

9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. We're going to begin
10	the meeting. Michele, can you do the call to order,
11	please.
12	MS. RICHARDS: I will.
13	All matters noticed on this agenda in any
14	category may be considered for action as listed.
15	Any item not so noticed may not be
16	considered.
17	Items listed on this agenda may be
18	considered in any order at the discretion of the
19	Chairperson.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
21	The mission of the OC Fair & Events Center
22	is creating equitable community access to
23	agriculture, entertainment, culture, and
24	educational experiences.
25	With that, Robert, can I get you to lead



1	us in the pledge?
2	(Pledge of allegiance.)
3	CHAIR LA BELLE: Jeff, could you call the
4	roll, please.
5	MR. WILLSON: Chair La Belle?
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Here.
7	MR. WILLSON: Vice chair Pham?
8	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Here.
9	MR. WILLSON: Director Rubalcava?
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Here.
11	MR. WILLSON: Director Cervantes?
12	(No response.)
13	MR. WILLSON: Director Ruiz?
14	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Here.
15	MR. WILLSON: Director Bagneris?
16	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Here.
17	MR. WILLSON: Director Aitken?
18	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Here.
19	MR. WILLSON: Director Kovacevich?
20	(No response.)
21	MR. WILLSON: And Director Rafiei?
22	(No response.)
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Jeff.
24	I'd like to make kind of an opening
25	statement.

1	We were advised last Friday, May the 20th,
2	that Director Rafiei had submitted her resignation
3	to the governor's office effective immediately.
4	Pursuant to Board Policy 3.01 and 3.05,
5	the Chair has the prerogative of setting the
6	agenda, and I will be not scheduling any further
7	review of the cannabis policy until after the 2020
8	fair.
9	And with that, I'd like to ask Director
10	Bagneris.
11	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Good morning, everyone.
12	In light of what's been going on across the country,
13	Buffalo, New York; Laguna Woods, California; and now
14	Uvalde, Texas, we would like to take a minute just to
15	have a moment of silence for all the lives that were
16	lost from this gun violence that we've been
17	experiencing.
18	So if you would, retract for a minute
19	and while we're in silence.
20	(Moment of silence.)
21	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: You know, we're
22	concerned about our community, but we are all a
23	community together across this country, so continue
24	to keep those families in our prayers.
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Barbara.

1	The next item on the agenda is the minutes
2	of the April 28th board meeting.
3	Are there any corrections, additions, or
4	is there a motion?
5	DIRECTOR AITKEN: So moved, Chair.
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Barbara Bagneris. I
7	second.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Jeff, can you call the
9	roll, please?
10	MR. WILLSON: Chair La Belle?
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
12	MR. WILLSON: Vice chair Pham?
13	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Abstain.
14	MR. WILLSON: Director Rubalcava?
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Abstain. I was
16	not present.
17	MR. WILLSON: Director Ruiz?
18	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Also abstain. I was not
19	present.
20	MR. WILLSON: Director Bagneris?
21	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
22	MR. WILLSON: And Director Aitken?
23	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Michele, can you introduce
25	matters of the public comment, please?



1	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Public comment is
2	allowed on issues not on the current agenda.
3	However, no debate by the board shall be permitted as
4	such public comments, and no action will be taken on
5	such public comment items at this time, as law
6	requires formal public notice prior to any action on
7	a docket item.
8	Speakers are requested to fill out and
9	submit a comment card to the meeting secretary
10	prior to the start of the meeting and are limited
11	to three minutes.
12	Comments will be accepted on all other
13	agenda items at the time each item is listed on the
14	agenda.
15	Speakers wishing to address the board on
16	items on the agenda are requested to fill out and
17	submit a comment card to the meeting secretary
18	prior to the start of the meeting and identify the
19	agenda item or items on which you desire to address
20	the board.
21	Speakers are limited to three minutes.
22	And at this point, we have no cards for
23	public comment unless no. We're good.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
25	The next item is the consent calendar.

1	Does staff or any of the directors have
2	any items they wish to pull?
3	MS. RICHARDS: Staff does not have an item
4	to pull, but rather one to highlight.
5	On page 4 of your consent calendar and
6	in my hands is a signed, sealed, delivered LOU
7	agreement with OC Animal Care for the use of
8	property the property during emergencies for the
9	evacuation of animals.
10	So that is about two years in the making.
11	I just wanted to highlight we've got it now.
12	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Thank you.
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
14	Okay. Is there a motion regarding the
15	there being no speakers, is there a motion
16	regarding the consent calendar?
17	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I'll so move, Chair.
18	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Second.
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: We have a motion and
20	second.
21	Any discussion?
22	(No response.)
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: Hearing none, Jeff, can you
24	call the roll, please?
25	MR. WILLSON: Chair La Belle?



1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
2	MR. WILLSON: Vice chair Pham?
3	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Yes.
4	MR. WILLSON: Director Rubalcava?
5	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
6	MR. WILLSON: Director Ruiz?
7	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
8	MR. WILLSON: Director Bagneris?
9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
10	MR. WILLSON: And Director Aitken?
11	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. That takes us to the
13	governance process, Item 8A.
14	What I would like to do is have in the
15	past, had a presentation from staff on the agenda
16	item. Obviously during the presentation, directors
17	are encouraged to ask any questions they might have
18	for clarification.
19	Following that, we will get public
20	comments and then bring it back to the board for
21	action.
22	In this case, since the Heroes Hall
23	Veterans Foundation provided all the funding for
24	the three concepts, I'm going to take the Chair's
25	prerogative and assume they are the applicant and

1	let them make comments on behalf of the foundation
2	in advance of public comments.
3	So with that, Michele?
4	MS. RICHARDS: Very good. All right.
5	In response to ongoing drainage issues on
6	the east side of the Pacific Amphitheater berm
7	that's the area that borders Heroes Hall our
8	landscaping team our internal landscaping team
9	developed a proposal for a potential solution which
10	would involve creating a veterans serenity walk.
11	That project was initially listed on the
12	capital projects list for 2024 during the budget
13	process. The idea was presented to the Heroes Hall
14	Veterans Foundation with a request to consider
15	funding the project.
16	At the board meeting held on
17	December 16th, the board considered a request to
18	move that proposed serenity walk from the 2024
19	capital projects list to 2022 with an offer from
20	the foundation to contribute \$100,000 to the
21	project.
22	And the board voted to move that project
23	to the facilities committee to explore the proposed
24	idea in more detail and then provide the board with
25	more information.

1	So without incurring any costs, staff
2	engaged the California Construction Authority, CCA,
3	who developed an estimate of \$30,920 for CCA to
4	provide administrative services and work with a
5	landscape architect to develop a scope of work.
6	And the board also gave direction to have
7	three conceptual designs for the project developed.
8	And then in an effort to move the project
9	forward sooner, the foundation agreed to pay the
10	cost of that LOU in the amount of \$30,920, and that
11	was approved by the board.
12	So we have staff has worked with CCA
13	and the landscape architect to develop three design
14	concepts at 30 percent completion, one at around
15	300,000, a second approximately 400,000, and a
16	third at 500,000, as requested by the board.
17	And so I'm going to go through those three
18	concept drawings right now. All three of the
19	options contain the following elements: They all
20	contain solutions for those ongoing drainage issues
21	that we're having in that area.
22	They all contain a plan to either repair
23	or replace the Pacific Amphitheater berm fencing.
24	They all contain an area to honor service dogs, and

they all contain special plantings to honor Purple

1	Heart recipients. So I'll go to the drawings.
2	Now, let me give you an orientation. If
3	you look to the right, that's actually facing
4	north. Heroes Hall is facing south. So to get the
5	drawing as large as possible, we turned it, but the
6	structure to the right is the restroom on the Plaza
7	Pacifica area.
8	You see the Sky Hawk, and then to the left
9	of that is the Walk of Honor and the Medal of Honor
10	courtyard.
11	So in the in Option 1, this is the
12	minimal option it includes a decomposed granite
13	pathway. And you'll see that as the tan area,
14	colored. It includes minimal trees and shrubs and
15	other landscaping, and it does not include any
16	additional Walk of Honor monuments.
17	So you can see the additional trees and
18	shrubs along the decomposed granite walkway; okay?
19	And that walkway goes from the restroom
20	area on the north end all the way down, you know,
21	across the Sky Hawk, and then it ends in that area
22	that for that one side entrance to the Pacific
23	Amphitheater.
24	And please, anyone, stop me if you have

questions at this point.

1	Option 2 let's look at that drawing.
2	And this concept was around 400,000. And, again,
3	these are not cost estimates, but they were
4	parameters that were given to the landscape
5	architect.
6	This pathway goes in the same direction.
7	It includes everything from Option 1 with a few
8	additions, a pathway of pavers. And you can see
9	that the serenity walk itself now matches the
10	pavers that are part of the Sky Hawk area.
11	Very nice addition. It includes an entry
12	monument.
13	Let me see if I this doesn't have a
14	pointer, does it? Maybe. No. No.
15	There's an entry monument, and you'll see
16	that on the far right of the pathway, entering from
17	that western walkway, it includes an entry
18	monument. It also includes along the way seven
19	additional Walk of Honor or monuments and six
20	additional pillars along the fence line. And I'll
21	show you what those look like in a minute.
22	So it gives us the opportunity to add 13
23	additional Walk of Honor monuments. And it
24	includes increased landscaping, increased trees,
25	shrubbery, and the other floral plantings.

1	Then Option Number 3 that's the
2	high-end option. This one, you can see the path is
3	a little wider in areas where it includes some
4	seating areas, beverage areas. It includes
5	lighting all along the path. It includes a wall
6	that will conceal the back-of-house area near the
7	restrooms. It includes a waterfall feature, and
8	that is in the area sorry. I wish I had a
9	pointer.
LO	Thank you, Ken.
L1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Ken is the pointer.
L2	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Ken is the pointer.
L3	He's been appointed the pointer. Yes. Right there.
L4	Do you want to point out the wall? Why
L5	don't you stay up there, too?
L6	Yes. The wall that would hide the
L7	back-of-house area.
L8	It includes the water feature wall right
L9	there (indicating). It includes a seating area
20	near the waterfall. It includes nine additional
21	Walk of Honor monuments along the path.
22	And those are kind of spread throughout
23	the path, with 11 additional pillars as part of the
24	fence line. And then this option also includes
25	benches along the way.

1	So the next steps along this project would
2	include entering into LOU Number 2 with CCA to
3	finalize the plans and specifications to develop a
4	bid package and put the project out to bid, then
5	award the project and begin construction.
6	If approved, that construction could begin
7	as early as mid-October.
8	So I'll stop there to answer any
9	questions.
LO	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I have a
L1	question.
L2	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
L3	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Can you explain
L4	more about the drainage issue? Because that's new to
L5	me. I didn't realize that that was an issue.
L6	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. I can have Ken add
L7	detail, but there's always been a drainage issue in
L8	that area, as water flows off the berm, you know,
L9	into the Heroes Hall area.
20	So the idea of the hardscaping and
21	landscaping was to create a solution for that, and
22	it was proposed that it add a feature to Heroes
23	Hall.
24	So I don't know if you have anything else
2.5	to add.



1	MR. KARNS: So I'll tax your memory for when
2	the business development area was over there, and
3	when you walked over there, it always was soggy and
4	wet and had some flooding issues coming off the berm.
5	This will give us some opportunity to do
6	some underground construction and tie in and take
7	that water.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And that was
9	flooding from watering the berm area?
10	MR. KARNS: Primarily.
11	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: With the
12	governor's new conservation initiatives, will that
13	resolve the issue? Because technically that would
14	fall into an ornamental area; right?
15	MR. KARNS: So we hope to find the balance.
16	As you know, we have that great berm initiative,
17	which is going quite well, but I don't see that berm
18	going back to just being brown dirt, so but having
19	the balance of sustainable California growth,
20	drought-tolerant, but with a little bit of watering.
21	But even with minimal watering, the issue would be
22	there.
23	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So I have a question.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Barbara?
25	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: For that issue, did we

1	ever put that in the capital plan, to fix that drain
2	problem? We hadn't decided we were going to fix that
3	before we looked at this? Or that was the reason we
4	looked at this?
5	MS. RICHARDS: This oh. Sorry.
6	MR. KARNS: Go ahead.
7	MS. RICHARDS: Well, obviously it's been an
8	ongoing issue, and looking at a solution for that
9	issue, this was proposed.
LO	CHAIR LA BELLE: That was the genesis of
L1	this.
L2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And the cost to fix that
L3	problem initially was how much?
L4	MS. RICHARDS: I'd have to the initial
L5	cost?
L6	MR. KARNS: We would have to separate that
L7	out, Barbara.
L8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And just to kind
L9	of build off of Director Bagneris, so when we this
20	became an issue, the drainage issue, we put it into
21	2024?
22	MS. RICHARDS: Correct. No, not when it
23	became a drainage issue. When it became a serenity
24	walk.
25	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Part of the

1	solution for serenity walk, that's still allocated
2	for 2024?
3	MS. RICHARDS: Right. I mean, obviously the
4	drainage issue was going to need to be addressed, but
5	the idea of using a serenity walk as the solution was
6	originally on the 2024 capital list.
7	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Okay.
8	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Can you go back to the
9	first slide before Option 1?
LO	MS. RICHARDS: Uh-huh. This one
L1	(indicating)?
L2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: No. The next one.
L3	MS. RICHARDS: Okay.
L4	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So that Pacific
L5	Amphitheater berm fence repair/replacement, was that
L6	in the plan as well, in the capital plan to do
L7	something at that time?
L8	MS. RICHARDS: I don't believe so, no.
L9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So all of this happened
20	because we want to do this serenity walk, all of the
21	listing here of the four?
22	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Those with the
23	exception of the first bullet. The solution for the
24	ongoing drainage issues, this is this is one
25	creative solution for that.

