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7	CHAIR LA BELLE: We do not have a quorum today. So
8	we will just be going through the agenda with the board
9	members that are here that will be making recommendations for
10	the full board when we do have a meeting. In all likelihood,
11	there are a couple of items that are fairly time sensitive,
12	so we will be working to have a meeting now and when we would
13	normally meet in October. So I'll be asking the directors
14	the three that will be here dates that might work for them,
15	and then we'll go ahead and schedule it as appropriate.
16	They are trying to get me hooked up here. But I
17	think we can go ahead, and if you could read the mission
18	statement, Michelle.
19	MS. RICHARDS: I will. Do you want to open the
20	meeting?
21	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
22	MS. RICHARDS: Okay. The mission of the OC Fair and
23	Event Center is creating equitable community access to
24	agriculture, entertainment, cultural, and educational
25	experiences.



1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Could you call the roll, Summer,
2	please?
3	MS. ANGUS: Chair La Belle?
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Here.
5	MS. ANGUS: Vice Chair Pham?
6	(No Answer)
7	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Here.
9	MS. ANGUS: Director Cervantez?
10	(No answer)
11	MS. ANGUS: Director Ruiz?
12	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Here.
13	MS. ANGUS: Director Bagneris?

19	CHAIR LA BELLE: Just for the record, Natalie
20	called. She will be here, but she is stuck in traffic.
21	She'll be here momentarily. Michelle, do you want to
22	introduce public participation?
23	Let's do the pledge. Ashley, can you lead us in the
24	pledge, please?
25	(Pledge of allegiance)

1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Now, I believe it's
2	MS. RICHARDS: Now, we have approval of the minutes.
3	Oh, roll call. No. We already did roll call. Sorry.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: I jumped the gun. Sorry.
5	MS. RICHARDS: No worries. Yes, we have approval of
6	the minutes.
7	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I'll make the motion to approve
8	the minutes from the June board meeting. Well, I don't know
9	if we could do that.
10	MR. CAPLAN: For the board members that are here,
11	you can go through the formalities of motion in a second.
12	Just know the action you take is a recommendation. It's not
13	going to result in the actual approval the minutes, but would
14	simply be reflected on the next agenda, if there was an item
15	on the agenda for the board to affectively adopt the
16	recommendations these board members make today.
17	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Should we make the recommendation
18	to just table it for our next board meeting?
19	MR. CAPLAN: You can do that too. That's fine.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: I'll second that motion.
21	MR. CAPLAN: I think the matter would just be tabled
22	because you also can't take action on tabling it.
23	MS. RICHARDS: So we won't be taking votes today?
24	MR. CAPLAN: That's right. Yes.
25	MICHELE RICHARDS: It's the recommendation of the

1	board to approve the minutes from the June 23rd Board
2	Meeting?
3	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Okay. I'm sorry. So we're
4	approving the minutes. We are making the recommendation to
5	table them? What are we doing?
6	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. It's a recommendation to
7	approve the minutes. They'll appear on the next board
8	meeting agenda for formal approval.
9	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Okay. I thought I was voting on a
10	table. Because if that's the case, I'm going to abstain
11	because I was not here at the last meeting.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: We'll just put it on the next
13	agenda.
14	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Absolutely.
15	CHAIR LA BELLE: I'm struggling with my computer
16	here. So I'm relying on you, Michelle.
17	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Absolutely. So we'll move to
18	matters of public comment. And if the record would refect
19	that Director Ruva-Garcia has joined us.
20	So public comment is not allowed on issues not on
21	the current agenda; however, no debate by the board shall be
22	permitted on such public comments, and no action will be
23	taken on such public comment items at this time as law
24	requires formal public notice prior to any action on a docket
25	item. Speakers are requested to sign in prior to the start

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of the meeting and are limited to three minutes. Comments will be accepted on all other agenda items at the time each item is listed on the agenda. Speakers wishing to address the board on items on the agenda are requested to sign in prior to the start of the meeting and identify the agenda item on which you desire to address the board. Speakers are limited to three minutes. And at this point, we don't have any requests for general public comment.

CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michelle. For the benefit of my fellow directors in the audience, I rely very heavily on my computer because of my vision situation. So I'm going to ask Michele to kind of help me through the agenda. If you could kind of introduce each of the items, Michelle, I would appreciate it.

MS. RICHARDS: Sure. I'll be happy to. Okay.

So now we are moving on to consent calendar. And again, this is done by a single motion of the board, but in the absence of a quorum, the board will just entertain a recommendation at this point. So all matters listed under consent calendar are operational matters about which the board has governing policies, implementation of which is delegated to the CEO. They will be enacted in one motion by category in the order listed below. There will be no discussion of these items prior to the time the board of directors votes on the motion. Unless members of the board,

1	staff, or public request specific items to be discussed
2	separately and/or removed from this section.
3	Any members of the public who any member of the
4	public who wishes to discuss consent calendar items should
5	notify the Chair of the Board at the time requested and be
6	recognized by invitation of the Chair to address the board.
7	And at this time, the staff does not have any items to pull
8	from the consent calendar. We will just push everything
9	forward to the next agenda.
10	CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public comments?
11	MS. RICHARDS: No.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. The action before the board
13	then would be to recommend to the full board at the next
14	meeting the approval of the consent calendar items. Is there
15	a motion to that effect?
16	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Second.
17	MS. RICHARDS: We'll also notice the vast majority
18	of the items on the consent calendar are fair related. Those
19	are agreements that were entered into after the June board
20	meeting, but prior to the fair.
21	CHAIR LA BELLE: Should the committee call a roll
22	call before the committee?
23	MR. CAPLAN: We can take roll call or vote by
24	acclimation, you know, a show of hands, because it's not as
25	formal as a board meeting when we have quorums. I would

1	defer to the Chair whether he wanted to table it, take roll
2	or
3	CHAIR LA BELLE: Summer, why don't you go ahead and
4	call the roll then, so it makes it clear.
5	MS. ANGUS: Chair La Belle?
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes, ma'am.
7	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubacalva-Garcia?
8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
9	MS. ANGUS: Director Ruiz?
10	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
11	MS. ANGUS: And Director Aitken?
12	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michelle.
14	Go ahead. Next item.
15	MS. RICHARDS: Next item. And this was to be an
16	action item, but we'll entertain a recommendation.
17	The financial monitoring and audit committee has
18	reviewed the 2021 audit report with a representative from
19	Lance, Soll & Lunghard, our auditors. The auditors indicated
20	that the financial statements present fairly and all material
21	respects, and there are no deficiencies in internal controls.
22	The committee is putting the audit before the board for
23	review and recommendation to file with CDFA.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Any public comments to the
25	committee on that item?

1	MS. RICHARDS: None here.
2	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Motion would be in order to
3	recommend to the full board.
4	MR. CAPLAN: So moved.
5	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Second.
6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Second.
7	CHAIR LA BELLE: Call the roll, if you would,
8	Summer.
9	MS. ANGUS: Chairman LaBelle?
10	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
11	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?
12	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
13	MS. ANGUS: Direct Ruiz?
14	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
15	MS. ANGUS: And Director Aitken?
16	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
17	CHAIR LA BELLE: This is more challenging than a
18	regular meeting.
19	MS. RICHARDS: Okay. Moving on to item 8B.
20	I will turn this over to our facilities committee,
21	which happens to be here. Yes.
22	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Facility meeting is here in full
23	force. Yes. So this kind of overlaps for those that have
24	read our committee report, but I'm going to ask Ken to give a
25	little more detail on the ongoing Capital X project that

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1	involves our utility project in Lot G.
2	MR. KARNS: Thank you, Director Atkin.
3	As previously reported, this project was due and
4	came in over budget. Upon the work and review with the
5	facility committee and ACA, a strategy was developed where
6	the OC Fair would procure materials and ensure they were
7	on-site in advance to the project moving forward in an effort
8	to reduce cost. With that, we reviewed monies and the use of
9	Lot G at meetings with our carnival provider. We do have a
10	fund that was agreed upon to use some of that fund to fund
11	this project. We review that with the facilities committee,
12	and the recommendation is for the full board with staff and
13	the facilities committee's support.
14	If recommended, and then eventually approved, it's
15	what we would then do is agree that the intent to move
16	forward is sound, so that we could continue and that we could
17	go up to them in advance with the full board approving. So
18	based on that recommendation that could come today, we would
19	continue the project.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: I would note that this item is
21	fairly time-sensitive, and if we do have a meeting between
22	now and our regular October meeting, this will be one item
23	for sure that will be on that agenda.
24	So are there any public comments?
25	Okay. Motion would be in order then to recommend to

1	the full board approval of this item.
2	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I just have a question.
3	So supply-chain issues are probably the reason why it's the
4	increase. So even if we delay the project, it would still be
5	that amount regardless?
6	MR. KARNS: No guarantee on the budget. Again,
7	getting this budget, Robert can speak to what's happening out
8	there. It's challenging at best, but this is our best
9	attempt to move the project forward.
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And if we didn't move it
11	forward, how much would we lose? How much have we already
12	invested in it?
13	MR. KARNS: It's been mostly time and effort, and
14	some funds used by CCA.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And we do have the
16	additional funds if we just needed to approve the increase.
17	MS. RICHARDS: The additional funding would come
18	from the carnival capital fund, which our carnival provider
19	contributes to on a annual basis, and we already received
20	their approval to use those funds.
21	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And it's time-sensitive
22	because we have upcoming events that will be in this location
23	or
24	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. It's time-sensitive from a
25	cost standpoint, that every indication is that those material

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1	and labor costs would go up. But in addition to that, this
2	was a project we were hoping we could have finished before
3	the 2022 fair but obviously couldn't. But what this would do
4	is complete that Lot G project to install those utilities,
5	which are heavily used during the fair.
6	DIRECTOR AITKEN: We are going to go to bid it out.
7	We haven't bid it out yet. And I think it's important while
8	it's \$300,000 from our reserves, a large chunk, it's not
9	fully depleted.
10	MS. RICHARDS: Correct. Correct.
11	In fact, following the use of the \$300,000, there
12	would still be over \$300,000 in that capital fund for future
13	projects.
14	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I mean, I can make a
15	motion to approve it. The two of you probably
16	MR. CAPLAN: Second motion to recommend. Motion to
17	recommend, yeah.
18	DIRECTOR AITKEN: This is a first for all of us.
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: It's way too hard. Summer, can you
20	call the roll, please?
21	MS. ANGUS: Chair LaBelle?
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
23	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?
24	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
25	MS. ANGUS: Director Ruiz?

