain 5 fairgrounds into JBAs which I think is going to affect other fairs maybe differently than ours, and we need to 6 7 independently look at how some of this legislation affects our fairgrounds which might be different than what is good 8 9 for some of our sister, smaller fairgrounds. 10 So that would, kind of, that -- that's -- that 11 would be my recommendation going forward. But I'd like to 12 sit down with our CEO and you and, kind of, look at what's 13 best for our fairgrounds. 14 CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. You know, I also wanted to add too that they 15 16 offered another alternative. In case we don't partner 17 up -- partnering up with maybe the Angels or the Ducks to 18 try to get some, you know, use their 50-50 monies and 19 hopefully have it coming down our way if we don't enact 20 our own. So that -- that's another option that they 21 22 offered. So that was a great report from you. Thank you. 23 Okav. I will now move onto the Tenant Liaison committee. Director Pham or 24 25 Vice Chair Cervantes? Do you have anything to report? Page 61

1	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Nothing at this time.
2	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great.
3	Next is the Board of Directors Governing Policy
4	Manual and Ad Hoc Committee. Director Meyers or Director
5	Bagneris? Do you have anything to report?
6	DIRECTOR MEYER: Unless Director Bagneris does,
7	otherwise we defer this to our Agenda Item 9G, which is
8	the action item related to our report.
9	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great.
10	Now, we move onto the Safety and Security
11	Committee. Vice Chair Cervantes, you want to move that to
12	the report?
13	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Sure.
14	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. All right.
15	We will move that to the item that's will be
16	coming up on the Agenda as well.
17	The next one is the Master Site Plan Ad Hoc
18	Committee. Director Aitken or Director Rubalcava-Garcia,
19	do you have anything to report?
20	DIRECTOR AITKEN: The Master Site Plan Committee I
21	think as we discussed at the last meeting is going to
22	be on hold temporarily. So I don't know if we need to
23	agendize it until we maybe have some our first meeting
24	set.
25	What we're really focusing on is the work. And
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1	if you don't mind, Chair, if I jump ahead to the Building
2	and Maintenance Committee.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Sure. Go ahead.
4	DIRECTOR AITKEN: We have been able to set up a
5	meeting between Chair Rubalcava-Garcia and myself. We
6	are going to start moving forward and getting some of the
7	maintenance reports the overall property reports and
8	start moving those most of this through that committee.
9	And I think once we see, kind of, the lay of the
10	land, we will be able to then move forward with the Master
11	Site Plan Committee.
12	So I guess my recommendation would be to maybe
13	temporarily sunset the ad hoc committee on the Master Site
14	Plan until we do some real light work with the Buildings
15	and Maintenance Committee.
16	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great. Thank you.
17	Okay. I will now move onto the added I mean,
18	the Audit Ad Hoc Committee. Director Rubalcava-Garcia or
19	Director Meyer?
20	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: So we have had a chance to
21	meet and we did draft a letter to the auditor regarding
22	the 2016 Audit. And I'll briefly describe the things that
23	we just addressed in the audit or in the letter.
24	We did highlight the fact that we that
25	Chair Ruiz has established an Audit Committee to review
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1	audits moving forward and all correspondence should come
2	directly to Director Meyer and myself.
3	We also highlighted the policy that the Board
4	adopted at the March meeting related to payments to
5	other or payments to employees, and I'll read it
6	directly from the meeting:
7	"The Board adopted a policy prohibiting the
8	District from entering into severance agreements without
9	the prior approval of the Board and CalHR."
10	So we did highlight that that is something that
11	the Board has adopted, and we also reviewed some of the
12	Contracting Manual. So one of the issues that also came
13	up was contracting manual language, and we did clarify
14	that that was something that the Board established in May
15	of 2018.
16	So we under during our discussion with
17	Jason, who is the auditor assigned, he did become aware of
18	the fact that this is already something that the Board has
19	adopted and we clarified the language for him as well as.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: Great.
21	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And then one other item
22	CHAIR RUIZ: Oh, I'm sorry.
23	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I'm sorry.
24	We did receive the 2017 Audit and will agendize
25	it for the May or July meeting recommend that it be
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1	agendize for June, sorry.
2	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. Thanks so much.
3	DIRECTOR MEYER: One other thing.
4	We did speak with Jason the auditor from the
5	CDFA Audit Office and he clarified to us in very strong
6	language that the delay in receiving the results of the
7	2017 Audit was solely to manpower at the CDFA Audit
8	Office.
9	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Thank you for clearing that
10	up.
11	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And Chair Ruiz, I have to
12	commend the fact that you created this Audit Committee
13	because it did it was extremely helpful to get time
14	with Jason to understand his process, understand how he
15	works with fair staff here, and he's already started his
16	2018 process and we were able to be part of that.
17	Director Meyer sat in on that initial meeting.
18	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. Thank you. Keep up
19	the good work. Thank you.
20	Okay. We're still on Item 9A. I will now call
21	on the speakers under Item 9A. We're all on the same page
22	here.
23	Okay. Item 9A, I will now call on
24	Reggie Mundekis, please, followed by Adam Carleton.
25	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis and I'm
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1 discussing the committee and Ad Hoc Liaison Committee 2 reports. So for a number of months now, there have been 3 regular requests to make these committees open to the 4 5 public and they're ignored. And somebody says, "Oh, yeah. We're going to do 6 7 that," and nothing ever happens. And it's a really simple matter. You simply say, "Well, you know what, we're now 8 9 having these meetings open to the public." 10 This really confuses me why you can't take that 11 action because you're perfectly comfortable taking actions 12 which, for example, when you need to order tickets for 13 your friends for concerts at the Pac Amp. 14 What you do is that you have your friends call or email the Board concierge -- who is a State employee --15 16 that person then gets the contact information for your 17 friend -- who may be a relative, a cousin, or business 18 associate, or a client for your entertaining -- and then 19 that person can then give their credit card information and purchase tickets that aren't available to the public 20 and the State employee does all the work for them then. 21 22 Then for some reason if that person can't 23 actually use their tickets, they get a privilege where they can get their tickets refunded after the concert. 24 25 So, for instance, if your friend's dog dies and

1 they can't use their expensive tickets and the concert already happened, they get a refund for it. 2 3 So I am really, really confused where if you guys can set up that very complicated mechanism, you can't make 4 5 a Board committee meeting public. Let me give you another example of what really 6 7 adds to this. Another example of why I'm confused about this. 8 9 So last year -- when Earth, Wind & Fire were 10 playing -- Barbara Bagneris wanted to have her church to 11 have a private party. So rather than calling up Tandem 12 and arranging for a private party and buying group 13 tickets, she had Kathy Kramer and Summer Angus and some of 14 the other staff do the work to arrange a private party for her church group. 15 16 So I'm kind of looking at all this stuff going, 17 "You know, I just don't get it." We just need something 18 really super simple to happen. And that's to move these 19 committee meetings to the evening. It's not happening. You know, we need to conduct the public's 20 business in public, rather than behind closed doors and at 21 22 9:00 in the morning. Okay. 23 We need to move the committee meetings so they're open to the public and the public can attend so they're 24 25 agendized with meeting minutes and notes.

1 Thank you. CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. 2 3 I will now call on Adam Carleton followed by 4 Carolyn Beaver. MR. CARLETON: Thank you, Board. My name is Adam Carleton. I'm your Vice President of Finance. 6 And I've spent a lot of time discussing the 2016 Audit. In fact, it's been some four or five months. 8 9 today, the Fair has actually published a full copy of the 2016 Audit. 10 11 I did send an email to the Audit Committee and I 12 sent them the one that my lawyer got from the CDFA -- some 13 40 pages. It contains the preliminary and the final. 14 There's been a lot of discussion about why did it take so long. And we saw in CEOs own words that she had a 15 16 nine-month hold where she doesn't explain what happened; I 17 do know what happened. 18 I have some emails and -- but that's kind of a 19 legal issue. But we do have an email from the auditor from April 10th, 2018, and he's discussing the 2016 Audit 20 and the upcoming 2017 Audit. Right now, we're doing the 21 22 2018 audit. 23 He hadn't gotten a response from the CEO. And the version I sent to the Audit Committee clearly says 24 25 within 30 days, you're supposed to send us a response and

1 you're supposed to tell us the how and the why that you're going to do something about it. 2 3 We've never heard that. We never heard from 4 them. We never heard from CDFA. We've never heard from CalHR. And that's what I wanted. When we got this audit, it was so messed up and conflicted, I said, "We need a 6 7 legal opinion about this." So he writes to us. He says, "My management is 8 9 asking about the timing on the response to the 2016 10 Preliminary Audit. Would it be possible to get a response 11 this week?" 12 Their concerned about starting a new audit with 13 the last one and the HR issue still outstanding. Okay. 14 And we know from that response, it was like a year later and a month later. Okay. So I'm not sure who's telling 15 16 what. 17 This is what I know to be true. This is what the 18 auditors told us; they wanted a response. They wanted a 19 response in writing. And when you go back a couple months and you look 20 at the staff report, you have a bunch of phone calls and 21 22 conversations and unintelligible stuff from the CEO saying 23 what and why she might have done something. But we know what she didn't do; she did not 24 25 respond properly to the Audit. And her and I had some Page 69

1 very frank conversation about why you need to do it. And what I think happened was she simply didn't 2 3 tell the Board. And when she got the two copies in the 4 mail, she didn't say she actually gave it to anyone. 5 It wasn't until I went to the Finance Committee and said, "Hey, I've got to book this stuff. And it's 6 7 weird. You need to look at this ought." Only then did she finally disclose that, "Oh, look." U.S. Mail sat at 8 9 her desk for a month. And so I've written to the Audit Committee about 10 11 that and then later we're going to be talking about a 12 contract for the Pacific Symphony. And we look at that 13 and look at the MOU, we'll look at the terms and 14 conditions. And I think the important thing was that contract was written as a max-value, zero-dollar contract. 15 16 No one had an expectation of getting a penny off 17 of it, and that makes it odd. 18 Thank you. CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Carolyn Beaver followed by 19 20 Ana V. Thank you. I'm Carolyn Beaver. 21 MS. BEAVER: 22 morning. And I would also like to thank the Board members 23 for all the work that you do. One of the things that I think is particularly a 24 25 good step that you're taking is to engage a consultant for Page 70

assistance in reviewing the Board policies. And I think that's an excellent effort and I'm very glad to see that you're doing that.

One thing that I would like the Board to consider in addition to policies -- policies. It's great to update them but there will always be something that comes up that's not actually covered by a policy. Because, of course, you can't think of everything or you have so many policies someone may forget to look at a policy.

So the other thing that's really important for the Board to understand is the culture of the organization. Because ultimately, it's the culture that drives employees' decisions on a day-to-day basis.

So do you have a culture of transparency? And what can you, as a Board, do to promote that culture of transparency. So you need to think about that. Because you're not managing on a day-to-day basis, of course. And so it's really to your CEO who drives the culture, but you need to understand what the culture is. And you do set a tone at the top in terms of culture.

One of the things that you could do to promote transparency is, for example, to have meetings that have notice and are public meetings even when you're not legally required to. I know you're not required to because you only have two directors for the committees.

1	But to create a culture of transparency, you
2	could have those as public meetings. So I just encourage
3	you to think about culture because that is very important
4	and will help drive employee behavior.
5	Thank you.
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
7	Ana V, followed by well, okay. Ana, you got
8	two speaker cards.
9	MS. VRSKA: I I think I have five.
10	CHAIR RUIZ: Oh, you do have five. Yes.
11	MS. VRSKA: But I don't anticipate I will take 15
12	minutes. I hope to wrap it up in three. I'll see how it
13	goes.
14	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Thank you.
15	MS. VRSKA: Okay.
16	So the first one I'd like to address is the
17	Financial Monitoring Committee.
18	Well, step back. I do believe that it is very
19	I couldn't agree more with the previous speaker about the
20	culture of organization and culture of transparency,
21	building trust, building good processes, and keeping to
22	them.
23	So that needs to be and having the meetings be
24	public and the business of the public being done in public
25	would would help a lot and help move things along.

So in terms of the -- the -- also, looking at patterns is important, I think, too. So the Fairgrounds has a long history and I'm not sure if this is ever been really an issue before about audits and about needing these policies and procedures and updating everything. I think that does speak to the culture of organization and secrecy and some of these things that have been going on the last few years.

One of the concerns I have is that things are being addressed in terms of writing letters to the auditors, in terms of researching policy, and maybe putting new policies.

But what's not being really addressed at all -
I've heard no one touch it with a three-foot pole -- is

the issue of responsibility.

So if you have an audit that is unfavorable to Kathy Kramer and then you sit on that audit for, you know, even a month, even a week, is questionable. But all this time then, it's like a -- it kind of makes sense. There's a story. It's not like it was innocent and there was nothing bad in the audit and it was some kind of, you know, just put it in the drawer and forgot about it.

There was actually something that was bad and needed examining. So there is motive to not want it to be public.

1 So the issue of responsibility and accountability has to be front and center and everything else that 2 follows, that's good, too, but you can't have enough 3 4 policies that are going to address every possibility of what someone could do or how someone could find a loop 6 hope or someone get around it. You have to work on the culture first. Okay. So that's on that. 8 9 In terms of the Financial Monitoring, I believe 10 contracts need to be looked at closer in addition to just 11 the financials. 12 I think a lot of stuff is slipping through the 13 Either contracts are not being enforced or the cracks. 14 organizations aren't doing -- they're not being held to their contracts leaving open issues of liability. 15 16 So maybe part of the Financial Monitoring 17 Committee needs to have the work of maybe picking and 18 choosing certain contracts and making sure all of the 19 things are actually being done how they're supposed to. I agree with Board member Aitken about the 20 Master Plan site in building and maintenance. That makes 21 22 a lot of sense and thank you for that. For doing the work 23 first and then allowing that work to guide us about the Master Plan site. 24 25 And I think that's pretty much it. But just, Page 74

