21	The mission of the OC Fair & Event Center is
22	celebration of Orange County's communities, interest,
23	agriculture, and heritage with results justifying
24	resources expended.
25	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele. At

Well -- we want to 11 give it just a minute for everybody to reconnect? 12 CEO RICHARDS: Yes. And if you want to, I'll 13 share my screen from here if you'd like. 14 SECRETARY ANGUS: Okay. It looks like we may 15 be just waiting for Vice Chair La Belle and Director 16 Aitken. Oh, no. I see her. She's there. 17 Summer, let me jump on the phone CEO RICHARDS: and see if I can help Vice Chair La Belle. 18 19 SECRETARY ANGUS: Vice Chair La Belle, you're 20 going to have to unmute yourself. 21 VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: I am now unmuted. 22 SECRETARY ANGUS: There you go. 23 VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: All right. 15	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: The Board received advice
16	of counsel on the closed session items listed on the
17	agenda, and we have nothing to report at this time.
18	Okay. I just wanted to mention that Item 10B on the
19	agenda will be carried over until the January meeting.
20	The Financial Monitoring and Audit committee will be
21	preparing or will be making report under the
22	governance portion of the agenda. With that, I'd like
23	to turn it over to CEO Richards for her operational
24	update.
25	CEO RICHARDS: Hello. Good morning, everybody,

and happy holidays. I have just a few things to report on. Our landscaping department has been working with Centennial Farm staff to bring 15 students from Stanbridge University's Vet Tech program to perform health exams on the berm goats and the donkeys and the newly arrived lama who are taking care of the weed abatement on the Pacific Amphitheater berm.

In March those students will be on-site to examine the animals on the berm and at Centennial Farm as part of their educational program. They will be conducting routine health screenings, hoof trimmings, and pregnancy checks. It's a great opportunity for the animals to get some extra TLC and for the vet tech students to practice some of the skills that they've been learning in class.

For the second time this year the Orange County Fair & Event Center's equestrian center was activated by OC Animal Care as an emergency large animal evacuation center during the recent Bond Fire. We housed 21 horses during the emergency, happily all of them have been safely returned home at this time.

So first came the announcement that the OC Fair won the OC Register's People Choice award for the best fair or festival in Orange County, then came Parenting OC Magazine's Reader Choice award for 2020,

and last week we were thrilled to learn that we were also voted the best fair and festival by the readers of the Times OC. It's amazing that our fair fans continue to support us even in a year when the OC Fair was canceled.

Adding to that, each year the OC Fair enters the Western Fair's Association achievement awards in various categories. The Merrill Award, named after Western Fair Associations founder Louis Merrill, is given for, quote, those entries that clearly demonstrate innovation, vision, and excellence, unquote. We also learned last week that our entry from the community support category has been nominated for this prestigious Merrill Award.

OC Fair & Event Center was nominated for our emergency food distribution in conjunction with Power of One Foundation; for the COVID testing that we're doing in partnership with the county; for our produce donations from Centennial Farm going to the OC Food Bank; and for matching 4-H and FFA livestock students with potential buyers since the junior livestock auction had to be canceled.

The Merrill Award winner will be announced during the virtual WFA convention on January 6th. The California Department of Food and Agriculture announced



recently that it was seeking applications from state employees who were interested in the vital work or increasing diversity, equity, equality, inclusion, and parity within the department.

I'm very proud to announce that Thane Coleman, our guest experienced supervisor, and Ester Dusi, our finance director, both applied to serve on the new committee, and we learned last week that they have been selected for this committee. And their service at the state level will certainly help support the work of our new community affairs committee. We're looking forward to their contributions at that state level.

We also wanted to keep the Board and the public in the loop regarding ongoing discussions in Sacramento about alternative operating models for District Ag Associations. During a general meeting of fair CEOs CDFA representatives and WFA members on December 10th, specifically regarding COVID, the topic of alternative operating models was raised. It was communicated that a proposal for a joint powers authority model was shared with California Ag secretary Karen Ross and her deputy secretaries.

It was apparently positively received by

Secretary Ross, and she indicated that she would be

sharing it with Governor Newsom this week. I asked the



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1	same question in this meeting that Director Aitken asked
2	in a previous call: What, if anything, is required of
3	us at the 32nd District Ag Association? The answer was
4	a very clear "Nothing." Participation in any JPA
5	approved by the state would be entirely optional.
6	And Director Aitken, I don't know if you have
7	anything that you wanted to add from the previous call
8	that we were on together?
9	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yeah. I mean, I just want to
10	make it clear to our public as we go through this
11	process that they had three public workshops of the
12	network the network being the 77 fairgrounds in the
13	state of California. The call made up of fair CEOs,
14	members of the public, members of the Board of
15	Directors, and they, at the time, were indicating no
16	final decisions are going to be made. They're just
17	looking for input for fairs that do want to change their
18	model.
19	What is CEO Richards alluded to one of my
20	concerns was: If we do nothing, is a decision going to
21	be made for us? And they were very adamant that the
22	32nd DAA, if we choose, can remain in our current
23	structure. No change will be mandated by the state. So
24	I think that's really good for the model that we have

set up, and I just want to assuage any fears that our

local public may have that we will not be seeking to change our structure in Orange County.

CEO RICHARDS: Okay. Our financials for the month, ending November 30th, and I know the Financial Monitoring Committee will have a little more of a detailed report. But our -- our year-to-date revenue ending the period of November 30th, as you can see was 47.3 million dollars unfavorable to budget. However, we continue to do a great job of controlling our expenses.

We are 29.6 million dollars favorable to budget. Overall, though, we are seeing a net deficit to budget at this point of 17.7 million dollars. Our cash on hand and investments, so our total cash and cash equivalents at this point is 42.8 million. That's a 13 and a half million dollar decrease over the same period last year or 24 percent decrease.