DIRECTOR RUIZ: 1 Yes. 2 MS. ANGUS: And Director Aitken? 3 DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes. MS. RICHARDS: Okay. Moving on to item 8C. And 4 this was a project that was also discussed by the facilities 5 committee. So I'll kind of tee it up if you all have any 6 7 additional information. 8 So the California Budget Act from last year, 9 included a one-time grant allocation to the California 10 Department of Food and Aq, which would allow communities to 11 build community resilience centers. And the fairgrounds have 12 been -- throughout the state have been identified as key 13 locations to that. 14 So CDFA has received this grant money. 15 DAA, along with several other fairs throughout the state, 16 have been identified as recipients of that grant money. And 17 what that grant money will be used for, working with CCA, is the State will equip the fairgrounds, including the OC Fair 18 19 and Events Center, with necessary back-up power resources or 20 PSPS equipment. PSPS stands for Public Safety Power Shut 21 Off. So in the event of a PSPS occurrence, a wildfire for 22 example, or a wind event, or a climate event that we would 23 need to use the fairgrounds for emergency evacuation. 24 this project would pay to install, design, develop, and 25 install automatic transfer switches and docking stations for

1	the Costa Mesa Building, the Huntington Beach Building, and			
2	the Santa Ana Pavilion, which is the span between the two			
3	buildings. That would provide the infrastructure, if there			
4	is an evacuation event, generators can be brought in and			
5	easily connected to run the power in those buildings.			
6	So here's the tricky part. Even though there is			
7	full reimbursement by this grant, we have to front the money			
8	for that. It's an estimated \$351,661.16 to be exact. The			
9	project is in four phases, and we'll receive reimbursement			
LO	after receipt of each invoice, so we'll invoice CTFA after			
L1	each phase of the project. We will be reimbursed within 90			
L2	days of the receipt of the invoice. Although it's			
L3	reimbursable, we will have to cut a check or \$351,661.16 to			
L4	CCA who will manage the project. We will get full			
L5	reimbursement. That amount is not budgeted for, and it is			
L6	over my signing authority. So the recommendation would be to			
L7	allow us to provide that funding up front to be reimbursed.			
L8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public speakers on			
L9	this item?			
20	MS. RICHARDS: Not here.			
21	CHAIR LA BELLE: Go ahead, Natalie.			
22	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Just out of curiosity.			
23	What are the odds that it will come back higher than the			
24	estimate?			
25	MS. RICHARDS: It's already been bid out. And CCA			

1	is managing that, so they have already done that on their
2	end, and we are not the only fairgrounds. So far in the
3	first phase, there are 40 fairgrounds in the state that will
4	be recipients of this project.
5	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I'll make a motion to
6	recommend approval or whatever. Whatever you say, Josh.
7	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I just have a real quick question.
8	I'll second. But just a real quick question.
9	We obviously don't have the generators on property.
LO	We don't want to store the generators. But do we have an
L1	idea of where we would get them? Or are there plans if,
L2	unfortunately, if we had an event, how would we secure the
L3	generators?
L4	MS. RICHARDS: Right. I'll give you a perfect
L5	example. When the fairgrounds was used for Covid
L6	vaccinations you know, a super pod for vaccinations, the
L7	County brought in those generators to operate the emergency
L8	operation there. And so the generators were provided by the
L9	County. So if we were to be used for emergency purposes,
20	more than likely, the State or the County would provide the
21	resources for that.
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: I have a
23	MR. KARNS: And for clarity, we do have one portable
24	generator on wheels for emergency use that we own, beyond the
) 5	fived generators that we also own

1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Before we vote on the				
2	recommendation, I have a check's-in-the-mail question. How				
3	soon are we going to get the reimbursement from the State				
4	once we proceed ahead?				
5	MS. RICHARDS: Once we invoice CDFA at the end of				
6	each phase, we will get reimbursement within 90 days. So it				
7	will come in four pieces at the end of each phase.				
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: So the impact on our cash flow				
9	would be minimal in terms to that? Okay.				
10	Any further comments?				
11	Summer can you call the roll, please?				
12	MS. ANGUS: Chair LaBelle?				
13	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.				
14	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?				
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.				
16	MS. ANGUS: Director Ruiz?				
17	DIRECTOR RUIZ: As long as we make sure we get that				
18	\$0.16 back.				
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: That will be a first.				
20	MS. ANGUS: And Director Aitken?				
21	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.				
22	MS. RICHARDS: Not any less. Okay.				
23	Moving right along then.				
24	8D. Boy, this one is timely. Senate Bill 189 which				
25	was enacted and effective June 30th of this year, just after				

our June board meeting. Actually restores the process that we used during the Covid to be able to have remote meetings. And that's under the Governor's Covid-19 Executive Order. So the amendment to Bagley-Keen would permit DAAs to, again, hold meetings with all members participating teleconferencing through July 1st of 2023. So that's not a full year, but it would still give us some relief.

Under the amendment, board meetings can be held by Zoom or the board could decide, "No, we want to have our meetings live and in person, or a combination of both, a hybrid model." So this item is being brought so there could be some discussion and opinions shared. There are the three options. Conduct all meetings here in the OC room, conduct all meetings via Zoom with everyone remoting in, or do a hybrid model.

I will share with you that the staff has researched our ability to do a hybrid model. And we do have the technology. We figured out how to do that so the public can also participate by Zoom. And I think you see a lot of city counsel meetings still being held that way. So our staff recommendation is the board consider the option that works best for most board members. But honestly, if you look at today, we could have had a quorum if we could have noticed the meeting by Zoom and some being in person. I think from a staff perspective, the hybrid model would be ideal.

1	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yeah, I couldn't agree with you
2	more. I almost didn't come in today because I was feeling a
3	little under the weather last night. And that's why I have
4	this mask, so I wanted to take precaution. If we had
5	something of a hybrid
6	MS. RICHARDS: You would have stayed home.
7	DIRECTOR RUIZ: And we would have quorum, as well.
8	MS. RICHARDS: And I know Director Kovacevich is not
9	feeling well today either and asked about that ability to
10	Zoom in, but we would have had to notice that 10 days ago.
11	So the only caveat would be that if we were going to Zoom, we
12	would just need to provide ten days ahead of the meeting an
13	opportunity for the public to know how to participate by
14	Zoom. So if we continue with the hybrid model through June,
15	we'll automatically put that on the agenda each time.
16	CHAIR LA BELLE: Question for Counsel: Can we just
17	proceed ahead with the hybrid model without any formal
18	action, or is this something that needs to come back to the
19	full board?
20	MR. CAPLAN: No. SB189 doesn't require more action.
21	It effectively tells this agency that it's permitted to meet
22	under Bagley-Keen remotely, in person, or some hybrid form.
23	So staff can just move forward and notice the next meeting.
24	A lot of people do appear in person, but also appear via Zoom
25	or other video-conference technology.