1	again, front and center about responsibility and
2	accountability of the actions that happened because
3	something has gone very array and that has to be addressed
4	in addition to everything else.
5	Thank you.
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
7	Okay. We will now move onto Item 9B and I will
8	turn that over to VP of Operations, Ken Karns.
9	DIRECTOR MEYER: Before we move on, can I supplement
10	what we said in our Audit Committee report, Josh?
11	(Unintelligible)
12	One other thing I wanted to share that I think is
13	instructive and I found to be instructive when we spoke
14	with the auditor is that we learned that the process of
15	CDFA audits of State agencies is in some ways similar to
16	audits that are conducted by accounting firms companies
17	or non-profit corporations.
18	In some respects, they're quite difference. And
19	the difference that I thought may be highlighted that I
20	though was quite important is that he characterized to us
21	the fact that receiving findings in a management letter in
22	the course of reviewing a State agency audit is very
23	regular.
24	In fact, he said he couldn't identify a recent
25	fair audit that he's conducted that didn't result in
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1	findings. And I thought that was interesting because I
2	have a lot experience serving on non-profit and advising
3	non-profit committees.
4	And in that world having findings of significant
5	deficiencies or material weaknesses is something that you
6	would find very alarming. You generally want to come out
7	with a clean audit.
8	But I did just want to add that point of
9	clarification so that people have a little bit of context
10	that we received directly from the Audit Office regarding,
11	kind of, what their due course is, and the fact that
12	findings may be included in a management letter is part of
13	improving our process, making sure that we're calibrating
14	our policies and our oversight appropriately.
15	But that we shouldn't take the fact of the
16	findings in and of itself to suggest that there is a cause
17	to believe there's a culture of corruption or something
18	like that.
19	So I just, kind of, wanted to throw that out so
20	that so people have context for how the Audit Office views
21	the findings that they've been sharing with us.
22	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Thank you for that report.
23	Okay. I will now turn it over to VP of
24	Operations. Ken?
25	MR. KARNS: Item 9B is an action action
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1	item related to reviewing and approving the facilities
2	infrastructure scope of work.
3	So review the draft grounds facilities
4	infrastructure audit RFP, provide input and direction to
5	the staff.
6	As a matter of background, staff was directed by
7	the Board of Directors through the annual budget process
8	to move forward with the Grounds and Facilities
9	Infrastructure Audit.
LO	In January 2019, staff reached out to California
11	Construction Authority to start drafting a Letter of
12	Understanding for the services of CCA to assist with the
13	development of the Grounds and Facilities Infrastructure
L4	Audit RFP.
15	Drafts of the LOU were received and amended by
16	staff and the Building and Maintenance Committee at the
L7	time Chair Ruiz and Director La Belle.
18	In March, the LOU is completed and signed. In
L9	April, the new members of the Building Maintenance
20	Committee Director Aitken and Director
21	Rubalcava-Garcia were given a status update on the
22	project to-date. Staff and the committee have reviewed
23	the Draft Grounds and Facilities Infrastructure RFP.
24	So staff is now continuing the process of
25	developing the RFP, and once approved by the Board of
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1 Directors, the RFP will be released for bid by CCA. So I'm happy to take any questions, take any 2 3 comments, add, subtract, get the feedback, so we can 4 continue moving forward. CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Is there any question or comments? DIRECTOR AITKEN: I had a couple of questions. 6 So on the cover page, when we're talking about submittals must be received, I'm assuming we're changing 8 9 that date? 10 MR. KARNS: Oh, yeah. All the dates are. Those are 11 just placeholders. 12 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Okay. 13 And then do you have an idea or is it going to be 14 up to the person that responds about how long they think this project will take to do a property-wide assessment? 15 MR. KARNS: Yeah. I think once we drive the final 16 17 scope of work, one of the first things with the successful 18 proponent or proponents team will be what is that 19 schedule. It's quite significant, so I imagine it will 20 take some time. DIRECTOR AITKEN: Do we have an idea? I mean, I know 21 22 I'm not going to hold you to it. I promise. But just 23 ballpark, is this going to be something that's two full 24 weeks full time? Is this something that's a month? 25 MR. KARNS: I -- I -- I think several, several months. Page 78

1 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Several months to go through. Because my concern is, you know, there's nothing 2 3 we can do about it, but we are going to be -- if we can 4 get something to start June 7th, we're going to be running into -- when are the majority of the trucks on property for the Fair? 6 MR. KARNS: So there will be an impact on what can be done. But it's also a positive to see when it is added --8 9 the facility is maximized, the -- what it does to the 10 utilities and what it does to the infrastructure. 11 So there is information to be gained during the 12 Fair. 13 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Okay. So it won't be an added --14 will it be, I should say, will it be an added cost given the scope of work to have them start, let's say, in June, 15 16 where they have the property to themselves and then come 17 back and monitor -- what are we doing right? What are we 18 doing wrong? When we're at full capacity during the Fair 19 and then come back in August when it's all cleaned up 20 again. Is that going to affect the cost or it just the 21 22 scope of work is the scope of work and if it takes three 23 months it takes three months? MR. KARNS: The latter. 24 25 And whether it's Fair or any other week or Page 79

1 weekend, the grounds are relatively busy. So they never get to a blank. So there's always 2 3 something to work around. So that's to be considered and 4 I think we've got a schedule of events. DIRECTOR AITKEN: And once we get that scheduled, I would love to be updated on that. 6 MR. KARNS: Sure. DIRECTOR AITKEN: And then, are -- is there going to 9 be something built in where -- if there is an immediate 10 concern before the full and final report is done that we will get, maybe some small and interim updates on their 11 12 preliminary findings, especially, obviously if there's 13 a -- something that's a concern? 14 MR. KARNS: Absolutely. So our internal staff -along with CCA -- if for some reason there was something 15 16 that we found to be an immediate health and safety, that 17 would be a red flag. 18 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Okav. 19 And I would love if it -- just if you could update us as this process goes forward. So in June if you 20 could continually update the two of us so that we're aware 21 22 of any preliminary findings, and, obviously, the schedule 23 and then progress as it's going. 24 MR. KARNS: Absolutely. 25 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Thank you.

1 No further questions. CHAIR RUIZ: Any other questions or comments before I 2 3 call up the speakers on this item? Director La Belle? DIRECTOR LA BELLE: 4 Yes. As the former member of the Building and Facilities Committee, this issue initially initially came 6 7 up almost a year ago now, in terms of the Equestrian Center, and then we expended it to include the 8 9 entire site. 10 So some of my city manager frustration of doing 11 things yesterday rather than tomorrow is here. Couple of the things -- and I mentioned this before -- first of all, 12 13 it's not unusual for a large property owner to do this 14 kind of study, and it could be done fairly quickly. There are a number of utilities out there that 15 16 have a vested interest in what we do. We need to make 17 sure that they're clearly in the loop --18 southern California Edison, The Gas Company, Mesa Water, 19 City of Costa Mesa -- all of these entities have a vested interested in making sure what we do is done right. 20 There's still a couple of historic buildings on 21 22 site -- Baja Blues being one. It's been there since the 23 beginning of time. There's one other that escapes me at the moment. 24 25 We obviously need to make sure that when they do Page 81

1	the Building Assessment, that it is clearly addressing all
2	of the health and safety issues. But we don't want to
3	overwork some of this stuff. It's really not rocket
4	science, you know, for a construction management firm to
5	come in, assess a facility, and give you a range of what
6	the issues are.
7	So I just thank for those comments and hopefully
8	we can accelerate the process, rather than hold it back.
9	Because the Master Site Plan is waiting and waiting. And
10	that's the right decision. There isn't much that can be
11	done until we know exactly what does components are.
12	So those are my comments.
13	CHAIR RUIZ: Great.
14	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Chair, if I could just respond.
15	CHAIR RUIZ: Sure.
16	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I wholeheartedly agree with you
17	about, you know, keeping and breathing down the back of
18	necks when we finally award the contract.
19	And it is in our scope of work that we are going
20	to be engaging and hopefully having representatives from
21	the representative utilities to be on the process to be
22	on the property and to be working hand-in-hand with our
23	with our designated awardee.
24	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
25	If there's no more comments or questions from the
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1	Board, I will now go to the public speakers.
2	First speaker is Reggies Mundekis followed by
3	Jay Humphrey.
4	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis. I'm
5	addressing Item 9B, the Infrastructure Analysis.
6	So we're finally beginning this process which is
7	good. It's taken a while to get here but every journey
8	starts with one step. Okay.
9	So a couple of typo type things. In the
10	document, the words "contractor" and "consultant" get
11	get you switch between the two. So you need to
12	proofread it and figure out which one you're going to use
13	and be consistent. Just to make everybody's life a little
14	bit easier.
15	Also, on the list of buildings on the property,
16	there there's some like, for instance, it lists
17	The Hangar building as not completed. So that needs to be
18	updated. The ASTM is a good standard to start with.
19	That standard is written for evaluating
20	commercial property, meaning office buildings, apartment
21	buildings, shopping centers, warehouses. So that standard
22	and the ASTM is very clear in what that standard applies
23	and does not apply to.
24	Question is: How are we going to evaluate the
25	historic buildings Baja Blues? And I think it's
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1 building 15, that building where they put the flowers in 2. over by Heroes Hall during the Fair. And, also, how are 3 we going to evaluate the Equestrian Center? Because none of those buildings is really appropriate to use the ASTM 4 standard on. So maybe, for instance, historic buildings are 6 7 evaluated by a historic consultant and the Equestrian Center's evaluated by somebody in the agriculture or 8 9 equestrian business as far as what has to be done. 10 We also -- there's also -- under the building, 11 utility, and operational systems -- we want to add lighting to the systems to be evaluated. That would be 12 13 both internal lighting and external lighting in the 14 parking lots in particular. 15 We currently use a number of generator-powered 16 light stands in the parking lots for additional lighting, 17 and we'd like to get away from those. And we also want to make sure even that even 18 19 though it says communications, we want to make sure that 2.0 information technology is included in communications. 21 Because right now, for example, the Equestrian Center --22 you can't get reliable Internet access down there. 23 In the Appendix A about the Orange County Fair & 24 Event Center, there's no mention of the Equestrian Center 25 in here at all. So anybody bidding on this project

1 doesn't know that there's an Equestrian Center here aside from a few mentions in the table. 2 3 You know, if you can to carve out the 4 Equestrian Center and do a separate evaluation, that is going to need some discussion, but you need to put in a paragraph about the Equestrian Center the same way you did 6 the Pac Amp and the other issues. So I look forward to this process moving forward 8 9 and to seeing what the final RFP is. 10 So thank you. 11 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. 12 Jay Humphrey followed by Ana V. 13 MR. HUMPHREY: Good morning, Board. Jay Humphrey, 14 Costa Mesa Resident. My concern on this RFP is not that it's a good 15 16 thing; it is a good thing. The more we evaluate what we 17 have and how we do it and how we keep it healthy, the 18 better off we're probably all going to be in the long run; 19 however, in this, a large portion of this establishment is not called out in this RFP. 20 And it is infrastructure. We call -- we use the 21 22 word "grounds" to, kind of, encompass the whole place, so 23 yeah, that's included. Well, then why did you list all the buildings? The reason is is because as a cost 24 25 analysis, you also need to evaluate the entire parking

lot.

Because if I missed something in the last report last budget, we talked about a lot of money being spent on that infrastructure that is not listed anywhere in this RFP.

It's listed as grounds, of course. But grounds don't necessarily cover things like parking lot structure. Let's face it, the more it's used, the more damage happens to it, the more need for repair it has.

The most common overburden is the parking lot.

So I would -- I would request that you add the parking lot as part of the commentary. Even though it's going to be covered, to make sure it's called out because it's a major expense for this organization.

Another thing I'd like to say is thank you very much for the hearing support. I do appreciate it. This is an excellent system. It gives me very good hearing.

Again, the mics, when they're pointed away from you or far away from you, don't necessarily pick up. But this is a much better system than what has been in the past, so I thank you for that.

And lastly, I echo the need for morning -evening meetings for access to the ad hoc committees and
what have you. The public really reserves the right to be
heard and speak.

1	And I know a lot of people that would love to
2	come here. They think they're good neighbors. They would
3	like to be good neighbors. They'd like to share with the
4	public, with the Fairgrounds the things that they find
5	important relative to the Fairgrounds, but they are able
6	to do so in a meaningful, verbal, eyeball-to-eyeball
7	contact with the Fair because they can't get off from
8	work.
9	So I would really recommend that you find a way
LO	to have meetings in the evening that address the public,
11	and secondarily, that you give us access to the ad hoc
12	committees. It's nothing more than just by notifying
13	those people that are interested to come to those. That
L 4	"Oh, we're doing an ad hoc committee tomorrow or next
15	week," or what have you. Those folks could make their
16	schedule up.
L7	Thank you very much. I do appreciate your time.
18	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
19	Okay. Ana V, followed
20	MS. VRSKA: I waive my time. Thank you.
21	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Thank you. I will call on Anne P.
22	Anne, I can't read your last name. I apologize.
23	MS. ANNE P.: So I'd just like to echo what
24	Mr. Humphrey just said because I'm also hard-of-hearing.
25	Anyway, but I appreciate it when people take the time to
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1 help out people here. I just like to say that I'm a big fan of fairs. 2 3 I grew up near the Minnesota State Fair and we go 4 everyday. So when I moved to Costa Mesa, I ended up at this fair as much as I can. The Minnesota State Fair which was rated by the 6 7 New York Times as the best State fair in the country, followed by Texas State Fair. 8 9 One of the things they do is they save the 10 historic buildings. Like, in Minnesota, they saved the old merry-go-round, they saved the Tunnel of Love. 11 12 At Texas, they have certain things they saved. 13 And, you know, a lot of people come to the Orange County 14 Fair and there's certain things they make a bee line for -- even when they're growing up, even when their 15 16 grandmothers and grandfathers -- they make a bee line for 17 things that they have made memories with their families. 18 And I think sometimes just building new everything is not the answer. I think, sometimes, some of 19 the older buildings should be cared for and restored. 20 thrilled that they saved Heroes Hall and every year it 21 22 seems like there's less and less animals. 23 I mean, I don't know what happened to the Budweiser horses, but, you know, there's things that 24 25 people came here for and they're disappearing and I'd wish

1	you think about that when you do your infrastructure
2	improvements.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
4	Now, I will call on Carolyn Beaver.
5	MS. BEAVER: Thank you. I'm Carolyn Beaver.
6	And I'll make this fairly short, but I did also
7	want to just mention the fact that, as Reggie said, that
8	the Equestrian Center is not mentioned in Appendix A, and
9	it would be great if that could be included as part of
10	management standard description of the business of the
11	Fairgrounds.
12	Because you mentioned Imaginology which takes
13	place over a three-day weekend, and yet the Equestrian
14	Center operates 365 days a year.
15	And so it definitely needs to be included in this
16	contract and it should be included in all similar
17	descriptions. You should always describe that.
18	In terms of qualifications for the consultant, it
19	would be great to have someone have who has experience
20	dealing with Equestrian Centers as part of the team. We
21	want to make sure that we don't end up recommendations for
22	things like heated stalls that we had discussed
23	previously.
24	And for the new Directors, that was one of the
25	consultants that was used and made a recommendation that
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1 we have heated stalls which, of course, we don't need in 2 California. 3 So we want to make sure that we have the 4 appropriate experience in evaluating the 5 Equestrian Center. 6 Thank you so much. CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great. Thank you. Okay. I will now turn it back to the Board for a 8 9 motion to approve the RFP. 10 DIRECTOR MEYER: I have a comment. 11 I thought we got great feedback on this from 12 members of the public just now, and I would think it would 13 be appropriate to modify Appendix A and have a description 14 of the Equestrian Center. I think it would be great to talk about the 15 16 parking. I think we all agree that that's a major issue. 17 So I thought that was a very, very good point. 18 And also with regard to the historic buildings, 19 I think both -- including not only in the Appendix A description of the OC Fair & Event Center, and I think 20 point is well taken with regard to the Equestrian Center. 21 22 I should go in there -- but on the qualification 23 requirements for the bidders that they have experienced -and maybe this is desired and not required. I don't know. 24 25 At a minimum, we should be considering whether people have

1	experience with equestrian. I see agriculture.
2	MR. KARNS: Yeah. It's all tied.
3	DIRECTOR MEYER: Right. I think maybe even exposed to
4	at least mentioning equestrian, mentioning parking,
5	mentioning historic buildings those are excellent
6	things to find out if people have specific expertise in.
7	So if we could make those modifications.
8	CHAIR RUIZ: Absolutely.
9	So are you willing to make a motion to approve it
10	with those modifications?
11	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
12	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Second.
13	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion and a second.
14	Roll call vote.
15	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
16	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
17	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
18	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
19	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
20	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
21	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
22	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
23	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
24	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
25	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
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1	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
2	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
3	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
4	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
5	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
7	Now we move onto the next item, 9C.
8	I'd like to ask if everyone is willing to take a
9	10-minute break before we proceed?
10	(All agreed in the affirmative)
11	Motion and a second. Thank you. 10-minute
12	break.
13	(Break)
14	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. I'd to like call the meeting back
15	to order.
16	Okay. We now move onto Item 9C, Review and
17	Approve Gate Security Invitation Scope of Work.
18	I will turn that over to VP of Operations, Ken
19	Karns.
20	MR. KARNS: Thank you. Again, an action item to
21	review the draft annual fair gate security services IFB,
22	provide any input for direction to the staff to release
23	the IFB.
24	As a matter of background, the 2019 Budget
25	includes the use of outside contractors; however, we have

1	the full intention to bring as much of the operations
2	in-house as possible.
3	At this time, our Human Resources team indicates
4	that due to the low unemployment rate in our area,
5	recruiting will be an even greater challenge this year
6	than last year. Orange County unemployment rate as of
7	December 2018 was 2.8 percent.
8	Pacific Amphitheater gate operations which
9	include our pre-imposed fair concerts will be brought
10	in-house. Even with the hiring challenges, we believe we
11	can strategically manage schedules to fill all these
12	requirements; however, an IFB for our annual fair gates
13	security services was provided to the Safety and Security
14	Committee Chair Ruiz and Vice Chair Cervantes for
15	review and input.
16	If approved, staff will release the IFB on
17	Wednesday, May 1st, 2019.
18	Happy to take any questions.
19	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
20	Any comments or questions from the Board?
21	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: A couple.
22	CHAIR RUIZ: Director La Belle?
23	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes. I think it was on the cover
24	of the RFP. It said, "low cost." Is that something we
25	have to put on there?

