7	CHAIR LA BELLE: Good morning, everyone, and welcome
8	to the monthly meeting of the 32nd DAA, the OC Fair and Event
9	Center.
10	Michelle, could you go ahead and introduce the call
11	to order?
12	MS. RICHARDS: I will.
13	All matters noticed on this ajenda in any category
14	may be considered for action as listed. Any item not so
15	noticed may not be considered. Items listed on this ajenda
16	may be considered in any order at the discretion of the
17	chairperson.
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
19	The mission of the OC Fair and Event Center is
20	creating equitable communities, access to agriculture,
21	entertainment, culture and educational experiences.
22	With that, the pledge of allegiance.
23	Nick, could I ask you to lead us in the pledge?
24	BOARD MEMBER KOVACEVICH: Sure.
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: Can we have the minutes of the



1	board meeting held on well, wait a minute. I guess we

19	Is there a motion and a second?
20	BOARD MEMBER CERVANTES: I second.
21	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: Director Director La
22	Belle, before I have a correction.
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Go ahead, Barbara.
24	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: On Page 4 of 7, where it
25	speaks in the third paragraph down, it talks about me

1	supporting Option 3. Then the next says, Director Aitken
2	asks that everyone treat each other with respect.
3	It makes it sound like that may be tied to me. I
4	just want to make sure that, for future reference, it's not
5	tied to me; that comment wasn't made for me.
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Duly noted.
7	Now is there a motion?
8	BOARD MEMBER CERVANTES: So moved. So moved.
9	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: I second.
10	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. There's a motion by Sandra.
11	Second.
12	MS. ANGUS: Chair La Belle.
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
14	MS. ANGUS: Vice Chair Pham.
15	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Yes.
16	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia.
17	BOARD MEMBER RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.

25	Michelle, can you introduce that, please?



1	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Public comment is allowed on
2	issues not on the current agenda; however, no debate by the
3	board shall be permitted on such public comments and no
4	action will be taken on such public comment items at this
5	time, as law requires formal public notice prior to any
6	action on a docket item.
7	Speakers are requested to fill out and submit a
8	comment card to the meeting secretary prior to the start of
9	the meeting and are limited to three minutes.
10	Comments will be accepted on all other agenda items
11	at the time each item is listed on the agenda.
12	Speakers wishing to address the Board on items on
13	the agenda are requested to fill out and submit a comment
14	card to the meeting secretary prior to the start of the
15	meeting and identify the agenda items on which you desire to
16	address the Board. Speakers are limited to three minutes.
17	And we do have one public comment card.
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Go ahead, Michele.
19	MS. RICHARDS: Reggie Mundikis.
20	MS. MUNDIKIS: Good morning. Reggie Mundikis. And
21	thank you for this opportunity to address you this morning.
22	This morning the Supreme Court in case New York
23	State Rifle & Pistol Association v. Bruen Superintendent of
24	New York State Police issued a ruling regarding concealed

carry permits and other issues regarding gun control.

25

1	So in light of this, this is a new opinion, came
2	down a few hours ago, in the next few months, the Board
3	governance committee may want to review this opinion with
4	legal counsel and determine if a new policy regarding
5	concealed carry and other weapons issues is needed at the OC
6	Fairgrounds to keep our property as safe as we can for the
7	current environment.
8	Thank you.
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Reggie.
10	Any other public comments?
11	MS. RICHARDS: There are none.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Consent calendar.
13	MS. RICHARDS: Staff needs to pull a couple of items
14	and also make a correction. If you will look under Standard
15	Agreements near the bottom on the bottom line, looking at
16	Standard Agreement SA18522SP, this contract is for a revenue
17	generating sponsorship contract with the California
18	Department of Water.
19	You'll notice the amount of the sponsorship is for
20	\$40,000, but it was inadvertently entered under the expense
21	column, rather than the received column.
22	So just clarifying that this is a revenue contract,
23	as opposed to an expense contract. And then under Commercial
24	Rental Agreements, we're pulling four of those. These are
25	for the merchants that are with us during the fair.



1	And as hard as our staff has been working to
2	complete those agreements and get everyone's paperwork in,
3	there are four that are not quite ready yet. So we're
4	pulling those, and we will bring those back in September for
5	the consent calendar.
6	So those are rental agreements commercial rental
7	agreements under Section D, 22035, 22082, 22149, and 22150.
8	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: What was the second one?
9	MS. RICHARDS: 22082.
10	And, again, those are for individual merchants that
11	will be with us during the fair. Everything else on the
12	consent calendar is good.
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you. Thanks, Michele.
14	Is there a motion?
15	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: Director Bagneris. I move
16	to a motion.
17	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: Second, Sandra.
18	CHAIR LA BELLE: A motion and a second.
19	Roll call, please.
20	MS. ANGUS: Chair La Belle.

8	down to governance process.
9	Michele, you want to proceed with Item 8A?
10	MS. RICHARDS: Yes, it's my pleasure.
11	Dr. Angelica Suarez assumed the office of president
12	of Orange Coast College in July of 2019, just a few months
13	before the pandemic shut things down and sent all the OCC
14	students home.
15	I know it was a thrill for her to preside over her
16	very first in-person commencement on May 27th in the Pacific
17	Amphitheater. With her that day and today is Doug Bennett,
18	executive director of the Orange Coast College Foundation.
19	And we welcome them here today to present a very
20	special award to the OC Fair and Event Center.
21	Dr. Suarez.
22	THE WITNESS: Thank you very much, Michele, and good
23	morning to the Board. We are very excited to join you today
24	and present the resolution that you see to your I was
25	going to say to my right.

I would like to share with you just some of the
comments that were shared at our commencement ceremony about
the partnership that we so value with the Orange County Fai
and Event Center, if you'll endulge me for a few minutes.

So at our Orange Coast College 74th commencement ceremony just last month, the students, the faculty, and staff, and administration of Orange Coast College honored the Orange County Fair and Event Center as our 2022 Community Partner of the Year.