1	MS. RICHARDS: And this item is before the board for
2	agreement with this body. There's already approval at the
3	State level to do that.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Well, I certainly think the hybrid
5	way is the way to go. Obviously gives maximum benefit to
6	both directors as well as the members of the audience, the
7	community, so I think that's a great approach.
8	Any other comments or thoughts?
9	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I have a question. I'm assuming,
LO	because I remember when I missed the last meeting, I couldn't
L1	participate when I had Covid because I would have had to have
L2	listed my home address and have my home open. I don't think
L3	anybody would have come. But is this something that if we
L4	are at our office, or not feeling well and at home and take
L5	those precautions to make sure the agenda is posted on our
L6	home door or office door, et cetera?
L7	MS. RICHARDS: No. No. This waives the requirement
L8	that the locations be listed on the agenda. So you could
L9	Zoom from your home, you could Zoom from your office, and we
20	would not be required to put that location on the agenda.
21	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I think this is a good idea. I
22	would like to do the hybrid because just doing the one board
23	meeting and calling in phone only, it's a little bit wonky.
24	So having the ability to see what's going on I think would be
25	really helpful for the public and, for one reason if, board

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1	members are traveling or not feeling good.
2	CHAIR LA BELLE: And I think when we were doing the
3	total Zoom meetings, we did have board members from time to
4	time which were actually out of the area meetings, and it
5	made it easier for them to call in on Zoom from wherever they
6	were. I definitely think it's a good way to go. But that's
7	only through June 23, 2023.
8	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Unless extended.
10	MS. RICHARDS: Unless extended. So the Amendment
11	would only be good through our June 2023 board meeting.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: Any other thoughts? Do we want to
13	do another recommendation or do we just want to
14	DIRECTOR RUIZ: That goes back to your question,
15	Doug. Do we need to make a recommendation, or could we
16	implement it on what we have here now?
17	MR. CAPLAN: I think based on other information
18	items on the agenda, staff can take the comments of the
19	members here and just move forward and prepare accordingly
20	for the next board meeting using the hybrid model. Again,
21	this senate alone doesn't require agency action at the
22	decision-making level. This really is a staff function to
23	implement SB189. Now, certainly if there are board members
24	that object to a hybrid model, they can ask that be placed on
25	the agenda again to take some formal action to require only

1	in-person meetings. I don't think that will likely happen at					
2	this agency. Again, this is a staff function, so staff can					
3	move forward accordingly.					
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: I think there's a clear consensus					
5	with the directors present that that's the way.					
6	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. Hearing the discussion we					
7	will go ahead and prepare for our October board meeting, or					
8	the next board meeting, to be a hybrid.					
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public comments as I					
10	think of it?					
11	AUDIENCE: I think that's a great idea.					
12	MS. RICHARDS: Okay. Here we go. Moving right					
13	along. I'm going to turn this over to Director					
14	Rubalcava-Garcia. She and Director Bagneris are bringing					
15	this item forward for the Board's consideration.					
16	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Thank you, Michelle.					
17	So I know we didn't vote on this today, but I think it'll be					
18	a good informational item that we could hopefully recommend					
19	that the board adopt at a later time. But for those of you					
20	who are not aware, a person of Chicano heritage is a					
21	Mexican-American. And the reason why I thought it was					
22	important for our agency to recognize this as Chicano					
23	Heritage Month in August is because of our roots to the					
24	Agricultural Association, and many Mexican-Americans found					
25	their way into California through a program call the Bracero					

1	Program, which was basically bringing people from other
2	counties to pick fruit and vegetables and help our
3	agricultural economy thrive. My great-great-grandparents
4	actually came here through that program, and we had a lot of
5	people from within our community who were essential in that
6	area. And still to this day, the Mexican community is a big
7	part of the Agricultural Association work that is being done.
8	With that being said, Santa Ana is a city in Orange
9	County, and they were one of the first cities to also
10	recommend Chicano Heritage Month be celebrated in August in
11	the country. That then started a movement at the
12	congressional level which was presented by current
13	Congressman, Lou Correa, who is also of Chicano decent, and a
14	lot of other congressional members of Congress who joined him
15	in that effort, and the resolution was passed at that level
16	as well. So I would like to recommend to this board that we
17	also consider Chicano Heritage Month be celebrated in August
18	by the fair.
19	And I want to give a little bit of background on the
20	culture in general. For those of you who are not familiar
21	with it, it was 1970's-60's and 70's, it was a time of great
22	contention for the Mexican-American community. And many
23	people saw the Chicano culture as something that was bad, and
24	they would refer to them it was a negative. It also led
25	to Chicano riots and other things in the City of Anaheim and

1	other places in Orange County. But it is really a source of					
2	pride for the people who are within the community. It's a					
3	way of celebrating, dressing, the cars they drive, the food					
4	they eat. I'm from within that community, we have a					
5	handshake and everything.					
6	So for us it is something for to be celebrated and					
7	not something that should be seen as a negative. I ask that					
8	my fellow board members today consider that as well. I could					
9	read the resolution just for the record, if that's okay?					
10	MS. RICHARDS: It's E.					
11	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Thank you, Michelle, for					
12	being on top of that.					
13	And I am actually raising two little					
14	Mexican-American Chicanas as well. So for us it's important					
15	that they remember their heritage.					
16	So the background of the mission of the OC Fair and					
17	Events Center is to create equitable community access to					
18	agriculture, entertainment, culture, and educational					
19	experiences. Chicano Heritage Month in August is an					
20	important time to celebrate the contributions of Mexican					
21	Americans to the history of the United States. Historically,					
22	the term "Chicano" was previously used to insinuate					
23	inferiority but was later transformed into a term of					
24	empowerment used to embrace and uplift the Mexican-American					
25	community.					



1	The Chicano movement gained prominence in the 1960's					
2	and 70's when many community members advocated for social and					
3	political empowerment of the Mexican-American community. The					
4	Chicano community has been subjected to educational					
5	segregation, continues to earn less pay than non-Hispanic					
6	employees with similar skills, and face greater rates of					
7	incarceration compared to non-Chicano individuals.					
8	Systematic prejudices targeting the Chicano population have					
9	existed for decades and most recently became even more					
10	apparent as domestic terrorist attacks surge as seen in the					
11	2019 shooting in El Paso, Texas. Chicano leaders spearheaded					
12	the fight for labor rights and education reform landmark					
13	desegregation case Mendez vs Westminster. The Mendez case					
14	was the supporting case for Brown vs the Board of Education,					
15	which led Orange County and eventually the State of					
16	California to be the first state to make segregation in					
17	schools illegal.					
18	Delores Huerta and Caesar Chavez are prominent					
19	figures in agriculture and the overall labor movement and					
20	advocated for workers, immigrants, and women's rights. The					
21	Chicano population comprises of 61.4% of the US Latino					
22	population. The Chicano community values family and					
23	encourages a sense of comradery and companionship within each					
24	household, and serves as a means of Mexican lineage and					

ensuring principle traditions from Chicano culture as

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instilled	in	future	generations.
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Embracing Chicano heritage is a source of pride in
our community. The elimination of Chicano discrimination
requires the awareness and acknowledgement of the communitys
struggle and the culmination of decades worth of
marginalization. Chicanos have contributed to Orange County
in a significant way and continue to represent all areas of
business, education, arts, culture, legal and law
enforcement, government, technological and scientific
advancements, and agriculture in the United States.

In 2021, as I mentioned, the City of Santa Ana was the first major municipality in the United States to declare August as Chicano Heritage Month. Most recently U.S. Congressman Lou Correa sponsored a bill to federally recognize Chicano Heritage Month in August. It is recommended that the OC Fair & Event Center Board of Directors adopt this resolution to recognize August as Chicano Heritage Month. The Board of Directors recognizes the significance of Chicano Heritage Month as an important time to celebrate the significant contributions of Mexican-Americans to the agricultural and overall history of Orange County and the State of California.

That is the gist of it. But I will go ahead and turn it back over to Chair LaBelle and see if there's any questions.



1	CHAIR LA BELLE: Are there any public comments at
2	this time? Any comments from the directors?
3	DIRECTOR RUIZ: No. I just wanted to congratulate
4	Director Rubalcava and Director Bagneris for bringing this
5	forward. I think it's long overdue, and I am looking forward
6	to seeing as part of the annual OC Fair Chicano Heritage
7	Month.
8	Again, this goes back many years, and I'm glad that
9	this is finally being recognized not only here but through
10	other cities as well and throughout the state. Once again,
11	thank you for bringing this forward.
12	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Thank you. And I also
13	just want to highlight in 1944 one of our person within
14	the community, Gustavo Areano, who is a syndicated writer.
15	LA Times just recently wrote an article on the 1944 case that
16	desegregated swimming pools in California in general. The
17	city I live in, Anaheim, my grandparents could only swim in
18	the public pool once a week because they would drain it the
19	next day so that the Mexicans so everybody else could swim
20	in it. So it is significant in our lifetime, our
21	grandparents' lifetime, that this still occurred. So I'm
22	grateful that we are able to have this discussion today and
23	to recognize a community that deserves to be recognized.
24	Thank you.
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: I want to thank Natalie and Ashley

1	for bringing this forward. I agree completely. I guess my
2	question is back to the recommendation. Obviously, can we
3	recommend that to the full board? Maybe this is something we
4	could bring back to the next special board meeting or what's
5	your thought on that, Josh?
6	MR. CAPLAN: Well, the committee here can recommend
7	to the full board to adopt this resolution, or if the
8	committee prefers the committee that brought this
9	resolution forward today, if they prefer to have it back on
LO	the full agenda outside of the consent calendar for the next
L1	meeting so there can be further discussion by the board.
L2	I'll defer to the committee on what it would prefer it to do
.3	if they would rather have it on the public consent calendar
L4	for the next meeting, or have it be a separate agenda item
L5	under Governments.
L6	CHAIR LA BELLE: And I defer to Natalie. What's
L7	your thoughts? Whatever your preference is.
L8	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: In this situation, since
L9	I'm here as the only representative from that committee, I
20	also just want to get the thoughts of my fellow board
21	members. Do you think it would be best to just put it on as
22	a consent item or should we address it? I think that next
23	week we're probably going to have a lot of stuff on the
24	agenda, so I'm completely open to what the two of you think

as well.