1 (Public laughs) I mean, you know, you're looking for gate 2 3 security and then "low cost." 4 MR. KARNS: Again, at the approval of the Board, I'll have to -- with regards to our purchase and contracting policy, I will have to check that but I think it's 6 standard. I would rather not be handcuffed in many ways but I think we've been tied to that. 8 9 I'd have to check. 10 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: It's just a minor item. The other question is when we discussed a little 11 12 early in the year, I think the intent was that at some 13 point in time we would evaluate whether we wanted to try 14 to get back to providing all the service in-house. I understand the employment issues in that. 15 16 would like at some point in time, probably in conjunction 17 with the budget in November -- December of this year, I'd 18 like to suggest to the Board that we have a discussion 19 relative to in-house versus consulting service. And, I guess, my other question is: Is this the 20 kind of service that Orange County Sheriff could bid on? 21 22 Costa Mesa PD? Highway Patrol? Whatever, whatever. MR. KARNS: 23 Law enforcement does not provide security services. And those rates are astronomical if we looked 24 at the law enforcement. 25

1	Back here, the questions is related to low bid.
2	They also have to qualify. I'm sure it has to be a firm
3	that can do the job. So it has to be the lowest qualified
4	bid.
5	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Okay.
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Director Bagneris?
7	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: No. It was
8	CHAIR RUIZ: Oh.
9	DIRECTOR MEYER: I had just a couple questions.
10	CHAIR RUIZ: Director Meyer?
11	DIRECTOR MEYER: In general, on the services that we
12	hire through this, what's the do we specify the level
13	of license or certification that the security guards have
14	to have? You know, like a post-certification or
15	MR. KARNS: Yes, we do.
16	And I'm sure Nick is behind me. He can speak
17	more eloquently to security services licensing.
18	We went through and licensed our own staff
19	internally about what they have to hold in California.
20	That is a requirement.
21	Nick, you want to help me out here and and off
22	the top off your head what that requirement is?
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Nick, could you step up to the mic,
24	please.
25	MR. NICK: Absolutely.

1	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
2	MR. NICK: Welcome. Thank you, guys.
3	For proprietary security services like us, an
4	in-house team, there's a whole different set of
5	regulations.
6	But for a non-government agency private security
7	services which most of them are, they're regulated by
8	what's called BSIS the California Bureau of Security
9	and Investigative Services and they regulate all what's
10	called a Private Patrol Operator which is your staff pro,
11	CSC.
12	Those people are required to maintain a certain
13	amount of insurance training requirements each year.
14	Each guard has what's called a BSIS guard card which means
15	they received the basic amount of training and they
16	continue. I think it's 16 hours a year with continuing
17	education.
18	So there is a whole system in place for licensing
19	through State government for these companies that can bid
20	for us.
21	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
22	MR. KARNS: Thanks.
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Any more comments or questions from the
24	Board? Director Aitken?
25	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Do we have I know we for our
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1	part-time and full-time fair employees, we do inclusivity
2	and sensitivity training given the very people and
3	family that come to our fairs.
4	Is this something that the program that they're
5	going to go through as well or do they we'll we require
6	them to privately do some type of training to make sure
7	that they realize that this is a fair open and welcoming
8	to all people?
9	MR. KARNS: We have written in to this IFB,
10	additionally.
11	It wasn't in last year's a clause about customer
12	service and the ability to deliver customer service at a
13	higher rate, and then we do have our supervisors
14	monitoring that.
15	CHAIR RUIZ: Great.
16	Yeah. You know, I had a chance to review that
17	and, you know, the language was very strong responsible
18	good language and it qualifies as that, so I have no
19	doubt. Hopefully, I know that that we'll get probably the
20	best security company out there, so thanks for that.
21	Okay. Before we go back to the Board, I want to
22	take some public speakers on this item.
23	And I'm going to call Reggie Mundekis followed by
24	Ana V.
25	DIRECTOR MEYER: Real quick before we start
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1	CHAIR RUIZ: Sure.
2	DIRECTOR MEYER: Can you remind us again what the
3	difference between the RFP and Invitation for Bid is?
4	MR. KARNS: There we go. Kelly can give you all the
5	technical terms.
6	But IFB is very we need this, you deliver this
7	for that price cut and dry. So it's a much simpler
8	process than IFB versus RFP. And you have all the scoring
9	and the scoring criteria that has to go in. So this is
10	just a simple, clean scope of work: There's a price. If
11	you qualify, you get the job done.
12	Whereas an RFP, it's as the, you know, all the
13	scoring criteria. What's the word I'm looking? It's a
14	little more complicated, but's is subjective as well.
15	CHAIR RUIZ: I'm going to direct this to the speaker.
16	She does have the mic.
17	MS. MUNDEKIS: I can wait.
18	CHAIR RUIZ: I was going to ask, do you mind having
19	her give an explanation before you?
20	MR. KARNS: You need any further explanation?
21	CHAIR RUIZ: If the Board needs any further
22	explanation.
23	DIRECTOR MEYER: That's enough for me, unless Kelly,
24	you want to expand on it.
25	MS. VU: [INAUDIBLE].

1	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. You know what. Do you want to
2	step up to the mic so I can recognize you. Thank you.
3	DIRECTOR MEYER: Sorry, Reggie.
4	MS. MUNDEKIS: No. That's fine. Go right ahead.
5	MS. VU: Good morning.
6	Like Ken said, IFB stands for Invitation for Bid
7	and RFP is Request for Proposal.
8	And the difference are Request for Proposal is
9	for consultation, and IFB is for something routine; this
10	is what we want and how much.
11	RFP is, like, this is what we want. Tell how how
12	we do it and how much.
13	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And that's why it says low cost?
14	MS. VU: Correct.
15	DIRECTOR MEYER: Thank you.
16	CHAIR RUIZ: Any more questions or comments from the
17	Board?
18	(No response)
19	Thank you. Okay. Reggie, step up to the mic
20	now. Thank you.
21	MS. MUNDEKIS: Yeah. Of course.
22	Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis. I'm discussing the
23	Security Invitation for Bid Scope of Work.
24	First of all, you have a choice about how how you
25	want to bid this out. You do not have to do an IFB which

1 is the low-cost bidder. And, actually, having an IFB on a service product such as this where there's customer 2 3 service involved is unusual. 4 IFB is more commonly used for commodity items 5 like, for instance, if you're buying, like, three acres of 6 landscape sod and having it installed or for, you know, commodity items. It's unusual for services to be done this way. 8 9 And I can send you the sections of the State Contracting 10 Manual that explain the different bidding procedures that 11 you can use. 12 It makes me really uncomfortable on this that 13 we're doing the cheapest company possible for gate 14 security. I think we can do better than that. And I think the best way to do this is to do it in-house. 15 What is concerning is that there's no 16 17 cost-benefit analysis on this. Is that there's just been 18 this decision of we're just going to push this outside and 19 we're not going to do a cost-benefit analysis. Usually, when you do outsourcing for governmental contracts, you do 20 a cost-benefit analysis. 21 22 Those gate security jobs are important 23 entry-level positions for people who want to enter the 24 State employment system. 25 And remember, we're all about getting people to Page 100

1 better themselves and to get into the same employment system if they choose to and we're wiping out that 2 3 opportunity. 4 The other issue that you may not know is that 5 because we're in an agricultural district, we don't pay our employees overtime. So during the fair, when you need 6 7 a lot of people working a lot of hours, you could make people work overtime without having to pay them an 8 9 overtime break. So they just work 60 hours of straight 10 time. All these contractors will get overtime which is 11 something our employees don't get. 12 So I'm going to ask you to not put this as an 13 Because that makes people uncomfortable to do an IFB. 14 IFB. And I'll send you the State Contracting Manual sections that explain your choices for bidding. You have 15 a choice in this matter and the IFB is the worst choice 16 possible. 17 18 Thank you. 19 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. I will now call on the next speaker, Ana V, 20 21 followed by Anne. 22 MS. VRSKA: I just want to echo the previous speaker's 23 sentiments. I won't repeat the same things, but I will reiterate about -- there are things where 24 25 cost-effectiveness makes sense and there are things where Page 101

1 it is worth it to spend the extra money. 2 Interfacing with people as they come into the Fairgrounds and gate security, that's -- that's really 3 4 important that it be very high quality. And, yes, just 5 high quality. And I also encourage you to good by the RFP process and to make sure we are doing this correctly. 6 Thank you. CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Anne? 9 MS. ANNE: So I agree with the last speaker totally 10 and here is why. 11 The last couple of years when you come to the 12 Fair -- I'm over here a lot -- there was an attitude at 13 the gate, like, we were annoying the people as we were 14 coming to the fair. I'm sure you got complaints about it. 15 I actually complained to the Human Resources Department 16 about it. 17 But here is my favorite thing: I have a friend 18 whose son has a guard card. He is working as a security 19 quard. He's a total drug addict. He's been in one of the hospitals here -- I'm not going to mention names -- for 20 72-hour hole. But he has his guard card and he's working. 21 22 And I want to know if this company is doing a 23 Live Scan on every single person they hire, and I'll bet 24 you they're not. 25 And here is what happened last year: Page 102

1 different times I was over here -- two of them were at night; I saw quards smoking pot. I don't know if they 2 were on their break. I don't know if they were done, but 3 4 that means they're going to get into a car and drive. 5 They were smoking pot on the Fairgrounds. And it wasn't just because I smelled it; I saw it. So I really 6 7 think -- and I have two people that were with me that saw the same exact thing. 8 9 So if you're thinking about hiring the same 10 company you had last year, I strongly recommend you pay a 11 little more money -- find a different company. 12 And I don't understand why all these years we 13 hired local people to be at the gate. They did a great 14 job. I know times have changed and there's national 15 16 security issues, but I'd rather have some local college 17 kids that we know from the community that we're pretty 18 sure of their background. I'd rather have them be 19 security guards than have people we don't know who don't even live in Orange County. 20 You're saying 2.8 percent unemployment. I am 21 22 telling you there are young people in our county looking 23 for jobs, and this is a perfect summer job for college students and people just graduating from college, and I 24 25 think you're making a huge mistake again. Okay.

1	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
2	Okay. Since there are no more public speakers, I
3	will turn it back to the Board for any questions or
4	comments.
5	(No response)
6	Being none, can I entertain a motion to approve
7	the IFB?
8	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: One more time, could somebody
9	explain to me the two alternatives, and what would be the
10	downside of going with the RFP as an alternative to what's
11	being proposed.
12	CHAIR RUIZ: Ken, you want to explain that or do we
13	need help?
14	MR. KARNS: I'll try my best.
15	A couple of things: Timing. We don't want to
16	compromise security at all, so let's be clear on that. We
17	would have to go back and look to see if the RFP process
18	will meet our timelines.
19	And if they do and that becomes positive I
20	mean, the same contractor's bidding. It would just take
21	longer and be different scoring which may give us the
22	opportunity to pick company B over company A.
23	So we can definitely analyze that, but it would
24	be the same company bidding.
25	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: So you go through a rating process
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1	whereby you get "X" number of points for "X" number of
2	area?
3	MR. KARNS: And I don't know what that looks like, so
4	we have to create that.
5	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: And what's the downside again to
6	what is being proposed? Can I ask the speaker that
7	question?
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I think they're proposing
9	to bring it in-house.
10	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Well, no. I think I think she
11	was Reggie was suggesting an alternative.
12	MS. MUNDEKIS: Yeah. You can always do an RFP.
13	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Do an RFP versus the one that's
14	being proposed.
15	MS. MUNDEKIS: You can always do an RFP.
16	MS. RICHARDS: I think to reiterate what Kelly Vu
17	said our Purchasing and Contract Supervisor is that
18	an RFP is used for consulting or contracting services
19	where we're asking potential bidders to provide a proposal
20	for how they would manage a project or how they would, you
21	know, provide a services.
22	And IFB is used when we're we tell the bidders
23	this is exactly what we need, this is what we require;
24	please provide us with your quote for that.
25	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: So is the lowest bid the
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1	required for us to accept with the process as it currently
2	is being presented? If we don't go with an RFP.
3	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
4	MS. RICHARDS: It's always our responsibility to
5	choose the lowest qualified bidder.
6	So if the bidder does not meet the minimum
7	requirements that are outlined in in the IFB, then they
8	are we disqualify their bid.
9	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And are they blind bids or
10	are they public bids where they can actually see the
11	amount the other bidders are proposing?
12	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. They can always buy public
13	records requests obtain those materials. Once they
14	once the
15	MR. KARNS: Our bids are public.
16	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. All right. Okay.
17	So we can move the meeting along a little faster,
18	one more speaker. Go ahead, Director Mouet.
19	DIRECTOR MOUET: So I do believe that security is a
20	service, first of all.
21	And in city government world, this is a different
22	jargon, but it's a it's a the IFB is typically
23	called a spec a specification which is very you
24	specify and you legally have to go with the lowest bidder.
25	And I'm not sure about the rules here, but that
	Page 106

1 is something you got to sort of -- and then when you don't -- when you want to be able to assess quality of 2 3 services, you do an RFP. It depends on the level of the 4 work. You know, if it's at a certain threshold because 6 of your rules money-wise, you might be able to do an informal thing. But with security in my world, I usually bid --8 9 I'm city government -- I would talk to my police 10 department so that they could partner and give us their sense on how good the security company is because they're 11 12 going to need to communicate in events kind of a thing. 13 And so depending on the -- this probably is of a 14 large magnitude, and so you would have to do probably an RFP -- i don't know the rules -- because dollar amount is 15 16 what I'm referring to. 17 So best practices, in my opinion, just based on 18 my experiences that security is a service -- it's not a 19 specification of -- of they're, kind of, all the same so 20 give us a more lowest cost. At least in my experience, security companies are 21 22 not the same. There are some that you want to run away 23 from which is why it's important -- again, I'm city government -- to get the police department's input. They 24 25 kind of know the security rules.