The OC Fair and Event Center is richly deserving of this honor because of its generous support of Orange Coast College for over 50 years.

For over 25 years the Event Center and OCC has a cooperative parking agreement that allows Orange Coast College students to park at fairgrounds during peak times and allows fall visitors and employees to park at OCC during the annual county fair.

The cooperative partnership was especially helpful during the recent construction projects that allowed OCC students to park at the fair when the college parking lots were closed.

And you probably have seen our campus completely transformed over the past year. As we've often said, if there is a silver lining in the pandemic, in that we were able to finish five construction projects.



1	So I encourage you, if you have time, to stop by the
2	campus and see those beautiful new facilities.
3	Since 2024, the fair has made the Pacific
4	Amphitheater available for the college and the commencement
5	ceremonies as part of the reciprocal parking agreement.
6	The cooperative parking partnership extends to
7	college special events, a senior day, and Orange County
8	Children's Book Festival, and high attendance events at the
9	fairgrounds.
10	The Orange County fair has a long-time tradition of
11	hiring OCC students as part-time seasonal positions during
12	the annual county fair, which really provides OCC students
13	with summer income and gives the fair enthusiastic seasonal
14	employees as well.
15	So for this partnership and the support of Orange
16	Coast College, the Orange County Fair and Event Center
17	deserves the honor as Orange Coast College 2022 Community
18	Partner of the Year.
19	Congratulations to all of you, and thank you for the
20	partnership.
21	MS. RICHARDS: Can we get a photo with the Board
22	members?
23	I have to say, on a personal note, it was such an
24	honor to be on stage with Dr. Suarez during commencement.
25	You'll see some photos on the screen.

1	And these students that graduated this year from
2	Orange Coast College are sort of the COVID class, right? The
3	kids that graduated did not even get to participate in their
4	high school commencement because of the shutdown in 2020.
5	So what a thrill for them to be able to walk across
6	the stage at the Pacific Amphitheater.
7	So thank you so much for that honor.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Michelle, Item 8B, review of
9	renewal MOU with the Hero's Hall Veterans Foundation.
10	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. So the current MOU with the
11	Hero's Hall Veterans Foundation is set to expire on June
12	28th.
13	We have had input from the foundation and also in
14	regards to Director Bagneris's request that the Board have a
15	discussion regarding our Board members serving on the
16	Centennial Farm Foundation Board and the Hero's Hall Veterans
17	Foundation Board.
18	Staff is recommending that, so as not to rush any
19	changes on the MOU, to give our Board the opportunity to
20	really review the MOU thoroughly, give the foundation an
21	opportunity to review it thoroughly because the MOU is a
22	cooperative agreement where both parties agree on the content
23	of the MOU.
24	We're recommending that the Board extend the current

term of the Hero's Hall Veterans Foundation MOU through the

1	end of the year. That will allow us to get through the fair
2	and then agendize the discussion after the fair for moving
3	forward.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele.
5	Are there any public speakers?
6	MS. RICHARDS: There are no public comments.
7	CHAIR LA BELLE: Any comments from the directors or
8	a motion and a second would be in order?
9	BOARD MEMBER CERVANTES: I so move.
10	CHAIR LA BELLE: We have a motion.
11	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: And I'll second.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: A motion and a second.
13	Okay. Please call roll, Summer.
14	MS. ANGUS: Chair La Belle.
15	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
16	MS. ANGUS: Vice Chair Pham.
17	VICE CHAIR PHAM: Yes.
18	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia.
19	BOARD MEMBER RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
20	MS. ANGUS: Director Cervantes.
21	BOARD MEMBER CERVANTES: Yes.
22	MS. ANGUS: Director Bagneris.
23	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: Yes.
24	MS. ANGUS: And Director Kovacevich.
25	BOARD MEMBER KOVACEVICH: Yes.



1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Very good. Okay. Item 8C; we have
2	a presentation on that one, Michelle.
3	MS. RICHARDS: I'm going to stand for this one.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: All right.
5	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you so much.
6	Are we on here? Yes?
7	Okay. So during the budget process for 2022, a
8	recommendation was made by the Board of Directors for the
9	staff to provide a mid-year State of the Fair presentation
10	for the Board and public.
11	The idea would be to mimic what many cities do with
12	their State of the City Address and what our president does
13	in his annual State of the Union Address, a way to let the
14	governing Board and the public know how we're doing.
15	So today I'm going to review a few key aspects of
16	our overall business and provide you all with exactly that:
17	How we're doing.
18	So let's start with our place within the fair
19	industry. So let's face it, COVID wreaked havoc on the fair
20	industry, many industries for that fact, and we're continuing
21	to the see the ripple effects.
22	The cancellation of the 2020 OC Fair had a major
23	impact on our operations and our financials. COVID also
24	reshuffled the deck and created the opportunity for us to see
25	many things through a different lense.

2.2

The OC Fair was No. 1 in California last year and
No. 7 in the U.S., but those rankings were based solely on
attendance numbers. We're challenging the fair industry to
think differently about how fairs are measured and what makes
a top fair top.

We learned last year that bigger is not always better. Bigger is bigger, but better is better, and that's what we will continue to strive for.

We're now looking at the right metrics to measure the success of the fair: How was the guest experience? Did we serve our community? Did we manage our resources properly? Were we good neighbors to the peoples and businesses surrounding us? And we're pushing the fair industry to join us in this paradigm shift.

We were honored by Western Fair's Association with nineteen achievement awards for the 2021 OC Fair and by six awards at the international level from the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

We just don't receive from the fair industry, we give back too. Our staff serves at a variety of levels within the fair industry on boards like the California Fair's Alliance, committees through the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, and Western Fair's Association, and as panelists, workshop presenters, and certification trainers for those organizations.