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1	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I'm open to either one. And I
2	really look forward to incorporating this into the
3	fairgrounds. Whether we do a designated weekend that really
4	celebrate this, or even a standalone event like we do with
5	some of our other groups at the fairgrounds to continue with
6	our mission and our new mission statement about making this a
7	meeting ground and community square and doing some standalone
8	festivals or standalone celebrations just to build on the
9	educational aspects of this as well. But I would be
10	comfortable with whatever you're comfortable with.
11	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes, same here. It's an event that
12	has been long overdue. I'm good with either one. Whatever
13	your recommendation is, I'll support whichever one you want
14	to do.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: We can put it on the
16	consent calendar for next time. If the board wishes to pull
17	it off the consent calendar, we can have further discussion
18	on things we would like to you know, ideas we would like
19	to celebrate, that would be great.
20	CHAIR LA BELLE: So the committee recommends that it
21	be a consent item at the next board meeting. Do we need a
22	consensus? Do we need to vote again?
23	MR. CAPLAN: I think there should still be a vote on
24	the record. Something would be a recommendation to approve
25	the resolution, and if that motion passes here, then that is

1	what will land on consent calendar for the next meeting.
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I would recommend that we pass the
3	resolution and place on the consent calendar at our October
4	meeting.
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Do we have a motion? Do we
6	have a second?
7	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Second.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Summer, could we call the roll,
9	please?
10	MS. ANGUS: Chair LaBelle?
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: Yes.
12	MS. ANGUS: Director Rubalcava-Garcia?
13	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes.
14	MS. ANGUS: Director Ruiz?
15	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes.
16	MS. ANGUS: And Director Aitken?
17	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Yes.
18	MS. RICHARDS: All right. Moving right along.
19	Wrap-up presentation of the 2022 OC Fair. So we
20	have quite a lot to share with you. Did you feel the
21	sunshine? Saw a lot of people out there feeling the
22	sunshine.
23	I want to remind the board of the strategic goals
24	that this board set for the organization for the 2022 fair.
25	To increase board-directed fair admission ticket donations to

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local nonprofits from 2,500, which we did in 2021, to 5,000 this year. And we didn't quite get to this, but to use board assistance to identify foundations to supplement ticket donations with food and carnival rides, but we'll continue to work on that. Another goal was to identify at least five new local OC businesses to participate in the 2022 OC Fair. We'll go over that as well. To develop a mini-campaign focusing on affordable family fun with benchmark metrics. To achieve guest satisfaction ratings above 4.0 in all patron survey categories. We'll go over that as well. To introduce at least one new family-friendly exhibit or attraction. And then to present an annual state-of-the-fair address to the board and public, which we did in June.

So let's jump back up to the first bullet, increasing board-directed fair admissions. Look at the list of tickets that were donated to the neediest in our community. 5,142 ticket donations. And it was such a personal pleasure of mine to accompany all of our board members to present these tickets in person. We have some amazing non-profits in our community that are working with the neediest, and I felt so good, and I know all of you did too, that we put tickets in the hands of people who would never be able to afford to come to the fair. And it was very, very gratifying to go along with all of you to present those. So "yay" to all of us on that.



CHAIR LA BELLE: Could I just comment on that,
Michelle? I personally had got the opportunity to meet a
number of people that I would not have met had we not done
this. One of them was the Anaheim Rotary Non-profit
Foundation, and as Michelle and I presented tickets to them,
it went to The Boys and Girls Club and YMCA, we found out
that the gentleman that was heading this up has actually
worked at the fair back in the 70's when it was a much
different situation. He explained to us how they counted the
money and how informal a lot of that stuff was. So it was
really a good experience. I think I learned as much with the
groups that I worked with, and I'm sure my other fellow
directors did the same. So it was a great suggestion and a
great idea, Michelle.
MS. RICHARDS: I think our board members did a
phenomenal job of choosing those non-profits that really
served the neediest in our community, and I look forward to
doing that again in 2023 with all of you.
So the other goal was to support local small
businesses. We wanted to add at least five local OC
businesses to the fair. Well, we added ten new merchants
from Orange County. You can see the list here and where they
are headquartered. And we added two new concessionares from
Orange County: MoonGoat Coffee from Santa Ana and Sweets

from Aliso Viejo. So our team did a really good job of

reaching out into the community and bringing those new local OC businesses into the OC Fair.

Okay. We also had a goal within our regular marketing campaign to launch an affordable, fun mini-campaign to make sure our guests know where they can save money at the fair. First and foremost, we went out big with our messaging that we did not take an increase in admission or parking, and we haven't since 2017. So the price of admission to the fair and the parking is significantly lower than other attractions in Santa Ana -- or in Orange County, in general. And we hope to keep it that way for 2023 as well.

There were 5000 rack cards that were distributed at pre-fair community and marketing events focusing on the free attractions and activities. And the board members here might remember we distributed those to you at the June board meeting. It was the rack card that had a list with all of the things that are free with price of admission to the fair.

We introduced again the \$4 Taste of Fair promotion. That was highlighting 60,000 Fair Food Guides which were new this year. Many, many of our guests took advantage of the \$4 Taste of Fair on Thursdays, where they could sort of graze through the fair with just spending a few dollars.

We -- the Read and Ride program that we do in conjunction with our carnival provider, where kids fill out a book report and they get a free carnival ride, and almost

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8,000 kids participated in that.

We had eight separate E-blasts in June, July, and August which focused specifically on free attractions and activities at the fair. We were able to reintroduce the wristbands, the unlimited-ride wristbands, there were over 51,000 of those sold during the fair. People love those. And then during the course of the fair, we distributed seven press releases that were focused on value and those included tips on savings in both English and Spanish.

So what did our quests say? Because the goal was to score a 4.0 or higher in each of our patron survey categories. So let me help you through this chart. First of all, the survey method that we use and the program that we use considers anything above a 3.15 to be a high level of satisfaction by our quests. So you can see the scores for overall enjoyment and overall experience and overall value for 2021 fair compared to 2022. So we saw a big jump year over year in overall enjoyment, a good jump in overall experience, and a very, very slight decrease in overall value. When we look at the comments that we saw on social media and part of the patron survey, the cost of food was certainly a concern. The cost of carnival rides were certainly a concern as well. And I know our team did an excellent job of working with the concessionares to try to bring those prices down.



1	We saw a 12% increase year over year in total
2	impressions on social media, 44.6 million total impressions,
3	almost 1.3 total engagements on social media. We gained
4	almost 22,000 new followers on our social media platforms.
5	You can see Twitter was up, Facebook up, Instagram up, and
6	TikTok was way up. During the course of the fair, 23 days,
7	we only had 67 written guest comments and complaints. Now,
8	we heard a lot from our guests on social media, very, very
9	positive for the most part. But we did hear a lot about the
10	cost of food and carnival rides, and you can see that that's
11	reflected in that overall value score.
12	DIRECTOR AITKEN: So the survey categories, is this
13	the survey where you use the QR code, like, at our Guest
14	Information booths or is this something to be emailed to
15	folks after?
16	MS. RICHARDS: We push out a survey every day to
17	those who purchase tickets. So we have that growing data
18	because those tickets are sold online. Yeah.
19	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Inflation definitely hit
20	the fair.
21	MS. RICHARDS: Oh, yes. Yes, it did.
22	DIRECTOR AITKEN: And do we know what percent of, I
23	guess, ticket purchasers responded to survey?
24	MS. RICHARDS: I don't know that off hand, but we
25	can certainly get that information. Okay. Another goal was

new family-friendly exhibits. For anybody that went through
the explorium, you saw the California Fresh Exhibit, and the
Fun on the Farm hands-on play activities. There was so much
to do in the explorium for families. Selfie and photo ops,
Kaleidoscope Fun. There was nutrition and agriculture with
the My Plate magnet table, Build-a-Flower activity. The
Farm-to-Table Ball Wall, education, food, and farm facts.
Kids got to climb on the wooden tractor and the train and the
sandbox. My God, that sandbox was such a simple thing, but
families loved it.
And of course, we introduced our new foodie, Sunny

And of course, we introduced our new foodie, Sunny the Lemon was part of our traveling family-friendly exhibit as well. So we had some things that returned from 2019, and our guests were so excited to see them come back. We weren't able to bring them back in 2021, but they were here. Like the OC Fair Fun Run, the 5K Fun Run returned after being gone for two years. We had great participation there. The action sports arena was reactivated. The Brew Hee Haw Craft Beer Festival took place the first weekend. We had Monster Trucks, Speedway, and Demolition Derby, my favorite motor home madness.

I mentioned earlier we brought back the unlimited ride wristbands on Wednesdays and Thursdays. And people loved that. That was really excellent. I mentioned as well the Read and Ride Program came back. And we had a live --

Junior Livestock auction. So we weren't able to do that in 2021. And we grew our Group Events program during the course of the fair. We had 12 family and corporate groups that rented out our Club OC area for group events, and we want to continue growing that. So some fun numbers to share: We had 1,055,173 fairgoers -- and by the way, that is almost exactly the same number that we had in 2021. So that controlled attendance model really, really helps with planning. 11 of those days were sold out.