1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And so the initial
2	capital amount that we were going to spend in 2024
3	was how much?
4	MS. RICHARDS: I don't know that there was
5	an estimate done that was that didn't include the
6	serenity walk.
7	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: No. No. But
8	the serenity walk, what did we have that for in 2024?
9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: In 2024. Was it 300-?
LO	Was it 400-? Was it 500-?
L1	MS. RICHARDS: I think that was 200-, wasn't
L2	it?
L3	MR. KARNS: I will get that.
L4	CHAIR LA BELLE: I think initially it was
L5	300
L6	MS. RICHARDS: 3-?
L7	CHAIR LA BELLE: And then we expanded to the
L8	three concepts, based upon the foundation providing
L9	the funding for everything you see on the board
20	there has been paid for by the Heroes Hall Veterans
21	Foundation.
22	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Right. All these plans.
23	And did they give us 100,000 as well to award the
24	serenity walk? Where did I see the 100,000?
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: Their initial offer to the

1	district was to contribute 100,000. They have
2	contributed now 30,000. I can't speak to what their
3	current thought process is, but I'm sure the
4	foundation president can.
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So it was 100,000 less
6	the 30- now?
7	CHAIR LA BELLE: Less the 30
8	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Because I'm trying to
9	get to: Which concept do I like financially; right?
10	Because we had planned this out for 2024, if we're
11	going to bring it in early. What is that financial
12	impact?
13	And maybe the foundation would be willing
14	to kick in another 100,000, and maybe we can do the
15	500,000 plan. That's where my thinking is right
16	now, trying to figure that all out.
17	CHAIR LA BELLE: Good question. And I think
18	President Berardino can, you know, respond to that
19	when he makes his comments.
20	I have some questions, but I would prefer
21	to wait until we bring it back to the board so we
22	can have a dialogue. I'd like to hear what the
23	foundation
24	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Chair La Belle, can I just
25	ask for a clarification for the public.

1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Sure.
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: When we talk about cost at
3	30 percent completion, what does that mean vis-a-vis
4	final costs?
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, it
6	DIRECTOR AITKEN: We're not saying that it's
7	30 percent we're not saying that it's 300,000 to
8	get us 30 percent completed. I just think that it's
9	worded a little bit
10	CHAIR LA BELLE: As a generalist manager, I
11	will comment, which often gets me in trouble, but my
12	understanding is that the three conceptual drawings
13	we have are basically 30 percent completed. Whatever
14	one the board ultimately decides, another 70 percent
15	of the engineering work needs to take place before we
16	can do the bid.
17	Is that correct?
18	MR. KARNS: Generally correct.
19	MS. RICHARDS: Perfect.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: Got that right? Okay.
21	Yeah.
22	So 30 percent means the drawings and the
23	work they've done now doesn't need to be
24	duplicated, but obviously they need to put bid
25	packages together, inspections, need to work with

1	CCA, need to get the fine details put together so
2	the project can be, you know, bid.
3	And that's I think Michele indicated
4	the time frame subject to whatever action the board
5	takes could be completed by the bid package by
6	mid-October, early November, something like that.
7	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And Chair
8	La Belle, can I just ask a question?
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Sure.
LO	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I'm going to ask
L1	because you might need to go look for it.
L2	So when we the board initially voted to
L3	put this in 2024, when was that? Because that was
L4	a discussion. We clearly talked about it being
L5	allocated to 2024.
L6	So I just want to know: When did the
L7	board make that decision? Because it's
L8	instrumental for me that now we're kind of
L9	fast-tracking it to 2022 and we should really be
20	focused on moving our master site plan forward, and
21	it concerns me that we're kind of doing it so
22	quickly.
23	So if you can find out. I mean, we took
24	action on that at some point; right?
25	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Yes. So the project

1	slated for the 2024 on the 2024 capital project
2	list, which was part of the budget you know, the
3	budget process.
4	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And that was
5	20 in what, November of 2021?
6	MS. RICHARDS: At the end of 2021 for the
7	2022 budget cycle.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Okay. And then
9	the next month we brought it back to have it pushed
10	to this year?
11	MS. RICHARDS: Well, I don't think a
12	decision has been made about that. It was brought
13	it back to move the project along.
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Right. But it
15	still was brought back right. But the board voted
16	in November of 2021 to make this a capital bid
17	project for 2024.
18	MS. RICHARDS: Right.
19	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: A month later,
20	somebody on the board brought it back requesting to
21	have it pushed to 2024.
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, what occurred I
23	brought it back, and what occurred is it was referred
24	to the facilities committee, Robert and Ashleigh.
25	The facilities committee reviewed it, and they came

1	back with the potential of three concepts.
2	The foundation stepped forward and said:
3	Okay. If the board is willing to move forward with
4	the three concepts to, you know, refine where we're
5	at, the foundation indicated they were willing to
6	fund that, which they did, and that's where we
7	stand as of today.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And I just want
9	to make because I remember that meeting, and I
LO	clearly also indicated that I wasn't on board with
L1	pushing it to 2022.
L2	For me, this year is a recovery year for
L3	the organization. We're still in a recession, and
L4	we are still focused on our strategic plan, and I
15	think that I mean. I think I made it clear that

we are still focused on our strategic plan, and I
think that -- I mean, I think I made it clear that
that's a priority. It has nothing to do with, you
know -- I love veterans, and I love what we have
here currently as an asset, but I just want us
to -- I want to keep that top of mind, you know?

So that's, you know, my position on it from this perspective.

For me, I -- it's an issue when we take our time to get our finance group to give us a budget plan, as a board, we vote to put a project

1	in a capital improvement for 2024, and then a month
2	later we come back with a different proposal, and
3	then it's kind of like taken a whole life of its
4	own. So that's my position.
5	I did vote to go ahead and move forward
6	with having the concepts prepared, but now I feel
7	like we've put in the solutions on the drainage
8	issues, and now that makes it more urgent, and I
9	just don't want to be pushed into doing something
10	that for me is not really in the best interest of
11	the fairgrounds at this time.
12	So I'm just going to go ahead and put that
13	out there right now. And I know that we have
14	Mr. Berardino who's going to give us an update.
15	But that's been my position from the beginning of
16	this.
17	So I just and it's not a veterans
18	issue. I know I will be told that I hate veterans,
19	and that's not the case. It's really our
20	fairgrounds and what's in the best interest now,
21	so
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Natalie.
23	At this point in time, I'd like to ask
24	that the foundation president present the
25	foundation's position relative to the project.

1	MR. BERARDINO: Okay. Thank you. Thank you
2	very much, Mr. Chairman and honorable members of the
3	board.
4	So yes, it is true that I was I
5	think let's step back a little bit and talk
6	about why the urgency of the project.
7	Number 1, you know, in terms of veterans,
8	I'm sure all of you follow the news and read
9	everything. We're losing veterans at an incredible
10	pace. It's an incredible pace. This is not
11	something any of us I know any of you like, but
12	veterans are committing suicide at an incredible
13	rate. You know, 21 now every day, including
14	Vietnam veterans, which now make up the largest
15	portion of veterans committing suicide.
16	And that, you know, has a lot to do with
17	veterans now Vietnam veterans that are retired.
18	And what happens is they go home. They don't have
19	things to do, and those memories haunt them, haunt
20	me, I mean, haunt us.
21	I don't think anybody here, unless you've
22	been through a war and been in combat and I
23	think if you had, you wouldn't be concerned about
24	moving this forward. I think if you had seen what
25	we've seen and what we live with every day, you

would be moving it even quicker than this because 1 2 this is a community that has been largely ignored. 3 We went to Vietnam and fought a war and came home, and they're spitting on us. I came home 4 5 to the San Francisco airport -- lucky me -- in '68. I had blood -- I had blood on my boots from 6 7 Amirigard Edus [phonetic], who was my friend, who I 8 went through boot camp with, went through training with, saw him crossing a river, and we got hit, and 10 he died 12 days before he was going to go home. 11 What you see happening -- what you see 12 happening in Ukraine -- we went through that for 13 13 months, 13 months, and somehow -- I am -- I mean, I iust can't understand. I've sat on this board, and 14 15 I cannot understand how a board that's sitting on, 16 by the way -- and I'll let you think yourselves if 17 that's responsible for a nonprofit to be sitting on 18 \$61.3 million reserves with an operating budget of 19 about 50 million. 20 Now, if you were a private nonprofit, you 21 know what would happen. Your nonprofit status 22 would be gone. The feds would be on you like 23 crazy. 24 So we thought -- we thought that this was

a great time, because of the \$61.3 million, because

1	the entire community every elected body in this
2	county has been standing by veterans in a fight for
3	the cemetery, because for once we haven't had any
4	governmental body give us any any difficulty
5	because for once people understand the time has
6	come. The time has come. What more do you want
7	from us?
8	And we're sitting here talking about
9	you're going to give us another 100,000. You
10	already gave us 100 You're going to give us
11	100,000.
12	So the vets are going to cough up another
13	100 grand? I don't understand it.
14	And I can tell you, nobody else does,
15	because we've been to the community talking about
16	this. So and I think it it breaks my heart.
17	It really does.
18	I guess I get a little angry about it
19	because my feelings get hurt and my feelings for
20	all the veterans get hurt, but I will ask any one
21	of these board members how you'd feel if you were
22	in a firefight, somebody who you've been with for
23	12 months, getting ready to go home, he gets hit by
24	an RPG while he's climbing the tank, trying to get

up to a .50 caliber machine gun to lay fire down.

24

1	And you see him when he gets hit with an
2	RPG, and you run over to grab your friend, and you
3	grab him to pull him off the tank, and all you have
4	is the bottom half of his torso. The rest of him
5	is stuck on the tank.
6	And I'd like you to see that and come and
7	listen to people who have \$61.3 million in the bank
8	with a veteran community that is suffering and is
9	going to continue to suffer, and say, "Well, you
10	know, we're going too fast on this."
11	Really? I wish somebody would have told
12	me that, you know, before they sent me to Vietnam,
13	because, man, we went fast then. We drove our
14	butts over on the plane, stuck us on an airplane.
15	The next thing we knew, we had 16 hours, and my
16	landing, my friend from Hawthorne hit a land mine,
17	went up 12 feet, came down with no legs. Nobody
18	was slow moving it then.
19	But I can't even express to you how upset
20	I am. I can't express it to you, to sit here and
21	listen to people talking about: Are you going to
22	give us another 100,000? We've only got
23	61 million. Well, we're moving too fast.

who are committing suicide, giving people a place?

Moving too fast to take care of veterans

1	If that's the if that's the policy of this
2	board, so be it. So be it.
3	CHAIR LA BELLE: Could I interrupt with a
4	question at this point? The foundation has
5	previously indicated 100,000
6	MR. BERARDINO: We'll do 100,000 no matter
7	what you do.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay.
9	MR. BERARDINO: You've got 100,000 from us.
LO	We're not going to play this game: Well, if you we
L1	do this, can you give us this? Can you do no.
L2	You've got \$100,000. Does that make people more
L3	comfortable? You've got 100 grand.
L4	CHAIR LA BELLE: So that 100,000 is less
L5	than
L6	MR. BERARDINO: And I'll tell you what I
L7	think we should do to try to find a compromise here,
L8	because this isn't going down well. Those remarks
L9	made today
20	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Mr. Berardino
21	MR. BERARDINO: Excuse me. If you go to the
22	Chair
23	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: No. No. no. I
24	sit on this board. You were asked to resign, so if I
25	was you, I would stop.