1	Our place in the industry is enviable. We are
2	viewed as successful, generous, innovative, and leaders, and
3	that's what makes a top fair.
4	From September of 2021 through March of this year,
5	the Board actively participated in a rigorous planning
6	process, which resulted in a new mission and vision and a
7	strategic plan focused on key initiatives for the annual OC
8	Fair, our year-round events program, our educational assets,
9	like Hero's Hall and Centennial Farm, the equestrian center,
10	and our community support programs.
11	You can find that plan on our website and staff is
12	actively completing and working through each of the
13	initiatives in the plan.
14	The 2022 operating plan included 31 capital projects
15	and purchases; eleven have been completed to date, 19 are
16	active, and one is currently on hold, and we'll be
17	introducing our ten-year Master Site Plan sometime in the
18	fall with the timeline, budget, and funding plan.
19	But if you read the strategic plan in detail, there
20	is one thing that stands out more than any other, and that's
21	community.
22	We engage the community by supporting the community.
23	We engage the community by giving back. We engage the
24	community through our free educational assets. During the

pandemic, we partnered with Power of One Foundation to

25

1	distribute emergency food to the community, some of it came
2	from our own Centennial Farm.
3	We provided a site for the City of Costa Mesa to
4	host trailers for the vulnerable houseless population in
5	Costa Mesa exposed to COVID. Thankfully we never had to use
6	those trailers.
7	We worked with the county to serve as a COVID
8	testing site and a vaccination superpod, all while working
9	hard to bring back our year-round events and the OC Fair.
10	Remember the drive-in concerts and the fair food drive-thru
11	events?
12	We were also activated multiple times as a large
13	animal evacuation center during wildfires. Many of us serve
14	on Boards and committees outside the organization and outside
15	our industry to support the community.
16	Like several of us serve as workplace mentors for
17	Big Brothers and Big Sisters, the Board of Girl Scouts of
18	Orange County, the Board of California Construction
19	Authority, the Board for the OC Sports Commission, South
20	Coast Metro Alliance, committees on Orange County Business
21	Council, on the Board of the Costa Mesa Chamber of Commence,
22	committees with WFA and IAFE, on the Board of the
23	International Facility of Management Association, IFMA, the
24	International Association of Venue Managers, and the

California State Rules Committee.

1	Last year we provided 2500 fair admission ticket
2	donations to the neediest in our community, and we're
3	doubling that number this year so that those who would not
4	otherwise be able to visit the OC Fair can attend.
5	We held Imaginology for the first time in two years,
6	in-person, providing a free opportunity for students,
7	teachers, and families to explore, discover, and learn. Our
8	educational assets continue to provide opportunities for
9	learning and understanding.
10	Centennial Farm welcomed over 91,000 visitors this
11	past school year, conducted 13 garden classes with 358
12	participants, and logged over 2400 volunteer hours from farm
13	doses.
14	Likewise, Hero's Hall has welcomed 12,093 visitors
15	since the beginning of the year, which, by the way, is more
16	than double the number for the same period in 2019.
17	To date, Hero's Hall has hosted six events in our
18	speakers series with one more scheduled in September. We're
19	also planning our annual Veteran's Day celebration in
20	November.
21	We've earned a place of respect within our
22	community. The OC Fair and Event Center has continued to
23	grow and evolve as we develop new business in responsible
24	ways.

REGAL

We have added 23 new events to our booking calendar

25

1	for this year. There are six new sponsors joining us for the
2	2022 OC Fair, and part of our strategic plan included mining
3	new business from Orange County.
4	We'll feature 14 new merchants at the fair this
5	year, ten of which are from Orange County, all of which are
6	from Southern California.
7	We've added four new concessionaires to the fair
8	this year; two are from Orange County, all four are from
9	California, and two-thirds of the entertainers on our
10	community stages this year are from Orange County.
11	The state of the OC Fair and Event Center is, well,
12	transparent. As a public agency, we know it is not only
13	important that we conduct business in a transparent manner,
14	but it's something the public has a right to.
15	We introduce committee reports so the public is
16	aware of what's happening between one board meeting and the
17	next.
18	Our consent calendar is not just a check-the-box
19	afterthought for the Board, but rather, we've worked very
20	hard to make sure, with very few exceptions, that consent
21	calendar items are posted before the contact goes into
22	effect, rather than in reverse.
23	We livestream our board meetings so those in public
24	who are not able to attend can view the meeting online and we

post the videos of each board meeting on our website so the

25

1	public can access them after the meeting as well.
2	We introduced a new set of board governance
3	policies, all of which were finalized and approved during
4	public board meetings.
5	Our annual audits are now being done in a timely
6	manner and shared in public board meetings, and we've greatly
7	reduced our response time to public records request.
8	Now, while we have a long way to go to being a
9	premiere technology hub, we are leading our fair industry in
10	several ways.
11	Zoom became our life during the pandemic, anything
12	from simple one-on-one meetings to full board meetings. We
13	introduced DocuSign to make remote execution of contracts and
14	agreements faster and easier, and we're not going back to
15	paper.
16	Our tech team has upgraded much of the software we
17	use on a daily basis, and we continue our WiFi upgrade
18	project, making Internet access more streamlined, not only
19	for our employees, but the guests who use the property.
20	We developed a remote telework policy as a result of
21	what we learned during the pandemic, and at one point, our
22	tech team had 40 fully functional remote staff working on
23	behalf of the OC Fair and Event Center and many are
24	continuing remote work on an intermittent basis.



