A monthly assessment of trends in water supply and use for Santa Clara County, California

Outlook as of April 1, 2023

On March 24, 2023, the State Water Project (SWP) increased its allocation from 35% to 75% of contract amount. Similarly, on March 28, 2023, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation increased its 2023 south-of-delta Central Valley Project (CVP) allocation from 75% to 100% of historic Municipal & Industrial (M&I) use and from 35% to 80% of agricultural allocation. Thanks to healthy winter storms, Santa Clara County's drought classification was changed in March from Abnormally Dry to "None." On April 11, 2023, the Board of Directors will consider rescinding its call for 15% water use reduction and transitioning from drought response to actions to make water conservation a way of life in Santa Clara County.

Weather

- Rainfall in San José:
 - » Month of March, City of San José = 3.74 inches
- Rainfall year total = 20.98 inches or 165% of average to date (rainfall year is July 1 to June 30)
- April 1 Northern Sierra snowpack was 190% of normal for this date

- No imported water delivered into Calero Reservoir during March 2023
- Total estimated releases to streams (local and imported water) during March were 80,370 acre-feet (based on preliminary hydrologic data)

Treated Water

- Below average demands of 5,010 acre-feet delivered in March
- This total is 89% of the five-year average for the month of March
- Year-to-date deliveries are 14,760 acre-feet or 90% of the five-year average

Groundwater

 Groundwater levels are increasing throughout the County due to the recent storms and seasonal recovery, Valley Water's managed recharge, and ongoing water conservation by the community. Groundwater levels in all monitoring wells but one are higher than last month and all are higher relative to March 2022, indicating most groundwater levels have recovered to healthy, predrought conditions. The end of 2023 groundwater storage is projected to be in Stage 1 (Normal) of the Water Shortage Contingency Plan. Valley Water continues to plan for rapidly evolving conditions

Imported Water

- To date in March, the SWP operated Banks pumping plant with an average daily export of 13,416 acre-feet, resulting in a total export of 389,071 acre-feet from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (data through March 30th)
- To date in March, the CVP operated Jones pumping plant with an average daily export of 8,094 acre-feet, resulting in a total export of 234,731 acre-feet from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (data through March 30th)
- Storage capacity in San Luis Reservoir is split between the SWP and CVP. The SWP's portion
 of San Luis Reservoir has filled, and excess water in the Delta has been made available to
 SWP contractors. The CVP's portion of San Luis Reservoir is expected to fill in early April

Conserved Water

- Saved 80,078 acre-feet in FY22 through Valley Water's long-term conservation program (baseline year is 1992)
- Long-term program goal is to save nearly 100,000 acre-feet by 2030 and 110,000 acre-feet by 2040
- On June 9, 2021, the Board called for a 15% reduction in water use compared to 2019 and for retailers, cities, and the County to implement local water restrictions. On May 24, 2022, the Board approved an ordinance to enforce outdoor water waste restrictions against runoff, midday watering, and watering after rainfall, and a limit of two days a week of watering for non-functional turf. On September 13, 2022, this ordinance was amended to include the State's ban against watering commercial, industrial, and institutional non-functional turf amongst its list of enforceable restrictions

Recycled Water

- Estimated March 2023 production = 945 acre-feet
- Estimated year-to-date through March = 2,187 acre-feet or 86% of the five-year average
- Silicon Valley Advanced Water Purification Center produced an estimated 1.6 billion gallons (4,803 acre-feet) of purified water in 2022. Since the beginning of 2023, about 740 acrefeet of purified water has been produced. The purified water is blended with existing tertiary recycled water for South Bay Water Recycling Program customers

Alternative Sources •

 As of December 10, 2019, Valley Water's wastewater contract right from Palo Alto/ Mountain View remains at 11,200 acre-feet/year