1	MR. BERARDINO: Oh
2	(Cross-talk amongst parties.)
3	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: you're not
4	going to sit here you are not going to sit here
5	and
6	MR. BERARDINO: Wait a second. Who said
7	that?
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Natalie and Nick, this is
9	out of order.
LO	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: No. Listen.
L1	You are not going to sit here and bully this board
L2	into voting for something that you want. Nobody here
L3	questions whether or not the sacrifice of the men
L4	and women who fought for our country.
L5	MR. BERARDINO: Well
L6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: We all love
L7	them, and in that case
L8	MR. BERARDINO: Then show it. Show it.
L9	Show it.
20	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: we make
21	contributions to
22	MR. BERARDINO: Show it.
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: Order. Order.
24	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I can do it if I
25	want; okay? I'm on this board. You're not.

1	MR. BERARDINO: Oh.
2	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Not for long.
3	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Do what you do.
4	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Mr. Chairman, will you
5	control this meeting, please, especially the
6	audience.
7	MR. BERARDINO: Yeah. Whoever needs to
8	be
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Let's stop right there,
10	please.
11	MR. BERARDINO: Okay.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: The question is very
13	simple. The foundation has offered 100,000, of which
14	30,000 has been provided for the concept drawings.
15	Does 70,000 remain on the table in terms
16	of the foundation supporting whatever option the
17	board chooses, whatever they choose? Is that the
18	case?
19	MR. BERARDINO: That's the case. And I want
20	to make one other proposal.
21	So we're trying to find some sort of
22	compromise before it does really get out of hand.
23	Here's what I think. Your staff have indicated
24	they would like Option 2 and they would like to
25	add consider adding the monuments and consider

1	adding the lighting and the water wall.
2	So and that gets it to about 2.5.
3	Let's call it Proposal Two-and-a-Half.
4	Why don't we do this: Bid out Proposal 3.
5	And the reason why, Proposal 3 has all the options.
6	You bid out Two-and-a-Half, you don't have all the
7	options.
8	So if you bid out Proposal 3, and it has
9	all the options and if there's a way on that bid
LO	to say: The water wall costs X, more shrubbery
L1	costs X, you know, the idea of having more
L2	monuments for the brave men and women who will be
L3	winning I mean, that's good. I hope they never
L4	get I hope they always stay blank, but they
L5	probably won't and that way, if you and that
L6	way, if you bid out if you bid out the entire
L7	project, then you'll have the cost of each one of
L8	the features.
L9	So when we have it back, that's when you
20	can start talking about: Well, look, we'll have
21	fewer trees here, and we can do this, and we can do
22	that, and that will get it in line.
23	But we won't know the cost of everything
24	if we only bid out portions of it. But we know the
25	cost of everything if we bid out the whole project.

1	So that's my compromise solution.
2	And perhaps the veterans will get the
3	nicest perhaps you'll look at it and say: Hey,
4	we want to give our vets the nicest possible walk.
5	Or you may say: No, you know, we want to
6	do it, but this is where we want to put things.
7	But I think that's the fairest way, and
8	that's really the only way we'll have all the
9	information about what everything costs to
10	ultimately design something that's in your comfort
11	zone.
12	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Chair La Belle,
13	may I make a statement to you?
14	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I just I kind
16	of would like us to be able to focus on this as a
17	board without being pressured. I feel like there is
18	tremendous pressure for us to vote yes on this
19	project being moved to 2022, and we're not really
20	here to have a comprehensive conversation about how
21	we move forward. And I feel like that's a problem.
22	And I appreciate the comments of all the
23	advocates who would really like the serenity walk,
24	but we need to remove that pressure from the vote.
25	I'm not going to sit here and just vote



1	yes for something even though I know it's not in
2	the best interest of our plan here on campus.
3	CHAIR LA BELLE: Let me interrupt you,
4	Natalie, at this point in time, as the Chair.
5	We're not at a point of deciding among the
6	six of us what we want to do, if anything. We're
7	at a point where we're trying to get input of those
8	who wish to speak.
9	And at this point in time, I'd like to
10	we have, what, three public comments?
11	MS. RICHARDS: Yes.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: What I'd like to do is get
13	those public comments. We'll bring it back to the
14	board. I'm sure all of us have thoughts we wish to
15	share with each other. We'll take it in that kind of
16	order.
17	And the first one is?
18	MS. RICHARDS: Bobby McDonald.
19	MR. McDONALD: Good morning, Mr. Chair and
20	members of the board. Thank you for this opportunity
21	to speak.
22	Since COVID, I've had an opportunity to
23	come a couple times actually, more times to
24	Heroes Hall, and because of a couple interesting
25	a couple of positive programs that are happening in

1	the community now, there's an interest in veterans,
2	and there's more of an interest about finding out
3	more of our history and more people learning about
4	the veterans and what they've done in the
5	community.
6	As Nick mentioned earlier, we were in the
7	process of trying to get a cemetery built here in
8	Orange County in the hills of Anaheim, and that's
9	going very, very well, and that's causing a lot of
LO	people to come out into the community.
L1	We have here at the Heroes Hall about
L2	for the last four months, we've had programs at
L3	Heroes Hall on the weekends every couple every
L4	other Saturday, I think it is, and it's grown and
L5	grown and grown.
L6	We've covered through Black History month,
L7	Women's History month. We've done a couple of
L8	programs here with the 442, the Japanese, with
L9	women's the black women from the Six Triple
20	Eight. We've got a program coming up with the LGBT
21	group. And, of course, we have Judge Aguirre
22	[phonetic] with the Hall of Fame or, excuse me,
23	Heroes Hall that is here.
24	I'm in agreement with the third

proposal -- or the proposal that Nick has brought

1	up, that we take a look at Item No. 3 and get an
2	overview of what it's going to cost, and hopefully
3	you will come back and we can make a decision on
4	what will be the best use.
5	And I want to thank you for your time, and
6	I also want to thank you for everything you've done
7	for Heroes Hall. It's a big boon for the
8	community, and it has a lot of historical impact
9	and community presence.
10	And, again, as I said, with the cemetery
11	almost here, it's going to create some more
12	interest and some more information, and we'll get a
13	lot of people from all around.
14	So thank you very kindly.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Chair La Belle,
16	can I ask Bobby some questions?
17	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
18	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Just out of
19	curiosity first of all, I just want to say I love
20	all the things that you've done at Heroes Hall. I've
21	attended a couple of the events in this past
22	series
23	MR. McDONALD: Thank you.
24	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: and it was a
25	pleasure to meet all of the veterans, especially the

1	one who was here at the last event.
2	But just out of curiosity, this was
3	proposed for 2024. I heard the urgency expressed
4	by one of the other speakers for 2022, but what
5	if we still planned this out correctly and it was
6	built in 2024, would that be a loss, or would that
7	still be a win for the veteran community?
8	MR. McDONALD: I'm going to leave that up to
9	the board to make that decision.
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: In your opinion,
11	since you're so very connected and the work that you
12	do exceeds Heroes Hall with the BFW.
13	MR. McDONALD: Yes, ma'am.
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I mean, I've
15	attended many events that you hosted and you've
16	fought for the veteran cemetery that will be going up
17	in the city of Anaheim, which I'm very grateful for,
18	since I live in that city.
19	MR. McDONALD: Yes, ma'am.
20	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: So, you know,
21	since you're really the person who is in the
22	community working with veterans, would having Heroes
23	Hall here now and Sky Hawk here now does that give
24	our veterans a place to go so that they can get some
25	comfort and know that people do support them?



1	MR. McDONALD: The answer to that is yes.
2	The fact that we have a Heroes Hall, the fact that
3	we've got that, yes.
4	I know what your budget and stuff says,
5	2024, and it was supposed to be there. Again,
6	that's your decision. I'd love to see it earlier.
7	I really would.
8	But if that's the decision of the board,
9	to take it that far out, then we have to live with
10	that decision, as long as we can get the serenity
11	walk.
12	But to answer your question, I'd love to
13	have it earlier, but I'll take it; all right?
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Thank you.
15	CHAIR LA BELLE: The next speaker is Reggie.
16	Thank you, Bobby.
17	MS. MUNDEKIS: Hi. Good morning. Reggie
18	Mundekis. Thank you for this opportunity to address
19	you this morning.
20	I look at this project a little bit
21	differently than maybe the Heroes Hall people do
22	because many years ago, perhaps before most of you
23	were on the board, back when the building that's
24	now Heroes Hall sat where the Pac Amp berm was
25	reshaped, there was that building and then a garden

1	next to it, which was called Memorial Gardens, and
2	that had plantings and trees in it that were
3	donated by the public to honor their veteran family
4	members. And that was gone away in the process of
5	the various projects.
6	So I see this serenity walk as a
7	restoration of the garden plantings that went with
8	Heroes Hall.
9	I also totally believe staff when they say
10	we have a drainage issue that has to be fixed
11	because Costa Mesa is known for difficult soils.
12	And if you don't believe me, we can go to
13	Starbucks. We'll sit down. We'll have a cup of
14	coffee, and I'll tell you some of the horror
15	stories about things that have happened in
16	Costa Mesa as far as it was fine until last week
17	and all of a sudden there is a sinkhole and there's
18	a cracking in the foundation.
19	So I totally believe staff on that.
20	I also want to say that I support the
21	third alternative. These are variations on a
22	theme. I like what Director Berardino has
23	proposed, that it be bid out with I don't know
24	the term he used, but in a way that you can make

some design decisions.

1	One of the reasons I support that is given
2	that we're in ever-changing water restrictions
3	right now, there could be changes in what we're
4	what we should be planting versus what we want to
5	plant today.
6	So I see this as a really good project.
7	It does a lot to the community good.
8	Also, as Dr. Bagneris said at the
9	beginning of the meeting, we're dealing with a lot
LO	of stress right now with gun violence, so even if
L1	this walk is not about the gun violence situation,
L2	it's something it's a serenity walk where people
L3	can go there and find some peace.
L4	So I support this project. I like
L5	Variation 3. I thank staff for their work on this
L6	project and look forward to this being put forward.
L7	I understand the concerns of the board
L8	that we're kind of it looks like we're just kind
L9	of pushing this thing through.
20	Well, you know, quite frankly, we've got a
21	lot of money. It's not a really expensive project,
22	and there I'm kind of thinking maybe we can
23	squeeze a few bucks out of some of the supervisors
24	who are always running around beating their chest

about how much they love that.

1	But meanwhile we had to take the airplane
2	because they couldn't take care of it.
3	So thank you very much.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Reggie.
5	Jeanine? Jeanine Robbins?
6	MS. ROBBINS: Good morning. I have spoken
7	about different veterans issues here at the
8	fairgrounds before because of my family history, so
9	let me just go through it really quick because there
LO	are new members.
L1	My dad was a veteran. He was a veteran in
L2	the Navy. His older brother was also a veteran.
L3	He was a veteran who fought in the Korean war. He
L4	came home with PTSD so bad that it affected him for
L5	the rest of his life.
L6	At that time, it wasn't a recognized
L7	syndrome. He would wake up in the middle of the
L8	night screaming from nightmares. He would wake up
L9	in the middle of the night under the bed as if he
20	was in the war shooting a machine gun in his
21	dreams or in his nightmares, let's say.
22	So I am very much in favor of the Option
23	No. 3.
24	I will also tell you that from a different
25	angle, I am a founding member of the People's

1	Homeless Task Force of Orange County. We are the
2	group who sued the City and have just reappealed.
3	Because of my work with the People's
4	Homeless Task Force, I encounter homeless veterans
5	every single day. Every single day we work with
6	homeless veterans. These are veterans that we are
7	unable to get housed because their PTSD is so bad.
8	These are veterans from the Vietnam war.
9	These are veterans from the wars in the Middle
LO	East. They would benefit so much from this
L1	serenity walk. I can't even begin to tell you.
L2	I read up here, "the safe place" they
L3	would have a safe place. And the only Option 3
L4	has a place to sit.
L5	I don't understand how there could be any
L6	objection to putting this forward as quickly as
L7	possible. There are so many homeless veterans.
L8	Creating an equitable community well, it's not
L9	equitable. We are excluding a whole class of
20	people who would benefit from this.
21	And as we have said before, I know that
22	the fairgrounds has over 61 million. 500,000 is
23	such a small amount compared to that. This is a
24	priority that would help the people, the people who

need the help the most.