One of our very smart employees created an

25

1	Excel-based fair planning tool, which allows us to now keep
2	track of expenses on a real-time basis.
3	Our communications department did an amazing job of
4	adding user tools on our website so that it is now fully ADA
5	compliant.
6	We introduced the new evolved weapons detection
7	system at our fair entrance gate last year and we will
8	continue this year. We believe we may have been the first
9	fair in the U.S. to utilize that technology.
10	And our in-house CAD operator now has the capability
11	of creating 3D CAD drawings and maps, and we can't wait to
12	introduce them to all of you as part of our Master Site Plan
13	documents in the fall.
14	Canto is a digital asset management software program
15	we use to organize our library of photos, graphic
16	illustrations, and other graphic assets. And brand new is
17	Zen Desk, a customer service database, which will track
18	customer service comments and issues and study trends which
19	will allow us to make improvements for our guests.
20	Now, we believe we have the best team in the fair
21	industry, a core staff of about 100 State civil service
22	employees who remain determined and steadfast during the
23	pandemic and continue to bring their best every day.
24	As a result of their hard work to cut expenses and

manage our resources during the pandemic, we did not have to

lay off a single civil service emplo	yee.
--------------------------------------	------

We've completed training through the year in emergency preparedness, workplace harassment prevention, workplace safety, working remotely, et cetera, but there is still much to do in this area as we provide more resources for staff to grow and develop.

Through the hard work of one of our in-house teams, we did the work to become certified as a star facility through the Global Biorisk Advisory Council. We are now GBAC certified. And we're adding to our ranks with recently Board approved additions for a staff accountant and an equestrian center supervisor.

And congratulations to Evi Young and Carol Singleton on their recent promotions to the director level.

There is much more work to do to provide our staff with the training and support they need to continue delivering on the organization's mission, as we have plans to add more training and development opportunities.

And what about the state of our finances? They are strong, with reserves of 62.9 million dollars, which will be used as we execute our Master Site Plan and continue to improve the property and our operations.

We learned so much from having to pivot during the pandemic, like how profitable the fair can be when we right-size it, we manage our resources properly, and we

create a fantastic quest experience.

The 22 million dollars in net proceeds from the 2021 OC Fair proves that, and that's why we're sticking with the controlled attendance model.

At the end of May, our bottom line to date looks solid. We are currently 2.78 million dollars favorable to budget. And when we take five months of actual financial performance, January through May, and we add seven months of budget numbers still yet to come, the result is a year-in projection of 8.76 million dollars in net proceeds.

Our financial outlook is indeed solid, but we still have challenges. The OC Fair and Event Center is challenged with hiring staff, just like most companies out there.

We will be ready for the OC Fair, but it will come with a lot of tough and challenging work over the next few weeks on the part of our HR team and our hiring supervisors. Please send us anyone who is interested in working at the OC Fair this summer.

Supply chain issues are affecting the cost of materials and impacting capital and major projects. There doesn't seem to be any relief on the horizon, and we expect those challenges to continue.

With the rising rate of inflation and cost of goods and services, we are beginning to feel the pinch of shrinking margins. The challenge will be how to continue offering

1	value to our guests along with maintaining an excellent guest
2	experience with those shrinking margins.
3	And, of course, parking and storage remain a
4	challenge, but we're hoping that a new Master Site Plan will,
5	perhaps, provide some new opportunities for solutions.
6	So you ask the question: What is the state of the
7	OC Fair and Event Center?
8	Well, I asked our staff this question: If you could
9	sum up, in one word and one word only, the state of the OC
10	Fair and Event Center, what would that word be?
11	And here is what they said. You can see the larger
12	words represent multiple repeats of the same word. So from
13	all of us to all of you, we say the state of the OC Fair and
14	Event Center is resilient, strong, solid, and optimistic, and
15	a bunch of other fun descriptions as well.
16	And that completes my State of the Fair
17	Presentation.
18	Happy to take any questions.
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michele. Excellent
20	presentation.
21	Any questions from the Directors?
22	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: I don't have any questions,
23	but, Mr. Chair, I would like to move that we receive this
24	report with commendations at this time. I move that we
25	receive it with commendations.



1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Very good. We have a motion from
2	Director Bagneris.
3	Is there a second?
4	BOARD MEMBER CERVANTES: Second.
5	MR. CAPLAN: Chair La Belle, before you move to a
6	motion, I hate to be the buzz kill in the room after being
7	back here in-person in over two years, but this item was
8	listed as an information item, not as an action item.
9	So, perhaps, there could just be some general
10	consensus or comments from board members on their receipt of
11	the report, but the Board simply can't take a vote on this
12	item today.
13	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: To receive it with
14	commendations? That is a joy kill.
15	MR. CAPLAN: I'm sorry, Director Bagneris. I
16	typically am.
17	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: Okay. Well, I would like to
18	say commendations for this report. This is excellent.
19	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you, and we will accept those
20	commendations. Thank you so much.
21	BOARD MEMBER RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I have a comment.
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public comments at
23	this time?
24	Okay. Any other comments from the Directors?
25	BOARD MEMBER RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I have a comment.

1	I just want to say, you know, we transitioned to a
2	new CEO about two and a half years ago, I believe, and since
3	then, I think that the organization has created several
4	transparency best practices for the industry as a whole and
5	for any public agency.
6	So I just want to thank Michele Richards for her
7	leadership skills and being able to move the organization
8	forward during the pandemic, it's tremendous, and also
9	engaging your Board of Directors in a way that we weren't
10	really engaged in the past.
11	So thank you and to your team.
12	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you. I appreciate that so
13	much. The team works very very hard, takes great pride in
14	what we do, and hopefully this presentation showcases a lot
15	of that.
16	So thank you so much.
17	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thanks again, Michele, and ditto
18	all the comments from the directors; much appreciated, not
19	only what you have done, but I know what you're going to be
20	able to do in the future.
21	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you. Yes, thank you.
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: So thank you.
23	Next item is 8C.
24	MS. RICHARDS: All right. Everybody buckle their
25	seat belts because this is our favorite presentation of the

26

1	year.
2	I'm going to introduce our Chief Business
3	Development Officer, Joan Hamill, who has quite a unique
4	presentation to introduce, the 2022 OC Fair.
5	So Joan, take it away.
6	MS. HAMILL: Good morning. Let me get organized
7	here. The fair is coming in three weeks. Can you stand it?
8	I'm so excited.
9	Anyway, sorry, I just had to say that because I'm
10	giddy, I know everyone is giddy, the community is giddy, and
11	we're bursting at the seams.
12	So it's just three short weeks away. I did want to
13	bring some sunshine into the boardroom in honor of our theme,
14	Feel the Sunshine.
15	I want to say thank you and well, I should say
16	welcome first to Chris Lopez from RCS and he brought the
17	cotton candy. So he brought a little carnival feel, so
18	that's for you to enjoy during the presentation or on your
19	way home.
20	But just a few fun things. But the fair is going to
21	start, we're so excited. The excitement and the anticipation
22	is building and you can feel it in the air and on the
23	property and in the community.
24	We'll all feel the sunshine July 15th through August
25	14th. And this morning, I'm so delighted to be telling you

the 2022 OC Fair story.