And as we have done every month since the pandemic hit and will continue to do throughout 2021 is to report what our -- our position is, our projected position against budget by the end of the year and also our projected cash position for the end of the year.

Our position has not changed since reported last month. We're still projecting a 16.7 million dollar deficit to budget.

That's actually about a 2.2 million dollar



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1	improvement over our original estimate, way back in
2	April, when we projected an 18-and-a-half million dollar
3	deficit to budget, but we believe we'll come in about
4	16.7 million at this point. And then originally
5	reported we projected our cash position at the end of
6	2020 to be 38.3 million, but we due to our
7	reforecasting and some additional events that we've
8	reported as revenue as well as cost containment, we're
9	now projecting a 40.8 million dollar cash position by
10	the end of the year.
11	So I'd like to turn it over now to Joan Hamill
12	who will have a brief events report.
13	JOAN HAMILL: Thank you, Michele. Great.
14	Happy holidays. I want to say that we are so delighted
15	to announce that Winter Fest Night of Lights made it's
16	debut on December 10th. Originally scheduled to open a
17	week prior, the news just before Thanksgiving that the
18	state was going back into purple tier with the new
19	stay-at-home orders to include the nightly curfew put
20	the event on a temporary hold.
21	After much work and several Zoom meetings with
22	Orange County Health Care Agency, the promoter
23	persevered, retooled the event and the nightly closing
24	time and was able to make Night of Lights a reality A

special thank you goes out to Costa Mesa Mayor Katrina

1	Foley for her support and always being a friend to the
2	OC Fair & Event Center as well as the event and the
3	promoter.
4	Mayor Foley and Fair CEO Richards opened the
5	event last week by flipping the switch to light up the
6	Christmas tree to have the event start officially. And
7	what a wonderful reimagined event Night of Light is.
8	It's a spectacular one mile meandering adventure through
9	a magical winter scenes and a multitude of holiday
10	lights.
11	Reviews on social media have been positive, and
12	we're proud to host the event at OC Fair. Tickets for
13	reserved time slots through January 10th, which are
14	selling out quickly, can be found at
15	nightoflightsoc.com. And our continuing events, Power
16	of One Emergency Food Assistance drive through drive
17	through distribution, the final one for the year is
18	Saturday the 19th, right here on the fairgrounds.
19	Centennial Farm and Heroes Hall courtyard are
20	both open in a limit capacity per health and safety
21	guidelines through Orange County Health Care Agency.
22	COVID-19 testing is ongoing, 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.,
23	Monday through Friday by appointment only. Visit 360

Clinic MD for details. I skipped over the Christmas

tree lot. Today -- or tomorrow, excuse me -- is the

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final day to come to the OC Fair & Event Center to come on-site to purchase your Christmas tree or your wreath.

And, lastly, the farmers market taking place every Thursday, with the exception of December 24th and 31st. Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. So today is the last day, last opportunity before the end of the year to shop local until 2021. Moving on to -- moving on to 2021. In February will be a wonderful event. The Jurassic Quest Drive Thru. This is an established event, originally a walk thru event. This very popular Jurassic Quest experience has been reimagined to be a drive-through event now to go with the times.

The new Jurassic Quest Drive Thru features over 70 life-like dinosaurs including T. Rex, Triceratops, and more. These animatronic dinosaurs are displayed in realistic scenes that allows guests to experience them roaring and moving from their own vehicle, the dinosaurs -- well maybe people inside the cars will be roaring as well -- as they drive their way through the tour guided by an engaging and informative digital audio.

The experience lasts about an hour, and as mentioned, guests stay in their vehicle the entire time. Tickets start at 49 dollars per vehicle, and for more information jurassicquest.com is the place to go. And

1	that concludes my report, and I'd like to wish everyone
2	happy holidays.
3	CEO RICHARDS: Thank you, Joan. I've got to
4	really hand it to our promoters who are doing such a
5	fabulous job of turning their their events that used
6	to be inside buildings into wonderful drive through
7	experience for our communities. So rest assured we'll
8	continue to have some great entertainment at the OC Fair
9	& Event Center. So that concludes my CEO update.
10	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Does any board member

12	item is matters of public comment. Michele, would you
13	introduce the matters of public comment for me please?
14	CEO RICHARDS: I would be happy to. Public
15	comment is allowed on issues not on the current agenda.
16	However, no debate by the Board shall be permitted on
17	such public comments and no action will be taken on such
18	public comment items at this time, as law requires
19	formal public notice prior to any action on a docket
20	item.
21	Speakers are requested to sign in prior to the
22	start of the meeting and are limited to three minutes.
23	Comments will be accepted on agenda items during the
24	meeting. Speakers wishing to address the Board on items
25	on the agenda are requested to sign in prior to the

1	start of the meeting and identify the agenda items on
2	which you desire to address the Board. Speakers are
3	limited to three minutes.
4	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Summer, could you
5	announce the first three speakers, please.
6	SECRETARY ANGUS: Yes. We actually only have
7	four, so it's Cindy Massaro followed by Kellie Avakian,
8	Todd Martin, and Lisa Sabo. Cindy, when you're ready.
9	CINDY MASSARO: Yes. Good morning. Good
10	morning Orange County Fair Board. Thank you for your
11	service to our community and making our fairgrounds a
12	place of pride in our city, county, and state. I, too,
13	want to thank you for how you have adjusted and worked
14	events in different ways to try to make our fairgrounds
15	useful during this time of shutdown, so thank you and
16	good job on that.
17	Flying at the Orange County fairgrounds is our
18	United States of America national flag, our state of
19	California flag, and the Orange County fairgrounds flag.
20	Additionally, one other flag is also flown year-round,
21	the LGBTQ pride flag. This flag is being flown
22	year-round, not just during pride month.
23	Over a year ago, this board decided to fly this
24	one particular special interest flag to make people that

this flag represents feel included and welcome.