1	And these veterans that I encounter every
2	day if you could encounter them on the streets,
3	on the sidewalks of Anaheim yesterday we came
4	across three who were cowered in their makeshift
5	shelter at La Palma park with no place to go, and
6	the police were there hassling them, and we sat
7	there and watched to make sure that that was all
8	they did, was just hassle them.
9	So I can't imagine any objection to this
10	program, to this plan at all. Thank you.
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Jeanine.
12	Are there any other public comments?
13	(No response.)
14	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. I'll bring it back
15	to the board and to hopefully get some order going
16	here.
17	Let me kind of summarize where we're at,
18	if I can, for my colleagues. We have a
19	recommendation before us from staff that we move
20	forward with Option 2, which is in the \$400,000
21	range, with an added recommendation that we bid the
22	water element as an add and that we bid the
23	lighting as an add.
24	Again, I'll go back to my kind of
25	generalist background, and Ken can correct me.

1	What you don't want to do is bid any project in the
2	whole if you have a concern about some particular
3	element, because once you award the contract, you
4	don't want to be in a position of going back and
5	doing a change order. You never get the full value
6	of what that add is or deduct is out of a change
7	order.
8	The first thing that happens, they open
9	the blue book and say: Okay. Let's get a request
LO	for information, and if you think something is
L1	worth 50,000, and by the time Ken does his best job
L2	with CCA negotiating it, you'll maybe get 20,000
L3	out of that.
L4	So I think staff's recommendation on two
L5	is bid the water element and the lights as an add,
L6	which means they bid the project and then the
L7	contractor would say, "Okay. If you want to add
L8	the water element, this is the cost. If you want
L9	to add the lighting, this is the cost." And then
20	the board ultimately, with staff's recommendation,
21	would have the ability to say yea or nay on those.
22	Is that correct, Ken?
23	MR. KARNS: Without getting really, really
24	deep, you're generally correct.
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: The reverse would apply on

1	Alternative 3, which the foundation is supporting.
2	There are items in there that if you don't want to do
3	those items, you would bid those as deductive
4	alternates. You'd bid the lights as deductive
5	alternates. You'd bid whatever else as deductive
6	alternates.
7	So when the bid package comes back to the
8	board for award whenever, you would have the
9	ability to say: No. The water element isn't worth
LO	it for that amount of money, so on and so forth.
L1	Okay. So those are my kind of orderly
L2	comments to get us focused.
L3	And I'll just make one comment. In terms
L4	of the water element, they look nice, but Fashion
L5	Island doesn't have any more water elements.
L6	There's a long-term maintenance cost associated
L7	with those, and it's not just what it costs you to
L8	put that in. It's what it's going to cost Ken and
L9	Jerry and the staff to maintain that for the next
20	20 years.
21	I think in lieu of the water element, I
22	think that wall is a good idea from the standpoint
23	of it blocks the back of the house, and then it
24	also potentially becomes an element that monuments
25	and other things could be installed on as a part of

1	it.
2	So with that, I just wanted to provide
3	that kind of focus and open it up to the directors.
4	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Chairman La Belle?
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So earlier when I asked
7	my questions to help me formulate which way I was
8	thinking about going, I feel bad that I got beat over
9	the head about that, but I just wanted to say that
10	the foundation was created to support Heroes Hall in
11	that area. So putting in money to that, I think that
12	should be a no-brainer, either.
13	I like Option 3; okay? I figure if we're
14	going to do it, we should go all the way.
15	My concern is that we're throwing it into
16	a budget that we just approved. We're going to get
17	into another budget phase. We have the master site
18	plan. We know that's going to cost a lot of money.
19	So even if we brought in a year, put it into 2023,
20	I would feel better about it.
21	But right now, I feel like, you know, we
22	need to look at all the options. We shouldn't be
23	rushing this. But my preference is Option 3.
24	So even though I asked my question about
25	getting another \$100 000 from the foundation my

1	option is for Number 3. But originally, we were
2	looking at 300,000, just to let you know, even when
3	we said 2024. So if we're going to go up to
4	500,000, that was the genesis of my questions,
5	about the money.
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you. Thank you,
7	Barbara.
8	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Director? Oh. Go ahead,
9	Ashleigh.
10	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Thank you, Director Ruiz.
11	I appreciate it.
12	I just want to I think we've all had a
13	tough week, and I think we should all just together
14	take a really deep breath.
15	MS. ROBBINS: I had a great week.
16	DIRECTOR AITKEN: We are all here because we
17	love the fair. Our staff loves the fair. Our
18	management team loves the fair. People that come
19	here every month and take their time to comment,
20	they're here because they love the fair, and the
21	directors applied to be on this board because they
22	are concerned about the fair.
23	So let's just, again, try to treat each
24	other with the respect that we all deserve, as
25	mothers, as community members, as wives, husbands,

brothers, sisters, sons, and daughters, because I enjoy working with every single person in this room when you agree with me and when you don't.

That being said, I just want to have three

points of clarity. So when we bid out -- let's say we decide to go with Option 3. And just as -- you touched on this a little bit. We are just having them bid out all of those options.

We are not committing to do that, every single feature of that bid package; correct? We're just getting a -- basically a price of what those elements would cost?

CHAIR LA BELLE: Correct me if I'm wrong,

Ken, but if you bid the package in total, then to

remove something later, you're going to have to go

through a change-order process, and what you are able

to get back in terms of the value has yet to be

determined.

If there are certain elements that you're not sure you want to do, if you bid that as an add, then you would get a separate price from the contractor for the water element or the lights, and you could still award the contract and decide not to do the water element or not to do the lights.

But if you include it in the whole



1	package, Ken and his staff are going to have to go
2	through the change-order process.
3	Ken, do you want to add to that?
4	MR. KARNS: So if the direction is to move
5	forward with LOU No. 22 with CCA, it should be with
6	the full intent to award a bid package. We should
7	never go out to a bid unless the fundamental intent
8	is to award and get the project done. It is
9	absolutely not the right thing to do, to shop a price
10	and shelve it.
11	So the board would have to decide on what
12	our budget would be, and we finalize a scope of
13	work that fits within that budget.
14	When we go out to bid, we want to be very
15	careful on how much of a shopping list we do
16	create. Everything has to be fully designed and
17	engineered.
18	And if you're designing a large laundry
19	list of elements, you have to design both. What
20	does it look like designed in and what does it look
21	like designed out? So then some of the money is
22	being spent on engineering instead of the physical
23	project.
24	So that's why agreeing on an overall value
25	that this board wants to spend is a path that would

1	get us to a finish line.
2	Also, we would have to work with CCA.
3	When you have a base bid and then alternates, one
4	could concede we have to be very clear on what
5	we're awarding on.
6	So if I'm Bidder No. 1 and my base bid is
7	\$400,000, Doug is Bidder No. 2 and he's 500,000,
8	but the add alternative on the water feature, I'm
9	200-, he's 100-, who gets the bid? So what are we
10	doing, and what are we not doing?
11	So if it's ultimately: This is the
12	budget. Staff, go design that project. Value
13	engineer Doug's idea maybe that wall and the
14	seating is great. Don't add the water, but have
15	the wall and the seating. Value engineer some
16	stuff, make something a little smaller.
17	Incorporate some benching into the wall.
18	There's ways, if the board says this is
19	our comfort level on what we want to spend, we can,
20	again, design what that is.
21	Ultimately, A, B, and C it does not
22	have to be exactly that. It can be 3.1, this is
23	what we're going to go design and build.
24	So hopefully that provides some clarity.
25	DIRECTOR AITKEN: No. Thank you. That



1	does.
2	My second question is: We had talked a
3	little bit about fundraising ties with the
4	community, reaching out to maybe some of our unions
5	that are able to do this, Boy Scout troops that are
6	looking for Eagle Scout projects.
7	So when I look at some of the add-ons with
8	the you know, simple things I shouldn't say
9	that when it comes to public works. There's
10	nothing simple, but benches and things like that,
11	kind of what is the status of that? Do we need to
12	include in our bid package items that we might be
13	able to partner with our community to do for free?
14	MR. KARNS: So from a construction
15	standpoint, I'll answer that. We should not break a
16	project apart. It should be bid as one.
17	Furniture, FF&E furniture, fit-up and
18	equipment keeping that outside the project I
19	don't think that would be viewed or considered as
20	breaking up the project.
21	We can buy tables, chairs, benches. We
22	did it with the Sky Hawk. Those benches that we
23	see with the plantings we did ourselves after that
24	project was complete. So those elements, yes.
25	Figuring out the donation through the

1	foundation, fundraising with the Boy Scouts I'll
2	let Michele speak to that, but those kind of things
3	absolutely can be a maintenance item, come out of
4	the operating budget, or be a donation somehow. I
5	won't speak to donations. I'll leave that to
6	Michele.
7	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So as a follow-up to
8	that, which of those items in three can be a
9	maintenance item, an operations item? The waterfall?
10	MR. KARNS: No. I was just speaking to the
11	furniture.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: Furniture, you can buy
13	separately. You can pull that out completely and do
14	that separately. You can ask for donations so you
15	can get a bench, things like that. You can do a
16	whole variety of things.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: As a maintenance
18	item, you also don't have to go through CCA and use a
19	lot of staff time to get this all done.
20	MS. RICHARDS: You mean in terms of benches,
21	tables?
22	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Correct.
23	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Correct.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Correct.
25	MR. WILLSON: The idea about working with



1	the community to donate that, we had talked about
2	pavers at one point. Yeah.
3	So that's entirely possible, but there has
4	to be an understanding by the person who is
5	donating that they don't own a piece of it, they
6	don't have any rights to it, and that the district
7	has the right to remove it, change it, move it to
8	another location at any time.
9	DIRECTOR AITKEN: My last question and I
10	think there was some of the subject matter expertise
11	of some of our board members they might be able to
12	chime in.
13	Because I am sensitive to the feeling that
14	we're rushing this project realistically, given
15	supply chain issues, given rising costs, given how
16	difficult it is to find a skilled workforce that's
17	able to show up and start this project, if we move
18	forward with the bid and we kind of set the
19	parameters for what we want the project to look
20	like, realistically, breaking ground in
21	mid-October, what are we looking at realistically?
22	MS. RICHARDS: In terms of completion time?
23	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Breaking ground.
24	MS. RICHARDS: So let me talk about timing a
25	little bit. And that's why the recommendation is for

1	the staff to provide, you know, direction the
2	board to provide direction to staff on timing.
3	Something Ken said was very important,
4	that we don't want to create a bid package and put
5	it out there and I see Director Ruiz shaking
6	your head. You understand what I'm talking about.
7	What we don't want to do is put a project
8	out to bid and then shelve it. And shelving it,
9	you know, there's a lot of problems involved in
10	that, but that's only going to delay in terms of
11	material costs.
12	And you're right. I mean, we're getting
13	bids on some of our other major projects that are
14	coming in double what was budgeted for. So the
15	timing is important, and the direction that the
16	staff gives us on the timing.
17	Because while we could, you know, push the
18	go button now and be ready to get a bid package on
19	the market by mid-October, we would need to be
20	ready to pull the trigger on that project by
21	mid-October. We don't want to put it out there
22	again and then not award the bid.
23	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Thank you. That's really
24	helpful.
25	My initial thoughts I feel that with



1	partnering with Heroes Hall in putting all the work
2	for this landscape architect, that we have made an
3	initial commitment to move forward with this
4	project.
5	And so what I'm hearing is we have options
6	to assuage some of the fears of cost and timing.
7	We have options to fundraise and help us move
8	forward with this project.
9	I'm also sensitive to our Chair's comments
10	that having lived through the, I think I call
11	the Chair and I we're the long-haulers now, but
12	having lived through the Pacific Amphitheater
13	project, we want to stay away from change orders at
14	all cost, because that is not going to help us with
15	our budget.
16	So what I'm hearing from staff is that we
17	are looking at Option No. 2, but we are adding just
18	some type of wall and lighting. So we can take out
19	the benches. We can take out the water feature.
20	We can take out potentially even some seating area,
21	but just add I mean, from a safety perspective,
22	I think lighting is extremely important when we
23	have people that might be walking through at night.
24	And then the wall for aesthetics.