But first we have -- let me go ahead. I got too excited, I wasn't even doing the slides. Okay. But first, we have a little commercial break. Summer is going to help with that. Look what's on TV.

Another one coming up for you, this is our Spanish commercial.

Okay. So making its debut today at the OC Fair board meeting, the full campaign will be going into effect and mounting in the next several days and weeks ahead, so look forward to that, and getting that song in your head and not being able to get it out. It makes you dance, and it makes you excited.

Okay. Going on. So we need people to buy tickets; get your tickets today, right? We're keeping the attendance at the 45,000 cap. It was the right size for our fair. It was great. It was a wonderful customer experience.

So we're limiting the daily capacity to 45,000. Buy your tickets online right now. You can go up to our box office Wednesday through Sunday or you can buy them online, and I would suggest that, because either way it's feeless.

So the price you pay for your ticket is it, that's it. No extra added fees, and it's such a deal. It's just zero, none, nada, no fees on the tickets, the price of the admission is the price you pay and what a deal and it saves

There's not going to be any lines, you just have your ticket in your hand or on your smart phone and you walk in the gates, it's great, right through our evolved technology. You just get right in; you park and you come right in.

Last year we had 17 of our 23 dates sold out, and you just don't want to miss out on the fun. So don't delay and buy today.

We're doing pretty good on ticket sales, but as the fair nears, every day that we get closer, the sales keep increasing, and then beginning July and then, of course, after the 4th of July, the sales will skyrocket.

So get the word out to your families and friends that they need to buy their tickets. They don't want to miss out of the '22 Summer fair.

Marketing and communications have been doing the work to get that word out and the campaign and the messaging will hit its full stride with each upcoming day. So buy your tickets online right now.

And moving into the carnival. The ever popular and very missed ride wristbands are making their return in 2022, yay. Wristband days are Wednesdays and Thursdays and good for unlimited rides and two free games.

For a limited time, wristbands can be had for \$44,

1	and that's until July 14th. So you can go online and get
2	those wristbands, as well, for \$44.
3	And then, when the fair starts, the wristbands go to
4	\$49, still a great deal. You can redeem your wristbands by
5	5:00 p.m. and ride until 8:00 on Wednesdays and Thursdays.
6	And then we also have tickets ride tickets, our
7	Fun Passes and you can purchase those in advance and online
8	as well. Again, no waiting in line, right, you don't want to
9	get to the fair and wait in a line.
10	So buy those tickets today, you can download Fun
11	Pass, which can also be found at OCFair.com. I'm going to
12	show you that.
13	That is the Fun Pass app, download it today, right
14	now, on your phone, so you have that in hand, you can reload
15	tickets. It's great, such a convenience. It works
16	fantastic.
17	So if you love like I said, you get out of your
18	car, go straight to the entrance gates, and directly to those
19	rides, and this is where you'll be heading. So all of our
20	great rides. Look at that.
21	CHAIR LA BELLE: Joan, are there any new rides this
22	year from RCS?
23	MS. HAMILL: We have a ride that's coming and it is
24	the is it the mermaid ride or the pirate ride?
25	MR. LOPEZ: The Sea Ray.

1	MS. HAMILL: The Sea Ray, sorry about that.
2	Did you want to explain that, Chris?
3	MR. LOPEZ: It's a brand new ride. It will be
4	debuting here, and it's a big pirate boat that swings you
5	back and forth. So it will be the first one in the State of
6	California and debuting here at the fair.
7	MS. HAMILL: Right here at the fair, that's great.
8	Thank you for that, didn't mean to put you on the spot. Stay
9	right there in case I put you on the spot again.
10	Okay. Look at that. So much fun.
11	Okay. Entertainment, everyone loves the
12	entertainment. Pacific Aphitheater, The Hangar, and Action
13	Sports Arena. Last year, remember, Pacific Amphitheater, we
14	didn't have a full run of concerts because we were still
15	we didn't know what we were doing and we didn't know what the
16	tiers and everything [sic].
17	So we opened up kind of mid fair, but this year we
18	have a full concert season and several concerts post-fair.
19	So that's 23 nights of concerts in Pacific Amphitheater.
20	And in The Hangar, of course, we have our tribute
21	acts and more, nightly in The Hangar. And then I want to
22	call out the Action Sports Arena. It was dark last year, but
23	this year it's back in full swing, fully programmed.
24	Again I know, everyone is excited about that as
25	well. Things will start up in the Action Sports Arena on

25

1	Friday the first Friday and Saturday with the Brew Hee
2	Haw, a Craft Brew Roundup.
3	This event just gets better and better every year.
4	Last year it was held in the concourse of the Pacific
5	Amphitheater, but this year it's going to be held at ASA. So
6	we're exited about that.
7	And then also in Action Sports Arena is Monster
8	Trucks and then we have demolition derbies and then finally,
9	closing out the fair, will be Speedway. And then here's a
10	few things going on. Here you go.
11	Going back to Pacific Amphitheater, our Toyota
12	Summer Concert series at Pacific Amphitheater, tickets are on
13	sale now, buy those today. Lots of wonderful acts; Kool and
14	the Gang, Brett Eldredge, Jim Gaffigan, two nights of
15	Rebelution.
16	We also have Trevor Noah, that was a holdover from a
17	couple of years ago. He just couldn't wait to come back. So
18	he's going to be here this year.
19	Lindsey Stirling on the 21st. CNCO July 30th.
20	Maxwell making his debut on August 11th. Exciting. I won't
21	go through all of them, that will just give you a taste.
22	Go to OCFair.com. One thing you need to know from
23	today, OCFair.com or run over to our box office right after
24	this meeting.