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However, there are other groups that would also like to be recognized and feel included and welcomed by having their flags flown.

It seems right, fair, welcoming, and inclusive to recognize these other groups' flags as well. If only one single special interest flag is flown, other groups will feel disenfranchised if their flags are not also recognized. I am glad to hear that the community affairs -- committee -- excuse me -- is planning on taking up this flag issue, but I am concerned about how long this could take given that the diversity committee was formed and dissolved before accomplishing any projects.

And six months has passed without even an agenda item or discussion being held on this flag issue. I am asking the Board to resolve this today. I know you cannot take up issues and resolve them today, but my resolution I'm asking for is for you to take up the issue, put it on your agenda for next month, and resolve to remove this one special interest flag until the community affairs committee acts.

I look forward to a fair and equitable resolution to fly other groups' flags for equal and fair inclusion or simply removing any and all special interests flags. Thank you.



1	SECRETARY ANGUS: Thank you, Cindy. Kellie
2	Avakian, when you're ready.
3	KELLIE AVAKIAN: Thank you. I agree with the
4	caller before me. I have noticed that there's an
5	American flag at the fairgrounds, there's the State of
6	California, and the LGBT flag. And we've been taking up
7	this issue for six months. I have kids who are highly
8	involved in the fairgrounds especially during the Fair,
9	Imaginology, like, every event possible. They're
10	involved with Future Farmers of America. I think the
11	fairgrounds should represent that.
12	My kids are involved with 4-H, the fairgrounds
13	should represent that. My kid, my oldest, was one of
14	the USA representatives to compete in a world
15	championship because she did the equestrian sport
16	vaulting at the fairgrounds. So she has a title from
17	USEF, which is United States Equestrian Federation and a
18	medal from FEI, which is the global horse flag, horse
19	symbol. So I really feel like you guys need to start
20	flying other flags, especially ones that represent our
21	community, especially ones that represent the
22	fairgrounds for the least of it.
23	My kids are also involved with sports and
24	highly involved in the community, so I feel like we need
25	to start having all the flags flown and not just the

1	particular LGBT one because I know we're a whole entire
2	family of inclusion, and I would like the resolution to
3	take this up on the agenda because six months has passed
4	and I, too, am concerned how long this is going to go
5	on. So when my kids hear me on the phone calls, month
6	after month after month sill not getting their flags put
7	up that represents them that have to do with the
8	fairgrounds, it's a little concerning to show them,
9	yeah, I guess nothing does get done in city council.
10	I'm not sure because this has been six of just a simple,
11	simple issue or resolution to this. Thank you.
12	SECRETARY ANGUS: Thank you, Kellie. Todd
13	Martin, when you're ready.
14	TODD MARTIN: Hello. Hi. Good morning. Thank
15	you guys for being here so early to hear us out. I know
16	this is kind of a busy time of year, and I know you guys
17	are carving into your free time, so I appreciate it. I
18	can definitely echo what was said by Cindy and Kellie,
19	in regards to for me I feel frustrated because I
20	don't feel included, you know, like we're supposed to -
21	this is supposed to be an inclusive kind of thing in
22	flying the flags.
23	And I, too, know of a number of different
24	organizations I know there's many religious
25	organizations throughout our city that would love to fly

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1	a flag and very passionate about it, and I agree. And I
2	feel the same way. I would love to feel included in
3	that respect, and the fact that nothing has been done
4	as, you know, Cindy and Kellie said, and I agree it's
5	frustrating to see us bring this up over and over again
6	and not be addressed in any way, shape, or form.
7	And I'm wondering why. So if there is a true
8	spirit of inclusion here, that's what you guys are
9	shooting for, and I'd like to see that, with actions and
10	not just us showing up every month or so or whatever it
11	is to share our opinions, again, and ask for some kind
12	of action. So please consider this and put this on our
13	next meeting so we can discuss it and move forward.
14	Thank you very much.
15	SECRETARY ANGUS: Thank you, Todd. Lisa Sabo,
16	when you're ready.
17	Summer?
18	LISA SABO: Okay. Are you there?
19	SECRETARY ANGUS: Go ahead, Lisa.
20	LISA SABO: Okay. Well, thank you, everyone,
21	for taking my call. I want to read into the record a
22	letter that we put together from the Orange County
23	Fairgrounds Preservation Society.
24	Dear OC fairgrounds Board members, CEO, and the
25	fairgrounds staff, throughout the history of the Orange

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County Fairgrounds Preservation Society, we have consistently aspired to a open, gainful, sharing of ideas with the OC EC's executive team, fair staff, stakeholders, and most importantly the Orange County fairgrounds community.

We all share the passion for this amazing public treasure that has been a part of our lives for decades. As 2020 ends, we collectively reflect on these past many months. We would be remiss if we are not to extend our most sincere gratitude for the ongoing commitment to transparency and public participation process in helping shape the future.

We are pleased with the choice of technology used at the public meetings during the pandemic -- has allowed public to participate in realtime. And, so thank you so much and then one last little thing that I want to say is we had a little problem with the fire in the canyons a few weeks ago. And in the next month, we need to continue to work on the fairgrounds, opening the great gates when people come in the middle of the night to be rescued by the fire.

But that's a big issue on the side, and Gibran Stout has done a great job communicating, I think, with Michele and the staff and coming up with a plan that helps the evacuation side of the Orange County fairgrounds to become better. And I want to be a part of the solution, not a part of the problem. So when there is a fire, we need to be able to let horses and animals and livestock onto the property.