So I'd be comfortable -- and I'm

1	comfortable with Option 2 if we add maybe those
2	features that help it be safer and financially
3	feasible with what we've already originally
4	committed to do.
5	That's my initial feeling, so I'd like to
6	turn it back over.
7	DIRECTOR RUIZ: You know, I also I love
8	Option 3. I do. And I would like to see Option 3,
9	but Ashleigh brought up some interesting points as
10	well as the other directors.
11	Michele, as you know Jerry will
12	probably attest to this right now most of our
13	contractors that we represent are having a labor
14	shortage in getting projects done, so that's a
15	concern to me now.
16	And you're right. If we push this to get
17	this done in October Jerry, correct me if I'm
18	wrong we might not have the contractors to bid
19	this because they're so busy right now.
20	MS. ROBBINS: And there's a price increase
21	in July.
22	DIRECTOR RUIZ: And price increases and fuel
23	costs. Most of our contractors, the problem they are
24	having now was whatever bids they bid five years ago,
25	three years ago, fuel cost is just eating that up.



And so, you know, that might not be the case here, 1 2 but that is a concern. Again, I love Option 3, and I like the 3 idea Director Aitken said about working with the 4 5 community and getting donations. 6 Don't quote me on this, but we represent 7 two cinder block manufacturers in Orange County, 8 and those families are big philanthropists, and they love to donate to things like this, pavers and 10 I'm not saying they're going to do it, but 11 I can reach out to them. Maybe they might do it. 12 So, again, Option 3 might not --13 probably -- might not cost what -- you know, the 14 500,000. It could be less. I don't know. And it 15 could be more. 16 But, again, my concern is -- here is 17 rushing this and getting this done and not being able to do it because of everything that's going on 18 19 right now with the economy, with inflation, and with the labor shortage. 20 21 No one here is against veterans. I'm not. 22 I've got a lot of members who are vets, World War 23 II vets, Vietnam vets, Iraq vets. I would love to 24 see this done. And I would invite them to come and 25 see this.

1	But, again, this rush to judgment I
2	mean, to get this done it's a concern for labor
3	shortage. And if we approve this now and we get it
4	done, let's say, what's to say in 2023, there's
5	another idea, another concept, and let's get this
6	one done now because if you don't, then you hate
7	vets.
8	No, we don't hate vets. Nobody I love
9	vets. A lot of them are my members. I support
10	Option 3. I would love to see Option 3 get done.
11	Again, but we're not going to make a decision here
12	today, right, obviously, as to which one as to
13	what we're going to do, but I do love Option 3. I
14	would love to see that one done.
15	Again, my concern would be trying to push
16	it to get it done now, and with the labor shortage
17	and contractors being spread so thin with work
18	right now, I have 400 members working on the 405
19	freeway. I don't have any members on the
20	out-of-work list now, none.
21	So that's a concern to me if we want to
22	get this done now. We might not get it done now.
23	This might get pushed to next summer.
24	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Chair?
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes. Go ahead.

VICE CHAIR PHAM: It's kind of an awkward time, for me at least, to think about an acceleration and rushing to get -- making a decision right now on something like this, considering we are having significant supply chain issues, which are causing, you know, massive increases in prices of building materials, and then the labor shortage issues as well, which is escalating the cost on that front, because people have to pick and choose their projects, and obviously in a private market, they will prioritize profitability on that front.

And then -- so we could be significantly increasing the cost of this project in my eyes today versus, like, waiting a year or two, most likely when the supply chain issues work their way through and things are a little bit more settled.

Secondarily, as Alan had said earlier, we're not in a recession yet, but we are with high certainty heading to one. By definition, a recession is two quarters -- consecutive quarters of negative GP growth. We've just officially gone through one quarter of that. I have high certainty the next quarter will stay negative -- will print a negative GP growth, and we'll be officially in a recession.



1	Now, the \$61 million is a great headline
2	number to point out, but we do have a long-term
3	plan and a master site plan where some of those
4	dollars are going to get eaten up significantly.
5	In fact, we are probably going to have to take on
6	some debt to finish some of those projects.
7	So little things add up. 500,000, a
8	million, 400,000, whatever, which we've already
9	allocated 300,000 to this project you know, it
10	adds up.
11	And I'm not saying it's not something I
12	don't support or do support. I don't have a
13	decision right now. I don't have I need more
14	information.
15	But this board does support veterans.
16	This board approved spending millions of dollars on
17	Heroes Hall. This board approved recently moving
18	the Sky Hawk over, spending hundreds of thousands
19	of dollars on that.
20	So it's unfair to position and say, "Hey,
21	you're not approving the serenity walk or you're
22	not saying you're not increasing the budget by
23	\$200,000. You're not supporting veterans." I
24	think that's an unfair stance.

25

I just want to be fiscally responsible,

1	and I just want to make sure that I'm not
2	overextending staff, you know, forcing them to do
3	extra overtime work for something that we decide on
4	a whim to accelerate. I want to make an educated
5	decision when I make a decision.
6	So that's kind of what I'm thinking.
7	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Chair?
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes. Director Bagneris?
9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I think we could talk
LO	about this all day. I'm going to put forth a motion,
L1	and you can either accept it or not and we can move
L2	forward, but I move that we go with Option 3 and we
L3	move it in a year from where it is now, in 2023.
L4	(No response.)
L5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Let me speak to the motion,
L6	not hearing a second.
L7	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: There is a second.
L8	CHAIR LA BELLE: What's before us is staff's
L9	recommendation that we move forward and bid out
20	Option 2.
21	Ken made a very good comment. You never
22	want to bid anything with the intent of not
23	awarding the contract when it comes in. But if,
24	through our CCA, staff, and through the architect,
25	they come back and say, "Okay. Our estimate is

498,000," and you bid that, it will come back to us, and the presumption is if it comes back at 498,000 or less, you would award it. If it comes in at 495,000, this board always has the option of rejecting all the bids and starting over.

Mike -- and I am very respectful of
Newton's comments in that my concern is there's
always a better plan. None of us know, obviously,
from where we're at now -- none of us know what
next year holds or the following year holds. It
may get better; it may get worse.

Basically, what staff is recommending is that we bid out Option 2, and when those plans and specs are completed, we can start the bid process in late October.

By the time you bid it out, it's going to be early spring, and that decision would come back before the board in 2023, and if it's not within the parameters of the budget we have set forth, we don't award the contract. But you've got to go forward on the basis that the intent is there.

With that comment, I would second Director Bagneris's motion and with the provision that we complete the plans and specs for Option 3, deleting the water element, deleting the FF&E, and bidding

1	it on that basis, and that is going to come back to
2	the board as an option to award or not award based
3	on what comes in.
4	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So I appreciate the
5	second, but I won't take out any of those options;
6	right? Maybe the furniture piece of it.
7	VICE CHAIR PHAM: I think the water is
8	\$100,000.
9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Why would we need the
10	water? That's in Option 3; right? So my motion was
11	to take Option 3 the way it is; right?
12	DIRECTOR RUIZ: The way it is, right?
13	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: That gives us some time
14	to get through some of these labor issues.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I feel like the
16	second isn't what Director Bagneris said.
17	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: That's what I want to
18	make sure he knows.
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, the author of the
20	motion would have to agree to the second. And I'm
21	certainly comfortable with bidding the package out in
22	its entirety, but if there's something in there that
23	we just don't want, now's the time to say that we
24	don't want it.
25	Because when the bid package comes in and

1	it's we find out that the water element is
2	110,000 and we say, "Okay, Ken, go do a change
3	order and get that out of there," he's going to
4	come back in a month and say, "Well, I did it. I
5	got us 60,000 out of the 110" That's sort of
6	what you're up against. And Robert can speak to
7	this.
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And Chair
9	La Belle, I appreciate what you're doing, but it's
10	kind of mixing the waters a little bit.
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: I second Director
12	Bagneris's motion.
13	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Well, I'm going to make
14	a recommendation.
15	CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, we have a motion and
16	it's sitting on the floor.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: It's for the
18	motion.
19	So I would just recommend maybe we take
20	them separately. Maybe we make a motion to approve
21	the concept, and then we can discuss when it
22	actually gets put out to bid, because I feel like
23	they're now mixing; right?
24	Director La Belle, I can't even keep up
25	with where you're going with



1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes. Director Aitken?
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes. I'm sensitive to
3	what Director Rubalcava-Garcia is saying because I'm
4	a little uncomfortable with having any kind of time
5	frame because we never can anticipate how things are
6	doing or how long things are going to take.
7	So maybe we can just clean up the motion
8	and try to find a mid ground, because what I'm
9	hearing is that we want to give staff direction to
10	go forward with bidding Option 3, but considering
11	the bench the furniture, right, taking that out
12	and taking the water feature out only because with
13	water restrictions coming down the pipeline and the
14	fact that the maintenance is so high to upkeep,
15	with just corrosiveness and whatnot but
16	everything else we like.
17	So maybe we can just clean that up and go
18	forward with Option 3, but just take those two
19	things out.
20	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So that was going to be
21	the next question. On Option 3, what do you want to
22	take out? I can put that in the motion as well.
23	But based on what you have said and I'm
24	not the expert in that area I would go with
25	Option 3, take out the water and the furniture, and



1	I'm still putting a time frame because the
2	recommendation was asking for a timing.
3	And since we know we think October is
4	too soon, I'm saying move it out another year, but
5	then that's bringing it in a year from the original
6	proposal. So we're kind of meeting halfway, if you
7	want to talk about compromises. Okay?
8	So I'm okay with if Doug is, as my
9	seconder Option 3, take out the water and take
10	out the furniture, and bring the whole project in a
11	year, which means 2023.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, when you say "2023,"
13	if you complete the bid package by November, you bid
14	it out, it will come back to award probably sometime
15	in early spring 2023. I'm comfortable with that.
16	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: That's what I'm
17	proposing. That's the motion.
18	DIRECTOR AITKEN: So go out to bid now, but,
19	you know, realistically, nothing's going to happen.
20	VICE CHAIR PHAM: But if you go out to bid
21	now and you shelve it
22	DIRECTOR RUIZ: So when would we put it out
23	to bid if it stayed in 2024?
24	MS. RICHARDS: It would stay it would be
25	the same timing as we're talking about now. After

1	the fair, the 2024 fair, get it out to bid. Or to
2	Chair La Belle's point, you could do some prework on
3	it at the end of 2022 and then put it out in the
4	market in early 2023 so that the project you know,
5	actually, the construction starts in 2023.
6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Director
7	Bagneris, since your motion is still on the floor,
8	would you consider for me, it's a fiscal I
9	agree with everything. He said it so eloquently.
10	Unfortunately, I didn't, but he did. But I agree
11	that I love the Concept No. 3 as well.
12	I am concerned about the timing. We do
13	have a budget cycle coming up at the end of the
14	year.
15	Would you amend your motion to take out
16	the time and have us discuss approving one of the
17	concepts and then bringing it back at budget time
18	to see if that makes sense for putting it in for
19	2023?
20	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So the only thing I'm
21	concerned about right now is the bidding; right? Do
22	we go out to bid now, or do we wait? Is this bidding
23	going to happen next year? When does the bid happen
24	based on this motion?
25	MS. RICHARDS: That's what we're looking for

1	direction on.
2	So to Director Rubalcava-Garcia's point,
3	we staff needs direction on what option what
4	pieces the board would like. Then there needs to
5	be a decision about, I guess, which budget and in
6	what time frame do we want this to hit, because
7	that will dictate when we give CCA the go-ahead to
8	put the you know, finalize the drawings and
9	specs, put the bid package together, get it out on
10	the street to bid.
11	So maybe a good way to look
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So if you do that in
13	this budget cycle, that's going to come up
14	MS. RICHARDS: For 2023; right?
15	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: For 2023.
16	MS. RICHARDS: Right.
17	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Then we could go right
18	now and say, "Here's Option 3, less the furniture and
19	the water, and that in our next budget cycle, we
20	would approve the project to go out to bid," or do we
21	have to bid now?
22	MS. RICHARDS: Right. But understand that
23	just moving forward with that step involves working
24	with CCA, which involves cost. So there would be
25	some costs involved in this budget cycle.