1	That's just my two cents.
2	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: So, Gerardo, are you advocating
3	that we go with an RFP then?
4	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yeah.
5	I mean, I'm sensitive to what Ken is talking
6	about with regards to the timing. So by that, I mean I
7	think you want to make sure that you get the security
8	company coming in on board within enough time to do the
9	orientation and ready for the Fair.
10	So the the but for this type of thing, I
11	just think that you need to start early and you need to
12	make sure that you get the right service provider because
13	it's a very important service; it's a service. I don't
14	think of it as a specification for a large event like
15	that.
16	That's but I would say you should try to go to
17	the RFP and hustle because, I think, then it give us you
18	the ability to say, "Well, no. Not that firm and that
19	firm." You know.
20	So then you have to then specify the criteria of
21	it more and have your committee or your raters and all
22	that kind of thing. Realize that it takes time, but
23	that's my respond to it.
24	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Thank you.
25	One more? Is there any more?

1	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: I just wanted to say that I
2	agree 100 percent with Director Mouet.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Director La Belle?
4	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: I was just going to make a motion
5	that based on Director Mouet's comments that we move
6	forward with an RFP for the security services but provide
7	direction or the option to staff if they determine in the
8	next 48 hours whatever that they can't meet that
9	schedule, that they have the ability to go the other
10	route.
11	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: And I second.
12	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion and a second.
13	Roll call vote.
14	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
15	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
16	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
17	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
18	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
19	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
20	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
21	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
22	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
23	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
24	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
25	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.

1	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
2	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
3	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
4	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
5	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
6	Okay. Now we move onto the next item on the
7	Agenda which is Item 9B, Review and Approve the Memorandum
8	of Understanding between the Orange County Fair & Event
9	Center and the County of Orange for the Relocation of the
LO	A-4 Skyhawk Aircraft from the County Facility in Santa Ana
11	to the OC Fair & Event Center.
12	This time, I will turn it over to VP of
13	Operations, Ken Karns.
L 4	MR. KARNS: Thanks. So another action item.
15	At the discretion of the Board of Directors,
16	approve the Memorandum of Understanding between the 32nd
L7	DAA and the County of Orange for the A-4 Skyhawk
18	relocation.
19	As a matter of background, the Heroes Hall
20	Veterans Foundation Board Committee Vice Chair
21	Cervantes and Director La Belle, along with Josh Caplan
22	Deputy of the Attorney General and staff had worked
23	with representatives from the County of Orange and I
24	think he's still in the room. There he is. It was great
25	working with them on an MOU for the relocation.

1	The MOU was presented on Tuesday to the County
2	Board of Supervisors with unanimous approval.
3	So I'm happy to answer any questions. But,
4	again, at the Board's discretion, we are eager to have you
5	approve this MOU.
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Any questions or comments
7	before we approve?
8	(No response)
9	None. Is there a motion?
10	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: There's no public comment?
11	CHAIR RUIZ: My apologies.
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I'm just making sure.
13	CHAIR RUIZ: No. No, no.
14	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Very good.
15	Then I move.
16	CHAIR RUIZ: There was none.
17	Okay. There's a motion on the floor. Is there a
18	second?
19	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Second.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion and a second.
21	Roll call vote.
22	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
24	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
25	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
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1	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
3	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
4	(No response)
5	Director Aitken?
6	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
7	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
8	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
9	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
11	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Meyer?
12	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
13	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
14	Okay. Now we move onto the item which is Item
15	9E.
16	(Applause)
17	Review and Approve the Installation for the A-4
18	Skyhawk.
19	And I will turn this back over to VP of
20	Operations, Ken Karns.
21	MR. KARNS: Summer, can we put a slide, please.
22	Okay. So here we are. Since we have an MOU. I
23	thought we get to work on relocating the Skyhawk. And we
24	are another action item Review the Draft, A-4
25	Skyhawk Installation Layout and Provide Additions and
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Deletions to the Project of Scope Related to the Design.

As you know, we hired ATI. Direction was given to -- they're preliminary drawings. These are preliminary drawings -- in preparation for a committee review and full Board of Directors review and approval.

The Heroes Hall Veteran Foundation Board

Committee -- Vice Chair Cervantes and Director La Belle,

and staff -- reviewed the renderings provided by ATI.

The Committee and staff then met together to review the drawings and provide feedback. So we got feedback from both Sandra and Doug. Prior to fully completing the drawing specifications that will be used for the bid process, the Committee would like a consensus from the full Board of Directors on any additions or deletions to the scope of the project.

So a little bit of description: We really wanted to ensure that it fit and didn't look like a postage stamp put out there and that it wasn't part of an original design. So try to incorporate it into the existing architecture of Heroes Hall. So we're proposing taking the interlocking brick design and creating that pathway out to the A-4 Skyhawk -- two different shades of color -- to delineate a path that our -- if we could get the right dialogue in keeping with the existing interlocking break.

If not, have our architects recommendation a

1	complementary contrasting color. The final location
2	within several feet yet to be determined. As we go around
3	the Skayhawk, you'll see bump outs. We've already
4	modified those since our meeting. Those are locations
5	where we could introduce benching and planters.
6	I'll pass this around. Sorry. This was hot off
7	the press. So we can pass it around to the public as
8	well.
9	But to introduce benching and seating and
10	opportunity on that benching and seating to place
11	plaques. If required, we are looking at what we'll do as
12	it relates to fixing up the sod within that perimeter.
13	But we are looking to have price alternative number one to
14	see if on the east and west side well, around it if
15	it was to be artificial turf to clean that up.
16	But, again, looking at ensuring that we're
17	approved with the money. We are happy to add any
18	additional scope and do what the Board is requesting us to
19	do.
20	We want to make sure you're aware that if we are
21	adding scope, we would go back to the consultants. There
22	would likely be an amendment to their fee and then they
23	would likely be coming back to the Board for more budget
24	money. But we get one chance to do this.
25	So if it means a little more money at your
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1 discretion, happy to carry out whatever that scope of work But this design, I think, it was met with some 2 3 encouragement from the Committee. I'll pass it over to Doug and Sandra for any 4 5 other comment. But, yeah, I think we could make it fit. We are working around existing underground infrastructure. 6 7 What we didn't want to do is introduce cost of having to move a large water main or a major electrical service, so 8 9 we are in that area trying to work around. 10 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Questions or comments from the Board? 11 12 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: If I could just add a couple of 13 things. 14 Vice Chair Cervantes and I met with -- as Ken said -- with himself and staff and the architects. One 15 of the things that we clearly articulated to the team is 16 17 that we wanted this to be something that looked like we 18 always intended it to do it this way. This wasn't an 19 afterthought or anything else. The budget has currently approved between both 20 the District and the County. It's a little over 300,000, 21 22 and that includes everything in terms of construction 23 management and architectural services. One of the -- there's no quarantees that what is 24 25 being proposed could be done for that. Obviously, it's

1	going to be bid as a public works project. We feel
2	reasonably comfortable that we're in the range. We've had
3	both from and I want to compliment Saul and all of his
4	hard work for the County, and I definitely want to make
5	sure that we send a letter to his boss thanking him for
6	all his services.
7	I got a little but one of the things that we
8	wanted to make sure is is we feel reasonably
9	comfortable. We had a couple of preliminary cost
LO	estimates from our side and the County. We think we're
11	close again. After 43 years of doing this stuff, there's
12	never any guarantees.
13	The one thing that I'm a little I won't say
L4	troubled by but that I wanted to bring to the Board's
15	attention, on I guess.
16	Can you hear me up here?
L7	(No response)
18	(Director La Belle indicating on screen)
19	This area here is about 28 feet, and this area
20	between what's being done and the berm is probably 10
21	feet. The back of the area is where the business
22	development area starts.
23	I think it's very important that we do something
24	here and here, whether it be artificial turf get one of
25	the yoga goats to come in and chew down that stair way.

1 (Public laughs) I think we'll all agree that it's not the most 2 3 pleasant appearing area. Now that's not included within 4 the scope right now. I think we could probably do that force account wise after the project with artificial turf or whatever, but I do think it's important that we get 6 7 something in those two areas there to give it a finished look. 8 9 CHAIR RUIZ: Great. 10 Any more questions or comments from the Board? Go ahead, Director Aitken. 11 12 DIRECTOR AITKEN: One of the things I wanted to just 13 compliment, I really like the incorporation of seating to 14 any extent possible, giving some of the age of our veterans that are coming to the property. 15 16 And I always like to, you know, try to not miss 17 an educational opportunity. So was there any -- I noticed 18 that we have the four benches around there. Given the 19 kind of -- we've done everything in fives for the different branches of the military, is it something that 20 we could do small or maybe five around and have each one 21 22 dedicated to that branch of the military? 23

MR. KARNS: Sure. Great suggestion. Let me pass this around. Again, we're playing with drawing hot off the press.

24

25

We have -- after finding that planter, we have changed the orientation a bit of the style and size of those bump outs to be more in keeping with that planter box.

So I think based on the smaller design, incorporating the five -- and I'll pass this around -- we could absolutely. And I don't think that would significantly change the budget, so great suggestion.

DIRECTOR AITKEN: The other thing I wanted to ask about -- and I don't know how we would be able to do this -- but having been to my fair share of losing Angel games this year -- I think one of the really nice things that they've done -- and I know other areas have done it -- is they allow families that are interested to buy bricks.

And I thought -- I wanted to see if there was a way either as a fundraiser for Heroes Hall or to help some of our costs -- however you want to do it -- to offer something to families that are interested to be able to buy a brick to honor someone in their family or just to show appreciation and really personalize some of the bricking that we're putting -- is "bricking" a word -- that we are putting it around the Skyhawk to, kind of, allow families to pay tribute to some of the people in their families who served or just to generally leave a

1	message of support and consideration.
2	MR. KARNS: Sure. And that's something that I'll ask
3	my partner to help with beyond the construction.
4	Because we can whether we have one family or a
5	hundred families the work can be lifted and replaced as
6	it goes. So that could be an ongoing program, and I'm
7	sure we could tie into Heroes Hall and work through the
8	Foundation and create that.
9	DIRECTOR MEYER: That's a great idea.
LO	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I like that.
11	DIRECTOR AITKEN: On Angel games, my kids go right out
12	our brick, and they love to read. And it's, kind of, a
13	nice way to really personalize it for kids.
14	CHAIR RUIZ: Great ideas. Thank you.
15	Okay. Before we move on
16	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Just to add to that if I could.
L7	It's an excellent idea and it certainly has every
18	potential of happening.
L9	The Foundation has already determined that we
20	will pay for those existing plaques and that out there on
21	the current site. And the Foundation is going to pay for
22	creating something in terms of the Skyhawk.
23	So you know, we can incorporate that in and I
24	think it's an excellent idea.
25	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.

Before we move onto this item, I have one public speaker. And I'm going to call that speaker up which is Beth Refakes, Item 9B.

MS. REFAKES: Thank you for letting me speak on this.

I'm glad we're actually at this stage and able to move ahead of this. I like the idea -- as suggested -- to increase the little cutout for the seating because that's more compatible with most of the military representing the different branches of service. That's a great idea. And it will provide additional seating as well because we do have -- having volunteered out at The Wall That Heals, you have a lot of people that are not highly mobile, and so they do need to be able to sit or have a place to, you know, sit in their walkers and stuff like that. So I think that's going to be great.

The personalized bricks is another good fundraiser. I know the Costa Mesa has a -- had a program for that at -- we have Veterans Memorial in Costa Mesa and that was one of the fundraising things they did was -- I think they sold bricks for, like, little over a hundred dollars and you could have it personalized with your name or the name of one of the veterans, and so that's another good idea.

And I would also suggest that you do have some, kind of, story Board out there that does give a history of

1	not only the plane, but to any, you know, the names of
2	people that have flown it as well.
3	And if you have, I think, there's some
4	information. I think Nick Berardino alluded to that. So
5	I think that's a that would be a, you know, a good
6	idea.
7	And the other thing is, is it going to I can't
8	tell from the diagrams, but is there going to be any kind
9	of up-lighting or on the site? Because I think it
10	would be great at night, especially during fair time when
11	you have a lot of visitors in the evening and when it's
12	dark. Having it lit up is it would be spectacular.
13	So I like the design and everything. And, you
14	know, I hope we can move forward with this as soon as
15	possible.
16	Thank you.
17	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
18	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Just add a little bit to Ken's
19	comments.
20	From a scheduling standpoint, assuming Murphy
21	goes on vacation and doesn't get involved in the process,
22	the objective is to be out to bid in sufficient time to
23	award the contract for the initial phase.
24	There's a cure period of, I believe, is 30 to 45
25	days for the for the pilaster that the plane will be
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1	mounted on. So we hope to have that done in advance of
2	the opening of the Fair in July, so that that area can be
3	curing during the Fair.
4	There may be some work that we might try to put
5	together on Mondays and Tuesdays when the Fair is shut
6	down. Ken and staff can work on that.
7	And the objective is that the project in its
8	totality will be completed by Veterans Day in November so
9	we can have the dedication on the 9th of November. So
LO	that's what we're trying to head to.
11	And obviously, there's all kinds of challenges
12	that we can't quantify at this point in time, but that's
13	where we hope to be if the Board ultimately approves
L 4	moving forward.
15	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
16	If there's no more comments or questions, I'm
L7	going to entertain a motion to approve this item.
18	DIRECTOR MEYER: So moved.
19	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Second.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: Motion and second.
21	Roll call vote.
22	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
24	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
25	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.