Our entries—competitive entries program in the photography, fine arts, home arts categories up 20%. So people were busy during the pandemic. We had 9,871 competitive entries during the fair. 2.5 million carnival rides. And I think Sophie was responsible for about half of those. We had 20 piglets, 5 goats and 4 peachicks were born at Centennial Farm I don't know if you saw the peachicks. The peachicks were adorable, the little peacock chicks that were born during the fair. The guest services team fielded almost 14,000 phone calls. And to know that 14,000 phone calls came in and only resulted in 67 complaints. That was pretty fun. 231,736 cars parked in our lots. We had 153 animals that were brought to the auction, the Junior Livestock auction, and that results in almost \$243,000 for 4H and FFA kits. A great showing.

Over 13,000 visitors to Heroes Hall, and those



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visitors decorated a thousand post cards for active military and veterans. Oh, gosh. Sorry. I went through that way too auick. Yes. We had 12 sold-out concerts in the Hangar, eleven sold-out events in the Action Sports Arena, and 12 sold out shows in the Pacific Amphitheater. So it was a great season for numbers. So what were the results? Well, if you look at 2019, that was the year that we had a full fair unlimited attendance. You can see our revenue was 36.5 millon followed by about \$22 million in expenses, resulting in net proceeds of 14.5 million. We came back in 2021 with our new model, held our revenue about the same, brought our expenses way down, resulted in the \$22,000,000 bottom line, and we beat that this year. So these are still preliminary unaudited numbers but we had revenue of \$43.7 million. had expenses of 18.7 millon, bottom line \$29.4 million and that would be used to help found our site plans so we can continue to improve the property and bring more, better, different programming to the OC Fair.

So what did we learn? Well, we learned that the annual pass is important to a lot of people -- a lot of people. We knew it going into the fair, unfortunately we weren't able to reintroduce it, but we are committed to introducing an annual pass in some form in 2023, but still being able to control our attendance. We don't want to bring back the burden in the neighborhoods and the staff being



1	overwhelmed and not being able to manage our resources.
2	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I know you probably
3	don't have this one now, but how many annual passes did we
4	sell in 2019?
5	MS. RICHARDS: About 18,000.
6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Oh, wow.
7	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah. Yep.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: Michelle, do you have some initial
9	thoughts on how you might bring it back and what form?
10	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah, it would probably be a limited
11	number that are sold and create a, you know, a different kind
12	of experience that perhaps there are certain days that are
13	blacked out for use. So I know the team will come up with a
14	great model, but they are deep in discussions about that
15	already.
16	CHAIR LA BELLE: Good. Good.
17	MS. RICHARDS: I want to try and get that out
18	there.
19	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Can we is there a way also to
20	just bring into that For Natalie and I, our home park does
21	things quite well, but they still have a reservation system.
22	So are we going to try and incorporate kind of like the Magic
23	Key Model of yes, you have an annual pass, but it's still
24	reservation based?
25	MS. RICHARDS: Possibly. I don't know if the team

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1	has discussed that. But that's a possibility too, that you
2	have to put in your days that you want to come to the fair.
3	What we don't want to do is go back to 80,000 people being
4	crammed onto these fairgrounds. It's terrible the
5	traffic it's a terrible guest experience. So we don't
6	want to lose that, but if we could bring back the annual pass
7	in some form so those super fair fans that love to come to
8	the fair multiple times, then we are going to do that next
9	year.
10	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Even Disneyland is
11	uncomfortable at this point. Right? Like, I still think
12	there is a limited amount. I don't know. I don't go often,
13	but when we have been, it's already crowded.
14	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. Exactly. We know food and
15	carnival prices are a big concern, and we are going to
16	continue to work on that. We knew it last year, and now it
17	was confirmed this year that controlled attendance equals
18	more profitability. People have a better experience.
19	They're able to get to the front of the line, to buy their
20	food, to ride the carnival rides, and to experience all the
21	fair has. Bigger is not always better, and we learned once
22	again, that people love the OC Fair, truly, truly love the OC
23	Fair.
24	So we have some photos that we wanted to share with
25	you. Just some of our favorites from the fair to kind of

1	bring back that experience. Look at the look on that little
2	kid's face. He was either told, "You have to eat the whole
3	plate of cookies," or told he couldn't have any of those
4	cookies. Right? Yellow sunshine with the jet landing on
5	your head.
6	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And people were so happy
7	to be back to the 4H agriculture and the pig races are my
8	favorite.
9	MS. RICHARDS: Look at this kid in one of the food
10	eating contests. Heroes' hall. It was great to see so many
11	visitors to Heroes' Hall this year as well. People always
12	hanging upside down at the carnival; right?
13	And you can't forget the food. So it was a very,
14	very good fair. Congratulations to everyone for that.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Congratulations to you
16	guys.
17	Also, from a safety perspective it was a safe fair;
18	right? There was not any major incidents to be reported.
19	MS. RICHARDS: No, it was a very good and that's
20	another challenge when we have unlimited attendance is the
21	safety and security. When you put that many people together
22	in one place with controlled attendance, you know, it is a
23	better experience. And of course, our evolved gate system,
24	security system, we had that in place this year, and will be
25	again in 2023. We believe we are the first fair to have used

1	that evolved system last year, and now you'll see lots of
2	venues using it.
3	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I think we might be the
4	first, like, theme park using it. Even when you go to the
5	Angel game or Disneyland, there's back-up. So on the
6	innovation front.
7	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Michelle, out of the complaints that
8	we've gotten, other than the carnival rides and the food,
9	were there any from the neighborhood?
10	MS. RICHARDS: You know, I asked the same question
11	of our team because we are using new software to track all of
12	the guest comments, and there wasn't a single standout, you
13	know? It was kind of across the board, but I will tell you
14	that the neighbors were probably the loudest voices about the
15	super pass not being offered. They really love to come to
16	the fair every day or most days, and so they really missed
17	the annual pass. So I took lots of phone calls myself on
18	that one. I even had a neighbor who was willing to come and
19	volunteer her time working at the fair in exchange for a
20	super pass.
21	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Wow.
22	MS. RICHARDS: I would rather have our neighbors
23	wanting to come to the fair than complaining about traffic,
24	noise, and congestion.
25	All right. I know we have one public comment. So,



Reggie?

REGGIE MUNDEKIS: Hi. Reggie Mundekis. Thank you
for the opportunity to address you today on this. I am a
long-time fair fan. I went to the fair this year with my
niece from Iowa, who was out visiting for a work conference.
So when I told her one of the things I wanted to do with her
was to take her to the OC Fair, I could hear the
disappointment in her voice. Okay? She had already told me
she does not like fairs, and that if we went to the fair, we
would have to go do something else she wanted to do later on,
like a nature walk. I was like, "Okay. Fine. That's cool."
We each get one thing we get to pick. So we got up we
went the last day of the fair, because that's when she was
scheduled come out. We went out, we got breakfast, got to
the fair right as it opened, and she looks around and goes,
"Wait a minute. This doesn't look like our fairgrounds."
She is from Des Moines, Iowa where the State Fair of Iowa is,
and we go through security, and she is looking around like,
this worked really well. We get in, she gets her map, she
gets her food map, and she immediately starts with, "Wait a
minute. There's so much to do here."

So we hit Centennial Farm, because that's right next to the gate we came in. She grew up on a farm, she loves all that stuff. You know, it's 2:00 in the morning, cows got out. Guess what? We're all getting up and chasing the cows.



All that stuff. So she gets to Centennial Farm and is like,
"It doesn't smell, and the animals are cleaner than my
brothers were growing up." So we walk around, and she meets
the landscaping crew on the borough and was very impressed
with the work that they are doing and very impressed by the
critters. She had a corndog from Hotdog on a Stick and
pronounced it the best corndog she's ever had, and it's one
of her favorite foods. She actually said, "It's the first
time I've gotten one that was hot." Okay. Totally impressed
by the clean bathrooms and the fact that there's Porta
Potties. And we have drinking fountains that work that give
you water that you want to drink, because she had her water
bottle with her.
So by the end of the day, she made me she kept,

So by the end of the day, she made me -- she kept, like, looking at her map making sure she got to see everything she wanted to see, looked at it and said, "You know, this was really great. We could come back here, and this is something you could actually use for a vacation."