1	DIRECTOR RUIZ: And staff time.
2	MS. RICHARDS: And staff time, right, in
3	this budget cycle, if we put a bid package together
4	with the intent to put it out to bid in early 2023.
5	So that's why we're asking for direction.
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So I'm confused.
7	DIRECTOR AITKEN: So I feel like when we
8	took the money from Heroes Hall to have them go
9	through all these steps, we
10	DIRECTOR RUIZ: No, but we took the money as
11	a compromise, right?
12	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Okay. Please let me
13	finish. I'm so sensitive to never interrupt. And
14	I'm so sensitive to be respectful. I just would like
15	a little bit of that in return sometimes.
16	I feel like we made a commitment to look
17	at this project, and the way and the reason that
18	I asked the questions in the way that I did is that
19	in a perfect world and with a perfect time frame,
20	we're not going to be breaking ground in
21	mid-October.
22	What we're just asking staff to do is
23	bring us back a bid with direction of what we want
24	minus the wall and the furniture, and then after
25	fair at some point, we are going to have to go

1	through with a fine-toothed comb and analyze how
2	many we don't know how many bids we're going to
3	get. We don't know how many are going to qualify.
4	We are just trying to start that process,
5	realistically not doing anything, this year.
6	So I do think that we should give staff
7	direction to move forward with Option 3 minus the
8	water feature and minus the furniture right now
9	because we know they're not going to come back next
10	month with a fully bidded-out package.
11	That's just not it's going to take time
12	to go through CCA to get the bid prepared to even
13	receive bids back.
14	But I feel like we did make a commitment
15	to this project, and now we're stepping back and
16	we're relitigating an issue that we, as a board,
17	made an initial commitment to.
18	So that's just my reservation.
19	DIRECTOR RUIZ: May I comment, Chair
20	La Belle?
21	CHAIR LA BELLE: Just a moment. Just to add
22	to what Ashleigh has indicated, I'm going on the
23	assumption that there's 70,000 still on the table
24	available from the foundation, and that's 70
25	MR. BERARDINO: You've got 70 another

1	70,000. Use it however, whenever you want.
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: It's the same money, the
3	same 100,000, but we've spent 30,000, whatever that
4	number was.
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Same money.
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And that balance is
7	still on the table. This is not additional money?
8	This is what we already
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: So that 70,000 that is
10	still on the table would cover the cost of completing
11	the bid package for whatever option, which would be
12	done by November. And at that point in time and
13	correct me if I'm wrong, Ken, but that 70,000 would
14	cover LOU No. 2 with CCA?
15	MR. KARNS: So for clarity, we will not know
16	the value of LOU No. 2 until whatever if it's
17	Option 3 and we try to work within the parameters of
18	the 500,000, that's what LOU No. 2 would be.
19	Until we decide what we actually want to
20	design and draw, I can't answer Chair La Belle's
21	question on how much we would spend.
22	If it's the full design, we will get that
23	price from CCA, the landscape architect, and we'll
24	know what our fees our professional fees are.
25	Obviously, if we're designing Option 1, it's much

1	less. If we're designing Option 3 with
2	alternatives, it would be a little bit more.
3	So I can't tell you if it will be exactly
4	70,000, Chair La Belle.
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: You're a good negotiator.
6	I know that. 70,000 is all you've got. Get us to
7	70,000, period.
8	MR. KARNS: Chair La Belle is making a good
9	point. We can design to a budget. That's what the
10	board sent us off to do. We designed three options
11	to budget. Again, whatever the board approves for
12	the budget, we would move forward.
13	And if I can, on timing, to help clarify,
14	if a decision was made today and we were to
15	start we've got a little fair coming up CCA
16	can be working in the background. Staff can, also.
17	By the time we got through this, conceivably, it
18	would be a 2023 physical project, conceivably.
19	If time allotted and things went well, it
20	could move a little quicker. I cannot commit to
21	that, but when you say "2023," if we were to pick
22	the ball back up in 2023, we'd be talking post fair
23	in 2023.
24	So doing this work now to actually get the
25	physical project done in 2023 is good work being

1	done now.
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And with that, I hold my
3	motion. Option 3, less the furniture and the water,
4	and you're seconding that?
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: And that second would
6	include to make sure that Barbara's good with this
7	would include moving forward with preparing the plans
8	and specifications in terms of the bid package, which
9	would be completed late October/November. The bids
10	would then go out, and bids would presumably be
11	awarded subject to coming in with whatever the budget
12	determination is sometime in early spring.
13	Is that correct?
14	MR. KARNS: Hopefully before early spring,
15	but in the first of the year. But, again, if the
16	board could give direction on a budget so that we can
17	enter LOU LOU No. 2, the full value, because,
18	again, CCA hires the contractor once the bid is
19	awarded, we do not. So the LOU covers the budget,
20	not just their fees.
21	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So us approving this
22	motion the way I just stated it would include the
23	timing; right? Because you would start right away,
24	do what you have to do.

My motion stands. I call for the

1	question.
2	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Quick question. So what
3	happens if we reject the bid? Again, we go through
4	all this all through this entire exercise and we
5	reject the bid? Have we burned through the \$70,000
6	with all that stuff?
7	So theoretically, at that point in the
8	scenario, if we had to decide whether to approve or
9	reject the bid, my concern would be that we'd be
LO	even under more immense pressure because at that
L1	point, we had already burned through \$100,000 of
L2	the Heroes Hall.
L3	MR. KARNS: So I'll reiterate that if we
L4	put if the will of the board is to move forward
L5	and we put a bid package on the street, it should be
L6	the intent to award within the budget established.
L7	The reason to reject a bid is not because
L8	we don't want to do it anymore. It's: Oh, it's
L9	\$750,000 and we have to rethink the scope of work.
20	Bids will be rejected. There could be other
21	scenarios, but not because we no longer want to do
22	it.
23	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Yeah. I just wanted to
24	clarify that because I heard earlier that you can

reject the bid. This limits that a little bit, so --

1	MR. KARNS: There can be extenuating
2	circumstances, but fundamentally, you want to know
3	what your budget is and have your marching orders
4	with the intent to award. It's not fair to the
5	industry.
6	VICE CHAIR PHAM: So if we approve today,
7	we're
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And I also just
9	don't agree with the fact that I think we had
10	already approved the project for 2024, so we know
11	that the board approved that project or approved
12	the concept, right, of having serenity garden?
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Natalie, the question has
14	been called by the
15	DIRECTOR RUIZ: It's just discussion.
16	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: But you're okay with the
17	second on the motion?
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: I'm okay with the second.
19	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Okay.
20	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Are we having
21	discussion or no discussion?
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: The question's been called.
23	Jeff, can you call the roll? Do you want
24	to repeat the motion one more time, Barbara, to
25	make sure we're all on the same wavelength?

1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I move that we go with
2	Option 3, but take out the water element and the
3	furniture.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: And that we proceed forward
5	with completing the bid package?
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So my understanding was
7	that with this motion, that's what that meant.
8	So am I I have to state it? That's why
9	I asked you earlier: Do I need to put that in the
10	motion, that we go forward with the bid process
11	now? Do I have to put that in the motion?
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: I think it's clear in terms
13	of what the intent is.
14	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I'll say let's just
15	make it real clear. So less the water and the
16	furniture and go out to bid now.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: For 2023?
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: That's the motion
19	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: That's when it would
20	happen, in 2023.
21	CHAIR LA BELLE: And the second?
22	Jeff, can you call the roll, please?
23	MR. WILLSON: Okay.
24	Chair La Belle?

1	MR. WILLSON: Vice chair Pham?
2	VICE CHAIR PHAM: I need to make I need a
3	little bit more information to make an informed
4	decision, so as of right now, no.
5	MR. WILLSON: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?
6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: No. And I have
7	a comment with that. So I support serenity okay.
8	So no.
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Natalie, let's
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Chair La Belle,
11	I feel like you're not allowing me to speak.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: No. You can speak. But
13	let's finish with the motion, and you can speak after
14	that.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Okay. So no,
16	and I will give my reasoning for not approving it
17	after.
18	MR. WILLSON: Director Ruiz?
19	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
20	MR. WILLSON: And Director Aitken?
21	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Natalie?
23	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: So the reason
24	why I voted no is not because I don't think that
25	serenity garden would be a great addition to the



1	fairgrounds and Heroes Hall.
2	But a couple of things I don't agree with.
3	Initially we approved for this to go out to bid for
4	the concepts under the idea of we were just going
5	to go look at concepts.
6	Now some of our board members feel that we
7	owe it to Heroes Hall to move forward with this.
8	We will eventually move forward with this, but this
9	was not supposed to be a precursor for moving the
10	timing up.
11	I fundamentally don't approve with pushing
12	something forward when we just voted to budget for
13	it as a capital project in 2024 less than seven
14	months ago.
15	So for those reasons, I voted no on this
16	project. If we had taken the issues in two
17	separate motions, approve a concept, I would have
18	approved Concept 3. And looking at the dates, I
19	would have explored 2023 as a concept.
20	But having our staff start the process
21	now, when we're heading into a fair and we're not
22	even fully staffed, we have a job fair coming up on
23	the 6th, we have 1,500 positions part-time to
24	approve, is reckless.

So that's my opinion. Thank you.

1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Natalie.
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And may I say this,
3	Chair La Belle?
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: In the future, if staff
6	could be more specific about that, that would help
7	me, right, with moving forward?
8	Because if staff had said, "Hey, the fair
9	is here" I know I heard the fair but "the
10	fair is here, and we don't really have the
11	bandwidth to do this right now," that's the kind of
12	input I would need to make this kind of decision.
13	Because we clearly want to do the serenity
14	walk. There's no question about that. It's just
15	when is it going to happen?
16	And in October nobody agreed that
17	October was, you know, the right time timing.
18	And we heard I've heard November. I've heard,
19	you know, spring.
20	So if we move forward we have voted.
21	It's three to two, right, to move forward with the
22	project?
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: It's four to two.
24	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Four to two, sorry.
25	Does this cause a problem for the fair and

1	staff? That's what I want to know.
2	MS. RICHARDS: Well, we're always going to
3	do our best. We do have a fair to put on. We do
4	have some hiring challenges. There's a lot on our
5	plates.
6	We'll move this forward with CCA. You
7	know, it will we'll move it along as quickly as
8	we can, but yeah, anything ahead of the fair causes
9	challenges for us, for sure.
10	But we understand we agree this is a
11	great project. We'd like to see it move forward as
12	well. So we'll keep the board apprised through the
13	leadership committee that has taken on this
14	project. We'll keep the board apprised of our
15	progress. And if there are operational issues that
16	get in the way that have to take priority, we'll
17	report that out.
18	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And what I appreciated
19	about that is our executive team is fully capable of
20	making those decisions, and I know you're not going
21	to do anything to jeopardize our fair.
22	So if things have to shift a little bit, I
23	think the board would be okay with that, speaking
24	for myself.
25	VICE CHAIR PHAM: I think it goes beyond



1	just the fair for me. I would have liked to see sort
2	of like a prioritized list of what is occurring this
3	next year with the capital projects and seeing
4	whether this kind of leap frogs or replaces some of
5	the other things, you know, just a little bit more
6	information on that front, because I want to respect
7	staff's capacity. If you put this out to bid,
8	staff's not prepared to execute on this project, that
9	could cause issues, too.
10	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. Well, understand
11	that you know, I'll represent staff, obviously.
12	We know that the board has varying opinions about any
13	topic that we put before the board. It's always our
14	desire to do what the board asks us to do.
15	So I very much appreciate your comment,
16	Director Pham. We'll always do our best no matter
17	what the direction is.
18	If there is an issue that or a priority
19	that the board has that we feel compromises another
20	priority, like the fair or another priority that
21	the board has already put before the staff, rest
22	assured, I will bring it back to the board for
23	discussion.
24	So as we move forward, if it causes

operational issues because of our challenges with

1	staffing, I will absolutely bring that back to you.
2	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
3	Let's take a five-minute break
4	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Thank you.
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: for a couple of deep
6	breaths; all right?
7	(Recess.)
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: The meeting is back in
9	session.
10	The next item on the agenda is Item 8B.
11	Again, we'll have Michele present the
12	staff report and then get public comments and bring
13	it back to the board for discussion.
14	Michele?
15	MS. RICHARDS: Okay. So any addition of
16	civil service head count to our staff requires
17	approval from the board, and typically each year as
18	part of the budget process, we anticipate any new
19	head count, and we include it in approval with the
20	budget.
21	But we find ourselves in need of some
22	additional head count that was not included in
23	2022, so I want to review those real quickly and
24	request board approval.
25	The first position is the state

1	classification called deputy manager one. That's
2	basically our supervisory position. We'd like to
3	bring that person on board within the next couple
4	of months.
5	This would serve as the equestrian center
6	manager that was you know, the board voted that
7	we would take over operation of the equestrian
8	center come January 1st, but we don't want to flip
9	the switch without a team in place, so we'd like to
LO	bring that person on as soon as possible.
L1	The fiscal impact to this year's budget
L2	would be approximately \$52,000, and that includes
L3	wages, full benefits, taxes, et cetera for the time
L4	period of September through December. On an
L5	ongoing basis, that would add about \$157,000
L6	annually. And, again, that's wages, taxes,
L7	benefits.
L8	The other position, again as we address
L9	staffing shortages in our accounting department,
20	we'd actually like to create a part-time civil
21	service opening, but for someone to work with us on
22	a year-round basis at the level of accounting
23	specialist one.