8	consent calendar. Michele, would you please read the
9	the overview of the consent calendar?
10	CEO RICHARDS: All matters listed under consent
11	calendar are operational matters about which the Board
12	has governing policies implementation of which is
13	delegated to the CEO. They will be enacted in one
14	motion. There will be no discussion of these items
15	prior to the time the Board of Directors votes on the
16	motion, unless members of the board, staff, or public
17	request specific items to be discussed separately and/or
18	removed from this section.
19	Any member of the public who wishes to discuss
20	consent calendar items should notify the Chair of the
21	Board at the time requested and be recognized by the
22	invitation of the Board to address the Board.
23	Vice Chair La Belle, staff does have would
24	like to clarify two items on the consent calendar, but
25	I'll stop to see if anyone else has any items that

they'd like to pull.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Does the Board have any items that they would like to pull from the consent calendar? Okay. With that, Michele, why don't you go through the two items that you wanted to speak with -- or speak to.

CEO RICHARDS: Sure. There are two items that have been deleted from the agenda under standard agreements SA-00621-SM that is the standard agreement for the contractor who assists us with sound monitoring and mitigation. That contact is a result of a competitive FRP process, but there has been a protest file on that RFP.

So as soon as we get a decision or further direction from the Department of General Services who will be reviewing that protest, we will leave that standard agreement unauthorized, and we'll bring it back to the Board at such time that a decision has been rendered on that protest.

Under rental agreements, Item 9B, Rental

Agreement R-12520 was scratched from the consent

calendar. This is a very small and simple rental

agreement for a camping space in conjunction with the

Night of Lights. It's a camping space that a member of

the staff has -- has rented. Unfortunately, because of

1	the recent executive order from the Governor's office,
2	we learned that camping was not permitted, and so we
3	deleted that from the agenda.
4	However, the Orange County Health Care Agency
5	clarified and approved that one camping spot, so we
6	will bring that back on the agenda the consent
7	calendar for January for approval. And that's all we
8	have.
9	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele. Are
10	there any members of the public that have items that
11	they would like to have pulled from the consent
12	calendar?
13	SECRETARY ANGUS: I don't have anybody that was
14	identified earlier, unless there's anybody now.
15	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Summer. With
16	that, and with Michele's items that she is pulling, do
17	we have a motion to approve the consent calendar?
18	DIRECTOR CERVANTES: This is Sandra Cervantes.
19	I so move that we approve the consent calendar.
20	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I second.
21	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. We have a motion
22	and a second. Summer, could you please call the roll?
23	SECRETARY ANGUS: Vice Chair La Belle?
24	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
25	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Cervantes?



1	DIRECTOR CERVANTES: Yes.
2	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Ruiz?
3	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
4	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Bagneris?
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
6	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Aitken?
7	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
8	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Pham?
9	DIRECTOR PHAM: Yes.
10	SECRETARY ANGUS: And Director Kovacevich?
11	DIRECTOR KOVACEVICH: Yes.
12	SECRETARY ANGUS: Thank you.
13	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Summer. Okay.
14	We'll now move on to the next portion of the agenda,
15	which would be the governance process. We do have
16	various committee reports. These are just advisory back
17	to the full board.
18	I would like to go ahead and start out with
19	the the Leadership Committee, the Chair, myself, and
20	Michele met yesterday with Rick Hansen, who is the
21	operator of the equestrian center and has been the
22	operator for a number of years. Purpose of that meeting
23	was to just begin a process of getting an update on what
24	is occurring at the equestrian center.
25	I would add at this point, as I've mentioned on

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several occasions, and the Board has also, that the equestrian center is a very important part of the Event Center, and we are wanting to look towards doing what we can to expand it -- it's outreach into the community.

Right now it is a -- essentially a boarding facility that, you know, has various training activities occurring onsite, all of which is good, but we're wanting to, as a committee, to look at what we can do to incorporate the equestrian center into the various promotion -- or production things that we do as a Fair and Events Center.

Mainly, Imaginology and the annual fair so that we could expand and get as much community involvement in terms of knowing what we have there, what the resources there, and in that regard, we are going to move forward with a modeling study, if you will, in terms of what the various options are for the Board to ultimately consider.

We are very fortunate in having an individual that has extensive knowledge of the Orange County Fair & Event Center operations and is also involved in equestrian activities. I think he's familiar to all of us and that would be Doug Lofstrom. Michele has reached out to Doug to see if he would be willing to assist us over the next several months in looking at various

1	modeling options the would be available to the Fair
2	board.
3	The committee intends to continue engaging with
4	Rick Hansen as well as other stakeholders, and our
5	objective is within the next three to four months to be
6	bringing back to the Board for policy direction various
7	options relative to the equestrian center.
8	And with that, that would conclude my comments.
9	I'd be happy to answer any questions and I'm sure
10	Michele would as well that the Board may have at this
11	time.
12	No questions? Okay. Let's move on to the
13	Financial Monitoring Committee. Newton or Barbara, any
14	comments that you would like to make at this point?
15	DIRECTOR PHAM: Yeah. So the committee's been
16	rejiggered to the Financial Monitoring and Audit
17	Committee at this point. We did review the financials
18	with staff last week. Overall, you know, I think the
19	sentiment is, you know, we we're tracking a budget
20	but actually it slightly improved, as Michele stated
21	earlier.
22	You know, the budget reforecast is indicating a
23	net deficit of 16.7 million by the end of this year
24	which is a, you know, 1.8 million dollar improvement
25	from the, you know, the prior reforecast in May. You

1	know, we're projecting cash balance at the end of the
2	year to be at 40.8 million. We also reviewed the 2019
3	draft audit. You know, overall results of the audit
4	were were positive. There was one recommendation for
5	an MDNA or management discussion analysis report, which
6	is typical and wasn't necessarily and historically been
7	done.
8	You know, the committee did make the
9	recommendation that we should incorporate this, but just
10	trying to get a sense of what the check list will be at
11	this point in time whether we want to, you know,
12	integrate into this current, you know, 2019 audit or do
13	it on a go-forward basis. And that concludes my report.
14	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Newton.
15	Ashleigh, do you have any comments on behalf of the
16	Facilities Committee at this time?
17	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I think Chair Ruiz is going
18	to give an update on our meeting.
19	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Very good.
20	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Hi. Good morning. Yeah we had
21	a really good meeting last week and we discussed some of
22	the state contract policy codes that we are going to
23	adopt and introduce to the Board next month. We believe
24	this language that is to the State of California will
25	work for us here at the fairgrounds and it'll work for