So I just wanted to share it with you. And before I run out of time, there's Meet Cute possibility. City of Orange has a mascot, which looks like the cousin of our Orange mascot. And okay, City Counsel Mayor up there is always into like the Cute thing City Council meeting. I'm thinking the backstory is "cousins." You know? Just like a meet Cute. Any time you need something that's cute that you



Τ	need to get a photo op out for a press release. You know?
2	So thank you.
3	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you, Reggie. That means a lot
4	to all of us.
5	MR. KARNS: Our corn dogs are better.
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Any other director comments?
7	I have just one. My 13-year-old granddaughter,
8	Elle, has been coming to the fair I know Ashley and Robert
9	and Natalie have seen her since she was three years old, the
10	little car ride she started on and the faster the better.
11	She's the quietest person you would ever want to meet, but
12	when it comes to rides, the faster the better. She came with
13	a friend of hers, her brother, a couple of friends of her
14	brother, and her mother, and the other kids' mother. The
15	first thing she did, she started talking about what's that
16	ride? The Titan, the one that you go upside down and flip
17	around. She finally talked two of her friends into going on
18	the ride with her, and they needed a fourth. So my
19	daughter-in-law and Elle went on the ride. First thing Elle
20	said when she got off the ride is, "This is great. We are
21	going to do it again next year." And my daughter-in-law
22	said, "Once is enough."
23	MS. RICHARDS: She earned the right not to ever have
24	to ride it again.
25	CHAIR LA BELLE: I think that's the ride your mom

1	was on a couple years back.
2	DIRECTOR AITKEN: She's insane, Doug. She's
3	fearless. I am not.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Anyway, it was a great story. They
5	had a fantastic day. They enjoyed everything. They haven't
6	been since Covid. So it was really good, really great. And
7	I want to thank the staff, the directors for everything they
8	have done to make this a very successful event.
9	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you for coming to the fair, for
10	bringing your families to the fair, and participating in all
11	of the events. It was a real joy to get to know your
12	families. I can't believe how your kids are growing. I
13	mean, they are true fair brats, right? I mean, they are all
14	fair brats.
15	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: And I can't believe that
16	they are taller than us now.
17	MS. RICHARDS: It truly was a great fair. We
18	enjoyed it as well.
19	DIRECTOR AITKEN: Did you see how far the apple
20	falls from the tree? I accidentally, on opening day, got on
21	the swing ride that I thought was the kid's swing ride that's
22	on the ground, and it went straight up in the air. I thought
23	I was going to die. It started lifting off the ground, and I
24	don't like heights. It was super scary, and I was screaming
25	the entire time.

1	CHAIR LA BELLE: My granddaughter loves that one,
2	too.
3	DIRECTOR AITKEN: It's higher and faster than you
4	think.
5	MS. RICHARDS: It'll be back before we know it. So
6	that's the fair. Here we go.
7	Next item is 8G and this is an information item for
8	the board chair to appoint a two-person task force to make
9	recommendations for the officers of the board for the
10	upcoming year.
11	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Michelle. I would like
12	to ask Ashley and Natalie if they would serve as the
13	committee to bring back their recommendations to the October
14	board meeting?
15	MS. RICHARDS: Very good.
16	DIRECTOR AITKEN: I accept.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I accept. Thank you for
18	the opportunity.
19	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Very good. Thank you.
20	MS. RICHARDS: And that's an information item
21	because the board chair has the prerogative to name
22	committees at any time.
23	All right. Then we move on to committee reports.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. What's the first one?
25	MS. RICHARDS: The first one is the Leadership

Committee.

CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. Newton and I met with Michelle to prepare the agenda for this meeting. We also discussed the item related to the foundations, and that will be coming back to the full board at the October meeting. Each of the foundations will be meeting in advance of that to discuss their thoughts relative to the MOUs, the bylaws, and that sort of thing. We are going to ask that the Chair of both of those foundations be at the October meeting and the leadership committee will have some recommendations for consideration at that time.

MS. RICHARDS: Very good. I also want to note too that per board policy, Chair LaBelle participated in the pre-fair security briefing on June 29, and then both Chair LaBelle and Vice Chair Pham participated in the mid-fair security briefing that was held on August 3rd, and that's per board policy 5.07.

CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you.

MS. RICHARDS: The next is the Financial Monitoring and Audit Committee. Neither Director Bagneris or Kovacevich are here. I can give that report on their behalf. The district operations continued to perform very, very well and very favorably to the 2022 budget. Our year-to-date revenue as of the end of August, the \$48.2 million. That's favorable by \$1.9 million. Revenue for the month of August was



unfavorable to budget by \$846,000. That was mainly a lower-than-budgeted paid fair attendance. Even thou	gh the
2 lower-than-budgeted paid fair attendance. Even thou	_
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gate count was the same, we put more free or discoun	tea
4 tickets in the market than the year before, and then	we
5 budgeted for 40 performances in the Pacific Amphithe	ater,
6 booked 30, and we had two cancellations during the fa	air. So
7 that revenue was not realized. We did really well or	n the
8 expense side, year-to-date at the end of August, our	expenses
9 are \$31.5 million and that's favorable to budget by	\$4.8
10 millon. So for the year-to-date period ending Augus	t 31, net
proceeds are \$13.8 million, and that is \$3 million for	avorable
12 to budget. So we continue to perform very well again	nst
13 budget. Our cash and cash and you know, I'm going	g to save
14 the cash and cash investments for later.	
And then, of course, we talked about the aud	dit
during that committee report. And the committee met	with the

And then, of course, we talked about the audit during that committee report. And the committee met with the auditors and went through the audit report. And the next scheduled committee meeting is October 21. Okay? And then Facilities Committee is next.

DIRECTOR RUIZ: I think we pretty much covered everything on our report. Other than just, I just know one quick thing is I'm looking forward to hopefully breaking ground here for the screening to walk in Newport to walk here before on Heroe's -- on Veteran's Day. So I'm looking forward to that. Hopefully that will get done.



1 MS. RICHARDS: Yes. We are on track for that 2 project. 3 DIRECTOR AITKEN: And I think Ken wanted to give us 4 an update on the demo of the barns. MR. KARNS: Thank you, Director Aitken. Just a 5 little additional information since the committee met. As we 6 7 know through the infrastructure of the three barns and the 8 livestock area, they are beyond their use of life, and through the master site plan, are slated to be removed. 10 the completion of the fair, the middle barn was discovered to 11 be leaning over. 12 Our team had engineers out to write a report. Under 13 all the rules by which we do work through CCA, there is an 14 opportunity for the OC Fair to do work in an emergency. Upon 15 review of the thresholds by which an emergency is declared, we are still in discussion with CCA. We will not move 16 forward under emergency basis without the written consent of 17 both the Chair and the CEO. That's one of the caveats. 18 19 we are reviewing whether we need the threshold of an 20 emergency. Regardless of that, another threshold is the 21 value of the project of \$25,000 and the last threshold that 22 we want to make sure we meet is the signing authority of the 23 COO of \$50,000 or less. So in that, we have not proceeded 24 with any action beyond continuing research. 25 And in that, we may be back to the board asking for



1	money in October to proceed, if we can't proceed under an
2	emergency, or if additional time is needed to fully back the
3	projects. We are going to review the budgets to take down
4	all three barns since they are slated to come down anyway,
5	and have a tenting solution for the annual fair as it relates
6	to livestock exhibits. So in that, the full budget season is
7	upon us, and we might be back from before the board with a
8	full slate of capital expenditures, it might come to the
9	board as a full project at that time.
10	DIRECTOR AITKEN: So with the barn leaning, is it
11	closed and no one is going in it? It's not a safety issue
12	for anyone?
13	MR. KARNS: That's correct.
14	CHAIR LA BELLE: The item, I think, it's obviously
15	important on any item that's a health and safety item, that
16	we proceed ahead just as quickly as we can from a standpoint
17	of correcting the problem. So I do believe that the current
18	schedule is the facilities committee and staff will be
19	bringing forward recommendations at the October meeting for
20	the overall prioritization of projects.
21	MS. RICHARDS: For the master site plan?
22	CHAIR LA BELLE: Correct.
23	MS. RICHARDS: It's looking like that may be more
24	like November. The November board meeting is only three
25	weeks after the October board meeting so, we'll know a little



1	bit we'll know more in more detail about the timing in a
2	few weeks.
3	CHAIR LA BELLE: I know the board has previously
4	provided conceptual direction for lack of a better term as to
5	Phase One, Phase Two, Phase Three.
6	We know that the Equestrian Center and improvements
7	that are needed there, you know, are kind of at the top of
8	the list in terms of what we're doing and that triggers other
9	things.
10	MS. RICHARDS: We are following the presentation
11	made previously to the board on the different phases and
12	projects. We are following that exactly as we finalize the
13	concepts for the master site plan.
14	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you. Are there any public
15	comments on not only this report, but the other committee
16	reports? Okay.
17	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Chair LaBelle, I just
18	have a quick question. Just from a property perspective, the
19	barns are the ones for the 4H animals who are held here?
20	MS. RICHARDS: That's right.
21	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I didn't realize there
22	were three. I know you have to walk out but
23	MS. RICHARDS: Yeah.
24	CHAIR LA BELLE: And they have been there a long
25	time. They are older than I am, which is old.



MS. RICHARDS: All right. I'm going to come back to
the Community Affairs Committee. The Governance Committee
received a written report. I don't know if you want to
report by e-mail, If you want to brief on the sorry.
DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: On the governance
related to the public record to request that one?
MS. RICHARDS: Yes. I thought that you wanted to
DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Yes, I do. There was a
public records request that came in that we currently don't
have a policy that covers and I wanted to bring it to the
board for discussion today if to see if there is a desire to
have the Governance Committee go back and create a policy
that would address the concern that a member of the public
had. So to kind of you can correct me if I'm wrong. I
forgot the details. But the long and short of the public
records request was the use of personal devices during board
meetings and it was actually directed directly at me using my
phone, and there was a request for all of my text messages
during the board meeting. They also saw me outside and
wanted to know who I was speaking to during the meeting. We
currently do not have a policy that does not allow a board
member to utilize their personal devices during a board
meeting, so we wanted to bring it to the board. Chair
Cervantes and I, just to see if there is a will to have us go
back and explore a policy that would limit the use of

personal devices during board meetings. So I just wanted to
bring it back to my colleagues on the board to see if you
would like to have a discussion on the topic and give the
Governance Committee some direction.