1	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
3	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
4	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
5	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
6	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
7	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
8	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
9	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
11	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
12	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
13	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
14	Okay. Now we move onto the next Item 9F. And
15	I'll turn that over to CEO Kathy Kramer.
16	MS. KRAMER: Thank you, Chair Ruiz.
17	In a recent meeting I had with City of
18	Costa Mesa Leadership Mayor Foley and Mayor Pro Tem John
19	Stephens, they expressed their desire to host a city-wide
20	Independence Day celebration on July 3rd of this year on
21	our property.
22	The City of Costa Mesa has voted to and
23	approved hosting this sponsored event and is providing
24	\$10,000 from the city's contingency funding. The city is
25	actively seeking private sponsorships to cover any

1 additional costs to host this event. 2 On the staff report, I prepared some pro-forma 3 based on their event that was held with us in 2017. 4 That -- that event, we waived the rent only. And the 5 city, through sponsorship, covered all of the other 6 expenses. They're proposing that in -- that we partner with them and provide not only the event space, we would waive 8 9 the guest parking and we would also -- any of the staffing 10 and equipment rental will be waived at all. 11 Again, as I took a preliminary number just on 12 numbers initially, my guess, that would come to about 13 \$13,000. I've asked in the staff report at the Board's 14 direction to approve an amount not over \$20,000 to be co-sponsors of this city-wide event. 15 16 In exchange for us being a part of this city 17 Independence Day, we would receive signage, as well as 18 promotional opportunities through the city resources. 19 It's right actually, a week-and-a-half or so before our Fair, we'll have a great opportunity to really promote the 20 Fair through all the members of the community that will be 21 22 coming to this event. 23 So I'll be happy to answer any questions. we got members of the city staff that are here that would 24 25 also be able to answer any of the questions regarding this

1 event. CHAIR RUIZ: Any questions or comments from the Board? 2 3 Director Aitken? 4 DIRECTOR AITKEN: A couple questions. 5 Thank you so much for this report. And I had talked to Mayor Pro Tem Stephens about this and I was 6 7 really happy that you guys were able to meet and work out some of the details on this. But, obviously, the devil's 8 9 in the -- is in the details. 10 So a couple of questions: What is going to be 11 the -- how is the event going to be branded? Is it the 12 Orange County Fair & Event Center and the City of 13 Costa Mesa Present this Independence Day Celebration? 14 MS. KRAMER: I will defer to City staff to answer that. 15 16 DIRECTOR AITKEN: That's my one question because it 17 seems under this estimate work we're being asked to put in 18 twice the amount of money. 19 My second question would be, when it comes to 20 private sponsorship, what type of transparency is there going to be with the amount of private funds raised and if 21 22 it does go above cost, are -- I'm assuming we're going to 23 have a representative from our staff that's going to be -be given information about how much private donations have 24 25 been raised, and they're going to be seeking to help us

1	recoup our costs at the same rate they're being going
2	to be recouping their costs.
3	So I would just like to be able to know what the
4	numbers are as they're being raised. Because if we're
5	able to raise enough private donations, then maybe it
6	won't be such a large cost to the city or a large expenese
7	to us.
8	I just want to make sure that we're involved in
9	that process the entire way.
10	MS. KRAMER: Absolutely.
11	CHAIR RUIZ: Go ahead.
12	MS. KRAMER: I'm going to defer city staff on those
13	those conversations.
14	I do know they're seeking sponsorship from other
15	organizations Travel Costa Mesa and then private
16	sponsorships. So that hasn't been part of the dialogue so
17	far. So I know city staff is here.
18	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes. Okay.
19	I will now go to public speakers and the first
20	speaker is Connor Lock.
21	MR. LOCK: Yes. Good morning, Members of the Board.
22	My name is Connor Lock. I'm the Chief of Staff to the
23	Mayor and City Council of Costa Mesa.
24	Just to dive straight in. The Mayor Pro Tem was
25	unable to be here today so he asked me to fill in and give
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1 a few comments. Kathy has kindly duplicated in advanced basically 2 3 everything I was going to say about the event. But I do have a little more information based on Director Aitken's 4 questions. So I also have with me today Jennifer Christ, who 6 7 coordinated the 2017 iteration of this event to help answer any questions about that and about what we did 8 9 then. 10 So the Mayor Pro Tem wanted me to express his profound gratitude for your consideration of this event 11 for partnering in 2017 and for the fantastic neighbor that 12 13 the OC Fair has been to the city throughout the past many 14 years, and he looks forward to continuing that partnership for a very long time. 15 Additionally, this family, friendly event 16 17 conserves a touchstone for summer and really be a 18 tradition here in the region as well as in the City of 19 Costa Mesa. So it's not just a Costa Mesa thing. 20 And last year, with newspaper partnerships and branding and publication, the event actually did receive a 21 22 substantial number of regional visitors from outside the 23 City of Costa Mesa as well. As far as branding goes, this event would be a 24 25 partnership between the City of Costa Mesa, the OC Fair &

1 Event Center, the organization Travel Costa Mesa, Heroes Hall, and then the various private sponsors. 2 3 So far, the City of Costa Mesa has contributed 4 \$10,000 as well as a donation of approximately \$6,000 in 5 staff time coordinating and managing the event, including 6 day of. Travel Costa Mesa has contributed \$10,000, as well as sponsorship publication and outreach. And then we 8 9 also have private donations. So far, sponsorships pledges 10 so far at 17,500. And those are also being aggressively 11 targeted. 12 So Travel Costa Mesa is aiding with the target of 13 additional private sponsorships. The city will be working 14 alongside Travel Costa Mesa and the branding as a whole will be a large-scale partnership between all our 15 16 organizations. 17 And, again, we are available for any further 18 questions that you have. And if there's anything I 19 missed, I'm happy to answer. CHAIR RUIZ: Great, thank you. Okay. 20 DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I have one question. 21 22 CHAIR RUIZ: Yes. 23 DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: So on page 2, under 2019 Independence Day Celebration, the \$10,000 that were 24 approved by the City Council, it indicates that it's also 25 Page 128

1	for city staff involved.
2	So that may be a typo?
3	(Unintelligible)
4	It doesn't say in addition. Oh, it is in
5	addition? Okay. Because I mean, if it's coming to the
6	Fairgrounds, then it wouldn't be covering city staff time.
7	MR. LOCK: Yeah. It's in addition.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Okay.
9	So I do agree with Board Member Aitken about
10	recovering our cost; however, I do see the value of being
11	a good neighbor. We are located although we are a
12	State entity, we are located in the City of Costa Mesa.
13	So I do think it's worth exploring the opportunity
14	further.
15	I do agree that there are significant funds
16	raised. It could be used to offset some of the expense
17	incurred by the state, particularly in the area of
18	security and traffic maintenance where the city might be
19	able to provide some support in that area, especially with
20	city police where that may come from our budget.
21	But I think that it would be a great thing to
22	continue exploring.
23	MS. KRAMER: Related to this budget, these are just
24	expenses that we were anticipating. I do not know the
25	magnitude of the overall. There's a lot of expenses as

1	you might imagine entertainment, fair vendors. All
2	kinds of hard costs the city is going to have equipment
3	that is in addition to all of that.
4	So I do not have a budget, and I'm not sure if
5	they put an overall budget together yet. Jennifer is
6	shaking her head "no" that they have not put an overall
7	budget together.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Okay.
9	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay.
LO	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: But as they are, just keep
11	that in mind. Because we're and the fundraising
12	process, where would the funds go that the city is
13	raising?
L 4	MR. LOCK: So so the city the funds that are
15	being raised from private sponsorships, it will go
16	directly to either vendors or to services that are
L7	contracted.
18	So already, we have a commitment from the
19	Tijuana Dogs. That's a \$5,000 cost and they'll be the
20	headliners throughout the whole night. They'll be playing
21	throughout the entire event.
22	So that's how we're structuring, but it is
23	overall a general outline budget at this point estimated
24	to be about 60,000 in total cost.
25	But, again, if we're able to recruit sponsors and

1 other supporters to go above that, that will lead to a longer fireworks display, more services, more community 2 3 amenities. So things that we really love to see. We'd 4 love to be able to fundraise higher and do more and be 5 bigger year one. 6 One example that was raised during the 7 Travel Costa Mesa Board meeting -- Mayor Pro Tem was there -- was actually an event in the City of Long Beach 8 9 called the "Big Bang On The Bay" on the southeastern 10 portion of Belmont Shore. They're four years in. And by 11 their fourth year, its grown to such an extend that 12 they're able to contribute over \$100,000 to community 13 organizations as a philanthropic act just from selling 14 tickets and sponsorships. So that's years down the line; that's a big 15 16 But in year one, we'd love to go as big as we can 17 with the private sponsorships. 18 CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. Any more --DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Chair Ruiz. 19 CHAIR RUIZ: Director Aitken. 20 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Because I noticed in your council 21 22 report that you did have some initial costs associated with the event. 23 24 I guess my concern is I just want to make sure 25 that we have a representative from our staff that is part Page 131

1 of the conversation as to what dollars are being raised. You know, how quickly they're being spent. 2 3 would just like to ask the City Council to make sure that 4 we have a staff member in on all these planning meetings; keep us informed. Absolutely. Staff will be -- myself, as 6 MS. KRAMER: 7 well as some of them are from the event team. We're just a piece of it. 8 9 CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Any more questions or comments? 10 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Chair Ruiz. CHAIR RUIZ: Go ahead, Director La Belle. 11 12 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Kathy, this is obviously very 13 close to when the fair opens. Are you and staff 14 comfortable that this is something that can be done without impeding the Fair preparation process? 15 MS. KRAMER: We can work miracles. 16 17 (Public laughs) 18 And I say that. This is -- this is July 3rd and 19 the space that we're proposing to do this is the parking lot directly adjacent to that. So that's already in 20 place. It's going to be built out to welcome our fair 21 22 quests. We will also be hosting the Market Place the very 23 next weekend so that infrastructure -- their equipment and 24 footprint is still going to be there. 25 So, yes, we're -- after the -- after the Page 132

1 Market Place on the last weekend, then, yes. I feel comfortable. 2 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Chair Ruiz, I would also ditto 3 Natalie's comments that obviously the City of Costa Mesa 4 over the years has been a very good neighbor to us and we've, hopefully, been a good neighbor to them. 6 7 been very supportive of our Heroes Hall efforts in a variety of things that we've done in the community. 8 9 So I think this is a good opportunity to extend 10 that partnership. 11 CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. 12 DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And Director Ruiz, and I would say 13 we're doing that -- if we're going to do it now, it's 14 exceeded twice the value that the city is willing to put into, I think we would be a great neighbor and the 15 16 branding should reflect that. DIRECTOR MEYER: I move that we approve the 17 18 recommendation. 19 CHAIR RUIZ: Before we do that, Director Meyer, I got a couple of speakers. 20 MS. KRAMER: I want to say one quick thing to 21 22 Director Aitken's comment, would it be appropriate that --23 again, post-event that we have an accounting of where the funds went and expenditures so we can all have a look in 24 25 it, especially as we -- this is going to be, hopefully, an

1	annual event. Then we could make adjustments as we work
2	with the cities and the partners to build it out in the
3	future.
4	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Oh, I think that's essential. I
5	think if we're going to go into this, I think we need to
6	go in as partners.
7	MS. KRAMER: Okay.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: But I think the clarity
9	that you provided is key. That the majority of the
10	revenue that you earn or raise will be going towards the
11	event.
12	So we're only the Fair is being asked to
13	offset the expense by providing the venue and staff time,
14	but not necessarily to pay for the other elements,
15	including the fireworks show and other things.
16	MS. KRAMER: Yes, yes.
17	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great. Thank you.
18	I got a couple of speakers and I'm going to call
19	them out.
20	First is Beth Refakes followed by Ana V.
21	MS. REFAKES: Thank you for letting me speak on this
22	issue.
23	Actually, to correct the representative from the
24	city, the city tried this two years ago and I think they
25	had 50 at least \$50,000 invested in it and they had a
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1	thousand people turn out. So, you know, the that's
2	kind of a an issue for me because that amounts to
3	spending \$50 for person of taxpayer dollars for the most
4	part.
5	Last year, they didn't have one. The council at
6	the time voted it down. They weren't going to spend any
7	money on it and so this has come back again.
8	The I don't know I agree that the Fair
9	should not expend any more money, you know, than the city
10	has contributed or approved which is the \$10,000. And the
11	money that is raised should go back to the, you know, pay
12	off so nobody is spending any money.
13	Because the fact of the matter is, Costa Mesa
14	taxpayers are getting hit with this twice. Okay. We're
15	paying for the \$10,000, plus we're paying as taxpayers
16	because it's a State facility; we're also getting hit.
17	So from a taxpayers' standpoint, I kind of have a
18	problem with this. So I don't know that it's going to
19	happen on July 3rd, you know, you may have more people.
20	But since we have fireworks available in our city from, I
21	think the week before the 4th of July, a lot of people
22	still celebrate at home. So we'll see how it goes.
23	Thank you.
24	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
25	Next speaker is Ana V.

MS. VRSKA: So my questions on this are procedural.

Case in point being that the Council meeting was April 16th and this item came up pretty late. The Agenda was available. I saw it on Wednesday. I'm not sure if it was available on Tuesday which begs the question of are we all mind readers to know how the City Council would have voted to put an item on the Agenda that hasn't been discussed and voted? It wasn't a unanimous vote?

So to me, this does not make me feel like there is transparency or that things are being done according to the public interest. It makes me like they're back room dealings and maybe executive staff people feel like certain items are their private playroom where they can decide things and then agendize, you know, after the fact or before the fact. And that actually makes me very, very uncomfortable.

It's not discussing the merits of the event or anything like that, but it is things like this that degrade public trust. So that's my first comment.

My second comment is very uncomfortable how the money is being dealt with with all this. So there's sponsorship by the Fair. There's some money given by the city -- 10,000 plus 6,000, there's private contributions, but then those are being directly paid for services, so there is no proportionate accounting how there has to be

1 with public entities about how this is all going down which also makes me feel uncomfortable. 2 3 I would want to know who is privately donating and whose interest is it. Can I put a public records 4 request and find this information out or is that going to 6 be, you know, private because the donor is going to pay the fireworks, or however that's going to work? So I think these are things that have to be 8 9 cleaned up and done above Board as so not degrade public 10 trust and not to raise questions maybe where none questions should exist. 11 12 And then finally, on the issue of being a good 13 neighbor. I hope that the Fairgrounds would continue to 14 pursue that in terms of sales tax and making sure that all vendors throughout the year are appropriately being, you 15 16 know, all the the procedures are there in terms of 17 contracts and things. 18 Let's make sure that those things are being 19 followed so that the people can be remitting their paperwork and all the sales tax that is coming to the 20 City of Costa Mesa. Because as the -- I've spoken on this 21 22 previous times -- that as the Fair grows and the events 23 grow, the infrastructure pressure on the City of 24 Costa Mesa grows, too. 25 And so I hope we can continue to work together in

1	all kinds of different levels.
2	Thank you.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Okay.
4	I'll bring it back to the Board for a motion to
5	approve the action item that's on the floor.
6	MS. KRAMER: Chair Ruiz, can I make a suggestion.
7	Can we amend the ask to include that we support
8	the funding and that a post which we intentionally
9	did bring back a post report showing all the
10	expenditures from the revenue performed on the event and
11	it will be agendized for the Board.
12	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. I'll entertain a motion to amend
13	and a prove this item.
14	DIRECTOR MEYER: So moved.
15	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Second.
16	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion on the floor and a
17	second.
18	Roll call vote.
19	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yeah. Just as a point of
20	discussion, you know, I want to think as we see this
21	event evolved and I think it's going to be a great
22	event and I know some of the speakers have concerns
23	but I think, you know, we make it our mission to try to
24	get this property in use for the public benefit 365, not
25	just during Fair time.

1	So these are exactly the type of events that we
2	need to support. We need to get behind and partner with
3	them the government, the City Hall of Costa Mesa to do.
4	Because it's not just going to be for Costa Mesa
5	residents. It is going to be us using our branding our
6	social media to blast this out to everybody in
7	Orange County that is looking for a family-friendly place
8	to go and picnic on the 3rd of July, so I'm really excited
9	about this idea.
LO	And, I guess, I just want to make sure and I
11	think the staff clarified that but this is not going to
12	be something that's going to be the accounting is going
13	to be done by the Travel Bureau of Costa Mesa. This is
14	going to be accounting done with us as a public agency and
15	the city as a public agency which means it's all going to
16	be subject to public records request.
L7	And so I wholeheartedly support your suggestion
18	that we bring it back as an agenda item and do a full
L9	accounting and see what we did right and what we can do
20	better next year and really put our support behind
21	celebrating our nation's birthday on the Fairgrounds.
22	I think it's a fantastic idea.
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
24	DIRECTOR MEYER: One other comment.
25	And that's just that if the City Council of
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1	Costa Mesa had not approved this, I would not vote to
2	approve it.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Great. Thank you.
4	There's a motion and a second on the floor. Roll
5	call vote.
6	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
7	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
8	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
9	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
10	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
11	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
12	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
13	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
14	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
15	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
16	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
17	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
18	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
19	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
20	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
21	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
22	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
23	Now we move onto the next Item 9G. And with
24	that, I will turn it over to Director Meyer.
25	DIRECTOR MEYER: Thank you.