1	any contractor who's going to be bidding work on our
2	site.
3	Again, it was a very productive meeting, and we
4	hope to introduce that language in the meeting in
5	January and hopefully, you know, wrap that up in in
6	January. Again, I want to thank Director Aitken for
7	being there as part of that meeting and looking forward
8	to the meeting in January to get this done.
9	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Robert. In
10	terms of the Governance Committee, Sandra, do you have
11	any comments at this time?
12	DIRECTOR CERVANTES: Not at this time. Thank
13	you.
14	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Sandra. The
15	Community Fairs Committee. Nick? Any any update
16	that you would like to provide at this time?
17	DIRECTOR KOVACEVICH: Actually, I'll let
18	Director Ruiz go first, and I'll follow up after that.
19	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Sure.
20	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay.
21	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Sure. Thank you, Nick. Thank
22	you, Nick. Yeah. We met on December the 4th with the
23	staff, and we had, again, another great meeting. And we
24	talked about gathering input from the the initiatives
25	that we want to take on. And so what we are going to do

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is we're going to conduct a survey of the general public regarding what issues they want to bring to this committee.

What we did is we -- we checked around the idea of -- of getting the public involved, being more transparent. And so we wanted to -- we want to conduct a public Zoom meetings starting January, hopefully January 20th at 4:00 p.m. We're going to be announcing that. That will generate more from input from the general public.

One of the issues that we do plan to take on is the flag issue. We're finally going to do that, but we want to get input, more input, from the public when we start having this public meeting in January. We want to discuss other issues as well, and some of the other topics that we discuss that we plan to address would be having to lead this place, address this property.

First, the flags. We're going to discuss that come January. We also discussed diversity, equality, inclusion at the -- at the fairgrounds. One that would include special cultural days, like cultural exhibits, food offerings, and things of that nature, and entertainment as well. Interest by the public has been great, and as so, we plan to include them as part of our committee meetings, as well as district employees.

So we hope to have a lot of public input in
this because, again, we do want to address very
important issues. We don't want to keep kicking the can
of flag thing, you know, down the road. We want to take
on that, and we plan on doing that starting the new
year.

So having said that, I look forward to the meeting coming in January, the public meeting. It should be very informative, and I hope -- we hope to get a lot of input from the public as well. Director Kovacevich, unless you have something else to add?

DIRECTOR KOVACEVICH: No. I think you did a great job of explaining the events. I hope everybody understands that there's challenges with, you know, sometimes process flow, we experienced that with the original formation of the committee, and, you know, that kind of caused the delay.

So I hope everyone understands that the Board and the committee is committed to addressing these important issues in a timely fashion. We were delayed, but it feels good to now be on the right track. If you do want to share additional input on these issues, such as the flag issue, you'll be seeing a survey coming, as Director Ruiz mentioned, and we would really appreciate everyone's insight in completing that survey.



And then also, further discussion at the public
meeting, as Director Ruiz mentioned, on January 20th.
Again, we would welcome your input. And then after
gathering that input from a broad base of the public and
also the staff, at that point we'll be able to take the
action that everybody is looking for. So, again, there
are other important issues outside the flag. I think
we're going to be addressing those too. So a lot going
to happen in the new year. Hope everybody is ready.
And Director Ruiz and myself are certainly excited to
push this along, so thank you.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Nick and Robert. The Heroes Hall Veterans Foundation Board, Sandra and I are the Board's liaisons to the foundation. Just a quick update, as I mentioned at the last meeting, Sandy Stone has been retained by the Veterans Foundation to assist with fundraising efforts for us to again generate revenues that can come back into the Heroes Hall Veteran Museum for operating purposes and programming.

Nick Berardino, the president of the foundation has been very active in moving forward with a fundraising activity. I think probably most of you or all of you have received information on the activities underway. We are also in the process of doing some



1	modifications to our website to, you know, enhance our
2	ability to merge data bases together and to basically
3	expand our outreach.
4	I want to give a special thanks to Michele,
5	Joan, and Carole for their assistance with Sandy Stone
6	and Kathy Yach, in terms of helping to coordinate
7	getting the word out to as many individuals as we can.
8	I also wanted to indicate that I'm pleased to report
9	that the foundation board will be making a
10	recommendation to us at the January board meeting for an
11	additional appointment to the Heroes Hall Veterans
12	Foundation the individual is currently being interviewed
13	and discussed by the foundation, and I think we're going
14	to have a recommendation for the January board meeting.
15	With that, I have nothing further on that item.
16	And also, Sandra would you like to add anything in
17	additional in that area?
18	DIRECTOR CERVANTES: No not at this time.
19	Thank you so much.
20	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Sandra. Okay.
21	That would conclude the governance process. We'll now
22	move
23	SECRETARY ANGUS: I'm sorry, Vice Chair La
24	Belle. We do have two public speakers for this item for
25	the committee reports. Reggie Mundekis, followed by

Cindy Massaro. Reggie, when you're ready.

REGGIE MUNDEKIS: Hi. Good morning. This is
Reggie Mundekis. I'd just like to thank you for the new
committee structure and clarification of committee
expectations. I think this will be a great improvement
going forward.

I'd also like to thank the leadership committee for their work on the equestrian center issues. The Southern California area is seeing a change in the number and types of equestrian centers where equestrian activity is becoming less accessible to many people and certain groups, such as Western riding and the Hispanic riding groups being left out of the picture.