CHAIR LA BELLE: I'm good with discussion on that, and I think that's appropriate. My only comment would be, as I indicated earlier, I rely very heavily on my iPad to be able to expand the size of the agenda and read the materials. That's how I prepare, and I think -- I certainly wouldn't want to be precluded from doing that. Because given my vision problems, which I think everyone is aware of, that's basically the way I can function best. So as long as whatever we are doing is related to the function of that particular meeting, whether it's some indication or reading or whatever. That would be my only thoughts, and I would fully support that going to the Governance Committee.

DIRECTOR AITKEN: I agree. I also use my iPad up here to take notes on people's public comments because I want to make sure I remember what people's concerns are, especially on hot-button issues where we have a lot of public speakers. And, you know, so I think that's actually an important -- it's the world we live in. I also think that, you know, in the event for those of us that have parents that we take care of, that have children we take care of, in the event of an emergency, I would like a second way for someone



1	to be able to contact me. But those are just my initial
2	knee-jerk thoughts, but you know, hopefully we can have a
3	broader discussion. I think it might be a solution looking
4	for a problem.
5	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yeah, I agree with what you said.
6	It's the world we live in. I not only have one, but I have
7	two phones. And I have the reason I have that You know, I
8	represent 4,000 men and women in the construction industry.
9	And I'm always getting texts. One time it was about four
10	years ago, I got a text when a member got killed on the job.
11	So, you know, I need to have these phones, and I need to be
12	responding to people quite often, more often than I would
13	like to. But that's just the way it is, and that's the world
14	we live it. So if we could explore something around that,
15	that would still allow me to use these, I would definitely
16	support that. But yes, I got to have my phones. Sorry.
17	MS. RICHARDS: Yes. I would add too, that we're
18	going to be, pretty soon, moving toward using iPads instead
19	of killing trees every month, too. With the all the paper,
20	so that's something we will be adding to our budget, so we're
21	moving towards electronic devices anyhow. So I think it
22	would be good to have a policy.
23	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: Perfect. So we will
24	take it back and we will draft a policy to bring back to the
25	board. We will also work with Josh on that. Because I do

want to --

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1	use my phone at the I am usually not taking notes related
2	to any fair or State business. My conduct is usually
3	communicating with my children because they have phones. So
4	they are text messaging me or asking me questions throughout
5	the day. But we will draft something and bring it back for
6	the board to review. And then we can decide what direction
7	to go from there. Thank you. And that's all we have, I
8	think, from governance side.
9	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Natalie.
10	MS. RICHARDS: And then the Community Affairs
11	Committee. Director LaBelle and Director Bagneris, did you

CHAIR LA BELLE: Yeah. Let me kind of introduce it. Elle was on the community affairs committee, and I appointed myself when she left. So Barbara and I communicated the board will remember probably about a year ago, we approved 50,000 for some static displays in the Pac Amp area that would kind of, you know, relate to all of the activities the board supports in terms of community affairs.

Staff completed their analysis of that. There was some discussion prior to my being on the committee of maybe looking at expending that to maybe some sort of electronic messaging system. Staff utilized a small portion of that \$50,000 to kind of determine whether or not that was feasible if the full board will ultimately decide to do that. It is

1	feasible. It is quite costly. Barbara and I did ask staff
2	if they would kind of look at some different options and kind
3	of keep the ball rolling. Hopefully we will have something
4	to bring back during the budget process in a couple of months
5	so the board can consider it.
6	I mentioned to Michelle that I was very impressed
7	with the graphics that our staff has done in terms of static
8	displays. And I think as a minimum that something definitely
9	of a lot of benefit. And then, I believe we are going to
10	have a presentation.
11	MS. RICHARDS: We are.
12	CHAIR LA BELLE: I'm going to turn it over to you.
13	MS. RICHARDS: Thank you. September 15 was the
14	start of Hispanic Heritage Month, and I'm going to turn it
15	over to our Chair Business Development Officer, Joan Hamill
16	to make a brief presentation in celebration of that.
17	MS. HAMILL: Good morning. First of all, I would
18	like to say as a person of Hispanic decent myself, I'm very
19	proud and extremely honored to be making this presentation

today celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month. As Michelle

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someone from a Spanish-speaking country. Hispanic Heritage
Month celebrates the contributions of people whose ancestors
came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, Central America, and
South America.

Its history dates back to 1968 when President Lyndon Johnson first recognized Spanish--Hispanic Heritage week. The celebrations expanded to a full 30-day period in 1988 by president Ronald Regan. The timing of Hispanic Heritage Month is significant because of it being split between two months. That's because of several significant dates during the 30-day period from mid-September through mid-October that are important to the Hispanic heritage and culture. September 15th -- whoops. Excuse me. September 15th is the anniversary of the independence of the Latin American countries of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaraqua.

September 16th is the day Mexico celebrates its independence. September 18th is the day Chile celebrates its independence. October 12th, Dia de la Raza, a holiday celebrating the heritage and culture of diversity of Latin America. According to the US Census Bureau, the Hispanic population in the United States has grown from 53 million in 2011 to nearly 63 million in 2020. California has the highest Hispanic population in any state, and in the past 10 years, the state's Hispanic population grew by 11%.



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Hispanics comprise 34.1% of Orange Countys population state wide, and according to the OC Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, there are 30,000 Hispanic-owned businesses in Orange County.

Hispanic heritage and culture is rich in Orange County and started centuries ago with families like the Yorba and Peralta families, which first settled here from There was a huge demand for -- as mentioned earlier, there was a huge demand for farm labor during World War 2 and in response in 1942, the US and Mexico entered into an agreement to create a quest worker program officially called The Emergency Farm and Labor Agreement, or commonly known as the Bracero Program. This program brought nearly 70,000 men from Mexico to work in Orange County from between 1942 and Many became citizens in Orange County in the late 1960s. Even as late as 1947, California schools were still segregated. Gonzalo Mendez and four other families from Orange County filed a federal civil lawsuit, Mendez vs Westminster, would precede the landmark 1654 The US Supreme Court decision in Brown vs Board of Education that ended segregation in the US. And this was referenced earlier by Director Rubacalva-Garcia during her presentation.

The Hispanic community is thriving in Orange County. Hispanics hold leadership positions at every sector of Orange County community including business, industry, education, government, the arts, and nonprofit sector. The Orange



1	County Hispanic business community celebrates many
2	accomplished leaders including Christopher Ayala, President
3	of the Hispanic Bar Association; Reuben Franco, CEO of the OC
4	Hispanic Chamber of Commerce; Susie Lopez Guerra, VP of OC
5	Hispanic Business Womens Association; and Zulma Arizmendi,
6	President of the National Hispanic Real Estate Professionals
7	Association in OC. There are countless other Hispanic
8	leaders in business education, government, the arts, and
9	non-profits throughout Orange County, as I mentioned.

7	Hispanics have always played a leading role in
8	agriculture industry starting with Cesar Chavez, Founder of
9	the American Farm Workers Association, who worked tirelessly
10	to improve conditions for Farm workers in California and the
11	nation. Michael Flores is a California Deputy of Agriculture
12	Secretary under Karen Ross. Mike Lopez is the Orange County
13	Bureau of Board of Directors and Cynthia Flores serves

California Agriculture Laborer Relations Board.

Hispanics in Orange County have assumed leadership and ownership rules within the agricultural field. There are 62 Hispanic agriculture producers in Orange County, 12% percent of all of the producers throughout the state of California that identify as Hispanic. On a national level, Hispanic operated farms account for 5.6% of agriculture sales and 3.6% of US farm lands. There is a growing number of young Hispanic agricultural producers and farm owners in the US who are more likely to have recently started farming operations compared to US producers overall, according the US Department of Education. The OC Fair and Event Center

1	recognizes the Hispanic Heritage month and celebrates the
2	Hispanic community. Thank you.
3	CHAIR LA BELLE: Excellent presentation.
4	MS. RICHARDS: And that concludes committee reports?
5	CHAIR LA BELLE: Okay. We have no closed session
6	today.
7	MS. RICHARDS: No closed session.
8	CHAIR LA BELLE: How about the CEOs?
9	MS. RICHARDS: I have a few more updates, if we
10	could stand any more updates. On Friday, June 24, so that
11	was a day after the June board meeting. Plus a conference
12	was held in this very room to announce that the Orange County
13	sustainability decathlon will take place at the OC Fair and
14	Event's Center in October of 2023.
15	In the photo, you'll notice State Senator Dave Min
16	in the middle, on the far right is Costa Mesa Mayor John
17	Stevens, and the other two gentlemen, Mike Moodian and Fred
18	Smolder, are the UCI professors and Chapman associates who
19	are leading the charge in bringing this great event.
20	I have to tell you that the event will feature
21	collegiate teams from schools around the world who will
22	compete to design and build sustainable homes. The event
23	will also include a massive expo with exhibits, vendors, and
24	demonstrators who will educate the community on
25	sustainability. Including move-in and move-out, the contract