1 So the RFP for the Governance Review Congratulation Services is lengthy. So I will direct 2 3 everyone's attention. If you're in that tab, it's pages 4 14 and 15 of the actual scope of work. If you're in the PDF document, that's page 140 and 141 -- the comprehensive PDF document. 6 The detail what we're proposing here, we're very interested in everybody's feedback on -- I do want to take 8 9 a moment to thank Kelly Vu from the Contracting 10 Department. She was so helpful to our committee over the 11 course of the past two months. 12 (Applause) 13 Really excellent. Really educated us early in 14 this process and helped us put this together. And also thanks to Kathy and to Summer for really helping us make 15 16 this work happen. 17 And lastly, thank you to my colleague on the 18 committee, Director Bagneris, for putting in the time. 19 This is what these committees should be doing. It's getting this work done and putting the effort to make sure 20 that we're moving the ball forward. 21 22 So now to get a little bit more specific about 23 what we're recommending in the scope of work for this RFP. To some extent, the services that we're looking for are a 24 25 bit of a chicken-and-the-egg problem. In that we do want

1 to have expert consultant with regard to how we actually design this process. 2 3 If it's a process that incorporates every stakeholder's perspective on each independent issue that 4 we're going to be bringing forward. And that's important because what we're doing here is not simply going through 6 7 the existing policy manual and seeing whether any of us have comments about any individual policy. 8 9 But rather, we're trying to do a comprehensive 10 look at how we govern the organization. And so that may 11 mean we only need to modify some of the policies that 12 already exist or create new policies and processes in 13 order to make sure that we have the most transparent 14 process possibly. So what we put it in the scope of work included, 15 you know, that kind of a description. That we anticipate 16 17 that the consultant would be providing input and advice to 18 us about how we craft this process. 19 But then we also outlined some of the specific things that we anticipate would be included. And that 20 would mean that we would have -- with regard to each 21 22 significant topic that we'll be discussing and reviewing 23 as a Board in the course of the process. Opportunities for Board members to provide input 24 25 on a one-and-one basis with the consultant. Opportunities

for the public to provide input before it comes up to the Board for, you know, review and approval of an actual draft policy. Opportunities for the public to weigh in at public meetings as we go through that work, as well as opportunities for us to solicit feedback from CDFA, from the Department of Justice, and any other stakeholders who may have points that they'd like to share with regards to each of us.

So we outlined that on those pages that I've identified on the RFP -- very interested in feedback.

This is not set forth as "this-is-the-way-it-should-be."

This is our best effort after spending a lot of time of what we thought might be an appropriate process, but we definitely are interested.

One comment that I heard earlier in the meeting from a member of the public which I thought was a very good one in which -- I'm going to chew on it a little bit -- is the topic of culture.

I think that's a very, very well taken point and I think we might be able to incorporate some language for a consultant to be able to help us think about the ways that we established transparency, highest commitment to ethics and integrity, and talk, and making sure that we're ensured in compliance with that throughout the entire organization.

1	So thank you for that feedback and we're thinking
2	about ways we can incorporate that here.
3	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you, Director Meyer.
4	Any questions or comments from the Board?
5	Director Mouet.
6	DIRECTOR MOUET: On the culture, I think it's very
7	good thought that you have.
8	The in my experience in overseeing strategic
9	planning efforts for both city and departments, usually,
10	the real intensive discussion with the organization
11	internally and externally about core values and
12	exercise there are exercises in order to talk to
13	stakeholders both internal and external about core values
14	in that.
15	Typically, at least in the strategic planning
16	setting but even if it's an strategic planning
17	becomes, kind of, the rallying point. I'm reminding
18	people about cultural important things. So it's just a
19	thought that it typically revolves in focusing on core
20	values when one wants to change the culture of the
21	organization.
22	DIRECTOR MEYER: I love that. I think that's
23	terrific. We'll definitely address that.
24	And something I didn't point out but that is
25	included in here which we expect to be, a robust piece of
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1	this work is that once we do have all of these policies,
2	we're going to have training of us as a Board among
3	members of our staff so that everybody is aware of what
4	the policies of this organization are and what goes with
5	that as well as this constant training and discussion and
6	dialogue about what our core values are and what kind of
7	culture we have in our institution.
8	And so that's a great point. We'll definitely
9	incorporate it.
LO	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I just have a comment.
11	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes, go ahead.
12	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I just think it's so
13	important that you have suggested that we make this an
L 4	independent process by having somebody outside of the
15	organization look at all of the current policies.
16	Because when we are so close to the process, it's
L7	easy for a Board member or somebody to influence what the
18	policy looks like. But having an independent party make
19	recommendations and finalize it is important to the
20	transparency process.
21	So I think it's a great suggestion and I'm glad
22	that we're moving in that direction.
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. There's no more? Go
24	ahead, Director La Belle.
25	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.

1	I certainly want to support Director Meyer and
2	Director Bagneris in this process.
3	I think it's excellent. It's probably the most
4	important thing that we need to be doing in the next
5	after we get the Skyhawk done.
6	(Public laughs)
7	In the next in the next six months. My only
8	observation, I've been through various RFPs in the past.
9	The number that we plug in terms of the budget, given the
10	scope of work that we're anticipating we obviously want
11	to get the right individual or firm in there might be a
12	little light.
13	DIRECTOR MEYER: We actually raised that with Kathy
14	and she can speak to it more specifically, but we will
15	need the Board to make a significant investment in this.
16	MS. KRAMER: Our thought was if you recall from the
17	budget it was a \$20,000 placeholder.
18	What our thought was, because we we did not
19	put a number in this RPF from not to exceed. Once we
20	get those questions back, we select a winning bidder.
21	We'll bring that back for approval, as well as what the
22	financial compensation will be as well as.
23	And at that time, we can get monies approved by
24	the Board.
25	DIRECTOR MEYER: But we do expect it to be
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1	substantially more than that \$20,000?
2	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Got to do it right.
3	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yeah. Exactly.
4	DIRECTOR MEYER: Top priority.
5	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Thank you.
6	There's no more questions or comments from the
7	Board, I'm going to turn it over to the public speakers
8	now.
9	And I'm going to call on Reggie Mundekis followed
LO	by Ana V.
11	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis and I'm going
12	to be speaking on Item 9G, the Governance and Consulting
13	Services.
L 4	I like what you've done with this RFP. I like
15	the idea of it's inclusive and reaching out to different
16	stakeholders to get feedback. I see this as a process
L7	that tries to reach a consensus. It doesn't mean
18	everything leaves with everything, but a large number of
19	people can live with the outcome and that will be
20	refreshing change.
21	I also appreciate the behind-the-scenes work of
22	Mr. Caplan who has I'm quite sure spent many hours
23	and, you know, many bubbles of red ink marking up the
24	I'm sorry. It's really bad policies and procedures we
25	have now. Those are artifact of a different time and a

1 different place and a different frame. 2 So I really appreciate the work that people put 3 into this. I am hopeful that the process will get us 4 forwards to where we need to be, and I like the idea of including culture -- cultural aspects as far as, "Okay. We have these policies and procedures. What are our core 6 values and how do we want to reflect them in the way that we conduct business and the way we present ourselves to 8 9 the public." 10 So I do have one addition. I need to ask 11 somebody to help me with on this by making a motion to 12 amend this. 13 On page 12 of RFP. It's part 4. It says, 14 "History and General Information". There's no mention of the Equestrian Center. Okay. So if we can get, you know, 15 16 just -- both of these paragraphs are fairly short and if 17 we can get one of the short paragraphs, insert the 18 Equestrian Center. 19 That way, whoever bids on this knows -- has the full range of we're dealing with everything from a County 20 Fair to a demonstration farm to a museum to an 21 22 Equestrian Center. 23 So we have a lot of variety of viewpoints to deal with; that would be good. So if we can get somebody to 24 25 amend that, that would be wonderful.

1 Thank you. CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you. Ana V. 2 3 MS. VRSKA: Thank you for this. It's a couple of 4 steps in the right direction and I'm certain that the 5 right company, organization, or person needs to be picked to do this it is very important. 6 But more broadly speaking to culture of accountability and responsibility, ethics and integrity, 8 9 I'm just going to give a few examples from today of things 10 that I feel, like, need to change here first and foremost 11 before the work needs to be done. 12 So though I appreciated the comment earlier in 13 the meeting about, you know, clean audits are not 14 necessarily how it goes and there's always stuff on audits and doesn't mean that there is a culture of corruption; 15 16 however, I'm going to read the definition of corruption. 17 The definition of corruption is: "Dishonest or fraudulent 18 conduct by those in power." 19 And in the last few years, I definitely feel like I've seen examples of that it by the executive staff. 20 what concerns me is though I appreciate this, like, 21 22 peacemaking comment about, you know, we don't want to jump 23 on someone and accuse too soon and act rationally; 24 however, what concerns me is this very matter of attitude

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of audit findings.

1 For me, I'm a perfectionist. I would always want to aspire to a clean audit. If we're constantly getting 2 3 flagged on stuff, then the question should be like, why are we and how can we do better and improve things? So 4 5 although it's not going to be a perfect audit, I think it 6 is something good to aspire to. Also, I want to understand what will it take for this Board to take things seriously. And, you know, you 8 9 have to be like smacked upside the head? Like, what kind of behavior will it take? 10 11 To me, when there is a contract, you know, a 12 severance contact, and the dates are wrong and an 13 attorney -- Mr. Pollmeier spoke earlier -- you know, 14 discussed it's either fraud or theft. Examples -- maybe that are not brought up in the 15 16 audit but that have come up before -- about contracts 17 being postdated, about different amounts, about things not 18 coming to the Board, about things being swept under the 19 rug -- I just want to understand what level do things have to rise to before, you know, so -- a culture of 20 responsibility, accountability, doesn't just address 21 22 things going forward. It takes accountability of what's 23 happened and addresses why and how and there are 24 consequences when bad things happen. 25 You can't just, you know, sweep it again under

1	the rug and pretend like that didn't happen. You're job
2	here is sometimes hard. It's, you know, I know you work
3	together and you work with the executive staff, but at the
4	end of the day, you are responsible also.
5	On the RFPs, I want to know for the security why
6	that wasn't done earlier and now it's a rush and you can't
7	do it an RFP because you don't have time.
8	Thank you.
9	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
10	Okay. With that, I'm going to turn it back to
11	the Board for any more questions or comments.
12	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: I move the Committee's
13	recommendation.
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Second.
15	CHAIR RUIZ: Motion and a second.
16	Roll call vote, please.
17	DIRECTOR MEYER: Let me just say that I will be making
18	just a few tweaks based on the discussion that we had.
19	CHAIR RUIZ: Perfect.
20	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
21	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
22	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
23	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
24	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
25	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.

1	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
2	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
3	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
4	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
5	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
6	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
7	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
9	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
10	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
11	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Okay.
12	Next item on the Agenda.
13	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I just need to make this comment.
14	I want to thank Director Meyer. He is a welcomed
15	knowledge and resource and really helping to drive this
16	process; we spent nine hours. And Kelly has been with us,
17	CEO Kramer has been with us. And we have seriously put
18	our heart into what we're doing right now.
19	And it is the most important thing we can do.
20	And I'm so glad that we're doing this. And I want him
21	thank him for his leadership as Chair of the Committee.
22	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Thank you. And ditto those
23	comments. Thank you.
24	Okay. The next item, Item 9H.
25	And I'm going to turn that over to

Director La Belle.

DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes. When we started the process for the A-4 Skyhawk, I remembered that in the past life, I had worked with an attorney who was a consultant in the city I worked in.

And at one point in time, he had passed, you know, on a conversation that he had been a pilot. And I said I'll reach out to Tom to, kind of, get some info from him, and he was very helpful in terms of identifying the process through the Navy for the jet.

Tom is an attorney in Orange County. I've known him for over 35 years. And in the course of our conversation -- and Nick Berardino was involved -- he indicated that he had flown 350 combat missions -- plus a few -- in Vietnam in an F-4 Phantom jet and received five or six air medals as a result of that and just mentioned in passing the Distinguished Flying Cross, and I asked him: "What was the reason you got the Distinguished Flying Cross?" And Tom just said, "Landing the plane as many times as I took it off." And, obviously, that's not the case. And I'd like to ask Michele if she'll read the citation.

MS. RICHARDS: Sure.

"The President of the United States takes great pleasure in presenting the Distinguished Flying Cross to

Captain Thomas P. Clark, Junior, for heroism and extraordinary achievement while serving with Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 232, Marine Aircraft Bird 13, First Marine Aircraft Wing, in connection with combat operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam.

On 17 August, 1969, Captain Clark launched as Naval Flight Officer aboard the lead aircraft in a flight of two F-4 Phantom aircraft assigned a mission of providing close air support for the resupply of recognizance patrol which was heavily engaged in combat with a hostile force on a mountain 12 miles west of Da Nang.

Arriving over the designated area, he found that an overcast ceiling of 200 feet above landing zone, haze, and deteriorating weather conditions would severely restrict visibility and his area of maneuver ability and was informed by the tactical air controller airborne that two landing attempts by transport helicopters were aborted because of the extremely heavy volume of enemy automatic weapons fire.

When his Phantom was maneuvered on a low altitude identification run, Captain Clark alertly located the friendly position while his pilot observed the muzzle flashes from enemy weapons firing from a ravine 75 meters from the landing zone.

1	Undaunted by the intensity of the hostile fire
2	directed at his aircraft and the requirement to climb into
3	the overcast at the end of each run, navigate by
4	instruments to the run-in, and then relocate the target,
5	he skillfully monitored his instruments and equipment,
6	rapidly computed navigational and ordinance release data,
7	and provided a continuous flow of vital information which
8	enabled his pilot to execute repeated bombing runs and
9	deliver all of his ordinance upon the target with pinpoint
LO	accuracy.
11	As a result of his flights' devastating attacks,
12	the transport helicopter was able to land, discharge its
13	supplies, and depart from the precarious area.
L4	Captain Clark's courage, superior
15	professionalism, and unwavering devotion to duty in the
16	face of great personal danger, were instrumental in the
L7	accomplishment of the hazardous mission and wherein
18	keeping with the highest traditions of the Marine Corps
L9	and of the United States Naval Service."
20	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: The Heroes Hall Foundation will
21	pay for the plaque and we've as the Board is aware
22	there have been others that have been placed on the
23	Walk of Honor and it was unanimous on the part of the
24	Foundation to move forward with that.
25	So that's the recommendation.

1	CHAIR RUIZ: There is a motion on the floor.
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: So moved.
3	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Second.
4	CHAIR RUIZ: Motion and second.
5	Roll call vote.
6	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
7	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
8	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
9	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
10	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
11	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
12	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
13	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
14	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
15	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
16	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
17	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
18	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
19	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
20	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
21	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
22	(Applause)
23	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Thank you. Okay. Thank you.
24	Now we move onto the next item on the Agenda
25	which is Item 9I, and I will turn that over to CEO

1 Kathy Kramer. I apologize. Yes. I'm going to turn that over 2 3 to Director Doug La Belle. DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes. This is the item related to 4 the entertainment contract services. I think we've discussed this on a couple of 6 7 The reason I've asked this to be placed on the occasions. Agenda is so we can have an initial discussion relative to 8 9 possible inclusions in the scope of work. The current contractor has done an excellent 10 11 job -- Sexton -- and it has nothing to do with what they 12 have performed. They've been with us since 2010, I 13 believe. 14 And, obviously, from the materials that Kathy put together and staff put together, it indicates a very clear 15 indication of what's happening in the 16 17 Pacific Amphitheater. 18 We did have up here before us several months ago 19 an individual who said or indicated that he represented a firm who would be interested in proposing on this 20 particular contract when it came up. 21 22 I think at that time, we thought were we in the 23 last year and we would be going to RFP later this year. I think there's one more year extension provided in the 24 25 current contract.

