The Wake One Water Plan will help ensure the County has water to equitably support all aspects of our growing population.

What is the Wake One Water Plan?

The Wake One Water Plan is a 50-year water plan that upholds equitable access to clean and abundant water.

The Plan will look at:

- ◆ water supply
- ◆ wastewater treatment
- ◆ stormwater and flood management
- ◆ groundwater protection

Our aim is to look at water planning holistically. We're working with County and local governments to make sure the Plan aligns with development and transportation planning.

The One Water Plan will align with Wake County's comprehensive plan. It will help the County in its mission to create a county that is inclusive and equitable, healthy and active, and sustainable and vibrant.

The final Plan will seek to develop solutions that provide economic, environmental, and social co-benefits to all.

There are many challenges that increase water unpredictability. Wake County has the highest growth rate in the state. A changing climate also impacts our water resources.

Visioning

The County, with the help of engaged stakeholders, is developing a community vision with goals for water management over the next 50 years.



Assessment

We're also developing tools to analyze different strategies that consider future growth and climate change scenarios.