The fiscal impact for that -- adding that

1	about 24,750 for the remainder of this calendar
2	year and then thereafter, about 49,500. And,
3	again, that's an all-in number.
4	Our part-time civil service positions
5	receive prorated benefits and, you know, other
6	things.
7	So I'm asking for the board's approval to
8	staff up. We need these two positions.
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Michele, are there any more
LO	questions at this point?
L1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I just want to hear
L2	public comment, and then I'm ready to move forward.
L3	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Public comment,
L4	Michele?
L5	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Reggie Mundekis.
L6	MS. MUNDEKIS: Reggie Mundekis, and I
L7	appreciate the opportunity to address you on this
L8	matter. I support this. It's needed. The deputy
L9	manager for the equestrian center, that's a very
20	large job and is needed to create more political
21	programming along the lines of Centennial Farm.
22	And I'm really surprised we only need a
23	part-time person in accounting. So thank you.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Reggie.
25	I'll bring it back to the board for are

1	there any questions of Michele at this time?
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Chair La Belle, I'd like
3	to move that we
4	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Second.
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: We have a motion and a
6	second. Call the question.
7	Jeff, can you call the roll, please?
8	MR. WILLSON: Chair La Belle?
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.

1	Policy 6.05 reporting wrongdoing.
2	We see it as a duplication of the State's
3	whistleblower hotline and reporting process, and
4	there was a thought that the oversight of the
5	ethics hotline by the board, as the policy called
6	for, could be a potential conflict of interest.
7	So this has been approved by the board,
8	but we bring back the redline changes so that the
9	board can ratify those changes and we can get that
10	amended policy posted.
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public
12	comments?
13	MS. RICHARDS: No.
14	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Is there questions
15	of Michele?
16	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Chair La Belle, I move
17	that we accept recommendation to staff.
18	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I second.
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: Call the question.
20	Jeff, please call the roll.
21	MR. WILLSON: Chair La Belle?
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
23	MR. WILLSON: Vice chair Pham?
24	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Yes.
25	MR. WILLSON: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?



1	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
2	MR. WILLSON: Director Ruiz?
3	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
4	MR. WILLSON: Director Bagneris?
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yes.
б	MR. WILLSON: And Director Aitken?
7	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay.
9	The next thing is 8D, Michele?
10	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Another housekeeping
11	item, working with the governance committee, we also
12	looked at the Policy 6.06. That's the second
13	signature policy. So on all checks over or
14	transactions over \$15,000, it requires a second
15	signature in addition to the CEO.
16	Currently the policy states that the only
17	second signer is the vice president of operations,
18	currently Ken Karns, although we need to amend that
19	title, which should be chief operating officer.
20	It was also the committee's discussion and
21	staff's recommendation that we also add the rest of
22	the executive team, so the chief business
23	development officer and then when the position is
24	filled, the chief administrative officer. And that
25	gives proper support and backup to for checks

1	that need to be signed over 15,000.
2	So the recommendation is to approve the
3	committee's recommendation to add the chief
4	business development officer and the chief
5	administrative officer as second signors and to
6	update the title of vice president of operations to
7	chief operating officer.
8	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So my question Chair
9	La Belle, so my question would be: That's if
10	somebody's not here, then the next person down? It's
11	not just anybody, you get to pick which one you want
12	to do it?
13	MS. RICHARDS: That's right. So it would
14	mean that let me I want to make sure I
15	understand your question.
16	It would mean that any one of the three
17	other executives, the chief business development
18	officer, the chief administrative officer, or the
19	chief operating officer, could serve as a second
20	signor to my signature.
21	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And how is that and
22	how is that determined? That's what I'm trying to
23	get to. Do you just pick one at random and say,
24	"Today I want it to be Ken. Tomorrow I want it to be
25	Joan"? How is that determined?

1	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. There would be no
2	order. Typically, it would first probably go to the
3	chief administrative officer, who would oversee
4	finance. But if that person were on vacation
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And that's my point.
6	It's based on availability; right?
7	MS. RICHARDS: Yes.
8	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: You're going down the
9	chain, highest to lowest? I hate to say it that way.
L O	MS. RICHARDS: I know. I don't like to
L1	think of my team as a chain.
L2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Yeah. It didn't sound
L3	right when I said it. It's not just today you want
L4	one person to do it; next time you let this person do
L5	it; give the third person a chance; right?
L6	MS. RICHARDS: That's right.
L7	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: No. There is some
L8	process for who you choose?
L9	MS. RICHARDS: Right. Exactly.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: You can always draw straws.
21	Okay. Any further questions? Any public
22	speakers?
23	(No response.)
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Bring it back to the
25	board.

1	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Chair, I move to approve

1	the Centennial Farm Foundation, quote:
2	"District at its sole discretion
3	may provide to each active foundation
4	board member one complimentary pass to
5	district's annual county fair, which
6	pass may include an F Lot parking hang
7	tag.
8	"The type and quantity of
9	additional complimentary passes will
10	be assessed by the district on an
11	annual basis."
12	As a reminder, last year the board voted
13	to be consistent with what the Fair Time staff
14	gets, and that is ten general admission fair passes
15	at a cost of \$2 each.
16	So our recommendation is to repeat that,
17	to provide one F Lot parking pass to each
18	foundation board member, one pass for that board
19	member to get into the fair each day, and then for
20	them to have the ability to purchase up to ten
21	general admission tickets for their family and
22	guests at \$2 each.
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: Michele, is that the same
24	procedure still for the part-time staff?
25	MS. RICHARDS: That's correct.

1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So my question before
2	is: Wasn't it \$1 before? So it's gone up,
3	inflation?
4	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. It had been a dollar in
5	the past. We raised it to \$2 last year.
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: And it's still a bargain in
7	view of the fact that that \$2 pass enables you to get
8	in any day of the fair? It's not restricted by the
9	attendance; correct?
10	MS. RICHARDS: That's correct.
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Any public comments?
12	(No response.)
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Bring it back to the
14	board for
15	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Chair La Belle, I move
16	we approve the recommendation.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I second.
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: We have a motion and a
19	second.
20	Any further discussion?
21	(No response.)
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Call the question.
23	Jeff, please.

15	Natalie, we've got some very exciting
16	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I do have some.
17	CHAIR LA BELLE: Oh, I'm sorry.

19	monitoring, but
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yeah. We'll go back to
21	that, too. I can't even read. I didn't

1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay.
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: We did meet on the 13th
3	of May, and we're still moving forward with the LED
4	project for Plaza Pacifica. We do know after the
5	feasibility study, it could be completed within two
6	to three weeks.
7	This is also Asian-American Pacific
8	Islander month, and there's always the community
9	affairs committee that likes to recognize those
10	particular activities, and I do know that there is
11	a slide for that.
12	But before you do that, we did discuss
13	having that moment of silence during this
14	particular portion of the agenda, and at the time,
15	we only had we were going to honor Dr. John
16	Chang, who was one of the persons killed in the
17	Laguna Woods shooting, but we also knew that we
18	needed to discuss the other ones as well. We
19	couldn't just call the one out.
20	But specifically him because this is Asian
21	Pacific Islander month. We thought that we should
22	give some tribute to him, and so there is some
23	information there on the screen about him.
24	MS. RICHARDS: Actually, this is about Asian
25	agricultural producers in California.



1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Oh, I'm sorry. Okay.
2	So if you would, go ahead. Thank you.
3	MS. RICHARDS: Sure. Yeah.
4	This information is from the
5	U.S. Department of Agriculture, but specific to
6	California. There are 7,038 Asian agriculture
7	producers in California alone, and Asian producers
8	are responsible for \$7.5 billion in agriculture
9	sales nationwide.
10	So we wanted to salute the community that
11	we honored this month, but also tie that community
12	to their contributions in agriculture.
13	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And I apologize for
14	thinking that was Mr. Chang.
15	Thank you for that. We appreciate staff
16	and how they always are prepared to help us through
17	our cultural months.
18	With that, do you want me to do the
19	financial report?
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes, Barbara, please.
21	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Okay. So we did meet on
22	the 20th. Our finances look extremely good, as
23	everyone knows. And I know that in your CEO report,
24	you're going to go through the finances, so I will
25	not.



1	MS. RICHARDS: Okay.
2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: But also, the 2021 audit
3	is going on, and they're about 50 percent complete at
4	this time, so we're moving forward with the audit.
5	And our next meeting will be on the 17th of June.
6	So with that, I take it back to you, Chair
7	La Belle.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Barbara.
9	Entertainment and business development
10	committee, Natalie?
11	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I'm going to go
12	ahead and defer to Michele with that one because
13	you'll state it much better.

16	performances this year. Ticket sales are robust, and
17	the community is really excited.
18	Just a note that we are reactivating the
19	Action Sports Arena, so the craft beer festival
20	will be in the arena this year. We've got monster
21	trucks coming back, demolition derby, so people are
22	quite happy about the Action Sports Arena.
23	We've added new shows to the Pacific
24	Amphitheater. People seem to be very excited about
25	Boy George and Culture Club coming.

1	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Maxwell.
2	MS. RICHARDS: Maxwell.
3	So get your tickets. Go online,
4	OCfair.com or PacAmp.com, and get your fair
5	tickets. It's going to be a great, great season.
6	We're actually very proud of the variety
7	of performances. There's a little bit for
8	everybody on the on the lineup this year.
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
10	Moving on to the CEO's operational
11	announcements and updates.
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Chair La Belle, before
13	you do that
14	CHAIR LA BELLE: I'm sorry.
15	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: what do the committee
16	members actually have to do to support that
17	committee? Because this all seems so operational to
18	me, so I'm not sure what this committee needs to do
19	with that.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: I should probably speak to
21	that. I was the one who created that and asked
22	Natalie and Sandra to serve on it.
23	The intent is, as we expand our operations
24	in terms of the hangar and Pacific Amp, you
25	know, we're striving to get up to 40 concerts this

1	year.
2	My feeling is that having two directors
3	work with Michele and her staff, you know, kind of
4	providing input in terms of possible opportunities
5	for other entertainment and that sort of thing
6	would be a good, beneficial benefit.
7	And, again, it was my decision as the
8	chair, and obviously that's up to a future chair to
9	decide if he or she wants to continue in that vein.
LO	So that was my objective when I set it up.
L1	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
L2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: It seems like any of us
L3	could do it; right?
L4	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes. Everybody.
L5	I'm not qualified to do it. It's definitely
L6	operational for sure.
L7	I think the part that we can be helpful is
L8	when we're doing the master site plan and making
L9	recommendations to the things that need to be done
20	to Pacific Amphitheater, which has become very
21	apparent after we got our review from staff on why
22	we can't get certain acts here so I think that's
23	an area where we I'm trying to figure out as
24	well, like, where I can help on the governance

side, because I always try to make it clear,

1	operational versus governance.
2	So that's definitely an area where
3	Director Cervantes and I are both focused on doing
4	that.
5	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: And clearly the Chair
6	was within his rights to do that. Because I'm
7	reading this and going, "Well, how can the committee
8	help?"
9	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yeah. We do
10	help. We don't make any recommendations for acts,
11	either.
12	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Because I can give you
13	some.
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: We'll pass them
15	along and give them to Michele.
16	CHAIR LA BELLE: That's a very good point.
17	We are limited in terms of some of the stuff we do
18	there, given the current condition. The Pac Amp is
19	40 years old, give or take a year or two, and there
20	are things that we can be doing. And having Sandra
21	on the committee helps getting that input from staff
22	to you to, ultimately, the board.
23	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Natalie's going to get us
24	Harry Styles next year.
25	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: It will be our



1	whole budget for three years.
2	MS. RICHARDS: At a thousand dollars a seat.
3	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And we did get a
4	really good overview from Dan on, you know, what acts
5	cost, what based on the size of our facility, who
6	we could even consider hosting, who we are competing
7	with in the market. FivePoint Amphitheater is also
8	new. So there are a lot of factors that play into it
9	as to what we get.
10	We also question the diversity of acts
11	that come here from a cultural perspective. And it
12	appears to us that they are doing the best that
13	they can to get acts who are willing to come to
14	Pacific Amphitheater in its current state.
15	We completely love the work that Dan and
16	his team and Michele are doing, so
17	CHAIR LA BELLE: Very good. Okay.
18	Michele?
19	MS. RICHARDS: No closed session?
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: No closed session. Right.
21	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. You didn't say that
22	loud enough.
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: No closed session.
24	MS. RICHARDS: We're just going to take a
25	few minutes to give some interesting updates.