So I appreciate the work to do surveys and market research to find out what is viable going forward and how to build a better equestrian center. I appreciate the work of the Community Affairs Committee in doing a survey of the existing customers and looking to include more of our diversity community in the OC Fair both, in terms of entertainment, displays, and food.

I was curious to find out if you're doing outreach to the chambers of commerce and the different ethnic neighborhoods, like little Saigon and little Arabia to get input from those groups as far as what

they would like to participate in both, during the fair and year-round.

And then I'm finding this whole kerfuffle over the rainbow flag just very amusing. I'm -- I'm finding it really difficult how a flag that represents many, many people of all kinds and represents a group which has stood up for the rights of everyone all of a sudden is being seen as disenfranchisement of people and with that I would like to point out what that rainbow flag means to me.

It means that we are recognizing the many people who are members of the LGBTQ community who have suffered over the years. Among those is Lonnie Frisbee who helped to found Calvary Chapel and the Venue Church movement and was pushed out when he came out of the closet and has been written out of the history of it. And if you want to learn more about it there's a great documentary on Am- -- on Prime about Lonnie Frisbee. It's the same documentary that aired on (indiscernable) for a number of years.

So just remember that when I see that flag, I think of Lonnie Frisbee and the way he was treated by Calvary Chapel and the venue of churches and others. So thank you.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Reggie.



1	SECRETARY ANGUS: Cindy, when you're ready.
2	CINDY MASSARO: Yes. Thank you so much. I
3	really want to thank Director Bagneris who initially
4	brought up and voted against this flag being flown over
5	a year ago, and I want to thank Directors Kovacevich and
6	Ruiz for their commitment on taking up this issue both
7	on the Diversity Committee and now on this new
8	committee.
9	And so I want to thank you all for doing that.
10	I really look forward to a resolution. And I'm grateful
11	for the entire Board hearing us and taking up what is
12	important to us. Thank you.
13	SECRETARY ANGUS: Thank you. Vice Chair La
14	Belle, that's it for public comment.
15	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Summer. Just
16	to remind everyone that Item 10B, as Newton indicated,
17	is going to be carried over until the January board
18	meeting. With that, we'll move on to Item 10C, and I'll
19	turn it over to it's an information item, and I'll
20	turn it over to Michele Richards.
21	CEO RICHARDS: Thank you so much, Doug. As we
22	have done for the last several months, we want to keep
23	the public and the Board apprised of our Fair planning
24	activities for 2021. As we've mentioned before, it's a
25	very fluid process. One that we are staying in very

close contact with the Orange County Health Care Agency emerging directives from the state level, and as you all know, an ever-changing landscape out there.

So it's a challenge, but we're determined to bring something special about the Fair, whatever that looks like to the community in 2021. Let me start by summarizing the latest meeting that we had with Dr. Clayton Chau, who is the public health officer for Orange County. We met with Dr. Chau and another member of his staff last Friday, December 11th.

Dr. Chau indicated that the goal now is for the Orange County community to reach a 60 to 75 percent immunity level in order for the Fair to take place or for mass gatherings to return. And this is a bit of a revised number. Originally, it was a 65 to 80 percent immunity. But that's now been revised to 60 to 75 percent.

Dr. Chau believes that by late March we should know if the county is trending in the right direction, and that's going to be very helpful to the staff and the Board as a point of when we might be able to make that decision about whether we can move forward with the modified fair. We were also encouraged to learn from Dr. Chau based on the information he has regarding the vaccine distribution that by late spring, early

summer -- so he's saying by, you know, the May, very early June timeframe, everyone in Orange County will be able to get the vaccine.

So that was quite encouraging. He also asked for our help, and we most definitely agreed to help get the wording out in the market to encourage people to get the vaccine. So the Orange County Health Care Agency will be launching an information campaign and the OC Fair will do its part to help get that word out.

A few more interesting bits of information regarding our planning, our 2021 Fair admission prices, our team is recommending that that price remain the same, that there be no ticket increase. However, the OC Fair will be absorbing the fees for those advanced online orders so that the customer, even though we are insisting on advanced ticket sales only online for health and safety reasons, the customer will not have to pay those fees.

The OC Fair will absorb that and that way we can have ticket prices remain the same. This is a recommendation that we're going to bring back to the Board for approval in January. We are setting hours and days, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday will be considered our weekdays. We're suggesting being open from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. and then our weekends will



consist of Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.

And in our research, we've determined that Friday actually has as high a demand for attendance as Saturday and Sunday. So we'll lump that into a weekend, 10:00 a.m. to midnight. Our Fair Planning Committee is developing a go/no-go date recommendation for the Board so we'll be able to report on that in an upcoming board meeting so that everybody will understand the timing on when a decision will need to be made.

The staff is also dual-track planning for pivoting from a modified fair if those numbers don't -- are not tending where we need them to be by March that will be able to move from a modified Fair to a vehicle-based fair experience in the event that the in-person fair cannot be helped and that vehicle-base fair experience would look something like a very kicked up version of the Fair Food Drive Thru.

So there'll be lots of opportunities for people to enjoy Fair food, but there'll be components that include entertainment, exhibits, animals, et cetera, for people to enjoy. So rest assured there will be something from the OC Fair this summer. And, of course, we are continuing to work with RCS on ride lists and layouts and Dr. Chau and his staff are heavily involved in that, in advising us on what would work and what

| wouldn't work.

And then, of course, we're continuing regular meetings with Spectra having discussions on the food and beverage elements. One thing that we have made a decision on, and this is in consultation with Dr. Chau, is that walking around the Fair with, you know, as people are eating and drinking and needing to take off a mask for that purpose is not doable. And so we would create food and beverage gardens, seating areas large seating areas where people can sit and eat and they won't be meandering through the Fair with their mask off while they're enjoying their food.

