# **How to Write a Buyer Letter**

As part of your market livestock project you get to participate in the OC Fair's annual Junior Livestock Auction. In order to put on an auction, you need buyers, so be sure to send out letters to potential buyers advertising your animal at auction. Here are some helpful tips on how to create a buyer letter:

- The more fun your letter, the better. Use paper with a design on it, perhaps a
  letterhead with a clipart of the type of animal you are showing, or include an
  appropriate picture of you AND your animal.
- A strong letter includes the following:
  - Letterhead with your information
  - Date
  - Introduction
  - Body then closing
  - Signature
  - Picture of you and your animal
- Check with your leader/advisor on what personal information you should use in your letter (i.e. return address).
- Always ask your advisor, a parent, or someone you know who is good at reviewing written documents to review your letter for possible spelling or grammar errors.
- Get ALL of your buyer letters mailed by JULY 1!!!

## SAMPLE LETTER