1	I'm very happy to report that our spring
2	events program is far exceeding expectations.
3	We've been so happy to welcome back some of our
4	community favorites who have not been able to host
5	their full events here for two years, including the
6	OC marathon, which Director Aitken participated in.
7	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I did not win.
8	MS. RICHARDS: Correct.
9	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: You have to do better
10	next time.
11	DIRECTOR AITKEN: By two hours.
12	MS. RICHARDS: Also, OCC, their graduation
13	ceremony is back in the Pacific Amphitheater, and you
14	can see them setting up here in the parking lot.
15	Costa Mesa Speedway came back as of last
16	weekend, and the grandstands were packed. Their
17	fans were so happy to come back.
18	And then we're looking forward to Scottish
19	Fest as well.
20	Just to give you kind of a marker, we
21	for the 2022, we budgeted 101 year-round events,
22	and currently we're projecting 128 this year.
23	So it's been a good job by our events
24	team, our events sales team and our operations
25	teams who pack up the fair and continue to work

1 very, very hard year-round on those events. 2 Some of you may have been tracking OCTA's 3 news regarding construction on the 405 and 55, and 4 certainly we've all been stuck in construction traffic; right? I'm happy to hear that a lot of 5 6 your members are staying very active, very busy. 7 DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes. 8 MS. RICHARDS: Our two concerns involve --9 with those projects involve the expansion of the 10 Fairview exit overpass and the 55 freeway widening 11 project and the potential impact on fair traffic. 12 We've been in frequent communication with 13 OCTA, and we're very happy that neither project 14 will negatively impact fair traffic. And, in fact, 15 for anyone that exited on Fairview to come to this 16 meeting, you know that it actually has created more 17 lanes for traffic, so we're very pleased that that 18 will help in traffic control as people come to the

19 fair.

I mentioned earlier that we're very happy to finalize the LOU with OC Animal Care regarding the use of the property during emergencies. A part of that LOU not only details our emergency communications procedure with OC Animal Care in case of an evacuation, but the district will also

1	receive compensation from OC Animal Care if we
2	receive animals during an evacuation.
3	So that will help offset our labor costs
4	and equipment and materials costs for responding in
5	an emergency. So we're very happy to have
6	partnered with OC Animal Care on that.
7	It's beginning to look a lot like fair
8	around here. RCS trucks have begun loading in,
9	including some of the 22 semi-trucks it takes to
10	transport La Grande Wheel XL. Crews have been busy
11	all week installing the towers and cables of the
12	sky ride. We are just 50 days away from opening.
13	Yes.
14	MR. KARNS: 48 days and 23 hours and 15
15	minutes.
16	MS. RICHARDS: Ken's got a more exact
17	pinpoint; right?
18	Heroes Hall is getting ready for the fair
19	as well. The bronze plaques that make up the Walk
20	of Honor at Heroes Hall are getting expertly
21	polished up to be in tip top shape for our guests.
22	And in case you haven't heard, because
23	we're blasting this however we can, just like many
24	businesses out there, we are challenged with
25	filling all of our fair time job openings, and we



1	will be holding a hiring event.
2	We're not calling it a job fair because
3	it's a hiring event. We are hiring this Saturday,
4	June 4th, from 10:00 to 2:00 p.m. right out here in
5	front of the admin building. These are great jobs
6	for students, for teachers, retired folks, or
7	anyone looking for a fun summer job. And our
8	hiring supervisors will be on hand to conduct
9	interviews right on the spot.
10	So to save time, we're asking people to
11	get their application in ahead of time online and
12	then RSVP and let us know you're coming.
13	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Michele, just for clarity,
14	this is just to work for the OC fair. This is not to
15	work for concessionaires, RCS, et cetera?
16	MS. RICHARDS: Correct. We've invited Oak
17	View Group/Spectra to join us in hiring, and the City
18	of Costa Mesa is also participating, but this is not
19	to work for the individual concessionaires or
20	merchants; okay?
21	And last but not least, happy Memorial
22	Day, everyone, and a special salute to all those
23	who serve our country.
24	Some quick financial information, as
25	Barbara indicated, we are doing quite well against

1	budget for both revenue and expenses. This is the
2	time of year that we spend more money than we earn,
3	but we expect that, and we budget for that. The
4	good news is revenue is higher than budgeted, and
5	expenses are lower than budgeted.
6	So at this point in time, we are
7	2.58 million favorable to budget, and our cash and
8	cash equivalence as of the end of April is
9	61.3 million. That's a 54.1 percent year-over-year
LO	increase. So all of those losses that we
L1	experienced in 2020 and 2021, we're making up for.
L2	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: So just a comment on
L3	that 61 million, the governor can come get that at
L4	any time; right?
L5	MS. RICHARDS: Those are State funds. They
L6	don't belong to the 32nd DAA. We are stewards of
L7	those funds. Yeah.
L8	I'm going to turn it over to Joan for a
L9	very quick events update.
20	MS. ROBBINS: Yes. Good morning. I can
21	still say good morning.
22	As Michele mentioned, June is very busy
23	and June is shaping up to be another busy month,
24	and it's a shorter month. So we are setting up for
2.5	fair right now, so I'll jump right to it.



1	This weekend makes the return of Scottish
2	Fest, May 28th and 29th, and this is two days of
3	world-class Celtic music, piping, and drumming
4	competitions, Highland dancing, Scottish heavy
5	athletics, gifts, food, Scottish clans and
6	genealogy, children's events, and much more.
7	Fight Club OC is on the 2nd in the hangar.
8	Michele referenced the hiring event that's taking
9	place on June 4th, so we're looking forward to
10	that.
11	We have the Amigo SoCal World Guitar Show
12	the 4th and the 5th of June, and that's an
13	international buy-sell trade event for guitars,
14	amplifiers, and other musical gear.
15	There are two speedways, which is two
16	more speedways coming up in the month of June,
17	June 4th and June 11th, the 4th being Harley night.
18	And on both nights the gate opens the gates open
19	at 5:30, qualifying starts at 6:00, and the first
20	race is at 7:00.
21	And then we go to the classic Volkswagen
22	and Porsche car show, which takes place on Sunday,
23	June 5th. And this is a Porsche and Volkswagen
24	show and display. There will be new parts vendors

displaying and selling their products from the VW

1	and lifestyle industry, and it will feature a large
2	swap meet area for selling used VW
3	automotive-related items.
4	The Michelada Throwdown will be presented
5	by the original OC swap meet promoter to bring
6	SoCal's best, Michelada mixes, a car exhibition,
7	food, games, and live music, and that's on the
8	11th.
9	And the following day we have the OC swap
10	meet taking place; night market, the last night
11	market of the season before the fair, and that
12	takes place June 17th through 19th. Friday the
13	hours are from 4:00 to 11:00, and Saturday and
14	Sunday, it's from 1:00 to 11:00.
15	And then we'll close out the events prior
16	to fair with Repticon that is taking place in the
17	hangar, June 18th and 19th, offering reptile pets,
18	supplies, feeders, cages, and merchandise and live
19	animal seminars. So that's Saturday and Sunday,
20	June 18th and 19th.
21	Of course, COVID testing is continuing
22	Monday through Friday in our parking lot here, and
23	Farmers Market each and every Thursday.
24	And you can always go to OCfair.com to
25	find out more information on all of these wonderful

1	events.
2	Centennial Farm and Heroes Hall at
3	Centennial Farm, we have had a lot of activity
4	visitor-wise and animal-wise and people-wise.
5	On the animal-wise front, we have a lot of
6	new additions to the farm family. Our goat
7	that's, you'll see on the top left, Aphrodite
8	had kid triplets, two male and one female, and
9	she's posing for this picture.
10	She has you can't really see it here,
11	but her tongue is out. She's very proud of herself
12	with her beautiful goats right there. She's a
13	dairy breed of goat. I would invite you to go out
14	to the farm and take a look.
15	We have and are very happy that we have a
16	beautiful one-year-old black heifer calf. Her name
17	is April, and she hails from San Jacinto,
18	California. She was bottle-fed, so she's very
19	human friendly. So she's a beautiful, beautiful
20	the picture doesn't do her justice. She's friendly
21	to humans.
22	And then just one week ago today came this
23	beautiful little Angora goat that you can see at
24	the top of the screen here. She's a female. She's

tiny, but she's very mighty and full of energy.

1	She's jumping around the pen and very happy.
2	And then I just wanted to mention that the
3	last day of our abbreviated school tour season
4	comes to an end. That's on June 2nd. I just
5	wanted to also mention that despite the abbreviated
6	season, we had about 21,000 students visit that
7	will have visited from January until June 2nd. So
8	we started the season late, so we're really happy
9	with that number. We've very much embraced it's
10	about half of what a normal season would bring with
11	our school tours.
12	Sorry. I shut that off. Excuse me.
13	And then Heroes Hall continues on the 6th
14	of our speaker series. The last the last one
15	prior to fair takes place on June 18th at
16	1:00 o'clock this time. Normally they're at 11:00,
17	but this time is at 1:00.
18	And in celebration of Pride Month, a
19	documentary, "Our Service, Our Stories," will be
20	screened, and then will follow with a panel

documentary, "Our Service, Our Stories," will be screened, and then will follow with a panel discussion led by Stephanie Wade with LGBT military veterans answering questions and discussing their experience in the U.S. armed forces from Vietnam through the conflicts in the Middle East.

So they'll be talking about a variety of



1	topics of what it's like to have served and
2	continue to serve as an LGBT member of the
3	community.
4	So free reservations. You can go on the
5	Heroes Hall page of our website and you can sign up
6	for that. I'm looking forward to that.
7	And then, of course, the Fighting for the
8	Right exhibit continues and will continue through
9	the fair on the first floor of Heroes Hall. And
LO	then on the second floor is the refurbished
L1	Santa Ana Army Air Base exhibit, which is ongoing.
L2	And that's all I have for my report. I'm
L3	happy to answer any questions, if there are any
L4	from the board.
L5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Joan.
L6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I just have a question
L7	about no. A comment. I went to the night market,
L8	and when I went before the pandemic it's twice as
L9	big, isn't it?
20	MS. ROBBINS: It's about the same size.
21	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: About the same?
22	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah.
23	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Okay. It just seemed
24	huge to me.
25	MS. ROBBINS: Everyone was running to come

1	out to visit, so maybe it was the attendance. It's
2	about the same.
3	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: It was great. It was
4	great.
5	MS. ROBBINS: Always a great event.
6	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: I had some food. I
7	hadn't eaten before, but I really enjoyed it.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: I should go to the
9	Volkswagen Porsche event. My first new car in 1964
10	was a Volkswagen Betle. It came with whitewalls and
11	a radio for \$1,495. 1,495.

LO	got that Maxwell concert. You had me. I'm ready for
L1	that. Anybody have any tickets? Let me know.
L2	So I just want to say it's always good to
L3	see everybody. It's good to see you, Director
L4	Pham.
L5	Are there any more children in the works?
L6	VICE CHAIR PHAM: No. I think we're good
L7	for now. It's a lot of work.
L8	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: You know, fair time is
L9	when we start seeing all the babies.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: You can never have more
21	kids than you have parents. That's a mistake that I
22	made.
23	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Too late.
24	DIRECTOR BAGNERIS: Thank you for another
25	good meeting, because I was worried, but we've done

1	good. So thank you.
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Too late for me. Michael
3	and I are already outnumbered.
4	Thank you to the staff and to my fellow
5	directors. Good meeting. Happy Memorial Day to
6	everyone. Thank you to those who served. Thank
7	you to those who have lost and given everything
8	this week. Go home and hug your children, hug your
9	babies.
10	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Ashleigh.
11	Robert?
12	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes. I just wanted to wish
13	everyone a happy and safe Memorial Day weekend as
14	well. I mean, this is my first meeting since before
15	COVID. I didn't recognize some of the people, but
16	it's good to see everyone again, and everyone, again,
17	have a safe and a happy Memorial Day. Thank you.
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Robert.
19	First of all, thanks to staff for all your
20	hard work. And I'm looking forward to the fair.
21	This will be my eleventh fair, I think, if I'm
22	counting correctly, and on a personal note, I know
23	Barbara and Ashleigh and Robert will probably
24	remember my little grandson running around, six,

4	And with that, let's look forward to
5	whatever deep-fried wonder we're going to
6	experience at the 2022 fair.

8	declare the meeting adjourned.