So just a few updates that we have, and, of course, we'll continue to keep the Board and public apprised as we go along this journey. I'm happy to take any questions that the Board might have.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any questions from Board members? Summer, are there any public comments from the audience?

SECRETARY ANGUS: No. We don't have any for this item.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. I have just a couple of comments. I know we're all very hopeful and optimistic that the vaccines that are on the market and the ones that are coming to market very soon are going

to have a significant impact on the -- reducing the COVID-19 pandemic.

One of the things that I think we should be looking at kind of is plan C, if you will, and I am very comfortable with what Michele has outlined in terms of the Fair in the summer at it's normal time or the virtual drive through. I think as we get later in the year based upon the things that I read and hear, you know, by September, October, you know, obviously there are going to be more individuals that have been vaccinated, and the COVID-19 situation is going to be reduced, hopefully, accordingly.

I think plan C might be looking at a fair in late September, early to mid-October. And I guess I would ask Michele, is that something that is even feasible relative to the other operations that are going on out there? And if so, what should we be looking at to move forward with that as a third backup?

CEO RICHARDS: Certainly an option, and a good option as well, Doug. It does take a ton more coordination as, you know, there are other fairs and the routing of the carnival, and, you know, our food concessionaires and merchants, but it's certainly doable, you know, if we get to that point in March and it doesn't look like we're trending in the right



direction that we could, you know, we could recommend alternative dates.

We've already spoken with RCS about that possibility. We've thrown it out to the other larger fairs in Southern California so we're not stepping all over each other, but it's definitely a viable option, and one that, you know, we'll -- we'll continue to -- to consider as we move along in our planning.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Very good. And in that regard, I don't think we should spend a lot of time right now doing that, but perhaps, Dan and Lisa could be looking at options. I know we've moved a number of the performers in the Pac Amp have agreed or indicated that they would be willing to certainly perform in the Pacific Amphitheater in the summer months.

Maybe we could begin looking at what options might be available there and in The Hanger for later on in the year should that prove to be the most viable way to go. So I'll just -- that would conclude my comments. Are there any other thoughts the Board or the public might have at this point in time?

DIRECTOR CERVANTES: This is Sandra Cervantes.

And I just wanted to make a quick comment. Obviously,
with change there's always some amount of resistance.

One of the largest obstacles that I might see is that



now, if you're on a plane and you wear your mask, but if you're drinking something or eating something that they give you, you take your mask off. So the specific assigned areas for eating might need a lot of viability and exposure with a lot of time in advance in order for that to take place with the appropriate distancing but very, very doable.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Sandra. If there are no further comments, we'll move on to Item D, and that's a presentation by the CEO in terms of the budget letter for this year. Michele?

CEO RICHARDS: The Board suggested this last year. We completed a budget summary letter and wanted to continue that with this year. The -- the budget summary letter is a narrative, if you will, about the budget. So for those that maybe are not as comfortable reading detailed financial reports, this kind of puts in words what the budget is all about for 2021. So we have posted this, you know, copies are available for the Board, obviously, and then we posted the letter for the public as well.

The letter starts off with some operational highlights from 2020. That's kind of an interesting read, given all the challenges that we had going into this year. And then a narrative about the 2021 budget,



an overview of how it was built and specifically the assumptions that staff used to create the budget.

There's also a -- a statement that just as soon as the Board approved the budget in last month's meeting, and we know when the calendar flips over to January and that budget goes into effect that we will likely need to reforecast just as soon as the new year begins due to the ever-changing environment that we're currently operating in.

So I know I said it before, but I want to recommit that every month we will provide the Board with a reforecast of the budget as things are changing as we're able to come online with more and more events, generate more revenue, and then, of course, our efforts in controlling costs as well. And that way we'll be able to track all along the way how we're doing against budget.

The letter also includes an overview of our plan for our capital and major projects, and as you know, the list has greatly been reduced from previous years as we control costs and then try to focus on those items that are related to health and safety and security of the property. There is a spreadsheet that details the budget by department, if anyone's interested in that.

	And then just a summary where I certainly want

	And then also, to the public, we very much
	appreciate the public's involvement in the process of

	is an information item, but that letter is available to
	anyone who's interested in getting a little overview of
	the 2021 budget.
	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
	Summer, are there any public comments on this item?
	SECRETARY ANGUS: We have none.

VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you. Any -- any Board comments regarding the letter prepared by the CEO? I would just say that it's outstanding. I've, you know -- I find it very, very informative to be able to look back at words relating to the dollars and the budget, and I think it's a very useful document in terms of reminding all of us, the Board and the public, of what the budget process is, what it includes, what the

challenges are.

So I would extend my compliments to Michele and the staff for an excellent job in that regard. Okay.

Next item is Item E on the agenda. Relative to the RFP process, I would turn that over to CEO Richards for her report, and it is an action item.

CEO RICHARDS: It is an action item. So previously the Board had requested that all RFPs in the year be reviewed and approved by one of the board committees, the one most appropriate to whatever the topic happens to be. So review of that RFP before it's released. Staff is requesting that the Board reconsider this procedure and determine whether or not that procedure is still needed for the list of RFPs for 2021.

There are certain RFPs for which the staff will request the Board's review and approval because of the importance of that -- that service or the complexity of that service to our operations or the financial impact to the organization. But if you look at this list of anticipated RFPs for 2021, they are highly operational.