And remember, your Pacific Amphitheater tickets

1	allow you admission during the fair. So if there's a concert
2	during the fair, that gets you into the fair as well,
3	obviously.
4	And then we have a host of wonderful post-fair
5	concerts. We have Boy George and Culture Club, their first
6	Pacific Amphitheater appearance. So that's pretty exciting,
7	pretty excited about that.
8	And then Jackson Browne will be bringing down the
9	house on September 3rd. It will be guaranteed a big show,
10	wonderful shows.
11	Moving on to The Hangar; several shows in The Hangar
12	to include tribute acts, other acts in The Hangar that aren't
13	all tribute, but we have Elton John excuse me Elton,
14	The Early Years. This is a tribute to Elton John. This is a
15	phenomenal show, as are all the shows in The Hangar.
16	And also Mariachi Sol de Mexico de Jose Hernandez,
17	that will be taking place, that's a whole day of programming
18	of Mariachi in The Hangar.
19	We also have 24K Magic, that's a Bruno Mars tribute.
20	Again, with your tickets that you purchase for The Hangar,
21	that includes fair admission as well.
22	So there you go. I wanted to show you the Craft
23	Brew, this is taking place at Action Sports Arena, so that
24	will be guaranteed to be a lot of fun.
25	The monster trucks in Action Sports Arena, and

25

1	popular, popular demolition derby, that's the Damsels of
2	Destruction on the top right, and then Motorhome Madness.
3	You have to see the show, if you've never seen the
4	show before, you will laugh from beginning to end. It's just
5	amazing. I don't know if it's made it's debut, but it's
6	certainly made its home at the OC Fair.
7	Again, if you reserve a seat at Action Sports Arena,
8	that includes your fair admission as well; so so many ways.
9	Oh, Speedway, how could I forget Speedway rounding out.
LO	And then moving on we have our community and our
L1	grounds act, wonderful entertainment that's provided by our
L2	entertainment department, that takes place on the stages
L3	throughout the fair, that's just free with your admission.
L4	And all of our stages are going nonstop all day.
L5	There's something to see all day long and listen to
L6	and watch and laugh at. If you see the hypnotist, he's back
L7	once again, Mark Yuzuik, always puts on a great show.
L8	But also our wonderful community entertainment by
L9	local entertainers that come out, their first opportunity to
20	get on the stage for some of them sometimes in the public at
21	an event like the OC Fair.
22	So there you go. This is not a Spice Girls tribute
23	act, but it could be in the next few years. Of course we
24	have the Magic of Frank Thurston and he'll be in the OC

Promenade. Frank Thurston has been a mainstay. I think he

2	So as you can imagine, kids that saw him in 1993 are
3	parents and sometimes grandparents bringing their kids and
4	grandkids, and he has a wonderful show, really
5	family-friendly obviously, and standing room only, every
6	single show that we have with Frank Thurston. He's a lot of
7	fun.
8	And pig races; what would the fair be without pig
9	races? We moved the pig races last year to Park Plaza and
10	they'll be there again this year, hugely popular. So once
11	again, we'll have the pig races.
12	If you've never seen that show, I guarantee it is
13	worth every single penny that you pay to get in on your free
14	fair admission, because it is free.
15	Okay. I want to move on to some of our exhibits. A
16	very traditional component of the fair is Market Week and
17	Junior Livestock Auction, that's 4H and FFA school kids.
18	The Market Week is where they show their animals and
19	they are judged on how they handle their animals, how the
20	animal has been raised, and then that culminates in the
21	Junior Livestock Auction.
22	Last year Market Week occurred before the fair and
23	was closed to the public and Junior Livestock Action was
24	virtual, but this year it's back, live and in-person for all

the public to see and enjoy and learn from and they can also

participate in the Junior Livestock Action. I'll talk about that in just a second.

Market Week is the first full week of fair and Junior Livestock Auction is, mark your calendar, it's July 23rd, that's Saturday, July 23rd.

And the Junior Livestock Auction is a great way to support youth in our community by bidding on an animal or doing add-on, that means just providing additional funds to kids if you don't want to purchase an animal or buyback, that's another way you can support kids by not purchasing an animal. All of this helps the kids.

Think of it; these kids are young business people, they have purchased an animal on their own, they raise it, they feed it, they care for it, and when they sell in the Junior Livestock Action, that defrays the cost of them buying and raising that animal.

And this program is wonderful. It teaches youth about responsible animal welfare and stewardship and teaches them about the many aspects of business.

The livestock staff is always happy to assist with a purchase or an add-on. They're available and will walk you through the buying process or they'll meet with you in advance if you'd like to learn more about what that is. An absolute wonderful program, and you can also go online and learn more about this, but Saturday July 23rd.



