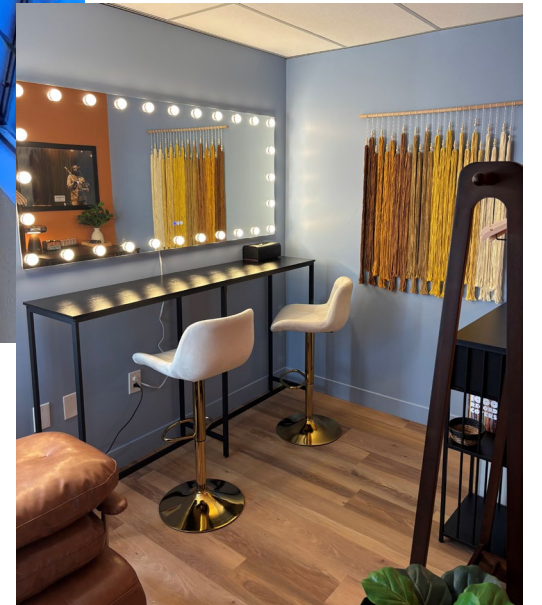

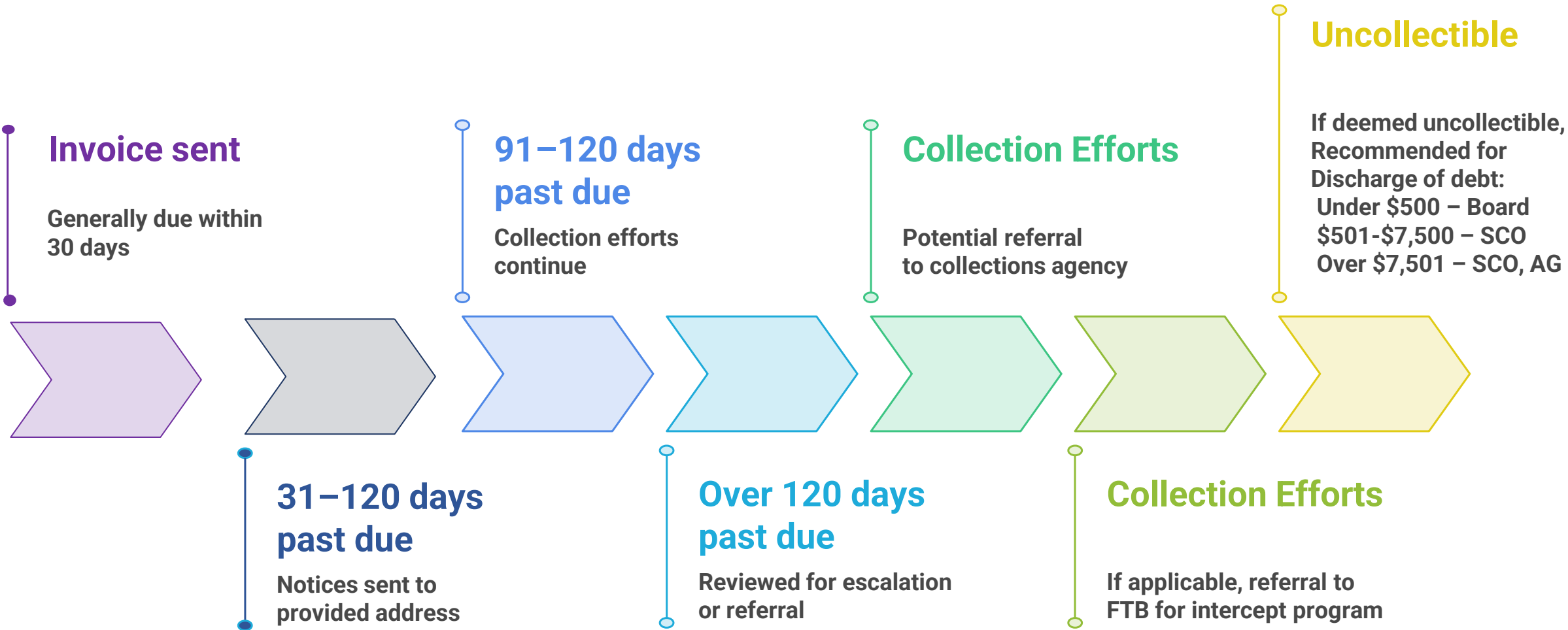
11A. Review of OCFEC Policies and Procedures for Collection of Outstanding Debt

The Fair Industry continues to be an important economic impact generator not just in Orange County but across all regions.

In an effort to define the true value of the industry, IAFE commissioned an economic impact study for the 2024 year.