1	for the event will expand 5 weeks, from September 23 through
2	October 20 of next year and generate approximately \$1 million
3	for the OC Fair and Event's Center. This was a combination
4	of nearly two years of hard work by our executive team, our
5	sales department, and operations departments to bring this
6	event to the OC Fair and Event Center navigating through
7	stiff competition, I might add, from the great park, but a
8	real win for the OC Fair. We are excited about that.
9	The Pacific Amphitheater kept rocking off after the
10	fair with six post-fair concerts, and what a great lineup.
11	Culture Club with Berlin had an amazing performance welcoming
12	back Boy Gorge in the Pacific Amphitheater for the first time
13	since 1985. Cole Swindel performed to a sold-out house,
14	followed by Steve Miller Band, Ramon Ayola, Pat Benatar, and
15	Jackson Brown. We are happy to report that Pull Stars Top
16	100 Amphitheater's Venues List just came out for Q3, and the
17	Pacific Amphitheater is number 14 worldwide. Worldwide.
18	That that ranking is based on total tickets sold and gross
19	revenue. So a really good showing for the Pacific
20	Amphitheater.
21	On a slightly less exciting note, we kicked off our
22	2023 budget process just this morning. And we have a public
23	budget study session planned for November 9, so more
24	information to come out about that, but mark your calendars.
25	Has anybody visited the planetarium at Orange Coast

College yet? Our employees got a treat earlier this week as we hosted our monthly all employee meeting there. It was great fun to walk across the street, we were quite a sight walking across the street. We watched a short presentation on our universe by Scott Mitchell, the planetarium director, and heard an update on the fair and other operations and we will like to thank Scott and all of our friends at the planetarium for hosting us. I highly recommend a visit if you haven't been. The planetarium is open to the public every Saturday. It's also available for field trips and rentals, and you can check out information on the Orange Coast College website.

We mentioned the 5K Fun Run was back as part of the 2022 OC Fair after a two-year absence, due to Covid. The annual partnership with the OC Fair provides an opportunity for families all over Southern California to participate in a fun race inside the OC Fair before opening. The net revenue from the event is shared between the District and the OC marathon. This year over 2,500 people participated in the Fun Run, generating net proceeds of \$24,456. Gary Kutcher, executive director of the marathon, presented us with our share, \$11,728. I know our own Joan Hamill did the Fun Run. Did you do the Fun Run? No? Okay. Sorry. Moving on. Because usually you do.

MS. HAMILL: I know. I might have slept through.



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1 MS. RICHARDS: All right. 2 CHAIR LA BELLE: There's no \$0.16 in there. 3 MS. RICHARDS: No, there is not. There's no cents 4 at all in that one. It's just a flat \$11,728. Okay. for the big numbers. So as I mentioned earlier, on behalf of 5 6 the finance committee, our year-to-date net proceeds as of 7 the end of August is \$13,000,779 -- and \$870, sorry. 8 a positive favorable variance of \$3 million against budget. And here's why I'm truly proud of this organization: 10 cash and cash equivalents at the end of August is over \$80 11 million. You might remember during the pandemic, we were 12 seeing that reserve go down, getting dangerously low. 13 this organization, over the past year and a half, has been 14 able to replace every bit of it and then some, it's a 15 year-over-year increase of \$17.3 millon or 27.6% and again, 16 this will go a long way in helping us put that money right 17 back in the property as we launch our master site plan. 18 we are very happy about that. And I'm going to hand things 19 back to Joan for a very quick events update. 20 MS. HAMILL: We will be immediately busy with our 21

MS. HAMILL: We will be immediately busy with our year-round event program right after the fair and through September. The last few events that we have in September are what you can see here. 2	Also this Saturday is Speedway in ASA and of course, every
3	Thursday, The Farmers Market to include today, from
4	9:00-1:00, and that happens in Lot D.
5	And moving right into October. Busy, busy month,
6	which is great. On the 1st to through the 31st, the Seasonal
7	Adventures Pumpkin Patch is returning once again, and that
8	would be located in Lot C. There will be three Speedway
9	events in October. The one on the first is National Speedway
10	Championships. The 8th brings Harley Night Finals with Side
11	Car Championships. And on the 15th is The Fall Classic, The
12	Gem Fair, takes place October 14th through 16th, and that is
13	held in the Costa Mesa building at the Santa Ana Pavilion.
14	And also that weekend, the 15th and 16th, it's the 45th
15	annual OC Home, Family, and Fun Expo, which takes place in
16	the Los Alamitos building. October 21 through the 23rd is
17	the OC Japan Fair making a return in 2022. And then on the
18	27th, Thursday, is Fight Club in the Hangar, once again.
19	Always a fan favorite.
20	And closing out the month on Saturday October 29 is
21	the Boo Haw Haw, a haunted Oktoberfest. And this is a
22	co-promotion with our friends From the Brew Hee Haw, who also
23	help us present the craft brew event that takes place during
24	the fair. The booth features three hours of unlimited
25	tastings from some of the nation's top breweries, and guests

1	can sample German lagers, IPAs, seltzers, ciders, kambucha,
2	and of course, there will be plenty of food available to
3	purchase throughout the night. And costumes are encouraged.
4	There is even a costume contest. Boo will be featuring
5	Barlin by Berlin, who just opened recently for the Culture
6	Club at the Pacific Amphitheater, with the special guest, The
7	Mismiths. I'm going to try to say that again. The Mismiths.
8	And that's a tribute band mashup of The Misfits and The
9	Smiths. That should be a lot of fun, once again.
10	Moving on to our educational assets, Centennial Farm
11	and Heroes Hall. Year round they are happening at Centennial
12	Farm. We have our wonderful docents that returned yesterday.
13	About 54 of our returning docents came for orientation and
14	preparation for the Junior Farmer and Discovery Day Tours,
15	which begin next week on the 28th and 29th, respectively.
16	For anyone interested in wanting to become a Centennial Farm
17	volunteer, there is still time to do that. We'll be having

couple of weeks, so I invite anyone come out to Centennial
Farms if they're interested in becoming a docent and making a
positive difference in the lives of many kids and teaching

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At Heros Hall the exhibit, Fighting for the Right to Fight. An African-American experience in military closed on the 16th of September. And we are preparing for an upcoming



1	exhibit that is a co-curated exhibit. And this exhibit is
2	titled, Armed Only With A Camera, World War 2 photography of
3	Stanley Troutman. And this exhibit details the story of WW2
4	war correspondant, Stanley Troutman, who carried no weapons
5	at all but instead a camera, as the title suggests. Troutman
6	was a civilian but he served his country side of the military
7	all the same, oftentimes putting his own life on the line in
8	the process. He was photographing the war in the South
9	Pacific Theater, including the devastated cities of Hiroshima
10	and Nagasaki after the dropping of the atomic bombs.
11	Profound stories and exhibit and it was a personal collection
12	of his family. Troutman lived in Orange County. And prior
13	to his passing at the age of 102 in January of 2020, Carol
14	Singleton had the incredible opportunity to meet and
15	interview Mr. Troutman at his Corona Del Mar home, where he
16	was living independently and was still as sharp as a tac and
17	could detail everything. The exhibit opens on Saturday,
18	October 15th with a small reception and programming.
19	Troutman's daughter, Gale Rinch, is also local, and several
20	family members will be in attendance that day. Actually, his
21	grandson will be a scheduled speaker.
22	Some of the members of the Press Photographer
23	Association of Los Angeles who are associates and peers of
24	Mr. Troutman will be in attendance on the 15th to honor him

and his legacy. And until that exhibit opens, Heros Hall

1	will be closed in preparation and installation of that
2	exhibit. And that concludes my update unless there are any
3	questions.
4	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Joan. Thank you,
5	Michelle. Any questions from the directors? Or audience?
6	Okay. I think that gets us to the comments from the Board of
7	Directors. Let's start with Ashley.

L4	the hard work and for making us a part of it, for making us
L5	proud.
L6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Ashley. Robert?
L7	DIRECTOR RUIZ: Yes. I also want to comment to
L8	Director Michelle, thank you. Good job as always and the
L9	staff as well for putting on an amazing fair. I didn't get
20	any complaints, just positives from people that attended, so
21	I just wanted to let you know to keep up the good work and
22	thank you for everything.
23	CHAIR LA BELLE: Natalie?
24	DIRECTOR RUBALCAVA-GARCIA: I want to thank Joan for
25	going through such a beautiful presentation for Hispanic



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1	Heritage Month. I think you did a great job articulating
2	everything in there, and I love all of the emphasis on all
3	the different people who are impacting Orange County and
4	agriculture so well done. Beautiful presentation. And thank
5	you for all you do.
6	CHAIR LA BELLE: Thank you, Natalie. I want to
7	ditto everyone's comments relative to the fair, and I too
8	agree that presentation was outstanding. A lot of
9	information there. Also, I will be working to see if I can
10	arrive at a date that works for a meeting of the board prior
11	to our October meeting to address the couple of rather urgent
12	items that we should move forward with as soon as possible,
13	we will make it as brief as we can. And it will just be
14	those two items and obviously public comments.
15	With that, the committee meeting is adjourned.