1	What I wanted to do is introduce this to the
2	Board today and to suggest following discussion that
3	after the Fair when things settle down in September,
4	October range, when it's settled down that we have a
5	more in-depth discussion relative to the scope of work and
6	that sort of thing.
7	Whether we, as a Board, want to go ahead and
8	extend the last year. That's a decision that we can make
9	later. If we decide not to, then obviously we will need
10	to go to an RFP.
11	I thought the material that Kathy and staff put
12	together was very well done. I do have a couple of
13	questions that I wanted to ask relative to that.
14	I think the individual who has an interest in
15	proposing is here and maybe we want to take public
16	comments first. I'd like to hear what those might be.
17	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay.
18	You know, I do have some speaker cards here for
19	this time. I only have three. And the only actually,
20	two people. It's Reggie Mundekis and Ana V.
21	So with that, if the Board doesn't have any
22	questions or comments regarding Director La Belle's
23	report, I'm going to turn it over to the public speakers.
24	DIRECTOR MEYER: I have a question.
25	CHAIR RUIZ: Go ahead.

1	DIRECTOR MEYER: What is the total dollars spent on
2	this contract? Do we know?
3	MS. KRAMER: Under 200,000.
4	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: I think the five-year total. It's
5	about 200,000 a year or a million over five years.
6	DIRECTOR MEYER: And so, Doug, is the interest in this
7	particular contract due to the dollar amount of the
8	contract or are there particular issues regarding these
9	services?
10	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: No.
11	I think it's a different individual just wants
12	the opportunity on behalf of his client to propose on the
13	RFP whenever we hit the street on it. Whether it's later
14	this year or later next year.
15	And that's just good. That's part of doing
16	business.
17	DIRECTOR MEYER: He's entitled.
18	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: He's entitled to do that.
19	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: But, I think, are you
20	exploring the opportunity of doing it before we exercise
21	the option for the 2020?
22	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Well, I think, we're going to have
23	to make a decision in September, October of this year if
24	we want to do something different.
25	We're either going to have to (A) extend the
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1	contract for one more year or go out to RFP. So it's a
2	decision that's going to come before the Board some time
3	after this year's fair. Correct me if I'm wrong.
4	MS. KRAMER: If I if I may ask if there's a chance
5	that there's not going to be that second that last
6	extension, I wouldn't wait until that fall. I would do it
7	at the June Board meeting because, you know, Fair is upon
8	us and we need time.
9	We start booking, in fact, we're already having
10	conversations about 2020 Fair. So just because we think
11	it's not in that mode, we're very actively in that. So I
12	would ask that if this comes back at a later date, that it
13	not be any later than June of this year.
14	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: I'll be comfortable with that.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Could we decide now,
16	though?
17	I mean, because it's already it's an agendized
18	item now. We have public comment. We have the data
19	that because, I mean, I'm looking at 21 percent
20	increase year over year for 2018.
21	I I I'm what I don't want to happen is
22	the public feels that we're not being transparent by
23	bringing this back in June when we already should have
24	resolved the issue sooner than later.
25	So, I mean, I I think I have everything I need
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1	to have a discussion about it.
2	MR. CAPLAN: The only thing I would add though is
3	there's there's no issue of discussion.
4	It's listed as an action item. But the action
5	item is not listed as a vote to approve the next option
6	year, and so that vote cannot happen today. That vote
7	would need to happen at a future meeting.
8	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you for clearing that up.
9	Any more questions or comments from the Board
10	before I go to public comments?
11	(No response)
12	Okay. First speaker I'm going to call up is
13	Reggie Mundekis followed by Ana V.
14	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis. I'm
15	discussing Item 9I, the Entertainment Booking Services
16	Contract.
17	Well, Ms. Sexton has done a good job over the
18	past several years and staff has presented this very nice
19	bar chart as an argument to, you know, that Ms. Sexton
20	should keep this position. There's a lot more that's
21	behind this bar chart that isn't presented here, as far as
22	like what makes up these numbers.
23	In these numbers, there's a lot of alcohol sales
24	that contribute to revenue. In this yellow line, I call
25	that a "bullshit line" because what staff did to create

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the false impression that she's just sending thing right through the roof every year. It's that this line is just the percentage -- the cumulative percentage of sales --

So this -- where it starts -- you take this number and you divide it by the total sales. The next, it goes up in the next increment by taking these two bars, adding them together, divide them by total sales, which is why it's really weird. It goes from zero to a hundred.

So one of the reasons this contract needs to be reconsidered -- and it actually needs to be reframed -- is that the Pac Amp is pretty much the same. It's like the same acts in different order each year. Every now and then somebody new sneaks in. Like this year, they got The Damned to come play and Reverend Horton Heat.

The entertainment is overwhelmingly aimed towards white people. Okay. We have made some Latino acts. We're not seeing any acts towards any of our other diverse populations in the county. We don't see anything for, you know, the Asian populations. We have a large Korean population. We have Chinese people. We have, you know, other groups that may, you know, have entertainment that isn't being served. And we need to find ways to better serve those -- those communities with entertainment

1 options, both in the Pac Amp and in The Hangar. And by doing that, we bring them to the property 2 3 and we get them involved in our different activities. 4 if you look at entertainment booking contract in that way, 5 there's a lot of opportunity here that we need to think about how we want to reframe that proposal to bring in the 6 7 diverse people of Orange County to our property. Thank you. 8 9 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Next speaker is Ana V. 10 I know you have two speaker cards. 11 MS. VRSKA: Oh, that was an accident. Sorry about 12 that. I forgot that I turned it in, but I wanted to be 13 safe just in case. 14 I echo the push towards diversity. I -- I'm also a big believer that things change and you have to 15 16 reassess every once in a while and see what other people 17 or other companies can bring to the table. Open it up and 18 get out there and see and maybe this is the best thing 19 around and maybe it is not. But to break away from the status quo and explore 20 and grow and maybe that just brings you back to, "Okay. 21 22 We're in a good place." But just maybe there's things we 23 could be doing better. And so for that reason, I support a lot of 24 25 looking into everything the way it's being done and Page 163

1	reassessing and either deciding, "Great. We've reassessed
2	and let's continue." Or, you know, there's things that
3	new people or new companies or new things that we can try
4	and see where that takes us.
5	Thank you very much.
6	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you.
7	Okay. I will now put it back to the Board for
8	any questions or comments or amendments regarding this
9	item.
LO	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I'd like to make a comment.
11	CHAIR RUIZ: Sure.
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: It's an 8,500 seat arena the
13	Pac Amp. Our entertainment organization does an
L 4	incredible job because you're either on your way up for an
15	8,500 seat arena or you're on your way down. And you
16	don't get the A-performer in an 8,500 arena. They're
L7	going to their 40,000 seat arena or more.
18	So I've been impressed since I've been on the
19	Board how the acts have changed. I don't think there were
20	any black groups. And that was five years ago.
21	And now, I have a choice. I can actually
22	Chaka Khan loving me some Chaka Khan. But I also like
23	average white band. I was shocked when I saw that they
24	were on the list.
25	So we are diversifying, as far as I'm concerned,

1 in the black community because a lot of my friends are excited about the acts that we're getting out and they 2 3 want to contribute to the fact that I'm on the Board. 4 just that is just hilarious. But I just wanted to say it's the arena that 6 determines who you're going to get. And so you have to go 7 out there and really, really work hard to get these acts. Even Chaka Khan, she may not be on her way out, but she is 8 9 past her prime as far as an artist, but I'm excited that 10 we're able to get her, that she's going to perform in an 8,500 seat arena which she could perform in a 40,000 seat 11 12 arena as well. 13 So we have to keep that in mind that our group 14 has really work hard to get some of these acts that they're getting and I feel like we've really improved 15 since I've been on the Board. 16 17 CHAIR RUIZ: Any more questions or comments? 18 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Chair Ruiz, if I might. 19 I guess the additional question that I have is similar to Reggie's. Certainly it shows a significant 20 increase in terms of revenues generated. 21 22 I'd like to have staff for the last three years 23 give us a breakdown or concert-by-concert -- some 24 obviously do better than others -- I'd like to know 25 what -- in terms of revenue -- what percentage are

1 revenues from ticket sales, what percentage are revenues from alcohol, what percentage are revenues from 2 3 merchandise, and whether any other category that might be. I think that would be helpful in terms of the 4 5 analysis. One the things I think we need to make sure that we're doing is not having any lost leaders out there 6 7 to the extent that we can and we need to make sure that we're maximizing the facility and it's not only filling 8 9 the seats, it's how much did we get paid for filling the 10 seats versus the other sales that go along the way. 11 So I'd like to have that information brought 12 back, you know, in an early date to the Board. That could 13 be an information item. But I'd like to see that. And I 14 think that's going to be important for us, as a Board, regardless of what decision we make and when we decide to 15 16 make it. 17 I think we need to have a more detailed breakdown 18 of how it applies to the various concerts. 19 DIRECTOR MEYER: Doug, I'm hearing what you're saying and I appreciate the -- this is something that we should 20 look at. 21 22 And to me, the -- if we're looking at whether or 23 not we're going to exercise an option, it would be whether 24 there are alarming reasons or something about what's going 25 on currently that is cause for a concern or cause for a

1 response to do this. The comprehensive look that you're talking about 2 3 to me seems like would naturally occur at the point that 4 we're going to go out and bid to this. And the reason I say that is because I was noticed very much in the packet that we were reading 6 7 through that the Fair is only 75 days away. And I think we, as a Board, need to be mindful about the number of 8 9 special projects we're creating for our team to work on in 10 advance of getting ready for fair time. 11 And so, unless, there's something urgent that's 12 driving this and it's not something that we can wait until 13 we look at this after the option year is up, my feeling is 14 that this isn't something we need to force staff to take on in addition to a billion other things that they're 15 16 already taking on. 17 Because I'm hearing this when I meet with 18 different staff members, and not just being the executive 19 team members, but the staff feels like there's a lot on their plate. That there is a strain and not a high level 20 of understanding about that on our Board. 21 22 And so just kind of want to throw that out there. 23 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: I'm certainly -- Andreas -- very comfortable with that. 24 25 My perception was that it would be October,

1 November before we could, you know, then go out to 2 proposal. If it, in fact, is June, I don't want that to 3 I agree. But I do think if we're going to take a 4 occur. comprehensive look and see this, we need to start now because that year is going to go by pretty quickly, and I 6 would like to get, like I said, whether I get it in September, October, or November. 8 9 I would like to get a very detailed breakdown of 10 the last three years of concerts and have a better 11 understanding of how the revenue spread occurs. We just need that for our decision-making press. 12 13 CHAIR RUIZ: Having said that, that would have to come 14 back probably as an action item, wouldn't it? MR. CAPLAN: Well, I mean, generally, members of the 15 16 Board can ask or direct staff to bring back information. 17 I don't know that you need to have that agendized and voted on by the Board. The only challenge, obviously, 18 19 is, I mean, and each Board member here on this table is going to want to look at different information. 20 So, obviously, if staff feels, like, for example, 21 22 if in a given meeting you have nine Board members each 23 asking staff to do nine things, and staff -- through Kathy -- doesn't think they have the bandwidth to do that, 24 25 then certainly that should be part of the discussion as

1	part of the request as Director Meyer just acknowledge.
2	But, again, generally, requests for information
3	do not need to be agendized.
4	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Director Bagneris?
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I was going to move that we table
6	this item until later in the year after fair time when
7	we're more in the window of meeting an RFP.
8	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion on the floor.
9	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: May I add something.
10	CHAIR RUIZ: Go ahead.
11	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: So is it possible to
12	agendize next month that we approve exercising the option
13	contract for 2020 and then start the RFP process next
14	year? Like, as soon as we can after fair time.
15	Because then we can not only address Doug's
16	concerns which I think is always a good thing to take a
17	look at where the revenue is actually coming from, but we
18	can also mover forward with booking talent, potentially
19	address some of the diversity issues that were raised by
20	members of the public in terms of who's performing here.
21	Although, I do have to say I like all kinds of
22	music. So I think what you guys currently have now,
23	The B-52's, seem super awesome to me.
24	But I just think that it may not be a bad idea if
25	we could potentially just agendize approval for exercising

1	the option contract for 2020 in May.
2	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Is that in a form of a motion?
3	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So, I was going to check, the
4	motion would be to delay this item. We would agendize it
5	in June for
6	(Unintelligible)
7	CHAIR RUIZ: One person at a time.
8	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Okay. So table this item until
9	later in the year.
10	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. With the amendment that
11	Director Rubalcava made
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Well, it really wasn't to exercise
13	the option.
14	DIRECTOR MEYER: But she can't do we can't put that
15	in this motion because it's not part of this action item.
16	She's just asking you to please agendize.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: made or just to
18	exercise the option contract.
19	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So did someone second that motion
20	to table it?
21	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Second.
22	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Okay.
23	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion and a second on the
24	floor.
25	Roll call vote.

1	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
2	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
3	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
4	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
5	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
7	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
8	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
9	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
10	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
11	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
12	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
13	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
15	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
16	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
17	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
18	And now we move onto the next item which is Item
19	9J. And I will turn that over to also Director La Belle.
20	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: The reason why I asked this to be
21	agendized, back in February, we received a very lengthy
22	letters from the Friends & Neighbors of the OC Fairgrounds
23	relative to some issues they had.
24	One of them was relative to the Pacific Symphony.
25	And I just felt that we needed to bring closure to that
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1 particular issue. Kathy has outlined in the staff report that there is a 50-50 split of the revenues with 2 3 Pacific Symphony. Just by way of background, the original agreement 4 5 was SA21417PA and that was approved in June or July of Then 14 months later, there was an amendment to 6 7 that contract which was -- where the 50-50 split occurred. The Memorandum of Understanding that the Fair 8 9 Board has with Pacific Symphony, very clearly has a 10 co-production section in there that deals with who gets 11 what in terms of the -- in general terms -- the, you know, 12 the Symphony handles all of their own ticketing, their 13 subscribers, et cetera, et cetera. 14 And then we handle our ticketing for Kenny Loggins and we did the parking revenues, et cetera, 15 16 et cetera. 17 When the amendment occurred, there was a 50-50 18 split. It was approved by this Board on the Consent 19 Calendar. On a go-forward basis, I just feel we need to make sure, if we're going to do that on a go-forward 20 basis, we need to amend the MOU to make it clear what our 21 22 responsibilities are and what Pacific Symphony's 23 responsibilities are. Obviously, things change. You know, we have an 24 25 MOU in place, we assume certain things, and it didn't Page 172

quite occur that way. And I don't have any problem with that kind of split, but I think we need to do it in a little more formal transparent sort of way.

That's why I pulled the one for the Rick Springfield which is SA12119PA. Now, that particular contract doesn't have a 50-50 split.

So are we getting into the same spot we got into with the Kenny Loggins contract? We'll come back in nine months or a year and say, "Well, it didn't work out that way," and now we need to do a 50-50 split? So that's my whole issue.

MS. KRAMER: I'll defer staff.