1	And then we also have many animal exhibitors that
2	are here at the fair. Here is a very friendly llama that is
3	delighting these young fairgoers.
4	And how iconic is this; isn't that wonderful?
5	Piglets born during the fair right here at Centennial Farm,
6	homegrown at Centennial Farm.
7	Fair staff farm staff, I should say, they're the
8	experts, have timed everything just right and so now fingers
9	crossed that nature cooperates and we hope to welcome a
10	litter, or maybe two, of piglets during the fair.
11	And then I think we have some friends that are right
12	out here, I'm going to wave them in. We have some visitors
13	from Centennial Farm that are dying to meet you all, okay,
14	and their handlers from the farm.
15	This is Omar, right here from Centennial Farm, and
16	he has a beautiful California breed rabbit named Lola that
17	he's going to walk around and introduce to everybody. Our
18	farm animals love people to come visit.
19	And then Jonathan has this beautiful Angora kid goat
20	that was born last month. Okay. So the Angora goat's name
21	is Cocoa. So we have Cocoa and Lola. You can walk around
22	and say hi to these beautiful animals. We have hand wipes
23	for you, we have sanitizer.
24	Oh, my goodness, look who else has come in the room?
25	We have some more visitors here. We have our Foodie

1	mascots. All of you know Olivia, right? Olivia has long
2	been our mascot, come to say hi, but we also have making a
3	debut is our new mascot this is Sunny.
4	Sunny was named through a contest that
5	communications did and the name Sunny was the overwhelming
6	winner. So Sunny will be out at this is their first debut
7	in public, I think; I think that's right. So they're here to
8	say hello to you all, welcome you all, they could be
9	available afterwards for pictures.
10	So we have animals and we have our mascots and we
11	have so much more happening at the fair, but they were all
12	dying to say hello; everyone is as excited as I am.
13	Thank you, thank you. Thank you, Cocoa, and thank
14	you, Lola, and Omar and Jonathan, and Roxanne from
15	communications.
16	Is that not the most beautiful kid goat you've ever
17	seen in your life?
18	I think it's so appropriate that we have Sunny for
19	Feel the Sunshine. You'll see the mascots every day at fair
20	and you'll see animals every day at fair. So what more do
21	you need?
22	Moving on. Our Competitive Program, all of the
23	wonderful competitive exhibits will be on display. As a
24	matter of fact, we had a judging the other day of our
25	preserve foods.

But right here you'll see our woodworking program.

We also have fine arts, photography, home arts, which is quilts, knitted, and sown items, jewelry, crafts, and collections, and so much more. We also have youth entries, baked goods, garden and floral categories, and here we have a culinary demonstrator that will be -- I don't know if he'll be in the promenade.

But we'll have numerous culinary demonstrations, many of them local, most of them local, Orange County, that will be doing ongoing demonstrations throughout the run of the fair in our culinary program.

And speaking of food, look at that, a No. 1 reason our guests enjoy the fair -- and all of us, right? Something for everyone; savory and sweet, deep friend, barbequed, and fresh offerings. Everyone enjoys the food at the OC Fair, it's just the best.

And then I want to show you some new food offerings that we have this year. We have a new concessionaire, and it's Cardinali. It's called Sweets by Cardinali, is the name of the concession.

And here we have -- I have to just explain this to



1	you on the left, because I have got to get my head around
2	this one.
3	This is called a midnight black charcol milkshake,
4	and it's made with food-grade activated charcoal mixed with
5	vanilla ice cream. I've never tried something like this, and
6	I can't wait. I hope all of you do that as well.
7	And then on the right is the cotton candy sundae
8	count. Is that not a thing of beauty? That is amazing.
9	Look at that.
10	It's an ice cream cone enrobed in cotton candy and
11	topped with sprinkles because, you know, more is more, can't
12	not have the sprinkles.
13	But the cotton candy sundae cone and the midnight
14	black charcoal milkshake will be making their debut here at
15	the OC Fair.
16	And I have to tell you that that sundae cone will be
17	featured on the Cooking Channels Carnival Eats program
18	upcoming.
19	So we're going to have a celebrity ice cream cone
20	that's going to be in our manner, so that's pretty exciting
21	about that. And Cardinali's also has
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Does that ice cream cone come with
23	a wash cloth?
24	MS. HAMILL: I think that's part of the fun, is
25	watching someone try to eat that, right, it's interactive.



1	And Cardinali's has all sorts of really inventive things that
2	they're doing; they have sundaes made with candy bars and
3	with cereal, like Trix, and Fruity Pebbles, Cinnamon Toast
4	Crunch.
5	They also have, for the more discerning, affogato.
6	That's ice cream with a shot of espresso. So there you go,
7	right? Pretty nice.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Go back and tell me more about this
9	charcoal; what is that?
10	MS. HAMILL: I'm sorry, the what?
11	You know what, I am learning about that, and that
12	was my first question, is I don't understand? Charcoal? But
13	it's a new food trend.
14	VICE CHAIR PHAM: It's supposed to absorb toxins.
15	MS. HAMILL: So basically it's a health food. We
16	can all agree that it's a health food? Okay. Great.
17	Because you get your dairy and you get your detoxins.
18	Then I also we have another local exhibitor that
19	will be in the festival of products, and they're Moon Goat
20	Coffee, and they come from Santa Ana. And I'm hearing people
21	know these names, right?
22	They will be selling coffee as well as vegan and
23	gluten-free pastries. And again, that will be in our
24	festival of products building. Really exciting.
25	And then, as always, you can count on Chicken



1	Charlie to cook up something inventive. This is a KoolAid
2	chicken sandwich. So it's sweet, tart, and savory all in one
3	and, of course, it's topped with a pickle.
4	And then \$4 Taste. \$4 Taste each and every
5	Thursday, and this is from 11:00 to 4:00 p.m. every Thursday.
6	Over 80 food vendors participate, and will have
7	offerings, and there's just something for every taste and
8	appetite. You can just eat your way through the fair every
9	single Thursday and taste every item. You will love it.
10	And then after all that fair food, the Fun Run,
11	right? The Fun Run 5K makes its return on Sunday, August
12	7th. That's been three years since the Fun Run has been in
13	place live.
14	As you may recall in 2020, they held a virtual Fun
15	Run, which was really fun, but it's not the same as being
16	here at the fair because we if you're involved in the Fun
17	Run, we have four detours to fun. Because it is the fair,
18	right?
19	You have to run through the fair and enjoy the fair.
20	So a little bit of fair with your fun. So I'll just show you
21	a couple of pictures.
22	Here's the run part of the Fun Run, super super
23	serious, right? Running for time. And here's the fun part.
24	So come one, come all, come in your costume, bring your