We want to be certainly conscientious of the Board's time, knowing that you're all working people, you know, and see if you're open for discussion on which, if any, RFPs the Board committees would like to be involved in. The one we absolutely want Board



1	involvement in the RFP process is the carnival.
2	Again, because of its financial impact, because
3	of the complexity of that RFP. But as you can see, the
4	others are very operational. So I'd like to maybe open
5	that up for discussion and input by the Board.
6	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public
7	comments relative to this item?
8	SECRETARY ANGUS: No, there are not.
9	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Board members, any
10	comments relative to what is being proposed by Michele?
11	DIRECTOR AITKEN: This is Director Aitken. I
12	really appreciate you bringing these to the forefront.
13	I think it's important not just for the Board, but for
14	the public to kind of be exposed to the process, not
15	everybody some people are very familiar with RFPs,
16	some people aren't. So especially with our larger ones,
17	just kind of explaining the process, not just to the
18	Board but to the public, I think is really helpful. So
19	I really appreciate you bringing this forward in such an
20	organized fashion.
21	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Ashleigh.
22	Nick, did you have a comment?
23	DIRECTOR KOVACEVICH: No. I just go ahead.
24	DIRECTOR RUIZ: I did.
25	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Robert. I'm sorry.

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DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yeah. Director Ruiz. I would
agree with Michele's presentation and her
recommendation, I think carnival is huge and we should
be involved, you know, we are all busy. I know I
probably wouldn't have the time to be involved in that.
I trust, you know, Michele and staff would do the right
and responsible thing, but I'm going to agree with that
I think carnival is pretty huge if you could have
someone of the board involved with that, that would be
great. So I I would agree with Michele's
recommendation.

DIRECTOR CERVANTES: Hi. This is Sandra

Cervantes. First, I have a question about how many RFPs are we talking about, give or take for the year? And if we're not looking at a huge amount, I would rather see some form of consistency. And if the approval needs to take place then let's be consistent and all of them get approved. If there's a million RFPs throughout the entire year then obviously it's a different story, but I'd love to see consistency.

All the Board deciding and the public having the information of, you know, what's important and what's not important because sometimes what's important and what's not important is a perceived interpretation of who's interpreting that information.



VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Sandra. A
couple of thoughts along that line. First of all, with
this being presented to the Board as a part of the
budget review process, first through the Financial
Monitoring and Audit Committee and then ultimately to
the full board, we're made clearly aware of the RFP as
staff is proposing to move forward with.

I think through that process, if an individual board member has a specific area that they would like to focus on, you know, we would have the opportunity to do that through the budget process. I sort of see it as kind of a two-fold process. We have operational issues. I personally would have no desire in being involved in the golf cart rental process.

And, you know, it's an operational issue that I think staff is very -- clearly, very, more capable of doing. We obviously have the opportunity before they start the process when this is presented to us in the budget and at the end of the process when we consider it as an action item on the agenda.

There are other areas that are policy related that are kind of more big picture sort of things, and obviously the carnival RFP is certainly one of those the entertainment RFP that Ashleigh and I participated in.

There are other things that will be coming forward that

1	are more policy related. I guess another good example
2	is the governance process and going through that RFP.
3	So I think if we can focus on the big picture
4	stuff, the policy issues, not only dollar amounts, but
5	things that have a significant potential impact
6	regardless of the dollar amount in terms of board
7	policy. Those would be the kind of things that I think
8	should come before us, and the other items, I think I
9	was one of the several board members that suggested that
10	we be apprised of these. And, you know, I'm very
11	comfortable with separating out the operation from the
12	policy areas.
13	And then obviously, an individual board member
14	who may have a particular interest or desire in a given
15	area, certainly has the opportunity to engage with the
16	CEO and staff to get comfortable with whatever that RFP
17	is.
18	(Multiple speakers at once.)
19	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
20	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes, Director La Belle.
21	This is Director Bagneris. I would agree wholeheartedly
22	with what you just stated, also Director Aitken, Ruiz.
23	I believe that these RPs, we do have opportunity to make
24	input as we go along. So let's just deal with the ones
25	that have the most impact that we might want to review

1	separately. So I would agree with what you just stated.
2	DIRECTOR CERVANTES: Well this is Sandra
3	Cervantes, and I so move that we move forward and
4	approve.
5	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Is there a second?
6	DIRECTOR AITKEN: This is Ashleigh. Second.
7	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. The motion then
8	would be to move forward with the recommendation from
9	the CEO that operational issues be handled by staff, big
10	picture policy issues be addressed by the Board and if
11	there's a specific area that an individual board member
12	is interested in, they can obviously reach out to the
13	CEO for for input and guidance. Is that the essence
14	of the motion? Everybody good with that?
15	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes, I am.
16	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Summer, if we're
17	ready Summer, can you take roll please?
18	SECRETARY ANGUS: Vice Chair La Belle?
19	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
20	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Cervantes?
21	DIRECTOR CERVANTES: Yes.
22	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Ruiz?
23	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
24	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Bagneris?
25	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.



1	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Aitken?
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
3	SECRETARY ANGUS: Director Pham?
4	DIRECTOR PHAM: Yes.
5	SECRETARY ANGUS: And Director Kovacevich?
6	DIRECTOR KOVACEVICH: Yes.
7	SECRETARY ANGUS: Thank you.
8	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, that brings us to
9	the end of the agenda, and at this point in time, I'd
10	like to afford each of the directors the opportunity to
11	make any final comments. And following that, we will
12	adjourn to our January 28th board meeting. Let's start
13	with Director Aitken, any comments?
14	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Thank you so much. Just
15	wanted to wish everybody a happy holiday season, and
16	stay safe. I can't wait for this year to be over. I
17	think that our staff has done such as an amazing job as
18	have my fellow board members in being able to pivot,
19	being able to navigate, being able to really just be
20	creative. I've been so impressed with everybody on this
21	board, and then the staff for all their hard work and
22	really just dedication to this amazing endeavor that
23	we're all a part of, so with that, thank you. And happy
24	holidays everyone.
25	VICE CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Ashleigh.

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1	Director Bagneris?
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes. I would just like to
3	wish everybody a Happy Hanukkah, Merry Christmas, Feliz
4	Navidad, Kwanzaa, whatever you celebrate. Have an

6	the staff, all of the staff at the fairgrounds. This