2.0

Michele, the contract with Rick Springfield, do you have knowledge that -- because as we said in the report, it was always our intent to restore our relationship. We would continue to do the Summer Concert Series and then we would co-pro -- co-produce an event where it was and equitable expenses and revenue. That was -- I remember seeing that. I don't have it in front of me in that initial MOU.

And so this would be one of the events. The year before, we did it with Frankie Valli and then this year would be the Rick Springfield concert. Do you have knowledge? I don't have that in front of me exactly to know that it's specified.

1 MS. RICHARDS: I don't have the contract in front of 2 me either. 3 But 2017 was the first year that we attempted a co-production with the Pacific Symphony and 4 5 Director La Belle is correct that there were certain things spelled out in those deal points with that contract 6 7 in terms of expenses and revenue that would be handled by each -- the Pacific Symphony and the OC Fair & Event 8 9 Center. 10 In 2018, those deal points were amended for the 11 Frankie Valli co-pro that included a 50-50 split. So all 12 expenses in on each side -- all revenue in on each side --13 it would be a 50-50 split. Those same deal points were 14 included in the 2019 contract with Rick Springfield. DIRECTOR MEYER: And so I'm not following the entire 15 16 thread here. 17 So where is -- I mean, these kind of 18 co-productions, it's not unusual to have -- there 19 typically is an accounting loss. There's typically a revenue loss share. And at the end, there's an accounting 20 and if there's a dispute, that's the total amount it gets 21 22 paid to the co-producer. 23 So what is -- what is it that didn't happen here? DIRECTOR LA BELLE: What -- Andreas, what didn't 24 25 happen -- at least from my perspective -- the MOU did not Page 174

1 get amended to change that co-production provision. There were very specific things in that MOU that 2 3 accrued to the District and then accrued to the 4 Pacific Symphony. What happened was a contract that had all that information in, it was just amended to be a 50-50 6 split. All I'm saying is that if that's what we want to do as a Board, I'm fine with that. But we need to go back 8 9 and amend the MOU to be reflected of what we're actually 10 doing so that when everybody looks at it, they know exactly what the responsibilities and obligations are. 11 12 DIRECTOR MEYER: So the MOU that was approved didn't 13 contain a 50-50 split cost? 14 DIRECTOR LA BELLE: No. It had a co-production section in there that very clearly, you know, we get the 15 16 parking revenues, we get all the ticket revenues from the 17 seats that we sell, et cetera, et cetera, et cetera. 18 Pacific Symphony gets their ticket revenues from their 19 subscribers, et cetera. What happened, basically, is the co-production 20 section ended up being 97,000 -- and this is in a letter 21 22 that we received -- ended up being \$97,000 loss to the 23 Pacific Symphony is what it amounted to, I think in a nutshell. 24 25 MS. KRAMER: That was the correct split. The revenue Page 175

1	split was 97,000.
2	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Right. And what we did
3	that's when we approved the amendment to this contract
4	back in September, that's when the 50-50 split was agreed
5	to.
6	And I'm not disputing the fact that we approved
7	it; we did. I'm just saying on a go-forward basis if this
8	is what we want to do as a as a Board, let's amend the
9	Memorandum of Understanding to be reflective of that.
10	CHAIR RUIZ: Okay. Any more questions or comments
11	from the Board?
12	(No response)
13	If not, I'm going to go to public speakers. I'm
14	going to call Reggie Mundekis followed by Adam Carleton.
15	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. I'm Reggie Mundekis. I'm
16	discussing Item 9J, the Kenny Loggins concert and other
17	issues with the Pacific Symphony.
18	CEO Kramer took it upon herself to fabricate the
19	50-50 revenue sharing agreement. I have a copy of the
20	Memorandum of Understanding that was published. And I can
21	hand this to CEO Kramer and I would like her to point to
22	me in here where it says that there's a 50-50 split.
23	Would you like to do that, Ms. Kramer? Would you
24	like to point to a 50-50 split in this Memorandum of
25	Understanding?

1 (No response) So what's happened is that because of 2 Ms. Kramer's actions, the Symphony was supposed to pay us 3 4 about \$317,000. And through a series of actions in which 5 CEO Kramer insisted that we needed to "sponsor" the Symphony to the tune of several hundred thousand dollars, 6 7 instead of being paid \$317,000, we paid the Symphony about \$426,000. 8 9 So we, the public, a State-owned property are in 10 the hole to the tune of about \$108,000 from two years of dealing with the Pacific Symphony. 11 12 So CEO Kramer's made up 50-50 split is a bad deal 13 I don't know why someone would make such a bad 14 deal for her employer. When you look at this and you see somebody putting their own employer into the hole by 15 16 hundred thousand dollars on purpose and backdoor changing 17 contract terms without bringing it to the attention of 18 nobody, you got to ask: What are they really doing? What 19 did they get out of this? And then when you see this, you need to ask 20 yourself: "What other times has this person done 21 22 something like this that we haven't found yet?" She was 23 really good at hiding this. 24 She just put up the Kenny Loggins contract in the

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Consent Calendar where they were going to get \$97,000 they

25

1 weren't owed. I didn't tell anybody. And then she did it again last year at Frankie Valli. 2 3 As a matter of fact, I have the check right here. She and Michele Richards did it after Adam Carleton was 4 placed on administrative leave. And quite frankly, this may be one of the reasons she doesn't want Mr. Carleton 6 7 around because he asks too many questions. On December 27th, there was a check that was cut 8 9 to the Symphony for over \$113,000 that they were not owed. 10 So we need to -- I'm going to suggest we bring in the 11 State auditor on this one because we need somebody to come 12 in who could take a thorough look at the books and figure 13 out what's going on. Because when something like this happens, there's 14 15 more to it. 16 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. 17 Next speaker, Adam Carleton, followed by Ana V. 18 MR. CARLETON: Thank you, Board. 19 I just want to reiterate, you know, hours after I was put on ATO she calls the State Auditor and and he says 20 back, "Pardon my phone call. I received your phone call 21 22 about not being with the OC Fair anymore. If I receive a 23 call from him in the future, I'll direct him, but I can't speak about OC Fair business." 24 25 She clarifies and says, "To clarify, he's on Page 178

1	administrative time off but restricted from conducting
2	Orange County Fair business." We're talking about that
3	business. I get three minutes. You could very well
4	extend my time. I do have the exhibits and I'll try to
5	read quickly.
6	Back in February or January 2017, here's the
7	transcripts. "After many months of discussions, we're
8	happy to announce the Pacific Symphony and agreement."
9	And it says, "An MOU will be brought back to the Board on
10	the Consent Calendar in February."
11	A few months later I can see why Director La
12	Belle is as near and dear to his heart and he says, "I
13	guess the only other comment," this is the March 2017
14	transcript, page 166 says, "I think the only other my
15	only other comment, Kathy or Michele mentioned that
16	there's a rental agreement for the Pacific Symphony. It's
17	going to be coming back next month."
18	Ms. Kramer jives in, "Yes. April or May. At the
19	latest, May." Director La Belle says, "I would like to
20	suggest that go through the Tenant Liaison Committee so
21	that they have the opportunity to review those issues and
22	make sure their input is given. With that, thank you."
23	So this didn't just "happen." It took months and
24	months of negotiation. After many months of discussion.
25	And the contract that got finalized was a zero-dollar

1	maximum value contract. And if you look at the backup
2	which she wasn't provided you'll see clearly delineates
3	who gets which monies and why. It was signed not until
4	July. It wasn't put on the Consent Calendar I got a
5	copy of that until September of 2017.
6	So even though she promised it's going to happen,
7	like so many things, it doesn't happen until months later.
8	And frankly, those are elements of fraud. And we tried to
9	give words new meaning and when you start messing with
10	dates, backdating, and spacing things out, and then coming
11	back and asking for not telling the Board.
12	Clearly, the Board wanted to know about this.
13	This was a great new tenant. I loved the Pacific
14	Symphony. We're already giving them \$100,000 a year. And
15	a year-and-a-half later, there's absolutely no reason to
16	go back and change the contract for \$100,000 that's now
17	more unfavorable.
18	So I'm running out of time. Would the Chair give
19	me more time?
20	CHAIR RUIZ: No, I can't.
21	MR. CARLETON: I got 20 more seconds then. Thank you.
22	So this is just another example. It's the tip of
23	the iceberg. And there's so many things like this. And
24	as I bring those up, she gets quite angry at me.
25	So, anyway, my time's up. Thank you very much.
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1 CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you. Okay. Next speaker is Ana V. 2 3 Hi. I like transparency and honesty. MS. VRSKA: 4 With all due respect Chair, you can. I'm a Chair of a committee. The Chair has the discretion. You should say, "I don't want to extend your time." That would be more 6 7 honest and transparent. I'm going to read the definition of corruption 8 9 again: "Dishonest or fraudulent conduct by those in 10 power." 11 I am constantly -- meeting after meeting -- I 12 come up -- I think I've been coming about two years now --13 flabbergasted why some of these things are an "okay-way" 14 to do business. I don't understand. Writing contracts, then not enforcing them or 15 following them. Backdating, front-dating, changing things 16 17 a year-and-a-half later and not being good a fiscal 18 steward to public funds in a public property which means 19 always working on the behalf of the people to make sure we're getting a good deal. 20 This isn't the first example and it won't be the 21 22 last example. So maybe one time, I'll start just 23 enumerating the things because when you look at things that aggregate over time how many times this has happened, 24 25 it becomes a very disturbing pattern of behavior. It's

1 not like once or twice and this happened or maybe got something overlooked. 2 3 This is a systemic way to get around things and do things, like, basically, fraud and theft. That's what 4 it amounts too. I'm going to take also this opportunity to put in a public records request on a different item. 6 I would like to -- all the paperwork regarding the \$75,000 given to Vanguard and all the intellectual 8 9 property. I'd like to understand, you know, the contract. 10 If that was Board approved or not Board approved. If it 11 was executive staff who approved it. I'd like any documentation from the AG in terms of whether there was a 12 13 comment, no comment in terms of compliance with State law. 14 So that's the public record request. I would also like to remind the Board that the 15 16 proper time is 10 business days for turnaround and I'll be 17 following up very closely on that. 18 Additionally, I'd like to put in another public records request. I'd like public records request 19 regarding how the fireworks item got put on the Agenda. 20 Namely, was it from the Chief of Staff? From 21 22 Major Foley or Major Pro Tem Stephens? Was it a staff 23 member? Was it CEO Kathy Kramer in terms of --CHAIR RUIZ: That's three minutes. 24 25 MR. CAPLAN: She has a backup there.

1	CHAIR RUIZ: That's a backup.
2	MS. VRSKA: But that's not honest to me because I
3	didn't know how much time I had.
4	MADAM SECRETARY: I'm sorry. I didn't turn on the
5	light.
6	MS. VRSKA: Can I finish my thought?
7	CHAIR RUIZ: Sure, sure. Go ahead. Go ahead.
8	MS. VRSKA: Thank you. I appreciate that.
9	In terms of how that came about. What I would
10	like to suggest going forward is that if you did not have
11	an actual Council decision, make the wording such to
12	reflect as to say, "If the Council approves it." Because
13	this just looks very bad. You put it on the Agenda before
14	an actual vote happened.
15	(Unintelligible)
16	But how is that not possible? I saw the Agenda
17	Wednesday morning. And then I want all the paperwork in
18	terms of when that happened from the vote late Tuesday
19	night to early Wednesday morning. Thank you.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: Thank you, Ana. Thank you for your time.
21	Okay. Now I will turn it over to the Board. I
22	know there was an item from the Consent Calendar that was
23	pulled; SA121-19PA.
24	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: I would move that.
25	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Second.

1	CHAIR RUIZ: There's a motion and a second on the
2	floor.
3	Roll call vote.
4	MADAM SECRETARY: Chair Ruiz?
5	CHAIR RUIZ: Yes.
6	MADAM SECRETARY: Vice Chair Cervantes?
7	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Yes.
8	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Bagneris?
9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
10	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Mouet?
11	DIRECTOR MOUET: Yes.
12	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Aitken?
13	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
14	MADAM SECRETARY: Director La Belle?
15	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes.
16	MADAM SECRETARY: Director Rubalcava?
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
18	MADAM SECRETARY: And Director Meyer?
19	DIRECTOR MEYER: Yes.
20	CHAIR RUIZ: Great. Thank you.
21	At this time we do have Closed Session, so we
22	will go onto Closed Session. Thank you.
23	(Closed Session)
24	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Calling the meeting to order.
25	Nothing to disclose.

1	Let's go around and Directors, we'll start
2	with Director La Belle. Any comments?
3	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Yes. I have a very important
4	announcement.
5	At 3:15 today, the Corona Del Mar Sea Kings
6	Varsity Baseball will be playing Laguna Beach. And if
7	they win, they'll likely go to the playoffs.
8	And my grandson, Matthew, who most of you know is
9	starting center fielder as a sophomore which is pretty
10	good.
11	(Applause)
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Congrats.
13	DIRECTOR LA BELLE: Other than that, that's it.
14	VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Director Rubalcava?
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I just want to mention
16	Imaginology.
17	So I took many two kids there. We were there on
18	Saturday and it was so much fun. I can't express how much
19	of a community giveback it is. There were I don't
20	know thousands of kids there. There was something for
21	everybody. I mean, it was pretty fun.
22	And we did see the equestrian area. The kids
23	loved that. But I just have to say it was a great
24	experience, and you're definitely doing something right on
25	the marketing side because there were a lot of people.

1 Yeah. VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: Nice. Director Aitken? 2 DIRECTOR AITKEN: No comments. Thank you. 4 VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: All right. Director Meyer? DIRECTOR MEYER: Just one quick comment for the record and the staff members that we still have here. 6 So in the course of working on the Governance Committee and the Audit Committee and being 8 9 invited by Kathy and Michele and Ken to, for example, 10 Long Beach Center event where the Fair was a leading 11 sponsor of the LGBT Center in Long Beach and we're working 12 on this thing, I am just so impressed by every single 13 person I've been coming across and working with our staff 14 here. And I just want to say congratulations. 15 I asked 16 this before and I'd ask you to do it again to please send 17 a message down through the ranks of the Fair that we 18 really value and appreciate the contributions of each of 19 you, and we support you completely. Thank you. Director Bagneris? 20 VICE CHAIR CERVANTES: DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yeah. I'm going to piggyback on 21 22 Imaginology. 23 What an incredible event. I was just happy to be I came out two days, and it's just -- to have the 24 25 record-breaking attendance on Friday, and people just

1 really -- genuinely excited about being here. I wish I was a gamer because I would have gotten into all of that. 2 3 (Public laughs) 4 But, you know, all the giant chess games and Unos 5 and all that thing. It was just really great. And all the kids there looked like they were having a good time. 6 And I think about that and I say the staff. I don't know if you just stop your world and do Imaginology 8 9 then restart with the Fair. I know you don't. You keep 10 looking toward the Fair and that's why our Fair has gotten 11 better and better and better each year that I've been on this Board. And I know it's because of staff. 12 13 And I want staff to know that don't feel bad when 14 you leave our meetings. You continue to put your head down on the plow and do what you have to do because it's 15 16 the Fair. We exist because of the Fair. 17 And if you continue to put on these great events 18 -- these great fairs -- then we're going to be fine. But 19 you don't have to worry about -- you're doing your jobs because we got through Imaginology and now we're 75 days 20 away from the Fair and we know looking forward to what the 21 22 Fair is going to bring. 2.3 So just keep doing what you do.