17	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Thank you, Newton.
18	Financial monitoring committee. Nick, Barbara?
19	Anything further?
20	BOARD MEMBER KOVACEVICH: No, nothing further. We
21	did get the update from Michelle about how well things are
22	going, and we're continuing monthly and review everything
23	and look forward to the positive impacts that the fair is
24	going to bring to our PNO.
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: Perfect. The facilities committee

1	is on livestream. So you have their report. I don't know if
2	there's any questions to that.
3	The governance committee. Sandra or Natalie, I
4	don't know if you have any comments on that.
5	BOARD MEMBER RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: We don't have an
6	update this month. But we did note a public comment related
7	to governance, so.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Community affairs committee.
9	Director Bagneris, do you want to present the report?
10	BOARD MEMBER BAGNERIS: Yes. We want to talk about
11	what's going on this month. So we have pride month that's
12	going on. So we called that out in our report.
13	We also have Out at the Fair, which will happen on
14	Sunday, August 7th. So keep that in mind. June is also
15	National PTSD Awareness Month. And so we'd like for you to
16	keep that in mind as well, especially, our veterans who
17	suffer from PTSD.
18	We did recognize Juneteeth, which was on June 20th.
19	It's actually June 19th, but the Federal holiday was on the
20	20th. So hopefully you were able to celebrate that activity
21	over the weekend.
22	We had our pre-fair neighbor meeting. We had the
23	Mesa Del Mar and College Park areas that attended this
24	meeting. The staff answered questions and provided
25	information about fair programs, operations, and customer

1	service.
2	And we also are going to be donating tickets, Board
3	members will be donating tickets to nonprofit organizations
4	to give those underprivileged persons an opportunity to come
5	and share in the fair without having to purchase tickets.
6	Our next meeting, we will continue to look at the
7	things that are coming up for the community in the
8	community. I do want to call out our special project, the
9	Plaza Pacifica. Hopefully we will have an update after the
10	fair on where we are with that activity.
11	And thank the staff for preparing this slide, which
12	talks about the things that I just mentioned and also notes
13	Nate Looney, who is the CEO of Westside Urban Gardens, and
14	that's a part of the LGBTQ community.
15	So if there's no questions, that's our report.
16	CHAIR LA BELLE: Any questions?
17	Thank you, Barbara.
18	I think that concludes the reports. I think we're
19	going to have a brief closed-session.
20	Are we going to set it up in here, Michelle?
21	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. We'll ask members of the public
22	and staff to step out, and then we'll close the dividers so
23	the Board can meet.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Perfect. So let's take about a
25	five-minute recess.

2	CHAIR LA BELLE: All right. We are back in session.
3	Let's see what I got here.
4	I think we're ready for the CEO's report, correct?
5	MS. RICHARDS: We are. We need to make an
6	announcement about nothing to report out of closed session.
7	CHAIR LA BELLE: Nothing to report out of closed
8	session.
9	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Please turn your mics back on.
LO	Okay. Well, I had a lot to say during the State of
L1	the Fair presentation. So we only have a few additional
L2	operational updates.
L3	I did want to mention that we learned late yesterday
L4	that Cotton Rosser, who was the founder of the Flying U
L5	Rodeo, which has been here at the fair for many many years,
L6	sadly passed away yesterday. He was 93 years old. A real
L7	icon in the rodeo arena and also at the fair. So we send our
L8	condolences to his family.
L9	And just to recap what the finance committee
20	reported. We're doing very well for the month ending May
21	31st. Year-to-date revenue is 3.59 million against expenses
22	of 10.1 million.
23	So we have a deficit, but we expect that deficit
24	this time of year, but we didn't have quite as big of a
2.5	deficit as what we had budgeted for, so at this point we're

1	2.78	million	favorable	to	budget.

And as I mentioned in my earlier presentation, our projection now, including five months of actuals and seven months of budget figures, we're projecting net proceeds of 8.76 million at the end of the year.

We're also doing very well with our cash and cash equivalents, and as I also mentioned earlier, this becomes the basis of what the organization will use to fund our Master Site Plan and other improvements to the property. So that's a 23.9 million dollar increase year over year. So doing quite well.

So I'm going to turn it over very quickly to our COO, Ken Karns, for a quick operations update.

MR. KARNS: Thank you, Michele.

Three items this month. First, with the Master Site Plan, staff continues development of the Master Site Plan related to a PowerPoint presentation, a rough order of magnitude, and then onto budgeting and financial modeling. We anticipate having more of an update for the facilities committee at their next meeting.

Second update is on the Highway 55 project. Staff met with the Highway 55 outreach and communication project team to further understand the scope of work and potential impacts on the annual fair or other events on the property.

This project will physically be starting late

1	August, early September, so it will not have any impacts on
2	the 2022 annual fair.
3	The project is expected to last for three and a half
4	years and the work is focused on changes and improvements on
5	the 55 between MacArthur and McFadden.
6	There will always be lanes open, so the future
7	impact on those getting to the fair should be minimal to
8	nonexistent.
9	However, there are full on- and off-ramp closures
10	late at night. That could impact guests going home at the
11	end of a fair evening. So with that, teams discussed
12	communication opportunities, and we'll continue to explore
13	those and finalize going forward.
14	And lastly, an Edison update. We have carried out a
15	meeting with our representatives from Edison to address power
16	outages this summer, strategies and communication plans that
17	will be in place, and Edison continues to be a great partner
18	of OCFEC.
19	On a proactive note, Edison fully launched a demand
20	response program. I'll happily delve into more detail for
21	anyone that's interested in that.
22	And directly related to the annual fair, we are
23	meeting again this Monday to discuss commitments on
24	preventative maintenance, blackouts, and also emergency



1	And that concludes our report. Happy to answer any
